

STOCKIN' FESTIVAL BEGINS FRIDAY

Christmas comes to Littlefield Friday... at least the beginning of the Christmas Season begins that day. Friday marks the kickoff of the annual Christmas Stockin' Festival which this year promises to be the biggest event of the kind ever staged in Littlefield. Merchants are turning their stores into Christmas wonderlands and Christmas decorations, the most elaborate ever used in Littlefield, will accent the Yule Season. The first of many Christmas Stockin' Events begins on that day with the Early Bird Christmas Stockin' Festival. This portion of the festival will feature hourly drawings during the days, Friday and Saturday, for over \$1050 in gift certificates. The only way area residents have of winning a part of the gift certificates is to fill out, then clip out and deposit in the registration blank that appears in the top right-hand corner of the Early Bird Christmas Stockin' Festival section

of today's Lamb County Leader or in the circular which goes to all the residents in the trade area. The registration blanks are to be deposited in a wire squirrel cage which will be located in front of the Littlefield Press office at 506 Phelps Avenue. There will be no in-the-store registration as in the past. Winners of gift certificates can pick them up at the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce office in the City Hall any time before 5 p.m. Saturday. The certificates will be good for merchandise through Saturday, Dec. 2. Littlefield's merchants are planning many special prices on Christmas merchandise during Friday and Saturday, according to Dan Staggs, chairman of the Retail Council. Monday, Nov. 27, a giant parade is planned, complete with bands, floats and climaxed with Santa's first appearance of the season in Littlefield. Santa will be on hand for about two hours after the parade to talk to children in order to find out what they want for Christmas.

Word was received Tuesday morning that at least five bands from the area will take part in the gigantic parade which will begin at 7 p.m. in front of the depot and continue down Phelps to the Courthouse. The parade will carry a religious theme with all floats entered requested to carry on this idea. The general theme of the parade is "A Full Stocking For Everyone" based on the idea of giving and sharing. Churches, schools, clubs, and other groups throughout the trade territory are eligible to enter the floats. The winner from each town will receive \$25 from the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce. Also after the parade Santa will be presented with toys given by people from the area. Santa will take the toys and with the help of the Littlefield Jaycees, repair them. He will come back to Littlefield later in the Christmas season with the repaired toys for the under-privileged children.

Help Requested To Decorate Tree

An urgent request went out from the Christmas tree committee of the Chamber early this week for volunteers to help in decorating the large Christmas tree which will be erected between the City Hall and the Post Office.

The tree will be decorated from 2 to 5 p.m. Saturday. "We'll appreciate any decorations that anyone wants to donate," Jerry Sanders, co-chairman of the committee, said Tuesday. "But we'll also appreciate anyone who will come down and help us decorate the tree."

This is the first year in several years that a large tree has been placed on Phelps Avenue. The 21-foot tree was given to the Chamber by Leonard Green who lives north of Littlefield.

Bank Teller Foils Forgery Attempt Here

A quick thinking bank teller foiled an attempt to cash a forged check for \$135 early Monday morning and resulted in the arrest of the man attempting to cash the check.

Manuel Robles Diaz, 27-year-old citizen of Mexico, was arrested and charged with attempting to pass a forged instrument. The check was made out to Odesmo Martinez, also a citizen of Mexico, and bore the signature of G. A. Poteet of Littlefield.

The bank teller, Katy Winters, took the check and compared the signature with the one they have on file and discovered it was a forgery. She reported her findings to Robert Bridger who in turn called the

sheriff's office. Diaz was detained by First National Bank officials until the officers arrived.

Diaz told officers that Martinez had given him the check to cash for him. Martinez returned to Mexico last week and Diaz was scheduled to leave Monday morning, an hour after the forgery passing attempt.

A fight Saturday night in Earth resulted in charges being filed against both parties. Deputies said Frank Gilmore, 28, of Earth, was charged with assault with a deadly weapon and S. N. Gentry, 28, of Sunnyside, was charged with making a menacing, destruction of public

County Teachers Hear Hamilton

"Teaching is a profession and let's keep it so," was the opening statement of Charles B. Hamilton, Field Representative of Texas State Teachers Association, when the county association met in Susan Monday evening for a meeting in the school cafeteria.

