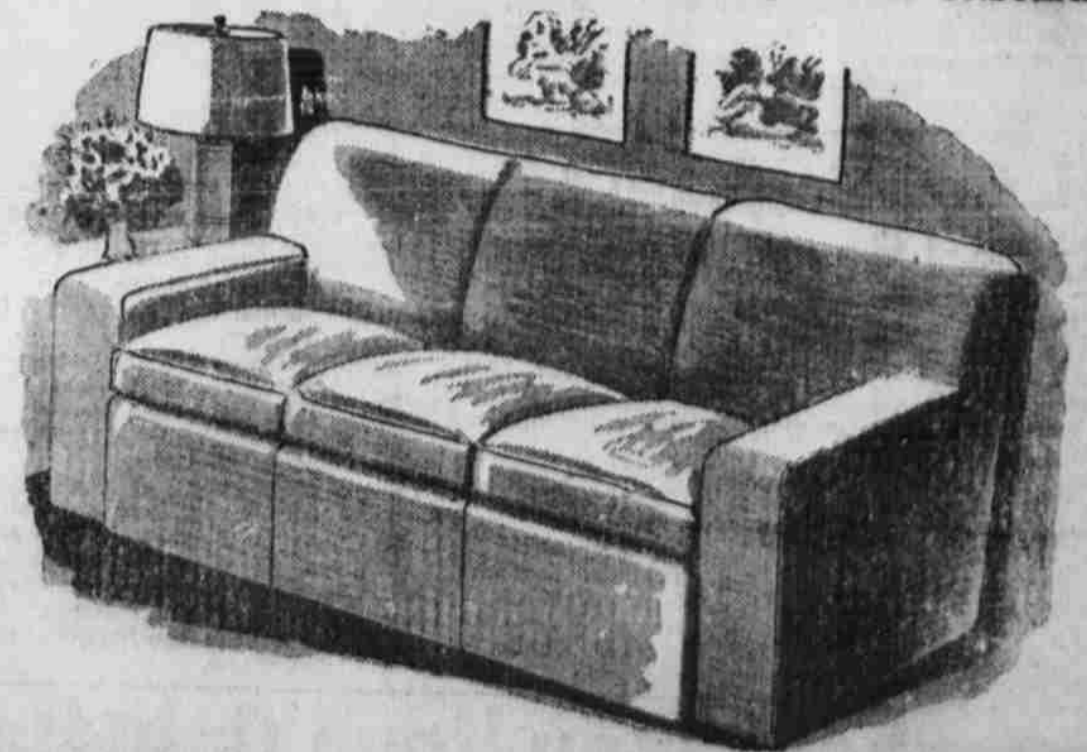

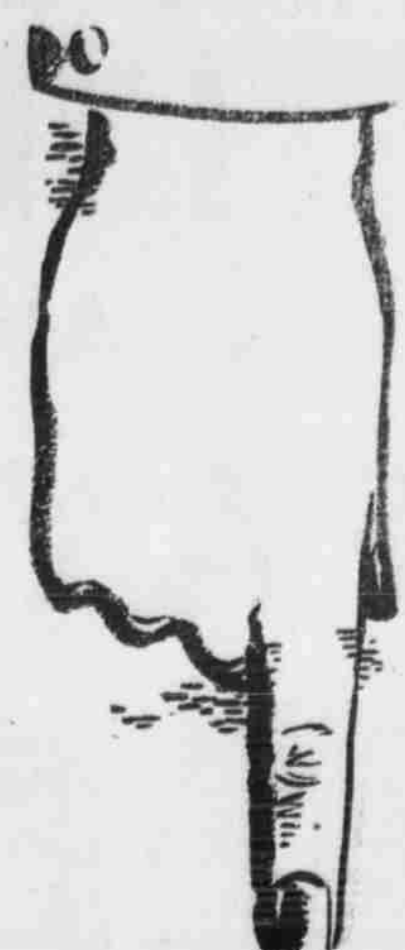

### Here Is Important Information RELATIVE TO THE PAYING OF YOUR POLL TAXES

Every person who shall have attained the age of 21 years and is a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided one year in the State and six months in the County preceding an election are entitled to vote and are subject to a Poll Tax, except those becoming 21 years of age since January 1, 1945, or those over 60 years of age.

Persons over 60 years of age do not need an exemption in order to vote. Exemptions are only issued in Lamb County to those becoming 21 years of age after January 1, 1945.

A new ruling, (Attorney General's Opinion No. 0-6236), now in effect requires those who are blind,

deaf or dumb, or who is permanently disabled or has lost one hand or foot, to pay \$1.00 for a Poll Tax, and are not entitled to an exemption as heretofore (World War II disabled veterans will not have to pay the \$1.00 Poll Tax unless he has been discharged for more than 18 months prior to the date of election).

A soldier and his wife who still claim Lamb County as their home may cast a vote even if they live and have been out of Lamb County the entire time he has been in the service; he does not have to pay a Poll Tax, but his wife does.

A person may pay Poll Tax without paying their other taxes, and may pay one whether it is assessed against him or her, or not.

A person may appoint an agent to pay their Poll Tax for them. Said appointment must be in writing and the Poll Tax receipt must be mailed back or given to him by the Tax Collector and not by the agent.

