Also on the program for the Reunion will be the introduction of special guests and a square dancing exhibition which has been presented annually for the affair by Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Ross, Mr. and Mrs. R. V. Armstrong, Mr. and Mrs. Lon Campbell, all of Littlefield, and Mr. and Mrs. Andy Thompson of Dimmitt.

Registration, under the direction of Mrs. Bob Smith, will begin at 2 p. m. Tuesday. The program is scheduled to begin at 3 p. m. A barbecue supper, prepared by Eldridge Foust and his crew, will be served beginning at 5 p. m.

Reunion officials added a new twist to the registration for this year. Different colored badges will be provided as the members register to denote which year the pioneer came to Lamb county.

Lamb County 4-H Club Boys Enter Cotton Yield Contest

Twenty Lamb county 4-H club boys have entered the South Plains 4-H club cotton yield per acre program sponsored by Texas A and M college Extension Service in cooperation with the Plains Co-op Mill, according to Lennie Cole, assistant county agent.

Cole said the contest, which is open to any regularly enrolled 4-H club member between the ages of 9 and 21 years of age, is to promote greater yields per acre of lint cotton on farms of the South Plains by improving the fertility and texture of soil and by better cultural practices.

Each club boy has entered five acres of cotton which have been measured, Cole said, and staked off plainly. The crop must be the 4-H member's bonafide crop and he must own at least half share of the crop.

4-H members must turn their record books and story in complete form into Cole by January 25. The highest yield in each section will be submitted by the County Agent's office in Lubbock by February 1. Material to be submitted includes crop record book, gin tickets, and acreage and yield certificates.

Awards will be presented to the six top winners in both the dryland and irrigated land contests. Following are amounts of prizes in each contest, from first through sixth: \$125 and a plague, \$100, \$85, \$75, \$65, and \$50.

It is usually the policy of the county to hold a contest of its own before the district contest, and then the ten county winners are entered in the district contest.

School Board And Commission Decide To File Tax Suit

The Littlefield school board met with the city commission Wednesday night to decide what to do about the tax suit which both had announced they would file against Payne-Shotwell Foundation for ad valorem taxes for the four years since the foundation was formed.

Neither the school board nor the city commission has any authority to forgive anybody's taxes if they are actually owed. No one but the courts can determine whether or not the foundation has been operated in a manner to qualify it for tax exemption.

They all agreed that once a church group started operating the hospital it would be exempt from future ad valorem taxes, but they agreed that there is doubt as to the tax status of the past four years, and they felt that it was in the best interest of everyone concerned to let the suit be filed as soon as possible so that the question could be settled.

The county and state are reported to have agreed to join the suit. Attorneys Wade Potter and James Gowdy, who are handling the suit for the governmental units, were present at the meeting. Afterward they said the suit would be filed as soon as the papers can be drawn up.

Kling was a member of the First Methodist church. Until his illness he had participated actively in the activities of the Lamb county Sheriff's posse and had been an active member of the Pioneer Reunion.

He is survived by his wife and his father, John Kling; one brother, Frank of Hale Center; and three sisters, Mrs. Guy Willis of

Earth Citizens Will Vote Saturday On Sewer And Water Improvements Bonds

Saturday is election day in Earth, when taxpayers will have an opportunity to vote for or against a sewer system and an enlarged water system.

As set up, most of the cost of the combined project will be paid for by revenues collected by the Water and Sewer Departments.

The bond issue is broken up into five propositions and citizens will vote on each separately. One is to refund \$16,500 in old bonds.

Two of the propositions will provide \$70,000 for the construction of a disposal plant and a system of sewer mains. The other two will provide \$30,

000 for the laying of half a mile of six inch waterline, a mile of two inch line, a second well, and a ground storage reservoir with booster pump.

\$66,500 of this (the \$16,500 plus \$50,000 of the sewer bonds) plus \$10,000 of the water bonds) will be in revenue bonds payable out of water and sewer collections only. The other \$40,000 (\$20,000 for each project) will be tax bonds, but city commissioners say they can be repaid out of tax collection at present rates as are asking for no increase in taxes.

