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Christmas Shopping At Record Pace

A record Christmas business, smashing all former records in almost every business category, is the big story of this week in Lamb county as the area gets ready for Christmas.

The roaring business, which started later than usual, is ranging the business front, department stores, drug stores, auto dealers and auto supply stores, appliance dealers and variety stores.

The word is "ahead" in almost every one of more than a dozen businesses checked in a Leader survey Tuesday and Wednesday.

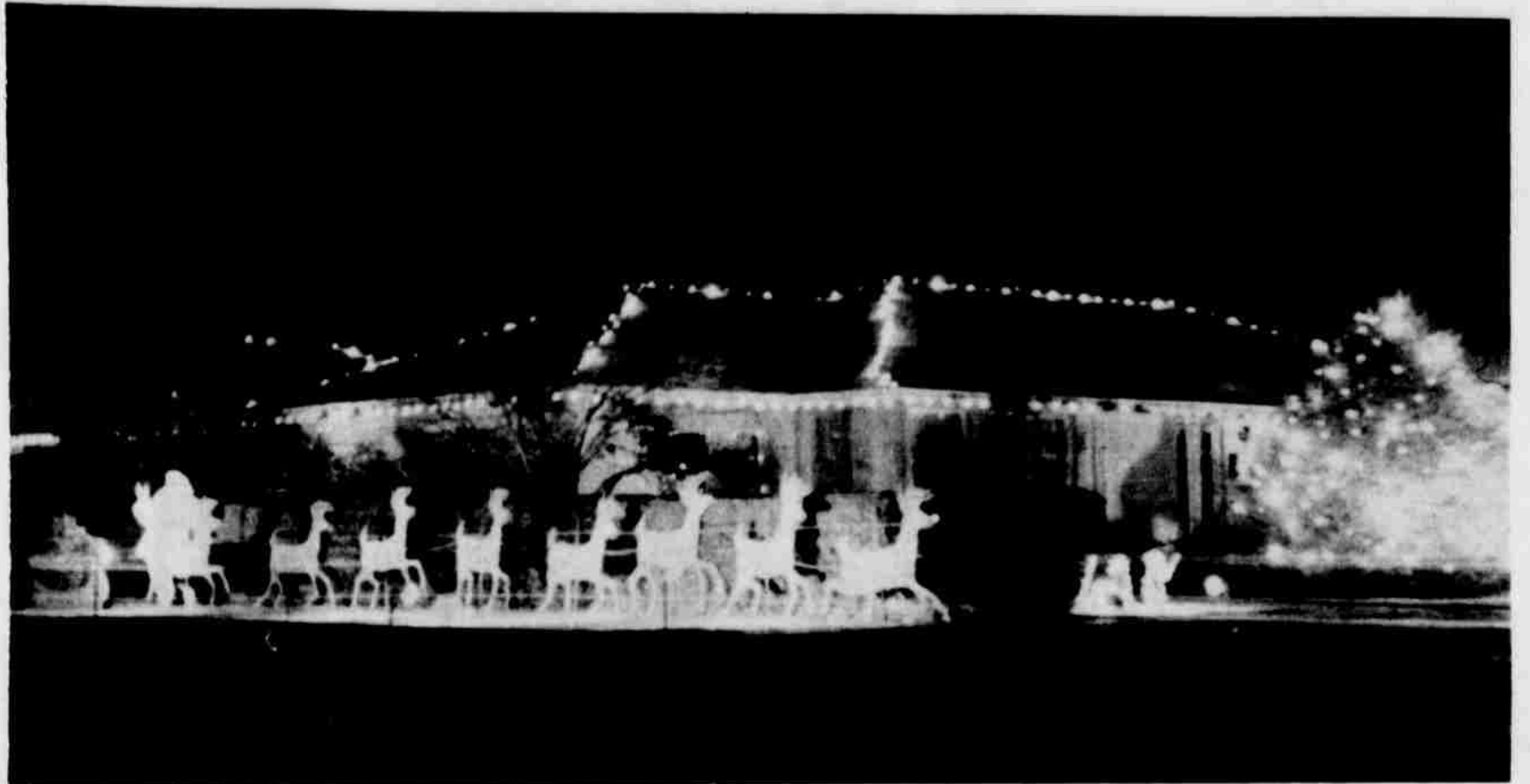
"We're considerably ahead of last year," reported one department store. "Business started about a week later, but it really broke loose and is setting new records every day."