Hamilton gave a word picture describing the image that teachers have of themselves and the image that lay people have of teachers. He stated ways in which the TSTA is recognized giving the example of the 56th legislative act of TSTA when they promoted the adoption of teaching a 400 word English vocabulary to non-English speaking children previous to their starting first grade. It was also an act for furthering good relations with Mexico.

He stressed, "Let's make teaching a specialized training type of work." He suggested that we study what makes a good teacher, the kind of teacher "I" want to become, the certification of teachers, and their code

of ethics. Hamilton stressed that the county association should be a word picture describing the image that teachers have of themselves and the image that lay people have of teachers. He stated ways in which the TSTA is recognized giving the example of the 56th legislative act of TSTA when they promoted the adoption of teaching a 400 word English vocabulary to non-English speaking children previous to their starting first grade. It was also an act for furthering good relations with Mexico.

Balloonist Is Sighted Here Sunday

Area residents were startled early Sunday morning when a large gold-colored balloon passed overhead and continued in a northeasterly direction.

Explanation of the balloon was received later Sunday morning when it was discovered that the balloon was used by a 56-year-old grandmother from Pennsylvania, who was trying to set a new endurance record for a balloon flight.

Mrs. Alford Wolfe of Bluebell, Pa., completed her 40-hour flight and accomplished her purpose as she broke the old record, held by a Russian woman, of 34 years 21 minutes set in 1948.

Lamb County's 1961 feed grain crop will top the \$16,000,000 mark according to top agriculture officials here. "This is the best grain year we have had in the past five years," according to Bill Kimbrough, County Agent.

Based on the average production on both irrigated and dryland and the price, both support and open market, plus the amount paid for layout lands, the total figure should be about \$16,200,000 or about \$2 million more than last year.

The crop is between 85 and 90 per cent harvested with only the late maize left in the fields. Dry, sunny weather is all that is needed to complete the harvesting.

"There is approximately 177,000 acres planted in feed grain this year," L. D. Aten, County ASC office manager, said Tuesday, "and about 52,000 acres in layout lands."

"The average yield on irrigated land is 5300 pounds and on dryland it is 2700," he stated. Of the total acreage about 30 per cent is dryland and the remainder is irrigated.

Based on these figures and the fact that 76 per cent of the farms are in the feed grain program, the \$16,000,000 was derived. Of this total \$2,300,000 was paid in layout land payments, with the remainder being the actual amount received for grain.

Figuring that the irrigated land produced the average total yield would be \$57,200,000

When you add the \$2,300,000 paid in lay-out land payments, the figure hits \$16,228,732.

'Old Rugged Cross' Is Nation's Favorite Hymn

"The Old Rugged Cross" still is America's favorite hymn. More than 61,000 newspaper readers from coast to coast voted in the recent National Newspapers Hymn Poll and 10,482 of them chose "The Old Rugged Cross" a vivid hymn which describes the traditional meaning of the Cross, as their dearest, religious song.

Bill McVey, the Christian Herald Gospel Singer, who directed the survey to determine the hymns America loves best, and Audience Analysts, Inc., Bala-Cynwyd, Pa., the independent research organization which tabulated votes from readers of more than 1,000 newspapers, reported that "How Great Thou Art" was a close second to "The Old Rugged Cross."

"How Great Thou Art", a dynamic gospel song describing God's omnipotence, received 8,449 votes. Audience Analysts said this large vote doubtless was due to the song's popularity at hymn sings across the country. "How Great Thou Art" a favorite selection of baritone McVey and Billy Graham, was fourth in last year's Christian Herald hymn poll and McVey attributed part of its current popularity to its moving, evangelistic feeling and strong melody.

The third favorite hymn disclosed by the National Newspapers Hymn Poll was "What A Friend We Have in Jesus" a song which has earned a place in American's hearts by its warm expression of faith held by Protestants of every denomination, McVey said.

McVey, who has sung all the top 50 hymns at Christian Herald Community Hymn Sings across the country, reported that "In the Garden" a hymn which tells of God's compassion and guidance, received 3,868 votes for fourth place in the National Newspapers Hymn Poll and was especially preferred in the Midwest.

The Christian Herald Singer noted the rise in acceptance of "Amazing Grace" among Am-

erican churchgoers. This gospel song, which relates how faith provides confidence, moved from ninth place in the 1960 Christian Herald hymn poll to fifth place with 1,816 votes in the National Newspapers Hymn Poll.