Injunction Suit Dismissed After Springlake Trustees Agree To Wait For Decision

The courtroom at Littlefield was packed with people from the Earth and Springlake area Monday morning. They had come to hear the arguments on a plea for an injunction to prevent the Springlake school trustees from obligating any of the funds from the \$400,000 bond issue approved by the voters last spring.

They were disappointed because all that took place was numerous huddles of the five attorneys with District Judge E. A. Bills. After about 45 minutes of such discussions attorney Sam Aldridge, representing one of the groups trying to tie up the funds, read a document signed by all the members of the school board, in which the board agreed not to obligate any of the funds until the final outcome of the appeal now before the commissioner of

Education has been legally determined. This satisfied the three men E. T. Borum, A. D. Taylor and C. T. Parrish, who had filed the suit for an injunction and they asked a "non-suit". Judge Bills ruled nonsuit and dismissed the case.

According to the lawyers at the hearing the board sold the bonds last week, contingent upon the attorney general's approval. The reported interest rates averaged something over three percent, so the interest cost to the district will be something over \$12,000 per year. By placing the money on time deposit until the litigation is completed, the district may be able to recover more than half of this interest cost. No one knows how long the matter will be tied up by the commissioner of education and by probable appeals from his decision, but most observers Monday were guessing that no building would be commenced before next spring's school board election, when the voters may have an opportunity to express a preference one way or the other.

Foreign Visitors Tour Farms In Lamb County

A group of 5 visitors representing 1 countries toured Lamb county Wednesday studying methods of growing irrigated crops in the United States under the government's Point Four program. The men, who visited farms throughout the county, were from Yugoslavia, Thailand, Italy, Turkey, Greece, Uruguay, Iran, China (Formosa), the Philippines, Brazil, Costa Rica and Egypt. Dr. B. K. Fuhrman of Utah was director of the tour.

They were accompanied on the tour of Lamb county by County Agricultural Agent Dave Eaton, James Abbott of the Soil Conservation Service, Littlefield Chamber of Commerce manager Jesse Everett, County Judge Robert Kirk and Douglas Poe, one of the publishers of the Littlefield Press and the Earth newspaper. Wednesday morning the group

## EDITORIAL

### Analysis of Finances by States Shows Texans in Fine Position

An analysis of state finances by Congressional Quarterly shows Texas in one of the best financial conditions of any state in the nation. The analysis, for the fiscal year of 1953, revealed that the 48 states in 1953 collected more revenue, made larger expenditures and increased their holdings, but wound up further in debt than at the end of the previous year. In the columns of financial statistics published by Congressional Quarterly, Texas stands out as a model of financial stability.

Although Texas is the sixth state in the nation in population it is 21st in the amount of its outstanding debt, which at the close of fiscal 1953 was \$92,993,000. This would make the per capita debt of Texans, based on the 1950 census, about \$12. It would be lower if the estimated 1953 population of the state were used in the computation. Few, if any, other states can equal this excellent financial record.

To top off the low per capita debt, Texas has the sixth largest amount of cash and security holdings of all states. It has \$976,288,000 in cash and securities at the close of fiscal 1953. One of the most significant showings for Texas in the analysis was that this state increased its spending in 1953 only 1.4 per cent, an accomplishment bettered only by Nevada. The national average of increased spending was 6.4 per cent. The analysis showed that in fiscal 1953 Texas collected \$730,074,000 and spent only \$619,080,000. Some of the surplus indicated in these figures is, of course, in permanent funds which can be expended only for specific purposes and are not available for general improvements.

What does all of this mean to the ordinary taxpayer? It means that he is getting good government for less money. It means that his share of the taxes to operate the state government is less than in most states. For example, 33 other states collected more general revenue taxes from their citizens than did Texas. The per capita general revenue in this state was \$88.28. By comparison, in California, another fast-growing state, the per capita general revenue was \$135.45.

### Keeling Heads Emergency Polio Drive In County

The Emergency March of Dimes campaign got underway Monday in Lamb county under the direction of Ray Keeling, county chairman.