Poll Tax must be paid by midnight on January 31, 1946, and all applications for Poll Tax must be in the office of Tax Assessor and Collector at that time. No Poll Tax will be issued after that hour.

**Welding the Fashion**



Heat-sealed home furnishings are heralded by this Krene shower curtain that has not a single stitch to interrupt the sheer flow of the film plastic.

LOOK for welded fashions and heat-sealed home furnishings in the plastic era, and don't be surprised if you can't find the seams.

Convinced that the plastic age needs special handling the National Carbon Company, Inc. has developed heat-sealing machines to replace the sewing machine wherever strain is a factor in plastic products for fashions and home furnishings. The heat-sealing machines use heat, pressure, and solvent, for continuous and permanent sealing, achieving nearly invisible seams and increasing the wearing qualities of the plastic products.

Two basic types of heat-sealing machinery have already replaced the sewing machine at the factory in Bennington, Vermont. These are the flat bed type, used for flat seams or hems; and the off-the-arm type which seals either straight or curved sections (including shoulders, sleeves, handbags).

"Spot welding" applied at points of potential strain is part of the new heat-sealing process that streamlines as it strengthens.

Research on welding plastics was speeded up during the war, a

spokesman explained. "We had to learn in a year what it might have taken five years to learn." The heat-sealing machinery was developed at the research laboratories of the company in Cleveland, Ohio.

Heat-sealing was involved in war products, made by this company, to withstand the most rugged use. All waterproof, they included desalination bags (that with the help of a chemical pill changed sea water into drinking water), gun covers, tarpaulins, powder bags, map cases, water containers, containers for dropping gasoline, bladders for assault boats, water bottles, head-wound gas masks.

First civilian products to be made of Krene plastic film since V-J day are shower curtains and ruffled window curtains for the bathroom. These will reach the stores during November.

Also surviving him are about 40 grandchildren, and 12 great-grandchildren.