An auto supply store: "We are far beyond our anticipated sales, and not in just strictly Christmas merchandise. A lot of people are buying tools and accessories from regular stock as gifts. But it seems everyone is buying, and we are far ahead of schedule in sales."

Automobile dealers are finding the same trend, but in larger, less rushing sales. "We are turning a number of new cars and pickups, many of these sales because of the good harvest. But you can say we are running ahead and looking good," reported one automobile dealer.

A department store: "This is the biggest December ever, with a gain every day over last December which was a tremendous month itself. Everything fell just right to make this a big year, and I expect January to be the same."

The same report came from another department store: "We're running well ahead of last year, with a gain every day in December. We've made up a slow start and are run-

COMMUNITY WATER SYSTEM

Loan Closing Set For Spade Project

Residents of the Spade community will receive a belated Christmas present when a loan for constructing a water distribution system is closed on Monday.

The loan was received from Congressman George Mahon this week. Officials of the Farm Home Administration have made arrangements to have the loan closed early this year. Officers of the association are Don J. K. Nelson and W. O. Nelson.

The project will provide a community water system and is expected to benefit about 51 farm and rural families in the Spade community.

Residents have been obtaining water from individual wells and from the Paymaster and Hampton gins.

The loan will provide for drilling a deep well, construction of ground storage tank, and installation of a metered distribution system.

The loan is a direct loan in the amount of \$50,000 at 4 1/2 percent interest. It is scheduled for repayment over a 40-year period. The loan closing is scheduled to take place in the Lamb County FHA office here Jan. 9.

Holiday Postal Load This Week

Christmas is not a week away in Lamb County post offices -- it is on Monday of this week.

Peak mail handlings for the Christmas season are going on this week, reports Littlefield postmaster T. A. Henson. "We caught a peak load Monday, and while it is continuing it will taper off the last day of the week on Christmas day," he predicted.

On Monday, the post office mailed 15,014 pieces of mail compared with an average Monday of about 4,700 pieces.

Tuesday, cancellations ran to 25,000 compared with an average of 7,000 for Tuesdays, Henson noted.

Postal workers delivered 399 packages Monday, 190 Tuesday. These figures were up from an

average days run of 85 to 100 packages.

"We're feeling the brunt of the season right now, and appreciate the fact that patrons are pretty well mailing early enough to allow assured delivery," he added.

Outgoing packages ran 455 Monday, 396 Tuesday, increases of about 300 percent for those two days.

The peak mail load is being handled by regular and substitute workers, and no non-staff members are being used, the postmaster said.

Regular postal deliveries will be made by the Littlefield office on Tuesday, with no service on Christmas day.

"We'll have everything in sight delivered in time for Christmas," Henson pledged.

Judging Set On Windows

Winners of the annual "Parade of Windows" will be announced in Sunday's County Wide News, it was announced Wednesday by Rev. Jack Ellzey, chairman of the project.

The windows in downtown Littlefield will be judged one night this week. The program is sponsored by the Littlefield Ministerial Alliance.

Prizes totaling \$155 will be awarded clubs and organizations who are judged to have the best windows in the "Christmas for Christ" religious themes.

The distinctive windows are entered by religious groups and clubs and displayed in downtown buildings with empty windows. Each is lighted every night during the Christmas season.

Out-of-town judges will appear in the windows. Prizes of \$50, \$40, \$30, \$20, and \$15 will be presented.

Mangum In Good Condition After Operation

Jim Mangum, Littlefield, was reported in good condition Wednesday noon after undergoing surgery that morning in the veterans hospital at Big Spring.