Keeling said, "The reason for the drive is the National Foundation and 96 percent of all county chapters will be broke by Sept. 15 unless money is raised. The Lamb county chapter has what seems like ample funds at present but in case we have many new cases the funds will be depleted before the annual drive in January.

"For example, in the new case at Spade, the hospital bill for the first month amounted to \$547. Naturally, it takes several months on the average before patients are released for home treatments. When they are crippled, braces and equipment leased for home, if the patient is must be bought and the patient must continue to take treatment, sometimes for years.

"Wonderful progress has been made in research on the new vaccine gamma globulin. Gamma Globulin has been used in Canyon during the past month due to the fact it was considered an epidemic area. It has been used in

the schools in Houston with wonderful success."

"Unless money is raised," Keeling added, "research and outpatient therapy will have to cease, when it seems that we're so near the goal of poliomyelitis control."

Keeling and Littlefield chairman Homer Garrison recently attended a meeting of chairmen from several counties at Lubbock where they heard Jim Edington, director of fund raising for Region 5 from New York city.

Other community chairmen are Mrs. E. C. Hudson for Earth, Mrs. F. M. Smith for Sudan and Pink Lawson for Olton.

The drive started Monday and will last through August 31.

A national total of 1,056 cases of poliomyelitis was reported by the U. S. Public Health Service during the week ended July 17, 1954.

Texas, California, Florida, Ohio and Michigan account for 3-279 cases, or more than 50 per cent of the total for the United States since the start of 1954.

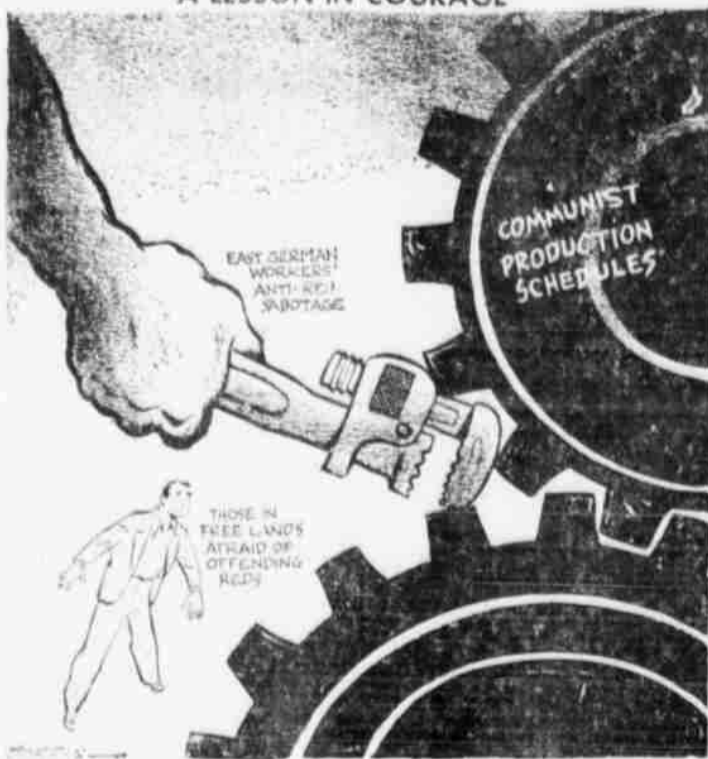
This year to July 17, 1954—Texas had 1,115 cases of polio compared with 743 at this same time last year.

### ASC Election Ballots Mailed Out, Must Be In By Monday

Ballots for the election of Community Committeemen in Lamb county communities were mailed out by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office in Amherst last Friday. The new election procedure is designed to make the selection of ASC committeemen more democratic, and was put into effect by the board of five farm leaders after being worked by the Secretary of Agriculture Benson.

The groups, consisting of Jack Yarbrough, W. L. Spencer, James D. Abbott, Truman Jones and Dave Eaton, appointed three man community election boards for each of eight communities and set the election date Monday, August 23.