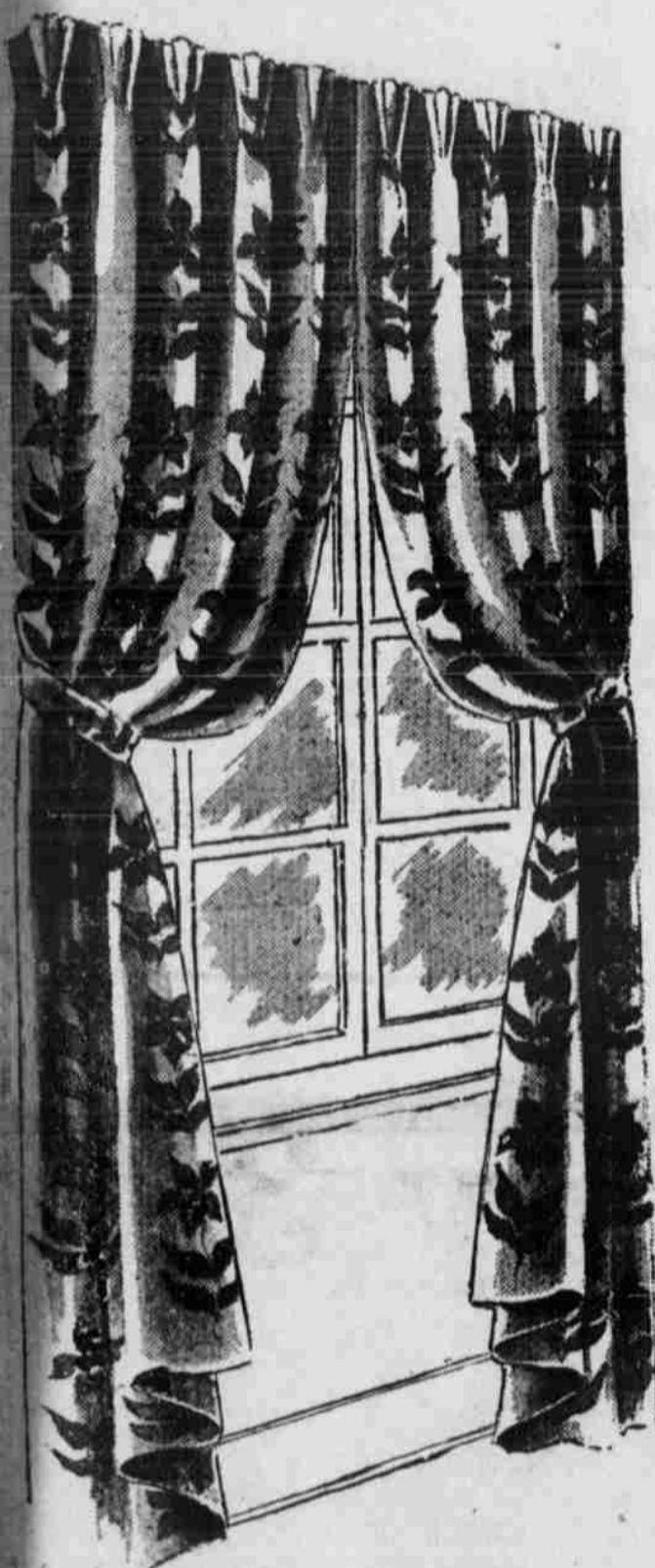

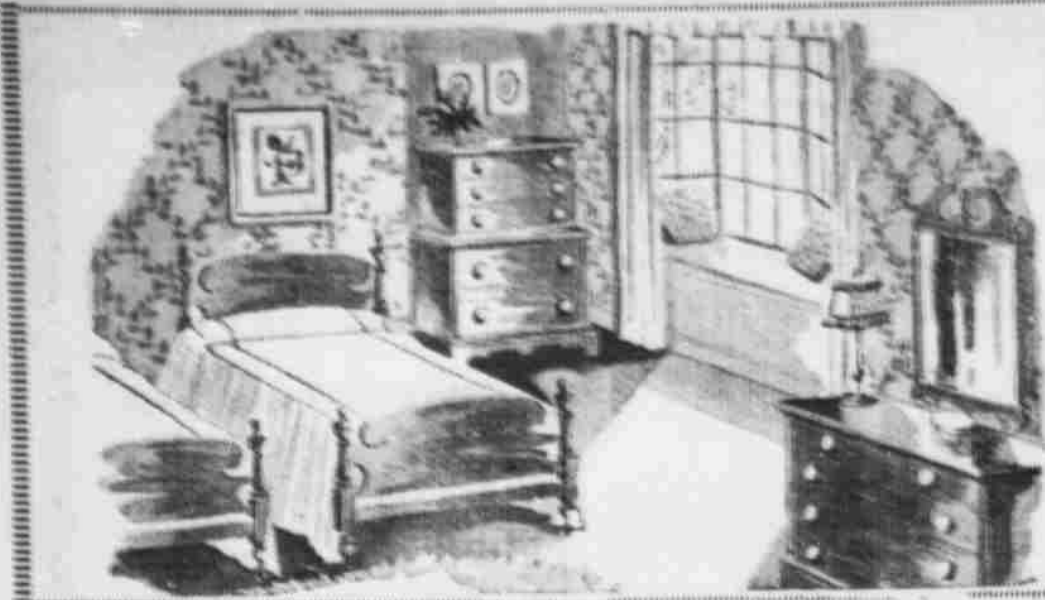

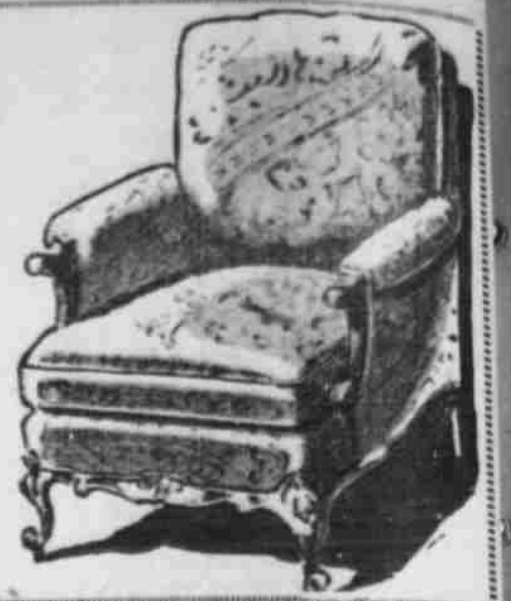

**For the Information OF THE VOTERS OF LAMB COUNTY**

I Am Setting Out A Few Things Below That May Be Of Some Help and Information to the Voters of Lamb County:

**First**

Every person who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and is a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided one year in the State and six months in the County preceding an election, are entitled to vote and are subject to a Poll Tax, except those becoming twenty-one (21) years of age since January 1, 1945, or those over (60) years of age.

**Second**

Persons over sixty (60) years of age do not need an exemption in order to vote. Exemptions are only issued in Lamb County to those becoming twenty-one (21) years of age after January 1, 1945.

**Third**

A new ruling, (Attorney General's Opinion No. 0-6236), now in effect, requires those who are blind, deaf or dumb, or who is permanently disabled, or has lost one hand or foot, to pay \$1.00 for a Poll Tax, and are not entitled to an exemption as heretofore (World War 11 disabled veterans will not have to pay the \$1.00 Poll Tax unless he has been discharged for more than 18 months prior to the date of election).

**Fourth**

A soldier and his wife who still claim Lamb County as their home may cast a vote even if they live and have been out of Lamb County the entire time he has been in service; he does not have to pay a Poll Tax but his wife does.

**Fifth**

A person may pay Poll Tax without paying their other taxes, and may pay one whether it is assessed against him or her, or not.

**Sixth**

A person may appoint an agent to pay their Poll Tax for them. Said appointment must be in writing and Poll Tax receipt must be mailed back or given to him by the Tax Collector and not by the agent. Candidates for office cannot be appointed agent.

**Seventh**

Poll Tax must be paid by midnight on January 31, 1946, and all applications for Poll Tax must be in my office at that time. No Poll Tax will be issued after that hour.

The State gives the Tax Collector 25 days in which to make his report for the month of January, and I assure you that he needs every minute of that time, but just as soon after January 31, 1946, as we can, we will have out our Certified List of all the Poll Taxes paid in Lamb County.