The sixth favorite hymn of the 61,445 Americans who voted was "Rock of Ages," a religious song which describes man's confidence in God, "Rock of Ages", seventh in McVey's Christian Herald poll, received 1,511 votes in the July-October National Newspapers Hymn Poll.

The next four favorites were: "Sweet Hour of Prayer," 1,157 votes; "Abide With Me," 1,112 votes; "Beyond the Sunset", 1,050 votes; and "Whispering Hope", 741 votes.

McVey said the vote received by "Whispering Hope" was the biggest surprise in the nationwide balloting. This hymn was 27th in the Christian Herald poll but moved to 10th in the National Newspapers Hymn Poll.

This year's poll, co-sponsored by Christian Herald Magazine, the nation's largest interdenominational Protestant publication, and newspaper editors in every state except Hawaii and Vermont, recorded more than 1,900 hymns and gospel songs. Last year, Christian Herald readers voted for 1,666 religious songs.

McVey said the most important point disclosed by this first definitive survey to determine the hymns America loves best was that American churchgoers do not prefer one type of religious song to another.

The last two years have seen a constant controversy between hymnal editors, who downgrade hymns they feel are too sentimental and poorly composed and sometimes eliminate those religious songs from hymn books, and churchgoers who prefer hymns that have been the most inspiring to them and easiest for them to understand.

The National Newspaper Hymn Poll results show that American churchgoers want

to sing sentimental hymns and gospel songs like "The Old Rugged Cross", McVey said. "If we are to get all Americans singing the hymns or gospel songs of the church again, choir directors, organists and ministers should note the favorites of newspaper readers across the country and encourage religious singing of every variety," he said.

"A silent faith is not as strong as a singing faith," McVey said. "Singing our favorite hymns is a natural way to create a national bond of brotherhood and moral strength in the face of the mounting Communist threat," the Christian Herald Singer said.

McVey pointed out that readers who voted in the National Newspaper Hymn Poll divided their ballots almost equally for gospel songs such as "How Great Thou Art," and for hymns such as "What A Friend We Have in Jesus."

"Even though many of these hymns and gospel songs have been torn out of the hymnbooks they can't be torn out of the hearts of people who love them," McVey said. "Americans are inspired by the simple melodies and sentiments of the lyrics of their favorite hymns and gospel songs."

"The enthusiastic response to the National Newspapers Hymn Poll by men and women in almost every state indicates that ministers and choir directors should encourage more hymn singing in their churches and at the same time urge everyone to express his faith with song every day," Bill McVey said.

Penn Point

This is the Thanksgiving Season and just about the only time each year we all take time to stop and give thanks for our many blessings. We, of all the peoples of the world, should be the most thankful, for we live in a FREE nation under God. We have been blessed beyond measure with the material goods of life.

But just being thankful is not enough. We must all work hard and long if this nation and our way of life is to remain FREE. In the November 20, 1961 edition of "Life Lines" appeared the winning essay on "How To Save America" and written by Marcella Maybold, a college student in Columbus, Ohio. It is reprinted in full below and is titled "Just One Person."

JUST ONE PERSON

A war is going on. To call it a "cold war" in no way lessens this fact. Men are not yet fighting with modern atomic weapons; they are using two of the oldest weapons known to man - the gift of speech and the art of the pen. Men are not yet planning intricate military moves to wipe out towns of thousands; they are forming seemingly rational arguments to lead millions into a lethargic state of trust. Men are not yet losing their lives on the fields of battle; they are losing their freedom, by a slower but equally sure process.

To fight any war or win any battle, one must recognize the enemy for what he is and know his tactics. To survive, one must attack with force, not just stand still or retreat. Americans must realize that they are in a war now - a war as real as any one that could be fought on the battlefield. Once we realize this we will know how to save America. We know that only straightforward, positive action on our part will help us survive this war.

But you will quickly ask, "What action can I take? After all, I'm just one person." If you, a free American with full power to act as you choose, even ask that question, you are on the road to action. For if you are interested enough to ask that question, you are interested enough to act when you get an answer.

