4-Hers Would Help Relieve Famine

Four-H Club boys and girls throughout the nation are setting an example for all America. They are keeping on with their Victory Gardens, which totaled a million acres during the war. It is in response to President Truman's recent message emphasizing the importance of increasing America's total food supply to help relieve famine abroad.

The club members' action is stimulating rural youth to participate in the 1946 National 4-H Victory Garden award program. The awards are offered by Allis-Chalmers for outstanding records of achievement. They comprise gold-filled medals of honor to the four top ranking entrants in each participating county, and \$9,600 worth of U. S. Savings Bonds to be shared by state and national winners. Sectional

winners will also receive an educational trip to the 25th Anniversary National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago next December.

Participants learn how to care for and manage a well-planned garden, carry out a program of garden insect and disease control, and market produce in an economical, approved manner. Planning gardens for a long season is encouraged so that nutritious vegetables and fruits can be produced for use throughout the year.

The State Extension Service will provide information and suggestions for carrying on this program and for helping 4-H Club members in attaining its objectives.

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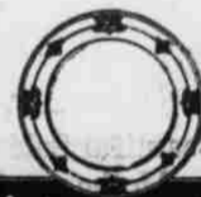

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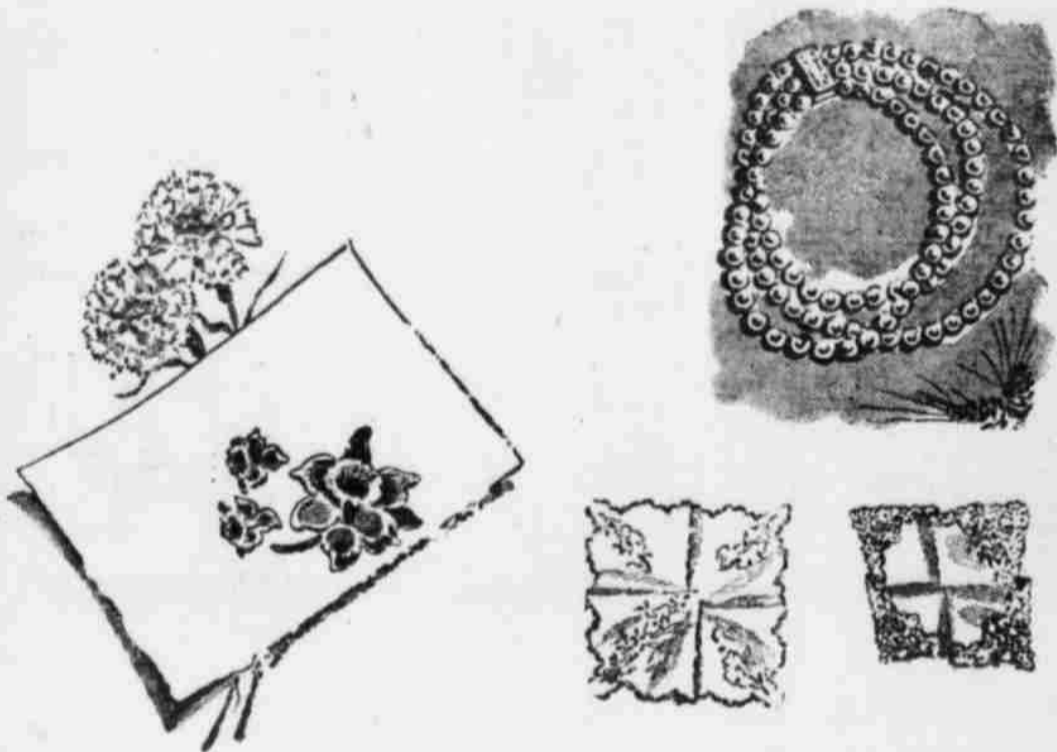