The community boards served as a nominating committee for the community committee candidates, naming ten farmers as candidates for the three committee positions.

The ballots mailed out for community contain ten names each, and voters are requested to vote for only five. Both husbands and wives are eligible to vote. Voters are to mark their ballots and return them in the envelopes enclosed with the ballots to the Lamb county A.S.C. office. Ballots must be mailed in time to reach the Lamb county A.S.C. office not later than Monday for them to be counted, or they may be taken to the office. The producers in each commu-

ity receiving the largest number of votes will be the Community Committeemen for the community for the 1955 ACP Program year, with the one receiving the largest number of votes as chairman, second highest, vice chairman, etc., down to second alternate. The producer receiving the largest number of votes will also be delegate to the county convention with the next highest as alternate delegate.

### Lamb County May Make \$2 Million Cotton Crop

Lamb county has a possibility of making close to 150,000 bales of cotton, provided more rains are received and provided we have a normal or late fall, County Agricultural Agent Dave Eaton said this week.

Eaton said 146,000 acres of irrigated land are planted in cotton and 47,000 acres of dry land, giving a total of 193,000 acres

seeded and standing. The allotment for the county is 196,500 acres.

Eaton said, "On the irrigated land we can count on about 4.5 of a bale average per acre. On dryland we can count on an average over the county of 1.5 of a bale per acre."

This will mean an estimated minimum of 116,800 bales of cotton from irrigated land and 9,400 bales of cotton from dryland, total minimum bales being 126,200. With favorable conditions the next two weeks, the crop could run another 25,000 bales. Eaton said any cotton blooming after Sept. 1 doesn't have a chance to make an open boll. He added that where this cotton is hand harvested it will make no difference, but machine harvesting on younger cotton tends to lower the grade of the whole cotton. Cotton blooming later than around Sept. 1 also stands a chance of being caught by an early freeze. The annual freeze date is established at Nov. 4. Eaton said, "At an average of \$130 a bale, the county's cotton production value might be estimated at \$1,950,000. In addition 60,000 tons of seed can be expected, worth about \$300,000. These estimates, of course, are based on conditions as of now and normal weather."

Lamb county ginnings for 1953 were 186, 615 bales.

Member of the Lubbock Cotton Exchange estimated this week that the twenty counties in the South Plains will produce 1,239,000 bales valued at \$193,036,000. This is 129,000 bales and \$10 million less than last year. This is 15 percent lower than an estimate made early in July before drought.