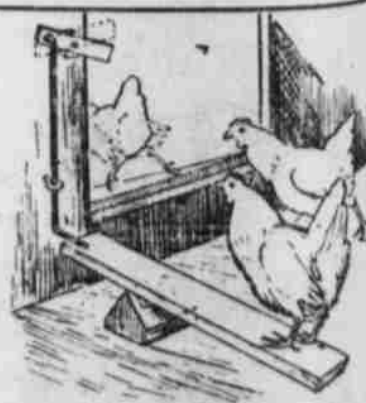

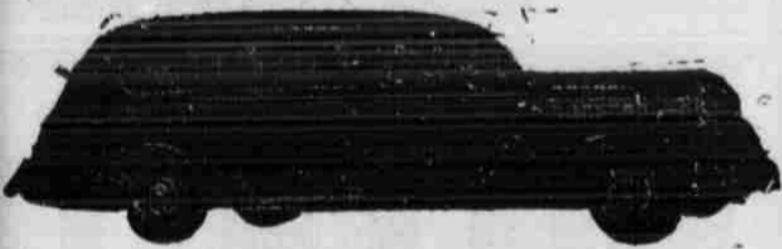

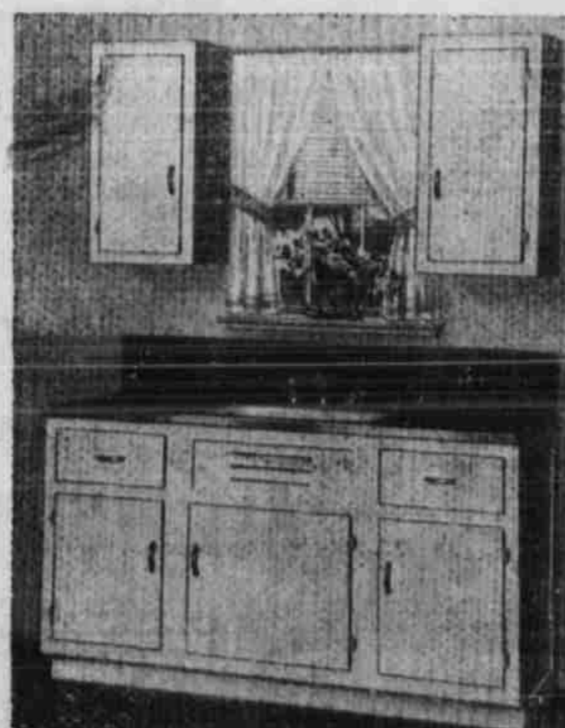

## Pay Your Poll Tax

The year 1946 is a year in which there will be several opportunities to cast a ballot. Although referred to as an off election year, nevertheless, it is very important. Everyone subject to qualify therefor should pay his poll tax or otherwise qualify himself or herself to vote.

Although 1946 is not a year in which a President is to be elected, there are numerous other offices to be filled by the electorate. Governor and State officers are to be nominated and elected. Representatives in the Legislature and about half of the State Senators must also be chosen.

Texas must choose 21 members of Congress, since they are elected every two years. The Lone Star State has several Congressmen who have served for years in the National Congress. Even these old and tried lawmakers often have opposition. You will want to be qualified to vote in the primaries and the general election, so as to have your say as to whether there shall be a change or a return of those now in office to their old positions.

County and precinct officials as well as some district officers are to be selected. We must have officials to handle our public business. The ballot box is where they are chosen. So from any standpoint, it is important that citizens qualify to vote. Be sure to attend to the matter in January—that's the last chance.

In July the first primary will be held. In the month of August the second, or run-off primary will come up. November 5th ("Tuesday after the first Monday in November," the law reads) is the date of the General Election. Two days later, November 7th, some amendments to the State Constitution will be voted by Texas voters.

Special elections also will be held. So it will be an election year of importance anyway you look at it.

The wise thing to do, the patriotic thing to do, is to qualify to vote and be

ready for whatever comes along in the voting line. An alarming indifference as to the duty of voting often shows up. All of us should shake ourselves out of indifference and neglect toward our voting privileges. We should often remind ourselves of this duty. Let's be ready for the election year 1946.

## Rural Electrification

Rural Electrification is on the march in this section . . . in fact, it is gaining in scope and usefulness wherever this great farm electrification program has been set in motion.

"With the progress of Rural Electrification, we are rapidly approaching the day when the farm home will be more attractive and inviting than the town home in many instances, and when living 'in the country' implies the highest rung in civilization," says the Scurry County Times. "We are gradually taking ruralism out of the country, and really making the farm and ranch an 'extension' of our towns. The day, too, will be here sooner than we think when the average farmer will be no farther away than his nearest 'walkie-talkie' machine."

And, we would like to add, no farther away than his trim, smart little airplane.

Representatives of the Lamb County Electric Co-operative have just returned from Washington, where they sought funds to construct 270 additional miles of extensions in Lamb, Hockley, Hale, Bailey and Castro counties. Results of their efforts will be known in a few days.

The annual meeting of the Lamb County Electric Co-operative will be held in Littlefield early in February. This is an event which is always looked forward to by the citizens of Littlefield.

Rural Electrification is a great institution. Rural and urban residents alike view with pride the facilities and conveniences it has brought to the farms of our nation.

## Sudan's Postal Receipts Reported

Sudan's yearly postal receipts for 1945 totalled \$10,049.71, Postmaster Simon Hay has announced. This compares fairly well with the \$10,558.00 gross receipts recorded for last year, although a decrease was noted in the volume of business during the fourth quarter. The large amount of overseas packages mailed during the war through Sudan post office stopped suddenly with V-J Day and the absence of the usual migratory cotton pickers in this area also contributed to the decrease in business.