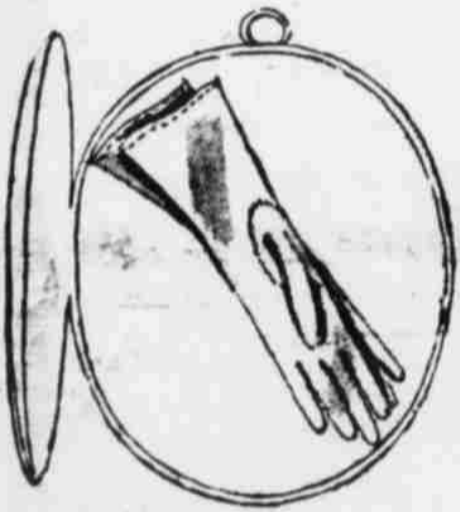

Miss Mitchell, 69, Passes Away At Clovis, N. M. Was Founder Of Leader, publisher of Muleshoe Journal

Miss Mitchell, 69, Veteran West Texas newspaperman, founder of Lamb County Leader, and former owner and publisher of the Muleshoe Journal, died at his home in Clovis, N. M., Wednesday morning, April 24, after having been in failing health several months.

Miss Mitchell was a man of many accomplishments besides that of a newspaper man. In his nearly 70 years of life, he served as a soldier, teacher, law enforcement officer, and also found time to become a successful business man.

Miss Mitchell established the Littlefield Leader in 1923, later changing the name of the newspaper to Lamb County Leader, and discharging the newspaper to the present owner and publisher Morley B. Clarke, in July 1930.

Coming to Muleshoe from Littlefield, Mr. Mitchell purchased and published for several years the Muleshoe Journal, later selling the newspaper to the late Clyde S. Holland. About two and one-half years ago he and Mrs. Mitchell moved to Clovis, where he established a print shop, and was at times employed by the Clovis News-Journal.

He was born June 24, 1876 in Benton, Franklin County, Ill., the son of Emily E. and Willis E. Mitchell. During the Spanish-American war he served two years with the First Regiment of Territorial Volunteers. In World War I he was a member of the United States Secret Service.

Miss Mitchell was ordained to preach and has served in pulpits of the Methodist, Congregational and Presbyterian churches. He preached at the Clovis Presbyterian church a year during the illness of the church pastor.

Miss Mitchell was editor of the Muleshoe Journal. Miss Mitchell achieved wide recognition as a forceful editorial writer. He did not hesitate to espouse a cause or advance an opinion.

Miss Mitchell still owned residence and business property at Muleshoe. The farm near Muleshoe is operated by Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Redwine.

Miss Mitchell was a forceful public speaker and was a leader for civic and territorial development of West Texas and the Plains.

At his will, Miss Mitchell requested that no funeral service be held and that no flowers be sent by friends. These requests were adhered to. Many Bailey County friends called at the home when word was received of his passing.

The body was taken to Benton, for burial near the graves of his father and mother. Mrs. Mitchell had a close friend, Miss M. Harwood, who accompanied the body there.

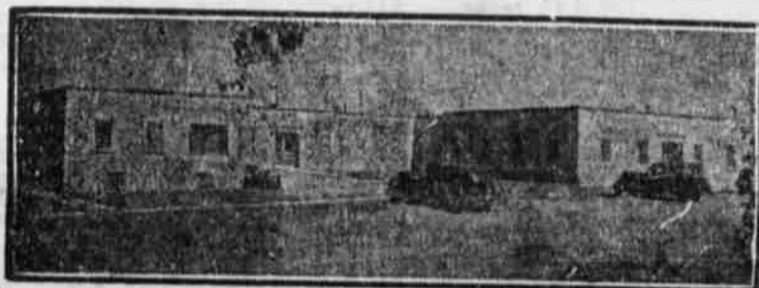
"My preference is to remain in the United States Senate where I can be of the greatest service to the people of Texas.