Mrs. Mangum, who is in Big Spring with him, reported that he "came through surgery in fine condition."

Mangum was admitted to the Big Spring hospital 10 days ago after suffering a severe stomach ailment late in November.

Contest Entries Announced Christmas Home Lighting

The Christmas Home Lighting Contest, sponsored by the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce, will be judged this week and winners announced in Sunday's County Wide News.

Four cash prizes are to be presented in the annual project, according to chairman Otis Bennett. Out-of-town judges will be used.

The contest has drawn nine entries. Judging will be on the overall house and yard decorations. There will be no separate divisions for windows or doors.

First-place winner will receive \$50. The next three places will receive \$25, \$15, and \$10 cash prizes.

Giant Packing Plant Slated For Hereford

A \$1-million-plus packing house plant in Hereford that will process 100,000 head of cattle a year was firming up Tuesday for neighboring Hereford, which already has under construction a \$15-million sugar processing plant.

The new packing plant will be the largest in the Texas Panhandle, larger than the relatively new Swift & Company plant at Clovis, which handles 75,000 head of cattle a year, reports indicated.

James Allan and Sons, of San Francisco, Calif., will build and operate the large plant on which construction is expected to be completed by late summer, 1964.

The plant is expected to employ about 50 persons.

Major reason given for selecting Hereford is the availability of large number of feed-lot cattle in its immediate area. Deaf Smith County, of which Hereford is county seat, has an annual feed lot capacity of some 54,000 head while nearby Hale and Pomeroy counties will fatten around 145,000 head of cattle a year, it is estimated.

The Hereford plant will perform largely slaughter work, with carcasses being shipped to the West Coast and Texas Gulf Coast for market handling.

A 500-acre site has been secured for the new plant. It is three miles east of Hereford on Highway 60 and adjacent to the Hereford Feed Yard.

Barry's Supporters Firm In Lamb, If He Likes '64

Lamb County Republicans have not changed their mind about wanting Senator Barry Goldwater for their party nominee for President in 1964.

A survey of leading county Republicans indicate that they hope Senator Goldwater, or "Barry" as his enthusiastic followers term him, will formally announce his candidacy for the nomination, early in 1964.

"He's still my man, and I think most people feel the same way," declares Bill Carter, county chairman of the GOP.

Goldwater statements since the death of President Kennedy have caused speculation that he may not choose to run against President Johnson in 1964.

"We'll have to wait and see," the senator said a few days ago. Where the Arizona senator was leading a strong movement against the Kennedy administration, he is observing a political moratorium until January 1.

His few recent statements, however, have confused his followers somewhat. But they apparently have shaken the faith of few of them.

A favorite political opinion just now, in the pre-campaign season, is that Goldwater may find fewer issues in the program of President Johnson and may prefer to wait until 1968 to carry his party's presidential standard.

But if he still chooses to go in 1964, almost all of his faithful in the county will go with him.

"If he wants to run, I'm with

him," declares Dan Taggs, Littlefield, an avid Goldwater supporter. "If he wants to wait, then I'll be with him in 1968."

"If it is his decision to run in 1964, then I'll support his nomination," said another prominent county GOP member, "but I'll feel better if he decides to run in 1968."

This reflected a feeling that Goldwater's 1964 prospects may not be as bright against President Johnson as they might have been against the late President Kennedy, whose political philosophy was clearly and sharply opposite to the Arizonian's.

At least one county Republican, and a Goldwater backer,

declined to voice an opinion, however, "not for some time."

This was the exception, however, in an informal survey of known Goldwater backers. While waiting on their candidate to say whether he chooses to run in 1964, Republicans in Lamb County--and nationally, according to wider surveys--are willing to hold his horse, or to ride, as "Barry" decides.

Goldwater probably has observed the most careful moratorium on political talk of any GOP prospect for President, during a mourning period for President Kennedy. He is expected to declare his direction early in 1964, after the voluntary moratorium.

