

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

THERE, LAND COURTLY, ACRES

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 49-b, creating a Veteran's Land Board and establishing a Veteran's Land Fund; providing for a nelection and the issuance of proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGIS-LATURE OF THE STATE OF

TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Mil-lion Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum.

"In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be is-sued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.

'The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency threeof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corpora-

tion.

"All lands thus porchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State of Texas to Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsoid at the expiration of eight (8) years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.
"All moneys received and which

have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of bonds, provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the ef-fective date of this Amendment, ail moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, any ony of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitu-

tional Amendment shall be submitted a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the little of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or eve printed on their ballots the ful-

lowing words: "FOR the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to De sold to Texa Veterans of World War H."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printon their ballots the following

words "AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Sec-tion 49-b, creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the Furchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the de-termination of such result and the

Governor's proclamation thereof. Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and

proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any fund in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election.

## Farmers Must Combat Enteritis In Hogs.

To help prevent feed waste in the face of today's shortages, livestock authorities are urging a special effort this months to combat enteritis in the state's swine herds.

Hogs afflicted with "necro" are unable to utilize feed properly and do not gain weight in proportion to the feed consumed, even though they may otherwise appear to be in normal health, the American Foundation for Animal Health has pointed out.

Farmers were urged to take these three steps to combat enteritis among

1. When new feeder pigs are purchased, segregate them from the home herd until they are proved free of dis-

When pigs develop digestive troubles, variations in temperature or loss of weight, move well animals away from them, and obtain a veterinary diagnosis at once. This diagnosis is extremely important because the symptoms of enteritis may otherwise be mistaken for those of hog cholera or other diseases of swine.

Practice rigid sanitation. Do not pasture pigs on ground where there has been an enteritis outbreak. Provide individual, movable houses. Concrete floors, thoroughly washed each day, are a great help in controlling this dis-

Medical treatment for enteritis has proved more generally satisfactory when preventive sanitation and segregation are applied in control of this often fatal disease, the American Foundation reported.

## Miss Louise Cunningham Writes Sister Here Interesting Letter From Tokyo, Japan

Miss Cunningham, whose home is as follows: at Lakeview, Texas, was formerly employed in the office of the Shell Oil Company at Houston. She left

I shall begin with the trip over:

We salled the 13th of April on the "General Collins", which is one of the larger class Army transports, manned by the Navy. The food was not too good, as it was GI and served and the larger class army transports, manned by the Navy. cafeteria; however, the quarters were very comfortable, even though there were 15 girls to a stateroom. They were previously officers' quarters and had plenty of closet space, lavatories, mirrors, etc. Also, there was much entertainment aboard, including two USO troops from New York-"Ghost Train and "Petticoat Fever"; an Hawaiian orchestra, ship's orchestra, movies nightly in the passenger ounge, the usual card games, lectures on orientation, and classes in both Korean and Japanese. It being Holy Week, there were services daily and a sunrise service Easter morning, which was very impressive in midocean on the top deck, or sun deck. There were 56 girls in our group and some twenty or thirty who had em-barked at Seattle, And, in addition, there were civillan men passengers and some thirty army officers and a couple of hundred enlisted passengers. So you see we had quite a cross-section of people, besides the hip's crew and officers. Most of the girls were horribly sea-sick about the third day out, as we really had the weather, and this particular ship rocks, reels and rolls because of the way it is constructed. But I am never sick either sailing or flying, fortu-

nately, so I had a pleasant voyage.

We arrived in Yokohama, 24 April; of course, we lost one day crossing the international date line. Tokyo and the harbor were quite a sight. Some of the Japanese Navy's half-destroyed ships were scattered around. I particularly noticed some carriers cut right half in two, which have not yet been salvaged or junked. We surely got a big welcome, with the band out to meet us, playing about an hour, and hundreds of GI's and officers, as well as Japanese men and women, lined the pier, all waving in welcome. It surly made us feel good, too, as I guess a few of us felt quite strange so far from home and entering an enemy occupation zene. clogs; it is a mystery to me how they walk on those things. There were the press reporters and photographers, who came aboard for tories and pictures. I have never been photographed so many times as the first few days. They are writing up some sort of article, or pamphlet, rather, called "You In Japan", and chose our group for example. We came ashore at 10 a.m. on Wednesday morning and large, new government busses were lined up to carry us from Yokohama to Tokyo, which is about 20 miles,, escorted by two jeeps full of MP's. Although I had heard about of MP's. Although I had heard about the utter devastation of Yokohama and Tokyo, it is hard to express my first impression. One just has to see it. A group of B-29's, approximately 600, hit Yokohama in only one raid, which lasted about two hours and completely wiped the city out; hardly anything was left standing — block that stretched into miles completely leveled with a few steel frames gut-

rouge. They all stopped and gaped at our caravan with open mouths, as we were the first American women most of them had seen. These people