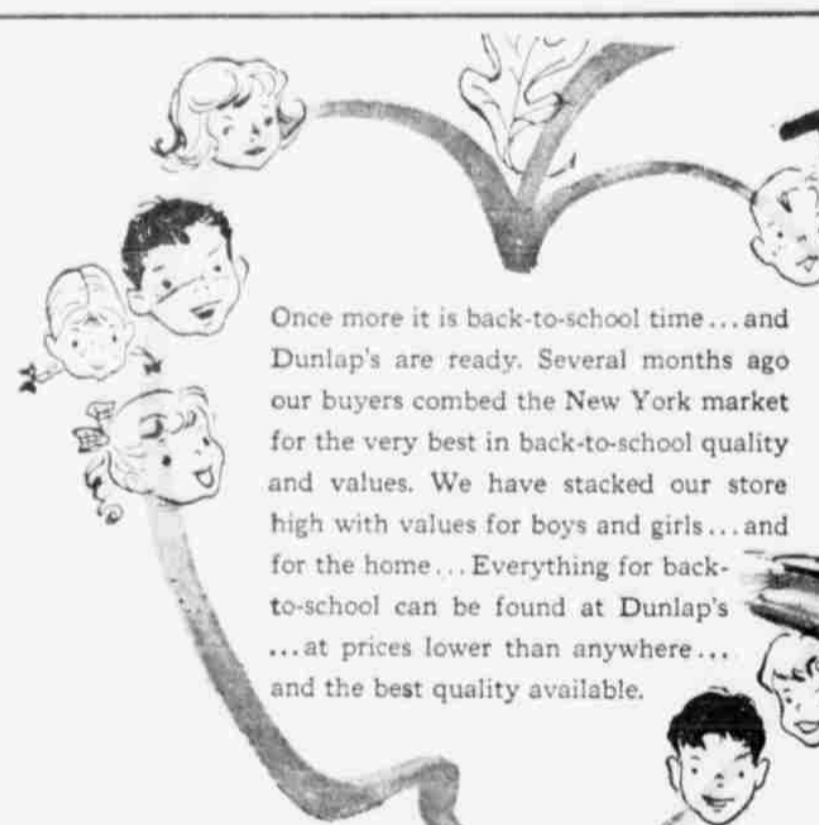

**Growing by Giving**

Lesson for August 22, 1954

A GREAT deal of "giving" is not giving at all. When two relatives give each other Christmas presents, it is more rightly called an exchange than giving. When the Red Cross or other community drives come along and the household or turns in his few dollars just so he will be counted, just to keep from being thought a tight-wad, that is not giving, it is a form of tax. When some higher court (say a Presbytery) or a Board or a Bishop lays upon a congregation an assessment, or in some church campaign for funds a certain amount is "allotted" to a congregation or an individual member, what still is not giving, but more like a tax. You can rightly call it "giving" only when it is freely done, out of sheer good-will, without desire of return.



**Dr. Foreman**  
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**Investing Personality**  
 When a church invites you to give to one of the causes it supports, it is doing a great deal more, something quite different, than just asking you to shell out some cash. You are being invited to share and invest your personality, no less. There is a hymn which says, "If you cannot cross the ocean and the heathen lands explore, you may find the heathen wearers, you may find them at your door." Well, you cannot cross the ocean, perhaps. You may be much too old to learn Korean or Portuguese. But your money can cross for you. Your money, given to "missions," represents your own work, your own energy and Christian-power, put into portable form. In that portable form it becomes part (for instance) of the salary of a young man and his wife who are missionaries in Korea or some other country. They may be evangelistic missionaries, preaching sermons you could never preach. They may be medical missionaries, performing operations you could never do. Whatever they are, they are where they are, doing what they do, because of the gifts you and others have given through the church. Your personality, without those gifts, would be tied down to your little Main Street; your personality through these gifts goes out to the far corners of the world.

**Adding to Yourself**  
 In true giving, you not only invest your personality but your personality itself grows. Paul in writing to the Corinthian Christians whom he knew so well, gives them a high rating for their faith, for their ability to express their faith in words, for knowledge, enthusiasm and love for him. Now you would think that persons who had all these good qualities so that even an apostle, not too easily pleased, was delighted with them, would need no further improvement, they were good enough. But Paul thinks of one thing more. "Could you not add generosity to your virtues?" he asks. (Philippians translation.) The minute you read that you can see the point. A person without generosity is not so big a person as the same person with generosity added. Look after a man's body has ceased to grow, his soul can grow by his increase in the "grace of giving."

**The Stingy Are Stunted**  
 On the other hand, the stingy are stunted. They are stunted because their eyesight is poor—the eyesight of their mind, that is. All they can see is themselves, maybe their families. But they cannot see the needs of other people at all; on the contrary they never see people as they are, but only as sources of income for themselves. They are stunted because they tend to shrink more and more into themselves. Stinginess if left alone will cover up a man's soul as with a thick layer of cobwebs till the soul can scarcely breathe. The stingy man ends by being stingy even with himself. He becomes a miser. Money comes to be the only thing in the world for him. He began by not feeling the needs of others, he ends by not feeling even his own. He will go without much that he needs because, even spending money (to say nothing of giving) hurts him to the bone. He is stunted because he finally loses resemblance to a regular human being and becomes no more than a slightly animated piggy-bank. You can put money into him but you can't shake it out. You would hardly guess that this poor shriveled soul had once been made in the image of God.