FOR NEEDED FAMILIES

More Help Needed On Christmas Drive

Littlefield's community Christmas effort for needy families, headed by the Salvation Army, is moving along but more cash donations and more help is needed to assure a successful project, Lt. Robert Gilliam reported Wednesday.

Gilliam indicated the Salvation Army's Christmas Kettle project had brought in \$214 through Tuesday, and a letter appeal to some persons in the county has netted another \$132. He estimated an additional \$500 would be needed to underwrite the Christmas program.

The Salvation Army headquarters here received 143 needy family applications. Forty-seven of these have been taken by organizations and individuals, with 96 still to be handled by the army.

Gilliam said any individual or organization who wants to help a family have a merry Christmas can call him for the names of a family. Interested persons should call 385-3403 or go by the Army headquarters at 621 E. 6th St.

Besides the cash donations, the Army has received about six baskets of food and canned goods and approximately 200 pounds of meat.

Gilliam urged all Littlefield residents to "meet your obligations with the United Fund before contributing to the Salvation Army on the separate Christmas project."

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Santa Returns To Littlefield 'Family Night'

Littlefield's Christmas Stocker's Festival time continues tonight with a repeat "Family Night" scheduled in downtown stores.

Santa Claus will return to visit with youngsters in local stores, hand out candy and hear the kiddies' requests for Christmas. Santa will visit several stores between 6 and 9 p.m.

The repeat "family night" is an approved chamber of commerce promotion, according to Jim Joyner, chairman of the retail council. Because of the success and widespread acceptance of the family night last Thursday, the event was slated again tonight.

Most merchants will remain open until 9 p.m., and all will observe later closing hours tonight.

Bid Awarded On Highway

A contract for a paving project from Muleshoe to 1.9 miles inside the Lamb County line on US-84 has been awarded to Henry L. Stafford of Lubbock.

Bids were opened on Dec. 10 and Stafford's low bid, slightly in excess of \$317,000, was accepted, according to Rhea Bradley, resident engineer of Littlefield.

The project calls for 9.6 miles of graded structure, flexible base and one-course surface from Muleshoe to 1.9 miles southeast of the Lamb-Bailey line.

In Lamb, the old lane will be constructed and a new lane built. In Bailey, the work will consist of reconstruction on the old lane of the 4-lane highway.

LIVESTOCK MINERAL PLANT

Olton Gets New Industry

Two Olton men last week announced they would locate a \$100,000 livestock mineral plant in Olton.

John Moses, president of the new corporation, Western Minerals, Inc., made the announcement as construction began at a site south of the city.

George Caddel, owner of the Plainsman Farm and Ranch, will be the company's general manager. Disclosure of the new plant came after a meeting with the Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, which worked closely with Moses and Caddel for several weeks in an effort to secure the plant for Olton. The corporation reportedly

considered Plainview, Littlefield and Lubbock as other possible sites. The City of Olton cooperated with the new plant by granting it a tax moratorium for the first 7 years of operation.

The operation's 6,000-square foot building will be located south and adjacent to the city limits on 6 acres purchased from Stanley Steele. The plant is expected to be in operation by Jan. 16.

Olton's City Council recently approved plans to annex the 6 acres into the city, and gave approval for the 7-year free-ride on taxes.

The company will make loose

livestock minerals packaged in 50-pound bags and 50-pound livestock mineral blocks, as well as protein blocks in 33 1/3-pound blocks.

The company will distribute through Plainsman Farm and Ranch and other feed stores in the Panhandle area, eastern New Mexico and Oklahoma.

Moses said the plant is the only one of its kind between the Gulf Coast and Kansas City, Mo., and there are none between here and California.

Moses, a resident of Olton for 30 years, is active in farming and ranching. Caddel moved to Olton in 1960 from Amarillo.

APPLE NUT BREAD
Mix: 1 cup sugar and 2 eggs
Add: 1/2 cup Weason Oil, 2 tablespoons sour cream and 1 teaspoon vanilla
Sift: 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda
Add: 1/4 cup nuts (preferably walnuts) and 1 cut chopped raw apple.
Bake in greased paper-lined pan for 1 hour at 350 degrees. Freezes well.

