### Wildcats Drilling To Crack Sweetwater Jinx

Littlefield has never beaten the Mustangs from Sweetwater. Coach Kirk and the Cats are training with might and main this week to change that. The fans are hoping. The coaches are studying ways to accomplish the change.

Past mistakes are being corrected. The offense and defense are at full strength. Tension will fill the air.

Although Sweetwater sports no victory yet this year, they will certainly be gunning for their first, especially since they will wish to keep their string alive over Littlefield. In fact, it is teams like Sweet-

water that will work harder at this kind of a game than many other games.

Last week the Mustangs scared Lakeview sufficiently with a 7-0 halftime lead that made Lakeview really dig in the second half to snatch a 19-7 victory.

But Sweetwater cannot live on its past either, even though they have come up with impressive wins. In '65 they barely beat the Cats 14-6 but in '64 they gave us a stinging 32-0 shutout.

The closest Littlefield ever came was in '58 when the Cats lost a squeaker 30-26.

The Cats intend to make it more than a squeaker this time. Eternal vigilance with no relaxing will be the order of the day. Ranked 18th out of 1223A teams in the State, Littlefield intends to climb higher on that ladder at the expense of the Mustangs.

Jinxes can be broken by good blocking, hard running, sharp passing and an alert and rugged defense. The Cats have produced that all season but plan to intensify every phase Friday night to send the Mustangs home with their first defeat ever at the hands of a Littlefield squad.

### Farm Bureau Meets At Olton For Convention

Meeting at Olton Tuesday night, October 18, for their annual convention, the Lamb County Farm Bureau members enjoyed a delicious free steak dinner and then got down to the many items of business at hand.

The treasurer reported assets of \$20,826.99 for the organization.

Introduced by Elmer McGill, Melody Brock, Earth, was the featured inspirational speaker for the evening. The local Farm Bureau had sent her to a Seminar on Americanism at Seymour in Waco from August 9-13. She related the threats from Communism to the world and the remedies that she had learned, and the remedies that can be applied to counteract it.

With Herman Neuenschwander moderating the meeting and Bill Clayton, State Representative, explaining the resolutions, the members proceeded to pass 15 resolutions and elect some new directors.

On the National level, they voted to follow the pattern of planting advocated by the Halfway Station of planting cotton, grain, and layout land on a third basis for each; to encourage national leaders to curb the trend toward increasing welfare programs; to oppose Federal government control of prices by manipulating markets and dumping surpluses on the markets to depress prices; commended Denver City housewives for their fight against high prices; are opposed to moving acreage of upland cotton areas to areas producing long staple cot-

ton; and commended the state and national stand against the proposed compulsory \$1 per bale compulsory check-off because the authority for spending the money would all be in the hands of the Secretary of Agriculture.

On the state level they encourage the state legislature to appropriate additional funds for an expanded swine research program; opposed the new merit rating system for automobile insurance rates because they said it would actually increase rates; opposed the unionization of farm labor and any state minimum wage law; opposed the proposed 1% increase in state sales tax because the mayors of cities would want one half of it; stand opposed to pari-mutual betting in any form; and oppose any water plan that does not include the High Plains.

On the County level, they encourage the expansion of the recently initiated tire and battery program.

The members also elected the following new directors and alternates: Winston Bly, alternate; Lowell McGill; Art Nafziger, alternate; Earl Douglas; Melvin Mears, alternate; V.J. Hobratch; K.W. Mahaffey, alternate; Tommy Patterson; Donnie Clayton, alternate; Kenneth Henson; Elroy Wisian, alternate; Lonnie Neinst.

After the regular sessions, these and other directors elected Donnie Clayton as the new president; George Stewart as vice-president, and Ted Hutchins as secretary-treasurer.

### City Fails To Reach Finals

Dr. Wm. Orr, who signed Littlefield's entry this year in the All America Cities competition sponsored by the National Municipal League of New York, announced Tuesday, October 18, that the National Municipal League would make its announcements on the 18th who the finalists were but that Littlefield would not be among them this year.

William J.D. Boyd, who was writing on behalf of the Municipal League stated that the League was "very sorry our community is not among those to be named. The extremely high calibre of the applications made for very close competition."

As if anticipating disappointment, Mr. Boyd encouraged the citizens of Littlefield to enter again next year or in the near future.

Approximately 125 to 150 cities prepare an entry each year although hundreds more are sent out from the League's office but not returned, he added.

### November 4th Deadline For Absentee Voting

## 15 Accidents On Rural Roads

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 15 accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of September, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no deaths, 6 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$14,860.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1966 shows a total of 85 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 47 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$56,970.00.

From past experience, the month of October signals the increase of traffic accidents in Texas due to shorter days and longer nights. The increased hours of darkness will hide dangers otherwise visible during the daylight hours.

The Sergeant listed some factors why driving is more hazardous at nighttime than in daytime. (1) Reduced road visibility prevents drivers from seeing hazards. (2) It has been longer since most drivers have slept and the resulting fatigue increases perception reaction time. (3) More drinking drivers will be met. (4) It is easier for drivers to become confused in traffic and to panic. These factors in varying degrees coupled with high speed cause accidents that would not occur in daytime.

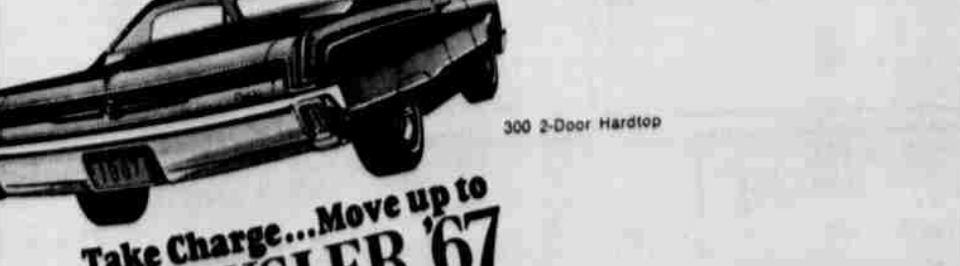
