the drive. In the past the Summer Recreation program has been supported by the Community Chest. This year there is no Community Chest and it is necessary in order to provide the program, to make a drive for funds. The program will be under the direction of the Youth Center and will utilize the Youth Center, the School, Park and Swimming pool facilities. Participation in the program in the past has been very good, and the program this year is expected to be better than ever, and will have a greater attendance, it was announced. The money raised by the drive will go to pay for salaries of those who are directing the Youth Center and program; for improvements of the Youth Center and for buying needed equipment for the summer program. Some of the equipment will include soft balls, footballs, volley balls, soccer balls, tennis nets, boxing gloves, punching bags, tumbling mats, leather tools and leather craft goods, braiding plating materials, croquet sets, and other outdoor and indoor game and sport equipment. This equipment will be used in the summer recreation program and also will be made available so that the youth may check it out and use it during the hours when the program is not in operation. With the assistance from the City, tennis courts, volley ball courts and a basket ball court will be erected during this month. Baseball and softball diamonds will be provided in other areas of the park for the use of the youth of the county without charge. It is hoped that the people of Littlefield and of Lamb County will whole heartedly support this program and to reach the goal of \$5,000, Don Maness Youth Center director said. It was pointed out that the value of the program has already proved in its success for the past four years, in the number of children who attended, learned to play together, learned to swim and take care of themselves in the water, and had the opportunity for clean, wholesome fun and recreation. ### Seeks Office Of Associate Justice At Amarillo

An Amarillo attorney, Hal Houston, has announced as a candidate for the office of Associate Justice of the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals. The incumbent, Judge Jim Lumpkin, is not a candidate for reelection. Houston is a native Texan, having been reared in Houston; now lives in Randall County; and is practicing law in Amarillo. He formerly lived at Lubbock for several years, and married the former Lola Riley, of Quanah. They have one son, who is now a student at West Texas State College at Canyon. He is a former railroad man, but due to injuries received in World War I, was not able to resume that employment. He was sent to Veterans Hospital at Muskogee while living in Lubbock, and there began his study of law. He graduated from the University of Oklahoma with a law degree and practiced there until he enlisted in the Army as a private in 1942. For many years he represented a mortgage investment company doing business in Texas, and became thoroughly conversant with Texas Corporation, probate and land title laws. He also represented several oil companies doing business in the Panhandle, North and East Texas, maintaining offices in Longview.