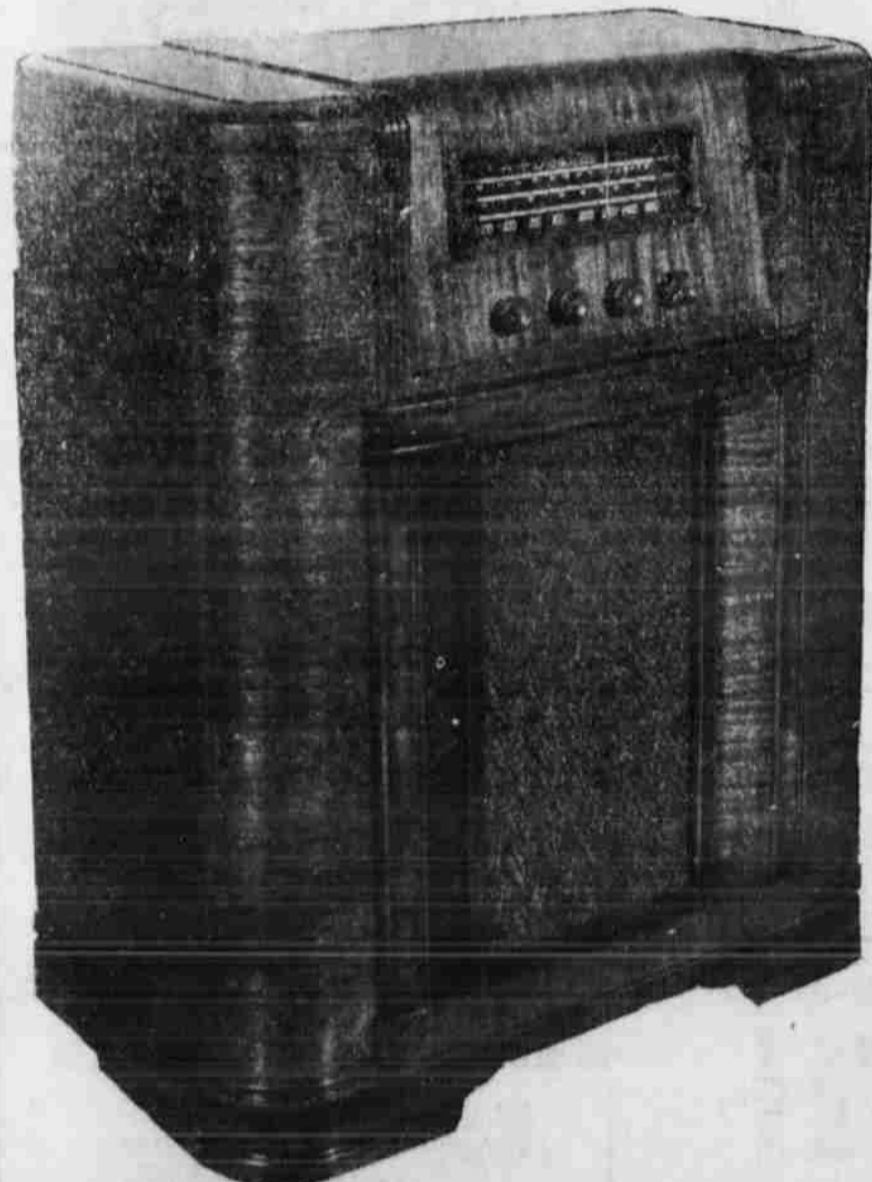

Santa Fe serves the Southwest with two main lines.

The northern route runs across the plains of Kansas, southeastern Colorado, and goes over the mountains at Raton Pass.

Johnny Lippard Re-enlists for 3 Years in Marines

John B. Lippard, of 805 E. 6th Street, Littlefield, Texas, this past week was re-enlisted in the United States Marine Corps for three more years and is now enjoying his 40-day re-enlistment furlough. At the expiration of his furlough, he expects to report to Moffet Field, California, A Naval Air Station there.

In the six and a half years of service with the Corps, Lippard saw action on Corregidor, Bataan, and the Philippines. On March 6, 1942, Lippard was captured at Corregidor, and was a prisoner of the Japs for three and a half years. He was imprisoned at camps in the Philippines, Manchuria, and Japan proper. He was liberated the 7th of September, 1945 and returned to the United States in March, 1946.

He served with the 4th Marine Regiment, and was wounded on Corregidor.

In the United States, he was stationed in Navy Yards at Bremerton, Washington, and Mare Island, California during peace-time.

Lippard is the 25 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Lippard of Littlefield, Texas. Marine Pvt. Rich-

ard E. Salmon, also of Littlefield, is now serving with the Leathernecks at the Marine Corps Base, San Diego California, and is the nephew of Lippard.

T. Wade Potter Named Chairman Of NAE Fund

T. Wade Potter, attorney of Littlefield, Texas, was named last week as Lamb County chairman of the campaign to raise \$15,000,000 toward the National Americanism Endowment Fund.