FOURS
1 cup white sugar
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup dark Karo
1/2 pound butter
2 cups thick cream
1 lb. pecans or mixed nuts
1 Tablespoon vanilla
Place sugar, Karo, butter and one cup of the cream in kettle, bring to boil, add remaining cup of cream slowly so boiling does not stop.

Allow candy to brown a little, but prevent burning by stirring often. Cook until forms a firm ball in cold water. Remove from fire; add vanilla and nuts. Pour into buttered pan, cut into squares after thoroughly cooled. Dip in melted dipping chocolate. Melt shaved chocolate in double boiler over warm water being careful not to get the chocolate too warm as it becomes thick. The dipping is best done in a cold room.

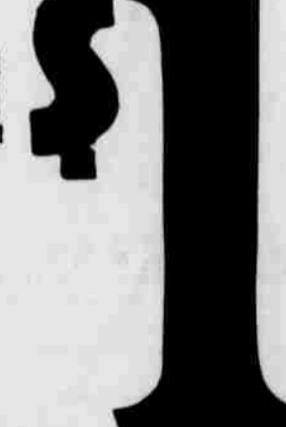

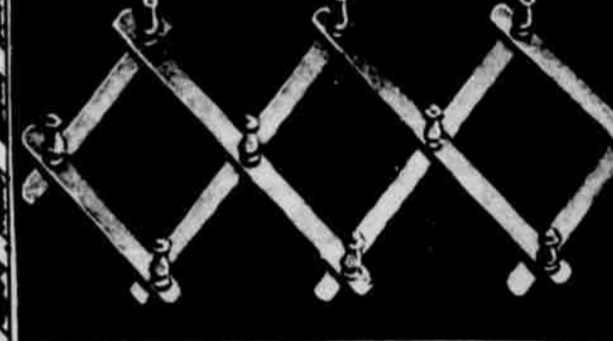

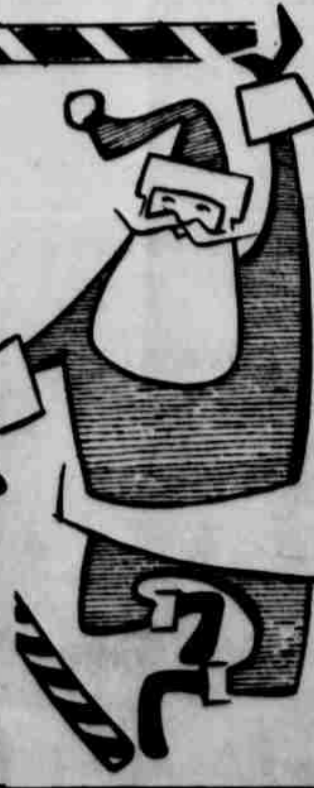

Jumping to an early lead, the Littlefield Wildcats were never headed here Tuesday night as they scored a 61-50 victory over the Slaton Tigers in the season's first home game.

The Wildcats now standing 4-3 on the season, enter tourney action again tonight when they meet host Clovis at 9 p.m. (Texas time) in the annual Clo-

vis Invitational Basketball Tournament.