1/2 cup Fat Evaporated Milk  
 1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
 1/2 cup cold water  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1/4 teaspoon salt

6oz. can frozen orange juice concentrate  
 8 vanilla sandwich cookies, broken into 1/2-inch pieces

Put milk into ice cube tray of refrigerator. Chill until ice crystals begin to form around edges. Soften gelatin in 1/4 cup water in a 2-quart bowl. Mix sugar, salt and 1/4 cup water in a small saucepan. Heat to boiling, then add to softened gelatin and stir until gelatin dissolves. Mix in orange juice concentrate. Chill until slightly thicker than unbeaten egg whites. Put ice cube milk into a cold 1 1/2-quart bowl and whip with cold rotary beater by hand, or with electric heater at high speed, until stiff. Then fold into chilled orange mixture along with cookies. Chill until firm. Makes 4 servings.

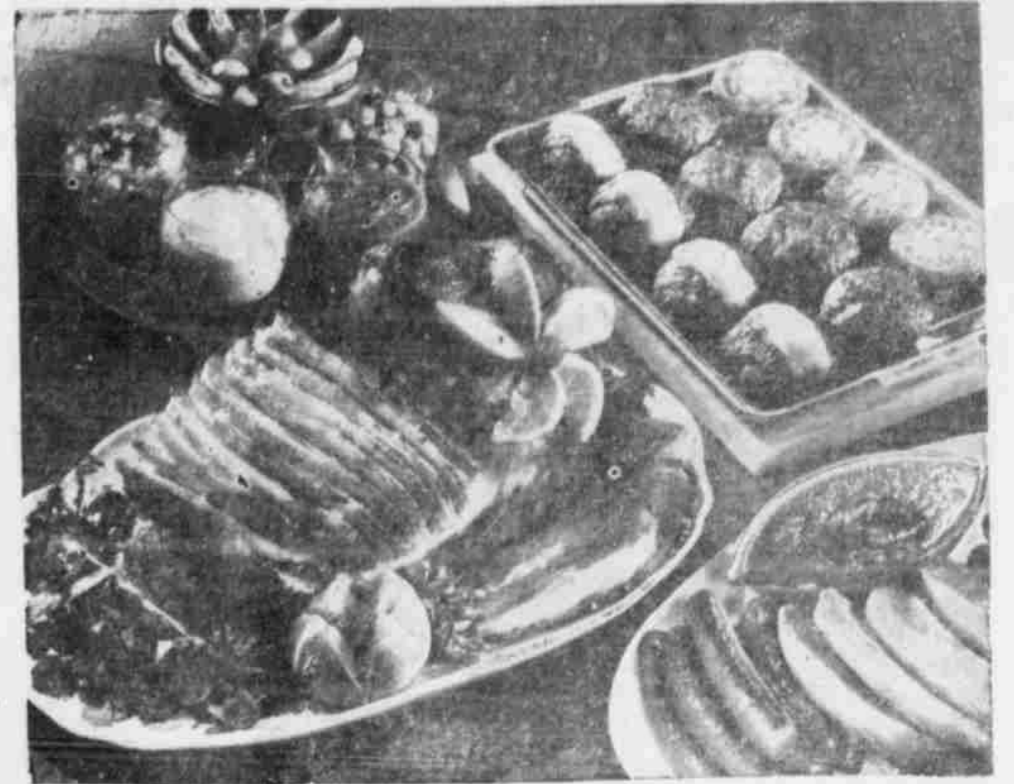

The popularity of these shoe radios, however, is not in doubt. Many women have voiced the opinion that shoe radios are the latest thing in fashion. They are very popular among women of all ages and are a definite addition to a woman's personality.

Advertising notices for the manufacturer are being placed in newspapers. The modern woman, it is said, must be more appealing than her sister in all five of her senses. Her skin must be soft to touch, her perfume pleasant to smell, her clothes pleasant to see, her kisses tasty, and most important of all — the sound of her presence agreeable — and that is where the shoe radio comes in.

To get people used to this novel idea, some of Nuremberg's best looking women are being paid to walk around town with their radios playing. (But not after ten o'clock.) Advertisers claim that within a year the shoe radio will be part of the wardrobe of every up-to-date girl. (Opposing forces, however, claim that the idea will die within six months.)