A national trust established by The American Legion, the Americanism Fund is designed to carry on a broad educational program combating all subversive "isms" in conflict with the principles of the United States Constitution.

President Truman is honorary national chairman and Governor Coke R. Stevenson is national vice chairman. Chairman of the campaign to raise Texas' quota of \$450,000 is Fred F. Florence, president of the Republic National Bank of Dallas.

Lamb County's quota is \$894.00. As stated by the 18 nationally known trustees, headed by Col. Alvin M. Owsley, of Dallas, the Americanism Fund's program proposes these specific undertakings:

1. Establishment of a permanent board of from three to five members—all leading educational authorities—to plan and direct a comprehensive continuing program of teaching the understanding and active practice of Americanism.

2. Cooperation with all established educational systems, whether public, private, or denominational, for the purpose of stimulating the more intensive teaching of Constitutional Americanism.

3. Endowment of professorships in colleges and universities for the teaching of Constitutional history and law, clarifying and emphasizing the values of the Constitution, and giving training in the active application of these principles to the nation's needs, today and tomorrow.

4. Establishment of college and university scholarships for young men and women planning careers in statecraft and government.

5. Encouraging and assisting physical fitness programs which will raise the health level of all Americans.

6. Intensifying support of existing youth-guidance agencies toward elimination of juvenile delinquency.

7. Development of an educational program designed to build support for the American system of competitive enterprise.

8. Training and employment of a permanent staff in the several Legion departments to assist and encourage all worthy Americanism projects.

9. Maintenance of a comprehensive public relations program—by means of newspapers and magazines, radio, motion pictures, and a speakers' bureau—to expound and explain the meaning of Americanism and

the processes by which it must be kept the living creed of the nation.

10. Research into all methods designed to further international understanding as a way to world peace; and support of those found to be in conformity with the spirit of the San Francisco Charter of the United Nations Organization.

Must Not Apply For More Than One Account Number

Wednesday of last week, John Palmer, manager of the Social Security Board in Lubbock, Texas, in Littlefield for the purpose of assisting persons who had questions regarding Social Security, or who wished to file a claim for Social Security benefits, or who needed Social Security account number cards. Mr. Palmer stated that a number of individuals applying for social security account numbers by mail had that they had never before applied for an account number and upon investigation determined that an account number had been previously issued to the applicant. Mr. Palmer stressed the fact that no individual should ever secure more than one account number. "To secure additional account numbers is a possible loss in benefits to the individual as well as causing the payment unnecessary expense in establishing a new account," he said. "No one number can be assigned to two different individuals, any employee for whom two accounts are established prohibits forever the use of the extra account number assigned for anyone else."

