

# PUBLIC OPINION SOUGHT ON PLAN TO FINANCE CITY SANITATION PROGRAM

## City Authorizes Taxi Cab Ordinance

Operators Must Secure License; Carry Insurance License Will Be Revoked For Carrying Liquor

At a meeting of the City Commission Monday night at the office of the City Secretary an ordinance was authorized, which the City Attorney is now drawing up for publication regulating the operation of taxis.

According to W. G. Street, City Secretary, the ordinance will require taxi cab operators secure a license. The City will collect \$100 a year for each car that is operated as a public conveyance, and at the end of the year, the amount will be adjusted according to the law in effect.

The ordinance will also require the owner or operator of a taxi to carry public liability insurance covering his passengers and the general public. It also will require the operator to transport liquor in a certain way, and if the offender is caught, his license will be immediately revoked.

The matter of the federal loan for paving project was also taken up at the meeting. The Federal Government loaned the City \$6803 to the paving program, and since the law is now under way, this amount is being used by the City Commission to authorize the payment of same.

The Commission also authorized the purchase of a new street maintainer for the new street main-tenance, which was received about two weeks ago. This machine cost the City \$238.00.

The old street maintainer will be used for the leveling and keeping the dirt streets of the city.

## Explosion Sunday Fatal To Mrs. J. R. Dean of Sudan

Mrs. John Robert Dean, 54, sustained serious burns and injury early Sunday morning at her home at Sudan, as the result of a gas explosion, which occurred when she attempted to light the floor furnace. It was reported that an accumulation of gas under the floor had caused the explosion.

She was brought to the Payne-Shotwell Hospital immediately, where attendants report she was suffering from third degree burns on her face, arms and legs.

Her husband was in another room and was thrown to the ceiling as the house was rocked by the explosion, but was not injured.

Mrs. Dean passed away about 1

a. m. Tuesday. Her death was believed due to internal injuries.

It is reported that the explosion work in Sudan, where she lived 24 was so terrific it was heard all over Sudan.

The Dean home is said to be almost completely wrecked. The roof caved in, and a portion of the walls were blown off.

Mrs. Dean was the daughter of the late Katherine Hill McCarter, noted Kansas author, and the late Dr. McCarter, physician of Topeka, Kansas.

Mrs. Dean was a member of the Sudan high school faculty at the time of her death.

## State Health Department Official Inspects City

A representative of the State Department of Health arrived here Tuesday in response to a call sent out by the Sanitation Committee of the Chamber of Commerce. Purpose of his visit was to inspect the city and recommend measures to improve sanitation in Littlefield.

The representative, Ralph Mitchell, conferred with Dr. C. E. Payne, chairman of the Sanitation Committee, Secretary Jim Roberts, C. of C. president, Jack Christian, and representatives of the local newspapers.

Dr. Payne explained the proposed program and outlined the needs which have been discussed by medical and lay members of the chamber of commerce committee.

## Last Rites Held For A. L. Frerich

Funeral services for Albert Leo Frerich, 54, of Pep Community, who passed away at his home Saturday night, at 10 o'clock, were conducted Monday morning at nine o'clock at St. Phillip's church, Pep. ## Four Point Program

The committee recommends a permanent garbage collecting agency under the supervision of the city. This would include a daily trash pickup in the downtown district, twice weekly garbage collection in the residential areas, regular sweeping of city streets, and a no-overnight-parking rule.

In order to finance this program, the Sanitation Committee asks that one dollar a month be added to residence water meters, a two-dollar charge would be made in the business district. This additional charge, according to the committee, would guarantee homes and business houses adequate garbage collection service and go far toward reducing the health hazards which attend haphazard garbage disposal.

## Survey Planned

In order to get the opinion of Littlefieldans on the sanitation program proposal, the C. of C. will send questionnaires to every water user in the city. Recipients are asked to vote Yes or No and return the card, which is post paid.

## Rapid Growth To Blame

Mr. Mitchell said that the rapid expansion of Littlefield had probably contributed to the problem of sanitation. In such instances many unsanitary conditions can develop.

He agreed that there was a pressing need here for a full time sanitation program.

The system proposed by the Chamber of Commerce has been tried and found successful by many cities of the size of Littlefield.

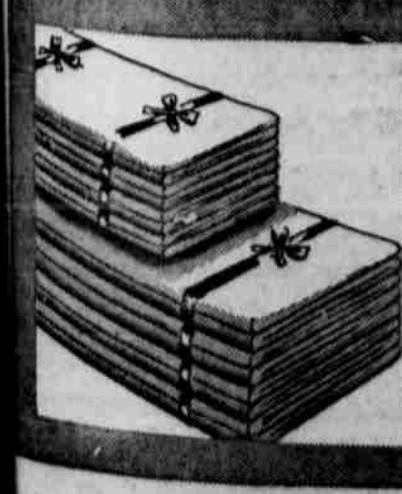

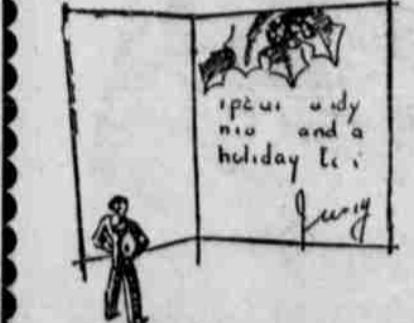

TEXAS 4-H State winners in the 1947 Better Methods Electric, Field Crops, Poultry and Dress Revue awards programs, who will each receive a trip to the 26th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov. 30-Dec. 4, and brief outlines of their records follow:



Alvin Davis

Alvin Davis, 20, of Post, won highest rating in the 1947 state 4-H Field Crops activity, in which International Harvester provides the awards. During seven years of club work, he produced 187 acres of cotton and 136 acres of grain sorghum, with estimated incomes of \$8,700 and \$5,207 respectively, which brought his total 4-H income to \$16,190.00. Alvin reports cotton yield of 5% and 10% above average with Half and Half and Acola, and 15% above average with Western Prolific. He has increasingly adopted approved methods including poisoning of insects and use of certified seed properly suited to the locality. Alvin has been president of the Post High, Texas A. & M., and District 2 4-H Clubs, and has done fine work as cotton insect pest reporter.

Joline Dyer, 16, of Houston, received the Chicago trip award provided by the Simplicity Pattern Co. for making and modeling the top rating outfit in the State 1947 4-H Dress Revue. Her winning outfit is a festa wine wool suit. The skirt has a full length tuck down the front and a kick pleat in the back. The cardigan jacket has a scalloped detailed front with set-in pockets. Joline knitted a white wool sweater to wear with her suit, made a black kid bag and trimmed a black felt hat with white and wine-colored ostrich feathers. The total cost of her costume was \$27.83. State winners who participate in the National 4-H Dress Re-

vue Presentation at the Chicago Club Congress will each receive a \$25.00 U. S. Savings Bond.

Gayle West, 17, of Memphis, received the state award of a Chicago trip provided by Westinghouse Educational Foundation for outstanding achievements in the 1947 4-H Better Methods activity. Gayle has been a 4-H'er for six years. Among his work simplification accomplishments on the farm and in the home are using electricity in place of the farm tractor to grind feed, wiring the poultry house and shop, and fencing pastures with electric fences. Gayle has also made a water warmer for chickens and dairy cows, installed an electric water pump, rewired a sewing machine and made a two-way telephone between the house and the chicken house. His work has increased farm production, saved money and energy and removed drudgery on the farm and in the home.

Lola Mills, 16, of Crowley, wins the Chicago trip award provided by Swift & Co. for her top-ranking 1947 4-H Poultry Achievement record in the State. During seven years in club work she raised 443 chickens, mostly white Leghorns. Lola estimates her income from 4-H Poultry projects at \$2,353.00. She has completed 11 4-H projects, including 4 in Poultry Achievement, and has made many poultry demonstrations. She has served her local club as president, vice president and secretary.

A national organization polled families in the United States on this and other religious habits not long ago. The percentage of families in the country as a whole that say grace before each meal is four out of 10.

Mrs. Eloise T. Johnson, extension family life education specialist for Texas A. & M. College, says that families tend to do in their own homes what they learned as children. One-half of the people who do not offer thanks before meals said that the custom had not been observed in their homes when they were children, while 84 out of 100 Texans who offer thanks reported that this was a family custom as they grew up.

Grace before each meal does more than give spiritual satisfaction, Mrs. Johnson says. The beauty and dignity of the blessing adds as much to the atmosphere of the meal as flowers, colorful linen or attractive chint. The few moments of quiet before eating calms emotions and consequently the digestive system is in much better working order. This is particularly true for small children, but adults also benefit from the short respite from worry, haste or excitement.

It's an old-fashioned custom, perhaps, but it still fits in the modern picture of family life.

I don't exactly know what civilization is, and I don't know who starts them wars, but I notice everybody pitches in, on one side or the other, in Europe every fifteen or twenty years, and if Europe spent one-half as much energy plowin as it does fightin and gettin ready to fight, she wouldn't be nearly so hungry, although understand I ain't advocatin no all-out program of plowin if it involves me in anyway.

Also, what farmin is done in Europe, I understand, is done mostly by peasants who ain't even up to my standards of farmin, and I'm here to tell you the world can't feed itself and farm like I do.

Nope, I believe in helpin Europe out all we can, and right now, without too much arguin in Congress about it, but as folks out here on Bull Lake know we ain't savin civilization, we're just helpin some hungry people out. Two-thirds of Europe ain't civilized yet, and I ain't even sure about you and-me.

VETERAN'S

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—I am a World War I veteran and would like to know if I am eligible for medical care and hospitalization in a Veterans Administration hospital?

A—You are eligible for hospitalization in a VA hospital if you have a service-connected disability. If your disability is non-service-connected, you must state under oath that you are financially unable to pay for private treatment. Then you must wait until a bed is available in a VA hospital.

Q—What veterans have preference to Veterans Administration hospital beds?

A—Veterans suffering from service-connected disabilities and those requiring emergency treatment are given preference to hospital beds.

Q—Am I eligible to benefits under Public Law 16 if I was discharged

for a service-connected disability before I had served 90 days in the armed forces?

A—Yes. For purposes of Public Law 16, service of 90 days in the armed forces is not required.

Q—Can you tell me what the deadline is for a disabled veteran to apply for one of the specially equipped

automobiles?

A—The last date on which applications can be approved is June 1948.

Q—May a veteran receiving ability compensation, receive at same time subsistence allowance under Public Law 346?

A—Yes.
