GOVERNMENT IN BANKING

People who like to sit about and discuss whether the Gold Star Pins government ought to take over banking, might stop a moment and consider to what extent it has already done

Since the banking crisis of March, 1933, great changes have swept across the whole banking world, changes so sweeping that few realize them. The American Bankers' Association recently summed up some of them, and the picture it draws is enlightening.

For instance, we used to have 30,800 banks, back in tions in 1933 at one of the evening 1921. Now we have something more than 14,000, a decrease of around 16,000 (over half).

About 4000 banks have vanished since March, 1933. Several thousand banks owe the R. F. C. more than a half billion dollars on pledge of valuable parts of their assets.

The R. F. C. has taken more than a billion dollars worth of stock in 6400 banks by way of increasing capitalization an award before the short course including many of the strongest banks in the country. Thus group. it has an interest in 44 per cent of all banks today.

A million people and institutions have borrowed from the 5800 loaning associations and corporations started by the government to extend various types of credit.

The R. F. C. also has direct loans to various corporations inspirational programs have been ar totaling around \$700,000,000.

Private agencies have virtually abdicated from the credit field, the survey indicates. From 1922-1931 securitives floated in private capital markets averaged more than five billions a year. During 1931-1933 these issues shrank to \$621,000,000 a year, a decrease of almost 90 per cent. Somebody had to do the financing. So the treasury did it.

Add in the fact of federal deposit insurance, giving another government agency a direct interest in banking. Divorce of the security business from commercial banking puts a new complexion on the whole field, and the in-Thience of the Federal Reserve System is admittedly rising.

So, when you hear a discussion of whether the government ought to go into banking, it's well to realize right at the outset that the government is already banking-right up to the hips.







DALLAS, Tex., Aug. 1.—Fifty-five millions of dollars in loans outstand ing on city property and farmy in Texas, and an interest rate that has declined steadily on such real estate loans since they entered the field, is a contribution to Texas economic life revealed by the recent survey made by the Information Committee of the Texas Life Convention, to have been

This study shows how money that formerly flowed out of Texas, prior to the passage of the Robertson Inwithin the State to aid Texas farmers and home owners.

But real property loans represent only a part of the Texas money that is assembled and kept working within the borders of Texas by the Legal Reserve Life companies, the survey further shows.

These companies also hold \$9,500,-000 of the bonds of municipalities and counties of Texas. This represents rapidly circulating moneyused by these local governmental agencies largely for construction purposes, such as building, roads, street paving and similar projects, with a high percentage of the cost being spent for labor. In addition, the Texas Legal Reserve Companies hold approximately \$1,250,000 of State Relief Bonds—the so-called "bread bonds" — voted by the people to match the Federal funds in feeding the hungry unemployed of



THE WATER SITUATION IN LITTLEFIE

In view of the fact that an election has been called to be held on August 29th, 1934, in which the property tax paying voters of the City of Littlefield are asked to vote on the question as to whether or not the City Commission shall be authorized to issue revenue bonds of the City to the amount of \$39,000, the proceeds of which are to be used in making necessary additions and extensions to the waterworks system, the City Commission is submitting the following information with reference to the water situation, as it actually exsts today.

No doubt every one has read in the local newspapers that the Public Works Administration has approved a loan and grant totalling \$48,-000 for the purpose of making these improvements. Of this sum thirty per cent of the actual cost of labor and material will be a grant, the balance to be a loan, secured by revenue bonds, drawing four per cent interest, and maturing over a period of thirty years from 1935 to 1964. THESE BONDS CANNOT BE PAID FROM TAXATION AND NO TAX LEVY FOR THEIR PAYMENT WILL BE PERMITTED BY THE GOVERNMENT, SHOULD THE CITY COMMISSION DESIRE TO LEVY A TAX, WHICH IS NOT DESIRED, THESE BONDS MUST BE PAID FROM REVENUES FROM THE WATER DEPARTMENT, and we are of the opinion that this can easily be done. At present the fuel cost of pumping water into the stand pipe, ready for sale, amounts to .049 per 1,000 gallons. Our engineer has figured that under the new set up this water can be pumped into the stand pipe for .13 per 1,000 gallons, and these figures have been checked and approved by the en_ gineers for the government. This saving in fuel costs will practically pay the interest and sinking fund on the bonds, without taking into consideration the increase in business that will naturally come when we have the additional water to sell, or the present revenues from the sale of water system as it now exists. Under these conditions we are of the opinion that there will be no trouble in meeting the payments from the revenues from the water system.