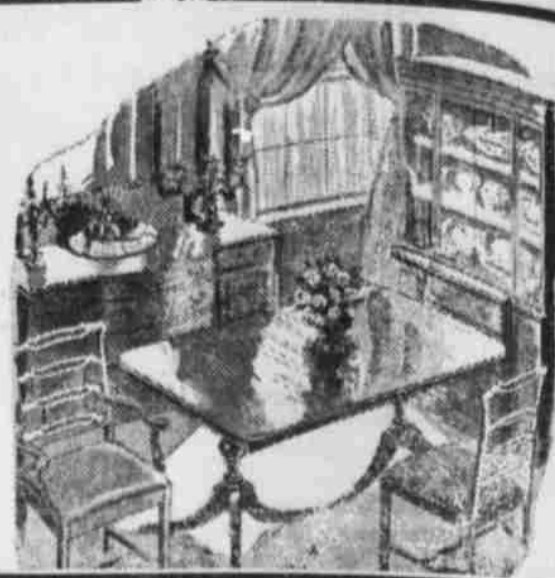

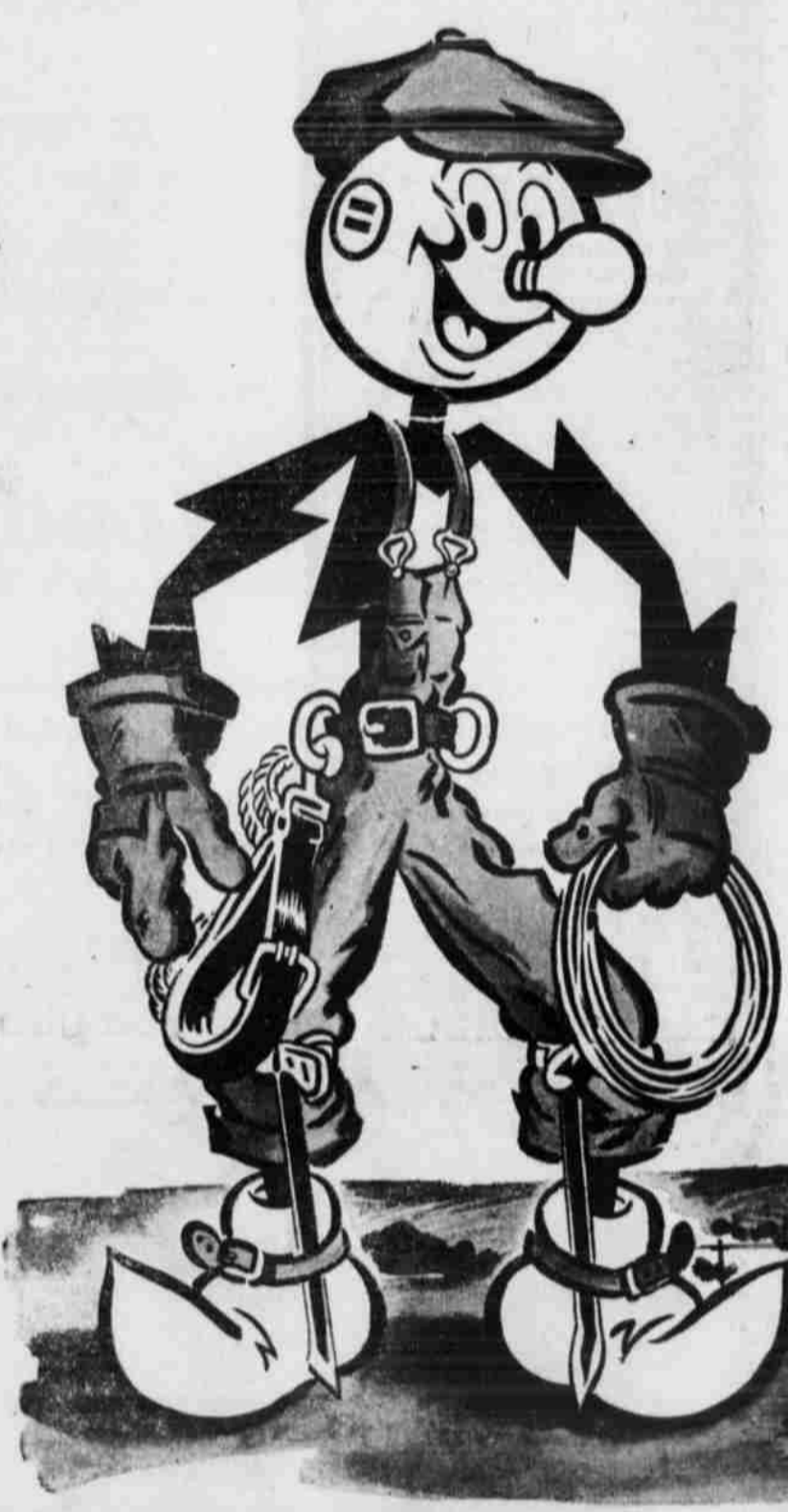



Littlefield To Get Airplane Service Soon

Cities and communities of West Texas, New Mexico, southern Colorado, Kansas and Oklahoma are going to receive airplane service almost immediately, officials of the Texas-New Mexico Airline have announced following notification from the Civil Aeronautics Board that they had been allocated permits to operate feeder lines over the area.

Recommendations of the board authorized lines between Trinidad, Amarillo, Fort Worth and Dallas, between Garden City and Amarillo, between Amarillo and El Paso, between Albuquerque and Amarillo, between Amarillo and Big Spring, and between Lubbock and Wink.