Women who have worn shoe radios all seem to agree on the following: Walking down the street in time to a lively tune makes one feel like the star of a musical. (Don't appraise a girl by staring with her legs — they look at the shoes first, and usually in amazement, the weight of the device is not excessive; if a wire gets loose and the music suddenly stops, it becomes embarrassing.)

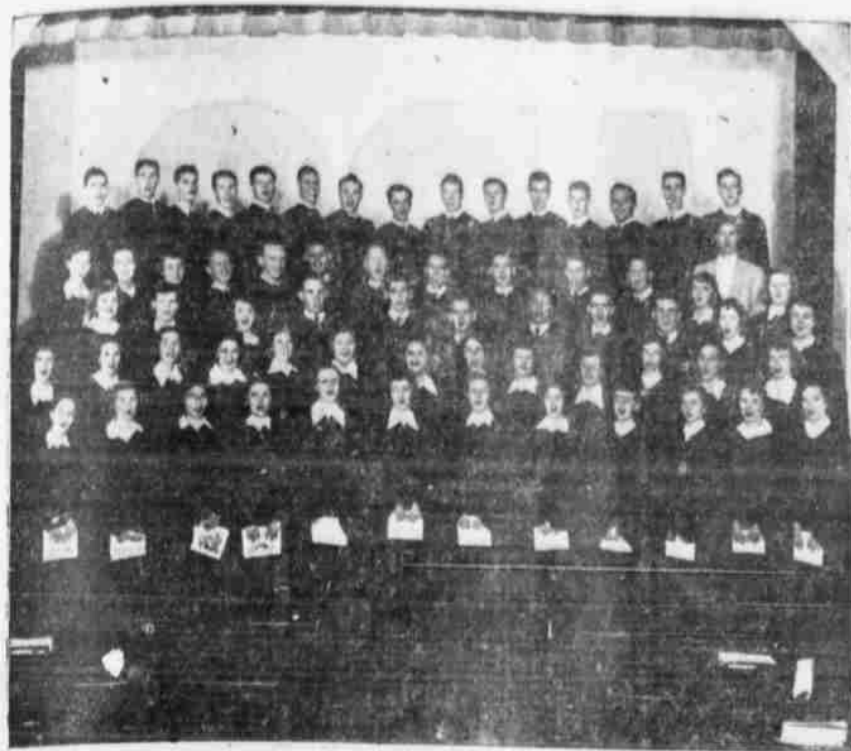

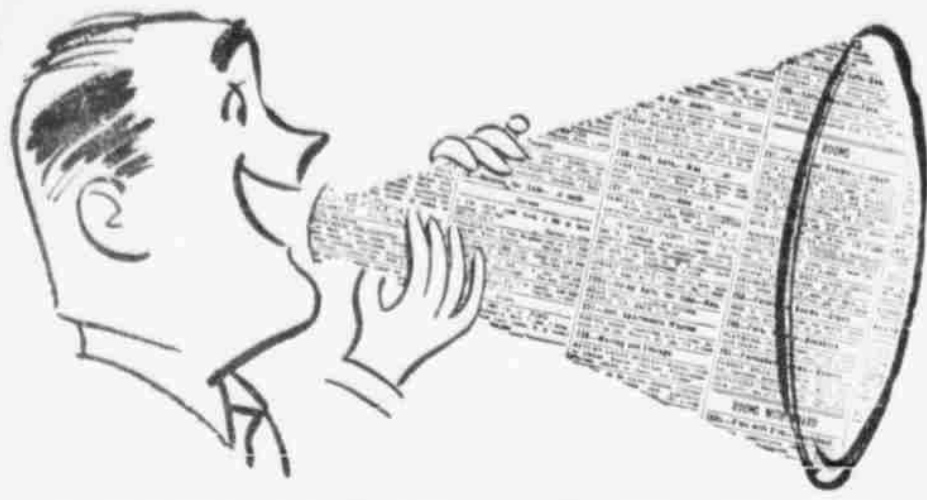

New Testament, the story is told in fact.

