# Dry Weather Hazard To Grass

College Stat on The increased months poses a real threat to cur afternoon in Lubbock, cheapest source of livestock feed.

Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council points out that most grass fires are caused by careleasness and the failure of people to observe fire safety rules. Gras. and other plants along the highways, in parks, woodlands, pas tures and ranges are all enough to burn and motorists are especially urged to make sure that matches, cigarettes, cigars and pipe ashes are dead before they are thrown onto combustible

material. Good pasture is very impor tant to livestock producers. They must depend on grasslands especially with the present prices of livestock-to keep down production costs. A charred range resulting from one careless act could be the final blow that would put a producer or producers out of business.

Ranges and pastures should be protected with fire guards. Hazards that might cause fires should be eliminated. Glass botties may start fires. They act as a magnifying glass and when the sun's rays reach the proper angle, almost any bottle may concen trate the heat from the sun

enough to ignite dry grass. Trash should be burned in a clowed incinerator and no fire should be started that cannot be controlled. Everyone should be on the lookout for fires and report them if found. A small fire car usually be put out before it has a chance to spread but if un checked, it may soon be out of

control. The Council urges community and county groups to organize for the specific purpose of fighting grass fires. They believe the local neighborhood groups should be coordinated on a community and county basis so that if necesary, an effective Lighting force could be gotten together in the shortest possible time in case of a major fire. All equipment should be inventoried so no time would be lost in getting the right

equipment to the fire. The old adage, "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of Make fire prevention your business, urges the Council.





# Social Security Adds New Child Denefits

Monthly insurance payments can now be paid to the handicapped son or daughter of a retired or deceased worker, according to John G. Hutton, District Manager of the Lubbock office of the Social Security Administration.

payments can be made to a dependent child who is incapable of self-support due to a physical or mental disability.

"Payments can bgen! for January of this year to a person of any age who was disabled before he reached age 18." Mr. Hutton says. Such payments are marle on the social security account of a parent of the disabled person. The parent must be an insured worker who has retired

"Before this new provision went into effect, no family insurance could be paid for a child after he became 18 years of age. Now there is no age limit for a disabled child," he added. 



# New Fishing Law To Benefit Fishermon\*

College Station,-A new Sports Fishing License Law which in creases fishing license fees becomes effective September 1. 1957. The additional revenue will enable the Game and Fish Commission to increase its work program by about 25 percent and will generally benefit Texans interested in better fishing.

The new law states, in effect, that it shall be unlawful for any person to fish in any waters of this state without first obtaining a fishing license, according to Ed Cooper, wildlife conservation specialis:

The exceptions to this law, says Cooper, are persons under 17 and over 65 years of age; any person, or member of such persons immediate family when fishing upon property he owns or upon winch he resides: persons fishing with trotlines, throw line, or ordinary pole or line having no reel or other winding device when fishing in the county of his residence. No other fishing license shall be required of a person who holds a commercial license issued in this state, adds the spec-Jalist.

The new law differs from the old one in ways besides charge, points out Cooper. Unlike the old law, the new one is not a visit with their daughter, Mrs. concerned with the type of bait to Gus A. Becker, Jr., and family. be used. Another difference is that the license fee is the same for Texans and out-of-state residents. The new law which requires salt water anglers to be licensed and charges a lower fee to non-residents, paves the way for a reciprocal licensing program with some of our neighboring state, concludes Cooper.