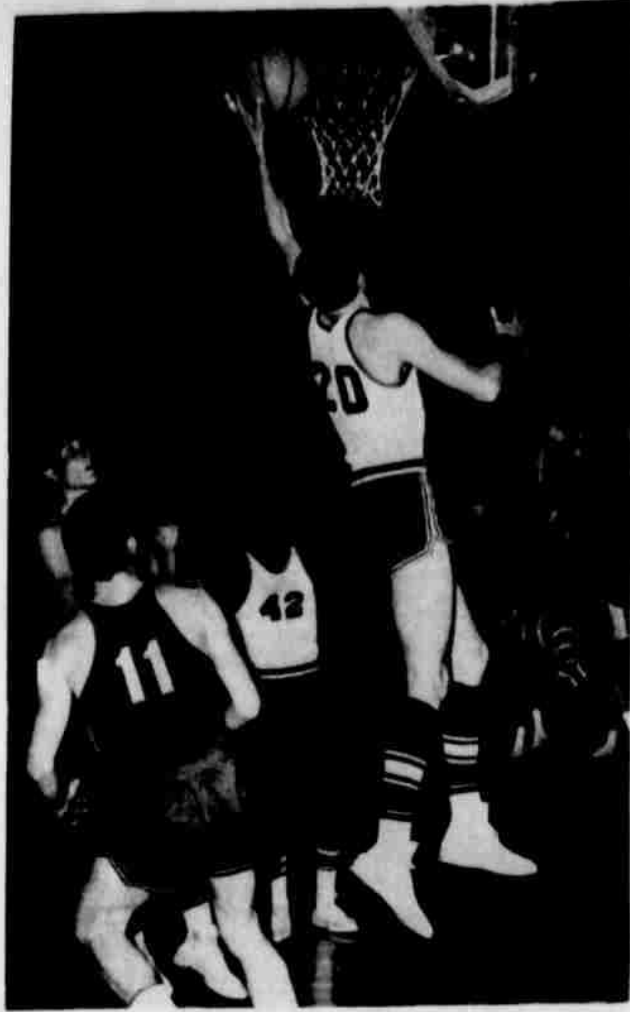
Littlefield outscored Slaton in every quarter but the last one,

The B-teamers led by 20-16 at halftime and didn't pull away until the final quarter. Bill Gass led Slaton with 13 points.

