EUGENE BLACK TO ASK REPEALING OF COTTON REPORTS

Legislation that will abolish the cotton reporting of the United States Department of Agriculture and that will curb the gambling element operating on the cotton exchanges will be presented at the December session of Congress by Representative Eugene Black, of Texas, he announced last week.

Estimates of the cotton crop made by the Department of Agriculture ,the figures of which Mr. Black in a statement disputes, has caused a drop in the markets during the last two weeks of between \$8 and \$9 a bale. The reaction sent cotton lower in quotations than it has been for some years, or a total of 365 points. He said that the unwarrented losses to the cotton farmer must be stopped "even if so radical a remedy as closing the exchanges is found necessary." Mr. Black explained that his reference to exchanges meant those utilized for the gamblers who never buy a bale of cotton.

In a letter addressed to Southern members of Congress, Mr. Black refers to the agreement of the Department of Agriculture to abandon the minimum and maximum estimates, which, as applied to the Sept., 8 report, "knocked the cotton market for \$12.50 a bele," and thereby cost the cotton farmers millions of dollars, and to the Sept., 23 report, which mcreased the former estimate by 644,000 bales, and sent the market down another \$6.50 a bale.

"The Sept., 23 report did not contain the minimum and maximum estimates, but God knows it was bad enough without them," says Black's

The problem of what is the best and cheapest way to maintain a herd of dairy cows is always before the ing. Brings out old, waste matter you man who produces milk. It is practically impossible to give a standard set of rules which will apply in all cases. The method used in maintaining a herd must largely be determined by the individual, recogniz-

ing the contributing factors. A dairy herd may be maintained by continued purchase of mature animals to replace those whose period of usefulness has passed. There are many conditions under which this may be a wise practice. If it is desirable to have the whole herd composed of cows in their full productive capac ity; if there is abundant opportunity for selection and purchase near at hand; if there is a reasonably good market for cows that are undesirable, and if one has reasonable skill in selecting, and good ability in bargaining, a herd of high-productive capacity may be more easily and more cheaply maintained in this way than by attempting to raise young animals to replace those that are worhout.







Shortly after Irvin had been apsoluted to fill the unexpired term of Carter as sheriff, he was called to Sudan on alleged disturbances created by Carter, and according to his statement, he failed to locate the accused on that day, but on the day folowing he again returned to Sudar a suarch of Carter and found him o the streets in a semi-intoxicated condition and making threats with a reoffer, Irvin being one of those who's for was threatened, shortly after which Irvin was shot through the firsty part of the hand, the bullet just grazing his temple, burning his hair

tables to can at home. Because they contain as much acid as many fruits and are very julcy, tomatoes can be processed by the water-bath method at the temperature of bolling water. Other vegetables are not so acid and therefore need to he processed under pressure at a temperature higher than 212 degrees Fahrenheit. From the standpoint of health and appetizing meals it is lucky that tomatoes are so easy to can at home. Canned as well as freah, they are one of the richest of all vegetables in vitamins. They add flavor, color, and food value to every course from soup to salad. Furthermore, almost every home garden fields a surplus of tomatoes which can be transferred from vines to cans un-der ideal conditions. In a new publication on home can-

ning, Farmers' Bulletin 1471-F, the United States Department of Agriculture gives the following directions for

werripe or parts of which are spotted or decayed. Put them into trays or shallow layers in wire baskets and dip in boiling water for about a minute, according to ripeness. Remove and plunge quickly into cold water for an instant. Drain at once, and core and peel promptly. Pack inte jars or cans as closely as possible Or better still, bring the tomatoes to the boll in an open kettle and pack them hot into the containers. For home use the jars may be filled with a thick tomato sauce or with the juice of other tomatoes. If the tomatoes are to be sold under federal regulations, add only the juice which drains from them during poeling and trimming. Season with one teaspoohfu of salt per quart. Process quart and pint glass jars for 45 minutes in bolling water, counting the time when active boiling begins, and No. 2 and No. 8 tin cans for 35 minutes.

VITAL SEED CORN

A good way to dry ears of seed corn is to string them, suspending the strings of cars in an open shed or loft, the ears not being permitted to touch one another.

The vitality of seed corn often is reduced by leaving it in a sack or a pile for even a day after gathering. With some moisture in the cobs and kernels, the ears begin to sour or mildew in a remarkably short time during warm weather. If left on the plant long after ripening, the kernels may sprout or mildew during warm, wet weather or be injured by freezing.

Seed ears should be picked, therefore, as soon as thoroughly ripe and placed where they will be safe. If they contain much moisture when picked they must be stored in such a way that they will have free circulation of air around each ear.






