300 local and area re-welcomed candidate for John Connally when he Littlefield Tuesday were wearing "John

Connally for Governor" pins and a huge "Welcome John Connally" banner was displayed across the front of Thornton's Cafeteria. Jerry Kirby, local attorney was in charge of the welcome committee and Pat Boone, Sr. Lamb County Democratic chairman introduced Connally. Connally spoke to the gathering in a very friendly, personal way and was well received as he spoke humorously in the beginning and then centered his talk on a serious note of need for voting support in this area

Additional Changes Made In Zoning Rule

Additional changes were made in the interim zoning ordinance Tuesday night and the date for the public hearing was set. Tuesday's meeting was a joint session of the City Council and the City Planning Commission. The public hearing will be Monday, June 25, at 7:30 p.m. in the Council Meeting Room, however provisions are being made to have the district courtroom available should it be necessary. Changes made by the two bodies were concerned with part eight of the ordinance which deals with certificates of occupancy. It was pointed out by several members attending that the interpretation of this part of the ordinance was causing alarm. It was further stated that the term "occupancy" was not clearly defined in the ordinance, therefore changes would be made in order to clarify the term and the ordinance. Section 8.1 was restated to state, "A change in use shall be made in order to clarify the term and the ordinance." (See Changes on Page 8)

Cotton Insect Dangers Told Young Farmers

"We had an insect-free year last season and I sincerely hope for another one this year," Raymond King, manager of Lubbock Cotton Oil Company, told the Littlefield Young Farmers Association Monday night. King spoke on cotton insects and insecticides. He said, "The key to good insect control is checking every three to five days for insects and then applying a spray when needed." He listed the six insects which give the most trouble in this area as thrips, fleahoppers, aphids, cabbage loopers, cotton leaf worms and boll worms. He continued that leaf worms are easy to kill because they eat the leaves on which poison can be applied and boll worms are also easy to kill when young but are hard to kill when mature. "The early stage of cotton, from three to six weeks of age is when insects do the most damage," King stated. (See Cotton on Page 8)

Local Doctor Charges Medical Aid "Deception"

A Littlefield physician charged today that proponents of medical aid to the aged through the Social Security System are waging "a campaign of deception."

Dr. D. Stafford, MD, told the Lamb, Bailey, Hockley and Cochran Counties Medical Society that "Arguments in favor of compulsory government medicine for our senior citizens revolve around the spurious claim that such a program is a form of insurance guaranteeing medical care as a right."

Dr. Stafford said that backers of this measure - which is now pending in Congress - "are doing the country a great dis-service by circulating this statement. Their aim of course is to foist on the American people a system of nationalized medicine under the innocuous guise of insurance."

"The medical aid proposal, known as the King - Anderson bill, would provide - at public expense - hospital and nursing home care for those 65 and over who are eligible for social security, regardless of their need and regardless of their income or other resources", he said.

"The King - Anderson proposal, like the Social Security System itself, is a tax program and nothing more. It is in no way insurance.

"Medical care for the aged under this proposal would be financed by a gross payroll tax imposed upon active workers and their employers to pay for medical benefits for the elderly - whether they needed or wanted such benefits."

Dr. Stafford said sponsors of the King - Anderson Bill "know that provisions of the bill itself constitute a denial of the argument that wage earners would be building up a fund for their future medical benefits which they would receive as a matter of right."

The physician pointed out that American citizens living abroad would be denied medical benefits under the King - Anderson Bill, even though they may have paid into the program all their working lives before leaving the country.

What would happen to their rights? Dr. Stafford asked. "They wouldn't even be able to recover the money they had paid into the fund. What kind of a 'right' is it that stops at the boundaries of the country?"

"Furthermore, the nation's employers would be compelled to pay half the tax for this program. What would they get as