Other cities to be served by this line are Dalhart, Dumas, Clarendon, Memphis, Childress, Vernon, Electra, Wichita Falls, Graham, Mineral Wells, Perryton, Canadian, Pampa, Sanhandle, Lamesa, Pecos, Wink, Odessa, Midland, Littlefield, and Seagraves.

New Mexico towns receiving the service include: Raton, Clayton, Clovis, Portales, Roswell, Alamogordo, Las Cruces, Las Vegas, Tucuman, Artesia, Carlsbad, and Hobbs.

Frederick and Guyton are the Oklahoma cities on the line.

In Kansas, Garden City and Liberal will be served. Trinidad is the only Colorado city affected.

Agents will be appointed in each city within the immediate future, Byron Singleton, executive vice-president and general counsel, announced. Schedules and comparative rates will also be announced as soon as the Civil Aeronautics Board approves. "Rates will compare favorably with existing transportation rates of first class, or lower," Singleton declared.

Lockheed 10's or aircraft approved by the Board will be used through out the service, the executive said. However, he added, D-C-3's are now available and may be pressed into service. The planes will accommodate 10 passengers or more in any event, he said.

The Company's first quarter sales of motor fuel were 25% greater than for the same period a year ago, and 28% higher than in the last pre-war first quarter of 1941.

The first exploratory well drilled by the Company's Venezuelan subsidiary on its 25,800 acres in the State of Monagas has discovered thick oil bearing sands with indications of prolific production. Additional wells are being started on this block and exploration is progressing on the remainder of the 869,603 acres in Eastern Venezuela.

Additions to domestic oil and gas reserves since the first of 1946 are estimated to have been larger than in any comparable period in the Company's history. The most important of these additions were an extensive Company holdings in or near the Juddkins, South Fullerton, North Embarras, and Block 31 areas of West Texas, the Chocolate Bayou Field on the Texas Gulf Coast, the Rangeley Field in Colorado, and various points in Oklahoma.

MEXICO ENTERS NEW ERA



For the first time since the revolution Mexico will elect a president who is not a general. Leading candidates are Miguel Aleman, pictured above with his wife and daughter Beatriz, and Ezequiel Padilla. Aleman, a Vera Cruz attorney and former governor of that state was head of the cabinet under President Avila Camacho and is the overwhelming favorite to be elected July 7.

His program calls for greatly expanded irrigation to open up millions of acres to farming, introduction of woman suffrage, improved housing conditions, improvement in the standard of living, a program of education far in advance of anything previously known in Mexico, and a road and railroad system which will make new markets available to the farmers and to the artisans in rural areas.

Aleman is the son of a revolutionary general who was killed in action. He is the candidate of the Institutional Revolutionary Party, Mexico's only political party. Padilla is an independent candidate.

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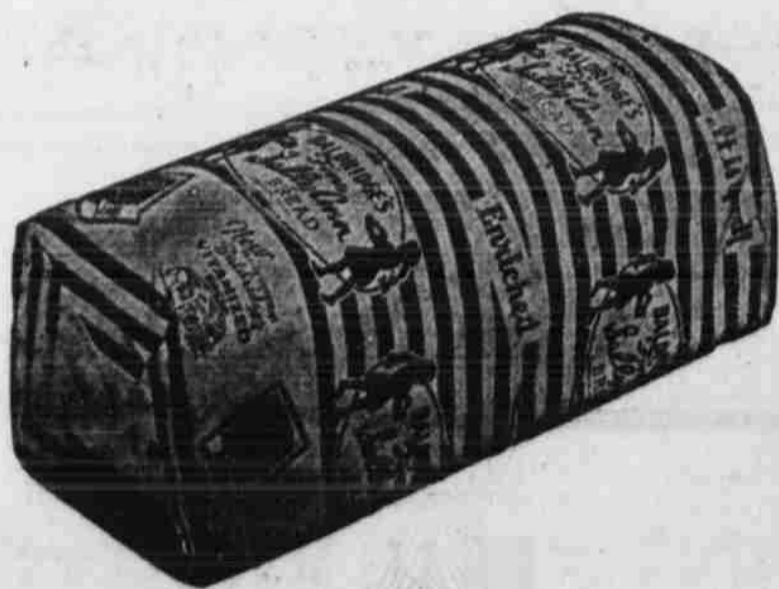