In spite of the rags most of the men wore, the girls looked colorful and gay in their bright kimonos and obes, the bright strips they wrap around their middle. It was a feeling of pity and despair of the filth, wreckage and ruins, and the thousands of peasants walking, trotting and running up and down the streets. Most of them were seeking food—any kind—and many of them had sticks or poles and were poking around in the rubble for anything edible. They walk along on their little wooden clogs; it is a mystery to me how they is modern, with steam heat and sev-eral elevators, tile lobby floor, furn-ished attractively. Off to one side as you go in is a large lounge furnished with comfortable "western" furniwith comfortable "western" furni-ture, divans, chairs, tables, reading lights, etc. Adjoining these is a beauty shop two steps down, and across on the other side is a tailor shop, press-ing shop, alteration shop, a PX, and an oriental gift shop. Incidentally, about thirty little native boys, around 11 or 12 years of age, came out to 11 or 12 years of age, came out to greet us, bowing almost to the ground and claimed our luggage. We also have a doorman, numerous girls to bring up messages announcing our have a doorman, numerous girls to bring up messages announcing our dates or callers, and four girls to clean our rooms. I room with a girl I knew in Honolulu who came over with me on the boat. These little boys shouldered our heavy bags as if they were nothing and led us to our rooms which had been assigned. We had been told to tip with candy or gum, as money is no good to them, since there is nothing to buy over here. Too, we were told never to tip more than one candy bar, as that is equal to an American dollar. They put our bags down and bowed all the way out, never turning their backs to us. 




## Spraying Plants Should Start Now Says Lem Weaver

According to Lem Weaver, a high percentage of the farmers of this area are complaining of finding honey-dew in their melon and cucumber patches. This is said to be the direct result of plant lice.

Disting or spraying of these plants should be started now and repeated in seven or eight days if excellent results are to be obtained. A dust of straight rotenone is the most effective. Be sure when you purchase the rotenone that it is pure and not mixed with sulphur, because sulphur kills any vine crop. One good dusting with the straight rotenone will kill all present plant lice, but it may not be strong enough to kill the eggs which have not yet hatched out.

Rotenone is a scarce item (the straight rotenone); however, several places handle that which is mixed with sulphur.

Some who have been using Black Leaf-40 have reported that the results were not satisfactory. But if good results are to be expected, use the following:

3 tbls. Black Leaf-40 to 1 gallon water, then add 1 tbs. baking soda, so that the Black Leaf-40 will act fast enough to kill. Do not spray this un less the temperature is 70 degrees, and will be better if it is 90 to 100

For those who prefer to dust, use 1 ounce Black Leaf-40 and 1 pound of lime. Repeat the application in seven days, or more often if it should rain.

Several vineyards are beginning to be affected with grape-leaf hoppers. The vines turn brown and spotted. To control this, use 1 tbs. 50 per

Cotton loan rates for the 1946 go on suffering! Get INNER-AID, crop, averaging slightly higher than last year, have been announced by County. the Agriculture Department.

The average loan rate for %-inch middling cotton will be 22.83 cents a pound. Last year it was 19.84 cents. For 15-16-inch middling cotton the average rate will be 24.83 cents. The rates will vary according to location, the announcement said. 



sing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to degislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicles registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall he allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negativing any as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State: prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGIS-LATURE OF THE STATE OF

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and hicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acsquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining and policing such pub-lic readways, and for the administration of such laws as may be pre-scribed by the Legislature pertain-ing to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants veted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and de-ciared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, how-ever, that one-fourth (%) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Avail-able School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each County and the percentage allowed to be retained by each County un-der the haws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit

for any purpose." Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have