Fourth quarter receipts in 1945 were \$2,661, as compared with \$3,484 in the same period in 1944.

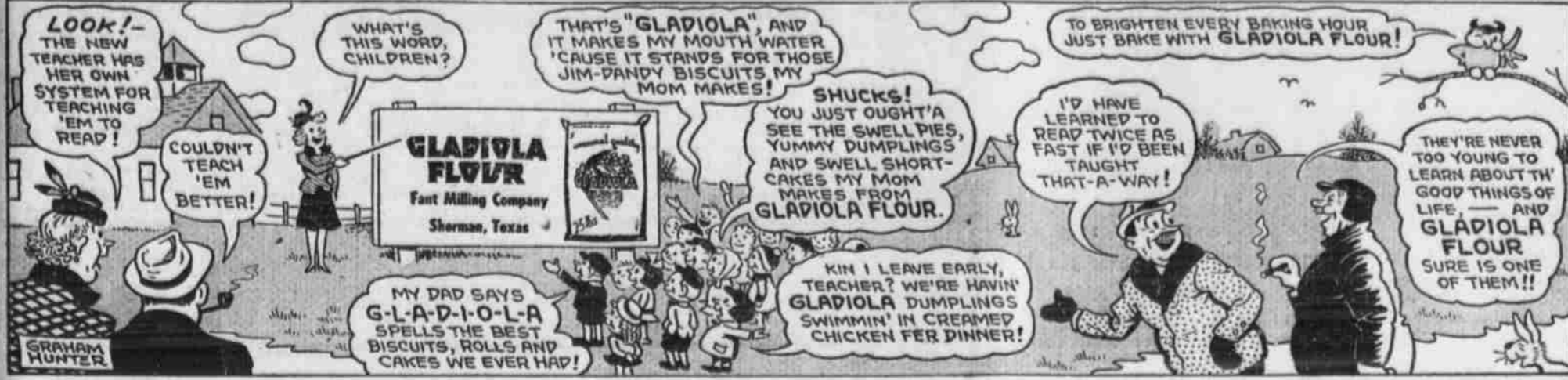

Collector Internal Revenue

- 1. Suppose I am one of the taxpayers who must file a declaration of estimated tax on January 15, how do I estimate my tax for last year? Estimate your income for 1945 and then figure the tax by the same method you use to compute your exact tax on your annual return.
2. Are there any special worksheets or tables to help me estimate? You don't need any special sheets. Use a copy of the regular return blank, Form 1040.
3. If I use the regular return blank Form 1040, to figure my tax, can I file that instead of an estimate form? If you fill it out like a regular return and use exact figures (not estimates) you can file Form 1040, and it will serve both as the declaration due now and as the return due March 15.
4. Part of my tax bill is paid through the tax deductions my employer makes from my paycheck. Do I have to pay the estimated tax on top of that? You pay only the difference between the withholding tax and your total tax.
5. If I am changing an estimate and have already paid some installments, how do I take credit for those payments? If filing Form 1040-ES, write the total amount of your payments on line 5. If filing Form 1940, write the amount on line 7(B), page 1.
6. Suppose my estimate last March was far too high, and I have already paid more than my correct tax for 1945. Can I get a refund of the difference? Yes, by filing your regular return and showing the amount of overpayment in line 9, page 1, Form 1940.

Swing of Southwest Farm Markets

Price trends on most southwest farm products were lower during the second week of January, according to USDA's Production and Marketing Administration. Principal exception was grain, which continued very strong with most prices at the ceiling. Feed supplies are far below trade needs. Hay prices held steady. Cotton strengthened late in the week following earlier declines in moderately active spot markets. Friday's prices lost some of the midweek gain, and closed about unchanged from a week ago. Sales in the 10 designated markets totaled 101,200 bales compared with only 58,400 in the preceding week and 127,400 a year ago. Domestic wool markets were more active as inquiries increased partly as a result of uncertainty as to availability of desirable foreign offerings. The spread of prices on citrus fruit was narrowed to bring top prices in line with the ceiling which was resumed on January 4. South Texas vegetables held about steady although demand ranged from slow to only fair. Beets closed dull at \$1

to \$1.25 per half crate f.o.b. Lower Rio Grande Valley loading points. Cabbage was firm at 85 cents to \$1.05 per 50 pound sack; carrots about steady at \$2.50 to \$2.75 per crate. Shortage of cars reduced movement of spinach from the winter garden-Eagle Pass area and also continued to affect movement of sweet potatoes in Louisiana and of onions and Irish potatoes in the San Luis Valley of Colorado. Egg markets were variable. In some areas of Texas, Kansas, and Colorado supplies are beginning to exceed the demand, but in most southwest markets there is still no surplus and some sections are deficit. This is especially the case around Albuquerque and New Orleans. Prices are holding up well except for the required reductions as ceilings decline. Poultry offerings were moderate and in some cases exceeded the demand. Price trends were generally steady in the Southwest although some northern markets were easy to weak. Southwest cattle markets were generally lower as receipts increased following the Christmas and New Year's holidays. Declines fell mostly in the 25 to 50 cents bracket, with some sales still about steady. Fort

Worth quoted beef steers and yearlings as high as \$16.75 but common and medium grades sold from \$10 to \$13.50. Canner cows realized \$5 to \$7 per hundred pounds. Hogs regained most of the preceding week's loss although a few easy spots still prevailed. For instance, pigs were down 50 cents to a dollar at Fort Worth and \$1 to \$1.25 at San Antonio, and light weight butchers were down 15 to 25 cents at San Antonio. Sheep and lamb markets in Texas and Oklahoma were steady to 25 and 50 cents higher for the week. Wichita declined 25 to 50 cents on lambs, but held steady on ewes. Denver also worked lower during the week.