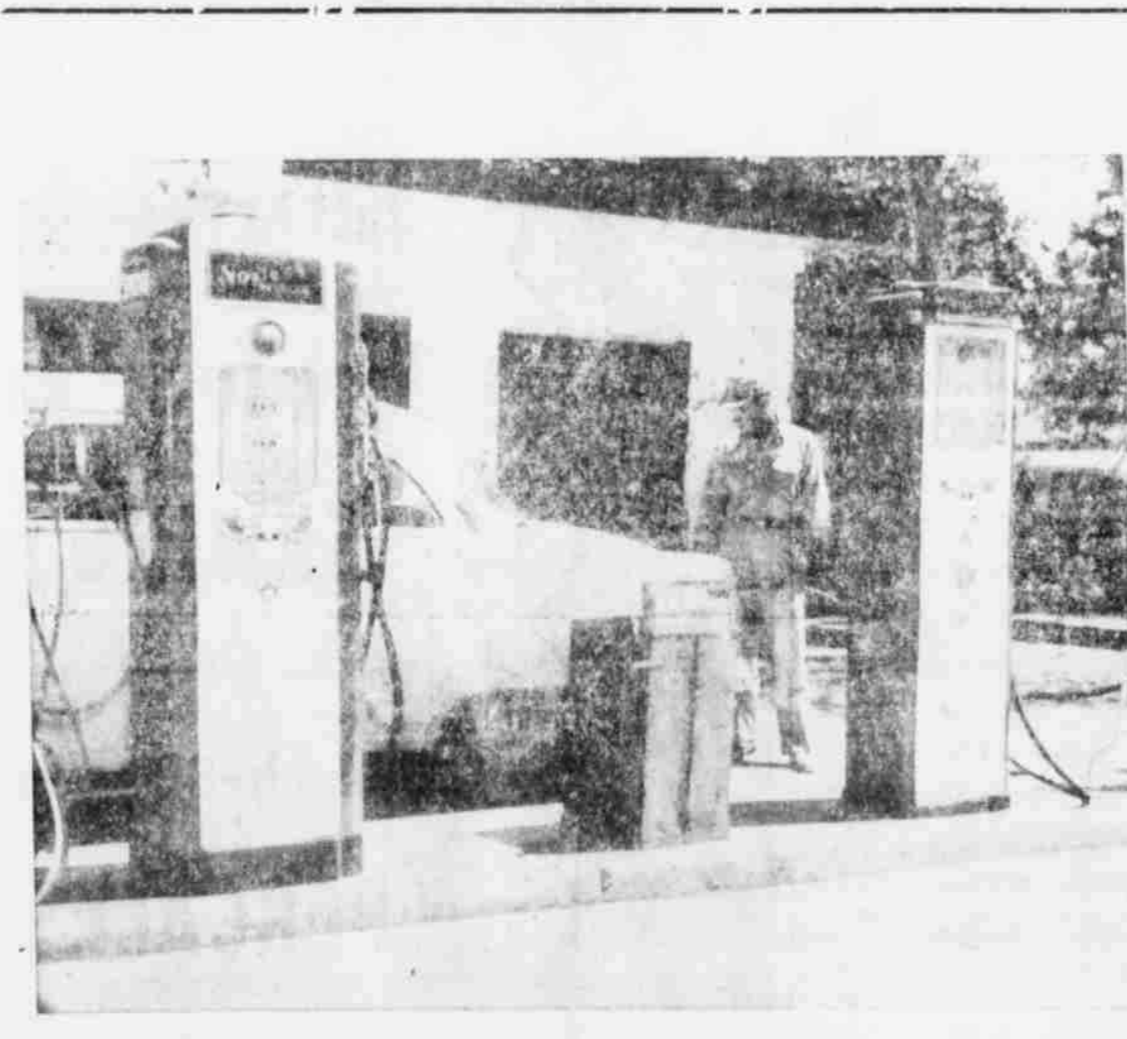
