Littlefield has never beaten water that will work harder e Mustangs from Sweetwater. at this kind of a game than many other games.


Last week the Mustangs scared Lakeview sufficiently with a 7-0 halftime lead that made Lakeview really dig in the second half to snatch a 19-7 victory.



15 Accidents On Rural Roads

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 15 accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of September, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no deaths, 6 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$14,860.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1966 shows a total of 85 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 47 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$56,-

From past experience, the month of October signals the increase of traffic accidents in Texas due to shorter days and longer nights. The increased hours of darkness will hide dangers otherwise visible during the daylight hours.

The Sergeant listed some factors why driving is more hazardous at nightime than in daytime. (1) Reduced road visiprevents drivers from seeing hazards. (2) It has been longer since most drivers have slept and the resulting fatigue increases perception reaction time. (3) More drinking drivers will be met. (4) It is easier for drivers to become confused in traffic and to panic. These factors in varying degrees cou-pled with high speed cause accidents that would not occur in