The answers are numerous for you if you honestly believe in our free American system of government with its freedoms of religion, speech and press. If you want your children to enjoy these same freedoms, now is the time to act on these answers, for it also takes just one person to press the button which will release an atomic warhead and destroy millions of human lives.

Since a war is being fought, you must be well informed on the tactics being used by the Mistaken; you must study their aims and their methods. To do this, you must find out exactly what your American freedoms are; you must know what our Constitution guarantees. You must know where your rights must end and another person's rights begin. Only by knowing exactly what you possess can you know exactly what you are losing. A man with ten dollars' worth of change in his pocket will not miss a nickel or dime which is stolen. But if his pocket is constantly being picked, even though the thief may only take what seems to be a small amount, the man with ten dollars to start with will end up with an empty pocket.

The same is true of the priceless possession of freedom. You may not realize that you are losing it if the Mistaken ones only take a small bit at a time. But the net result will be the same as for the man with an empty pocket. You will possess no freedom; you will be a slave.

It is clear that you must be a well-informed and well-read person to defend your Amer-

ican freedom. Don't let the Mistaken ones steal even the smallest bit of freedom from you. Often just one person can change an election result. That is how you can apply the knowledge you have gained from your reading.

Perhaps the most practical way for you as an individual person to help, is to tell others what you know. Don't be afraid they will scorn your concern. No one would ever laugh at you for telling them to watch out for a speeding automobile. Neither will they laugh at you when you tell them to watch out for the Mistaken. An alert America, one which is on guard against all the attacks made by the Mistaken, will never be accidentally taken over.

You can tell others what you know by writing intelligent, informed letters to the local press. Since the pen is one of the weapons in our war, you should make use of it as well as you know how. A simple statement of fact will often get more attention than an intricate display of prose.

You can tell others about the attack by the Mistaken on our American system by writing what you know. The "Letters to the Editor" section of a newspaper or magazine is often one of the most read sections. People have a natural curiosity about what other ordinary people have to say. Here, you and I can exert our influence. For you to speak out and say what you know to be true is better than to lose the war with the Mistaken by default. A letter written by just one person is read by thousands.

To again employ the pen in the fight for freedom, you can use some of the power given to you by our Constitution. As an American citizen, you elect men to represent you in Congress. If these men are to do a good job of representing you, they must know what you want. It is your right, therefore, and also your duty, to write your representative in Congress with any logical criticism or praise you may have to offer. A letter from a constituent back home is often a very influential factor in helping a congressman make a decision. Act now! If you object to bills being passed which you know are constitutionally wrong and which seem to be in-

spired by the Mistaken, do something. Write to your congressmen.

But if any war is to be won, soldiers must be trained. As Americans, interested in preserving our basic freedoms of religion, speech and press against the threats of Boss Khrushchev and Communism, we must teach our children to love America and what she stands for. The youth of any nation are always the sole hope of that country's future. American youth must not be weakened by forces acting to destroy their morals or their patriotism. Good courses in government, taught by people with a love of country, must instill our youth with the basis for being alert citizens. Parents must be responsible citizens who don't engage in petty criticism of our national leaders. Both parents and teachers must lead youth to be responsible citizens by being good examples themselves.

Seeing democracy in action and listening to people who care that it stays in action will do much for our children. Everyone has been influenced, at least to some extent, by another human being. Often, we can point to just one person who has helped us change our way of life. Remember this when our young people are around. Be alert and responsible. It may be America's future president who is listening to you and taking your example.

Saving America is no easy task which can be left to the government alone. Each person must feel the responsibility himself. Each person must recognize the need to preserve freedom and to act. Karl Marx started the Communist movement with only a few staunch believers, yet today his beliefs control millions. If you don't want to be a mere number in a Communist - controlled nation, you must act now against it.

Do you want freedom of religion, freedom of speech and freedom of the press? Do you want all your other freedoms? Do you want your children to enjoy these freedoms in the years to come? If you do, you must act now.

You might follow the example of the man who lived 1961 years ago. He was just one person, but he influences the en-

tire world today. The Christian principles which He gave us are dominant factors in our American way of life. The Mistaken would like to see them removed. If you want to show a true love of neighbor as He preached years ago, speak out against the Mistaken.

Though people are worried, America and her freedoms will not be destroyed. Instead, Won't you be the person who wants to save America?