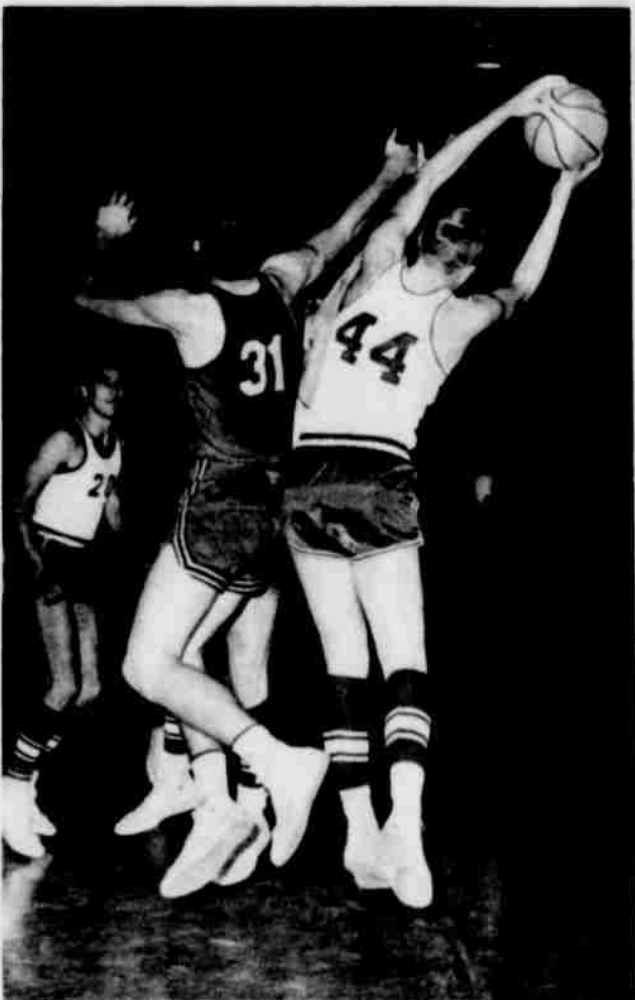

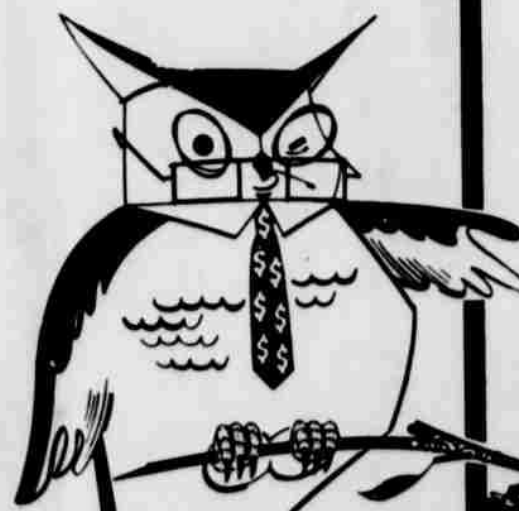

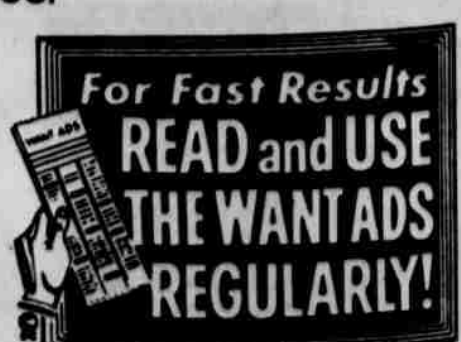

113 Wrecks In County, 6 Killed

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 113 accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of November, according to Sergeant D. S. Lawson, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for four persons injured and an estimated property damage in the amount of \$7,810.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county from January through November shows a total of 113 accidents resulting in six persons killed, 77 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$92,326.

The veteran patrol supervisor announced that every effort will be put forth, including a rigid enforcement program, to try and stem the tide of traffic deaths during the holiday season. The past five year average indicates some 238 persons will be killed in traffic crashes in Texas this December.

During the month of December for the past five years there has been 1191 traffic deaths. Of this number, 432 or 36% occurred during the holiday season. The sergeant stated, "It

Rev. and Mrs. Jack Ellzey Attend Texas Council of Churches Meet

The mid-year board meeting of the Texas Council of Churches, held last week at Palestine, was attended by Rev. and Mrs. Jack Ellzey of Littlefield. Rev. Ellzey is pastor of the First Methodist Church here.

The session was held at the Lakeview Methodist Assembly, Palestine.

A part of the meeting was devoted to planning and promoting the Council's general meeting next March.

Other discussion at the retreat dealt with what Rev. Ellzey termed "some questions the churches of Texas must answer in the next few years."

These included: "How can we best communicate the highly personal Gospel of Christ to a person who gets 90 percent of his social impacts from mass media," and "How are churches doing on ministry to the aging?"

In regard to the second question, Rev. Ellzey said, it was suggested that the large homes for the aging and set far off from city and community life--as some recently developed in Florida and California--are not the total answer.

It was pointed out that some churches and communities are developing schools whereby the Senior Citizens may continue their education, learning skills and arts which they have not had time to enjoy before. This could well be an area for cooperative efforts of neighborhood churches, demonstrating their unity in the field of Christian social concerns. There is a growing need to prepare persons psychologically for retirement and to perhaps redefine the word as different from quitting or stopping to suggest a time for continued and even more satisfying living.

One of the most important subjects was in reference to the college campus. Most religious leaders are feeling a sense of frustration in that there is such little religious response on the campuses.

It was felt that denominational leaders have not yet really faced this situation and neither have the school administrators and faculty. The group set up plans to try and bring together persons concerned in these fields to talk about the problems and implement ways to correct them, the pastor said.

Organized May 4, 1953, the Texas Council of Churches is representative of 16 state denominational bodies. "The Council is built upon the promise that the unity of the church is given by Christ, recognizing there can be a great deal

of diversity within that unity," Rev. Ellzey pointed out.

It is a Council, not a union, not a federation of churches, and "the autonomy and integrity of each unity is to be recognized and safe-guarded in all Council policies and programs." The Council is governed by the General Assembly and a General Board. The Assembly, which meets annually, is composed of representatives officially elected or appointed by member units. The General Board, composed of 76 persons also officially chosen by the member church bodies, meets at least twice a year.

Rev. Ellzey is a member of the Board from the Northwest Texas Conference of the Methodist Church.