### Circulate Petition to Hold Election on Paving Project

Oldham and Harrison, Sudan engineers, have estimated for the City of Sudan that it would require a bond issue of about \$38,000 to finance the city's share of costs for paving 30 blocks of streets here. This amount will provide revenue for one-third of the total cost, the remainder to be raised through payment by property owners adjacent to streets selected for paving. The proposals that certain streets be paved at this time is being backed by Chamber of Commerce members, who held a special meeting and appointed druggists Guthrie Allen and Claude Wiseman to circulate petitions for a bond election for this purpose. They will keep copies of the petition on hand at their respective stores, and taxpayers may sign them at either place.

The petition reads: "We, the undersigned taxpayers of Sudan, petition the City Commission to hold an election for the purpose of holding an election for the purpose of voting bonds to finance a street paving project."

Signature solicitors will aim at 100 per cent support before submitting these petitions to the commission for action. In addition to copies maintained at the stores named, interested citizens will distribute petitions for signing among the electorate, it is stated.

It is planned to pave Second Avenue two blocks south of the highway, from Temple Street to the eastern limits of the city, also one block each side all the way through. Discussion is still in progress on this point, but these are the streets generally suggested. Temple street (which lies one block west of Main) also is proposed for paving. This would total 30 city blocks, seven blocks along Second Avenue to be 56 feet wide, and the remainder to be 36 feet wide.

According to present estimations the cost to the individual owner of property fronting this wide street would be about \$240 per 50 feet. Property owners on the narrower streets would be charged approximately \$190 per 50 feet.

Sponsors of this project will make an earnest effort in the next two weeks to obtain further support for this much-needed work.

As has been pointed out by them, this plan suggested would bring all Sudan residents within a half block of paved streets from their homes.

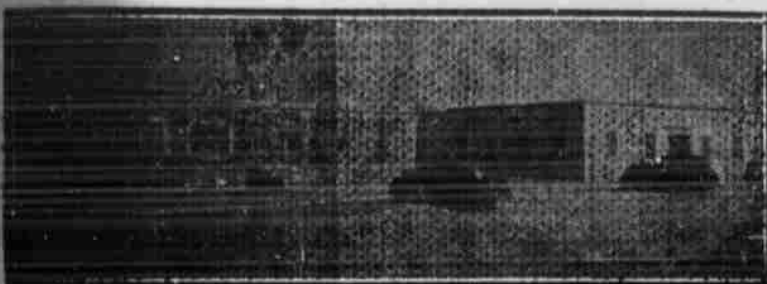

### SIDELIGHTS FROM WASHINGTON

By CONG. GEO. MAHON

A newspaper friend who carries this column told me in Texas the other day that I should try to give my little weekly reports a more personal touch. Here goes.

Prior to returning to Washington for the present session of Congress, I went by the old home place two miles north of Lorraine in Mitchell County to tell my father goodbye. He has lived on this same farm for 35 years. He is 85, but his health is good and he is still active in the management of the farm.

When we eight children were growing up on the farm, my father was always able to see plenty of things that needed to be done, even on rainy days. Well, his eyesight is still good. He amazes the family by reading his morning paper without his glasses. If he has any, they have long since been misplaced.

When he stood out in the front yard in the snow and waved "good luck to you" as I drove away, I noticed he was wearing what I call the Texas Tech trousers.

Here is the story about that: After being first elected to Congress in 1934, I was presented with a suit at a special ceremony at the fair grounds in Lubbock. I prized it very highly because it was given to me by the college and the city, and I first wore it when I took the oath of office in Congress in 1935. The wool for the suit was sheared from the sheep at Texas Tech and made into

cloth at the college. After wearing the suit for five years, I gave it to my father, and he is still wearing it. I know that a lot of people would be very happy if such high quality and workmanship could be found in present day garments.

There was nothing encouraging for relatives of men overseas in the personal report given to a joint meeting of members of the House and Senate last week by General Eisenhower and Admiral Nimitz. They gave a full statement on the over-all picture, but they did not give information in regard to individual cases of personal hardship and injustice—cases in which members of Congress and the people generally are most interested.

Officials of the armed forces freely admit that following the original plans made after VJ-Day, the demobilization program was speeded up far in excess of Army-Navy plans. There is no doubt but that this was done because of the numerous pleas and demands of members of Congress, the people generally, and the servicemen themselves.

A person who has not talked with servicemen overseas can hardly realize how desperately anxious these men are—especially those who have been long overseas—to return home to their families. In an effort to be helpful to these men, I have conferred personally with the President and others and will continue to avail myself of every possible opportunity to be helpful to them.