It has been reported to us that some citizens of the town do not see the necessity for these improvements, and are of the opinion that our present water supply is sufficient for the needs of the town. It has our present water supply is sufficient for the needs of the town. It has also been reported that the wells are not being pumped all the time and that more water could be produced from the present wells. This information is in error, for the wells are being pumped day and night, seven days in the week, and this has been going on for the past fifteen menths. It is absolutely necessary for the city to authorize this bond issue or to take some other steps to increase the supply of water, or it will be but a matter of a short time until we will be unable to supply the town as it now exists without taking into consideration any future growth or expansion. The City at present owns four small relations. future growth or expansion. The City at present owns four small wells, of which three have been pumped day and night for the past fifteen months. The fourth well has dropped off to such an extent that it is months. The fourth well has dropped off to such an extent that it is too expensive to pump it, as it will produce only seven gallons per minute. The other three wells are now producing a total of about one hundred sixty gallons per minute, and are steadily getting weaker. It has been reported that proper care has not been taken of the wells and they have not been cleaned out in years. This information is also in error, for two of the wells were cleaned out in January and February of this year, with no increase in production after cleaning them. One of the other wells was a new one, having been drilled in May, 1933, and it was not necessary to clean it at that time. The fourth well was in it was not necessary to clean it at that time. The fourth well was in good condition at the time and was producing about all the water that it could be made to produce. Since cleaning the wells in January and February, the demand for water has been so great that it has been impossible to shut down either of the wells long enough to clean them. In addition to the fact that the wells are getting weaker, the demand for water has been steadily increasing for the past two years,

and the attention of the voters is invited to the following figures: Since August 1, 1932 there have been added to the water system twenty six new connections, of which three represent large consumers viz: The Panhandle & Santa Fe Railway Co., the Choctaw Gin and The water pumped for the past two and the South Plains Creamery, one half years is as follows:

A STATEMENT BY THE CITY COMMISSION

January 1 to December 31, 1932, 40,303,064 gallons, an average 3,358,587 gallons per month.

January 1 to December 31, 1933, 53,387,635 gallons, an average

4,448,969 gallons per month. January 1, to July 31, 1934, 33,175,263 gallons, an average of 4,739,327 gallons per month (seven months).

These figures will show that the demand for water has been steadi-

ly increasing, and the consumption for the year 1934 would have been onsiderably larger if we had the water to sell. Instead of soliciting as large a volume of busines as possible, we have been compelled to request water consumers to use as little water as possible.

The present plan of making these improvements is to drill test wells at a distance of from one to two miles north of the present waterworks plant and locate the unlimited supply of water which is known to be there. If water in sufficient quantity is not found at a nearer location, one of the large irrigation wells that have been known to produce as much as 1,000 gallons per minute will be bought. This well will be connected with the present reservoir and stand pipe with an eight inch water main, which is the smallest size that is practical, and is the small-est size that the State Fire Insurance Commission will approve. The est size that the State Fire Insurance Commission will approve. The present PWA loan and grant has been figured with a view to running a line to one of these wells which are already drilled, but should water be found in sufficient quantity at a location nearer then this, the amount of bonds will be correspondingly smaller. In other words, no money will be spent except for the actual cost of the project, and the full \$39,000 is not required, only enough bonds will be issued to cover the cost of the improvements. of the improvements.

The City is at present being penalized in fire insurance rates due to 2,200 feet of six inch water main between the present plant and the stand pipe. It is planned in the new set up to remove this six inch pipe and replace same with eight inch, and to use the six inch at some other place in town where this insurance penalty will not apply. Necessary funds for all labor and material for making this change have been figured in this loan and grant.

There seems to be some lack of understanding about the difference in the amount of the present loan and the loan that was applied for in December, 1932, and which was rejected by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. In order that the voters may get a clearer idea as to the differences in the two projects, attention is directed to the following comparative figures:

No part of any existing county shall be detached from it and attached to another existing county until the proposition for such change shall have been submitted in such a manner as may be provided by law, to a vote of the electors of both counties and shall have received a majority of those voting on the question in each."