Between May 12 and mid-January approximately 6,772,000 servicemen were discharged. General Eisenhower said that not until June 30 will all enlisted men with two years of service be discharged or on board ship

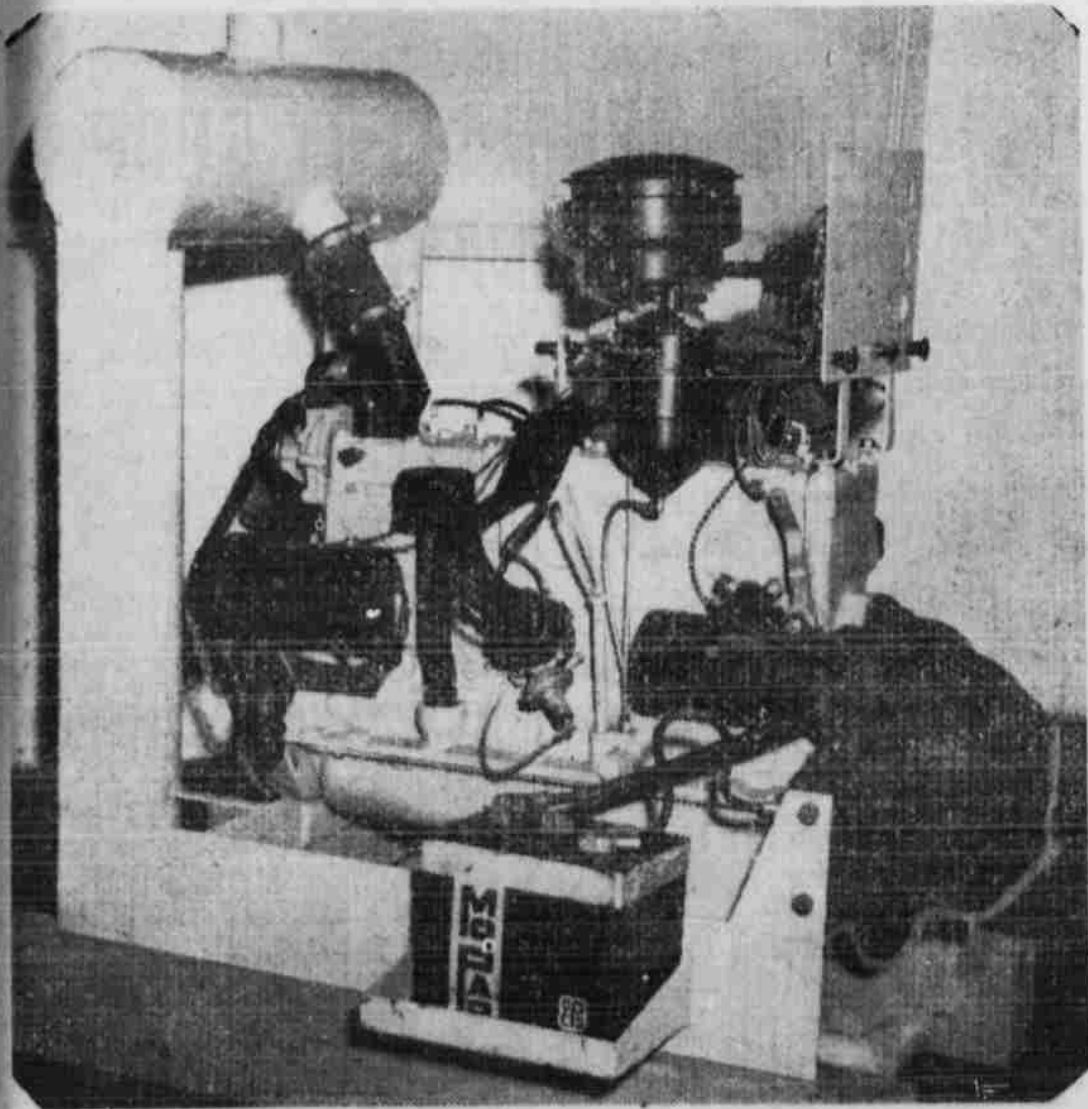

Information for Veterans

Q. Does a peacetime veteran who is receiving pension receive the same amount as is received by a war time veteran for the same disability?

A. A peacetime veteran is paid on the basis of 75 per cent of the amount received by a war time veteran. If, however, the service during which his disability was incurred is determined to have been extra hazardous in character, or performed under conditions simulating war, he may be paid at war time rates.

Q. If a veteran moves from one state to another must he continue to transact his business with the Regional Office in the state from which he moved?

A. No, upon request signed by the veteran his claim file may be moved to the Regional Office in the State of his new residence. He will then transact his business with the Veterans Administration in the Regional Office of his new home.

Q. What is an area office of the Veterans Administration, and why are some claims rated there and other claims rated in the Regional Office?

A. An Area Office is a branch of Central Office. It has initial jurisdiction of the claims of World War II veterans discharged within its limits. When a claim is made at time of discharge the records are immediately sent to the area office for initial rating. This is done to expedite service on the claims of men being separated from the service. All future action on these claims will be by the Regional Office. Other types of claims are handled entirely by the Regional Office.

Q. Is it necessary for a veteran to have an honorable discharge to be eligible for a loan guaranteed by the Veterans Administration?

A. The veteran is basically entitled if he has a discharge other than dishonorable.

Q. What determines the eligibility of a veteran who has had war time service for hospitalization?

A. If discharged other than dishonorably from his last period of war time service he is potentially eligible.

Q. What determines the number of weekly payments a veteran may receive as readjustment allowance?

A. The length of active service after September 16, 1940, determines the period through which the benefit may be paid. If a veteran has

90 days of active service after September 16, 1940, he is entitled to receive 8 payments for each calendar month of major portion thereof for the first three months of active service and four payments for each calendar month thereafter until a maximum of 52 payments.

Q. May a veteran who was more than 25 years of age when he entered active service go to school under the provisions of the G. I. Bill?

A. Yes, every veteran who served 90 days or more subsequent to September 16, 1940 and was discharged other than dishonorably is entitled to a one year retraining or refresher course.

Q. What determines a veterans entitlement to medical treatment?

A. Need of hospital treatment must be shown before a veteran may be admitted to a Veterans Administration Hospital.

Q. If a man has applied for and been denied a pension, is he entitled to the benefit provided by the G. I. Bill?

A. The fact that a man has been denied a pension does not disqualify him for any of the benefits provided in that bill.

Q. Can a veteran who has continued his National Service Life Insurance after discharge reduce the amount of his policy?

A. Yes, he may reduce the amount of his insurance. However, the amount of insurance continued must be a multiple of \$500 and not less than \$1000.

Q. May a veteran be assigned a total disability rating without being totally disabled according to the rating schedule?

A. Yes, and extension to the 1933 rating schedule a total disability rating may be assigned if the veteran has one disability ratable at 60 per cent and is determined to be unemployable. If there are two or more disabilities one of them must be ratable at 40 per cent or more and sufficient additional disability must exist to bring the combined rating to 70 per cent or more at the attained

age of 60, the percentage requirement may be reduced by 10 per cent. At age 65, by an additional 10 per cent. At age 70 there will be no percentage requirement. A determination of unemployability will suffice for a total disability rating if there is sufficient disability to produce unemployability.

Q. When a soldier changes the name of the beneficiary of his National Service Life Insurance is the beneficiary notified?

A. Neither beneficiary is notified unless the soldier has made a specific request that the Veterans Administration do so.

Q. Is a veteran limited to one loan to be guaranteed by the Government?

A. A veteran is not limited to one loan. He may execute any number of loans provided the aggregate of guarantees under such loans does not exceed \$2000 for any one veteran.

Q. Does the remarriage of the widow of a veteran who is receiving pension for herself and children stop the amount payable to the children?

A. Only the pension payable to the widow will be stopped.

Q. What does the Veterans Administration hope to accomplish by its reemployment and retraining program for veterans?

A. The objective of the reemployment and retraining program is to place the veteran in the best job for which he is qualified by training and experience or if he is incapable of employment by reason of a physical disability to furnish his training that will overcome his handicap, irrespective to his employment status at the time he entered service.

### National 4-H Dairy Production Winners



Three of six national 4-H dairy production winners are shown here, with their favorite animal and preferred liquid refreshment—milk. They are (left to right) Bill Van Cleave, Chapel Hill, Tenn.; James Galbreath, Street, Md.; and Earl Edwards, Jr., Floydada, Tex. They received college scholarships presented by the Kraft Foods Company. Bill started out eight years ago with one heifer, now has three cows, four heifers, two calves and a herd sire. Total income from dairy products is \$5,454, including \$803 in cash prizes. James has raised 16 dairy animals in eight years, won five junior, one senior and four grand championship awards; has grossed \$5,425, including \$550 in cash awards. Earl is milking a herd of 21 purebred Jerseys, with gross earnings of \$7,085 of which \$287 was prize money. He won grand championship and reserve champion in a county dairy show last year. He is secretary-treasurer of the Texas 4-H organization.

### Work on Sudan Roads Gets Underway

A \$247,980.94 contract for building 36 1/2 miles of farm-to-market roads in Road District No. 4, in the immediate vicinity of Sudan, was awarded to Fred Hall & Son, of Waco, at a meeting of commissioners court at Olton Wednesday afternoon, of last week.

This is just \$19.06 less than the \$248,000 bond issue previously voted for the project. The reduction in costs was accomplished by deleting certain phases in the contract originally offered by Hall & Son. The figure agreed upon is the total contract price for the entire mileage, including engineering. The county will undertake to perform the deleted work later, with precinct funds.

An important item was the decision to change from a soil-cement base to a caliche base on the work north of town. Also, engineers pointed out, the recent snow made possible a saving of between \$4,000 and \$5,000, because it has eliminated the need for considerable sprinkling.

A successful search for caliche pits in the area north of the railroad tracks meant another saving, as it made the caliche available near the scene of the road-building there, rather than having to haul it from the known pits on the opposite side of the city. Hauling of this material is an expensive item, it was pointed out. Omission of the concrete culverts which customarily are placed over pipe lines as a protection to them was also agreed upon.

Even with these changes and savings, practically the entire amount of the bond issue was required to build the roads. As a result, no funds are available for the purchase of right-of-way. This will make it necessary for the various property owners to donate the required amount of land, instead of being paid a nominal (small) fee for it, as is customary.

Engineers started setting stakes for the work Monday. Hall & Son contracted to give preference to ex-servicemen and Lamb county labor and equipment Boyd Callan, who will represent the contractor, will arrive in Sudan Jan. 28.