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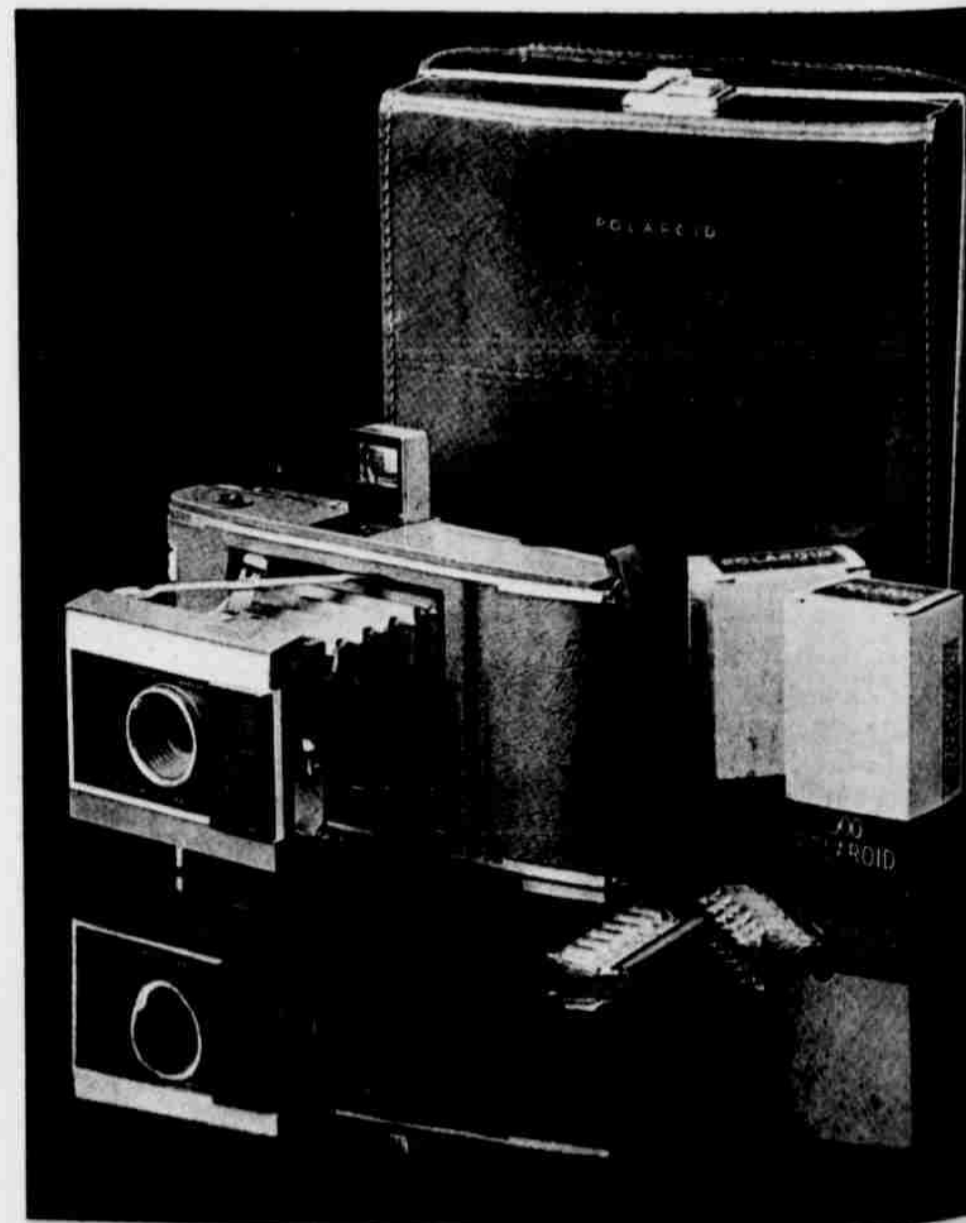

Turman Favors Help for Aged

Speaker James A. Turman, candidate for lieutenant governor said this morning that the State government should shoulder its share of responsibility in giving adequate care for its aged citizens. During the past seven or eight years, the State has made progress in easing the financial burden of our senior citizens through gradual increases in grants," Turman said. The average assistance now has reached \$54.92. This, of course, is insufficient for many of our elderly people with their limited income from other sources and little opportunity for any added revenue from employment. He said he favored the amendment and would support its passage. Turman said the problems of the aged were not to be taken care of or solved with the passage of time. The problem involves a million Texans, three-fourths of whom have passed 65, with the remaining one-fourth within one or two years of reaching 65," he pointed out.

Smith Defends Texas Right To Work Law

Preston Smith, Democratic runoff candidate for Lieutenant Governor, has come out squarely for retaining the Texas "Right to Work" law which provides that Texans can't be forced to join a labor union in order to get or keep a job. At the same time he defends their right to join voluntarily "any organization which has legitimate, worthwhile purposes." This would include a legitimate labor union. Senator Smith already has called attention to the fact that his runoff opponent is the endorsed candidate of organized labor leaders and several other special interest groups. Smith has not sought any such endorsements, he pointed out. In a small campaign folder, under the heading "Senator Preston Smith's Views on Freedom," the businessman-candidate from Lubbock County says: "All Texans have the inherent right to defend their freedom of choice and their dignity as individuals. "And I do not believe any person should be forced to join any group or organization in order to get or hold a job. That is why I will work to retain the Right to Work law. "In the same spirit of freedom, I believe that voluntary membership in any organization which has legitimate worthwhile purposes is an admirable freedom we must protect. "I believe that Texans are completely capable of running their own government, without necessary interference from federal administration. Texas should be free from harmful desires of out-of-state labor leaders, or anyone else who might seek to use our state as a playground for any selfish special interest group. "If I am elected Lieutenant Governor, I will work hard to help begin a program of progress whereby Texas can attract new industry, new tourists and new income that will mean better jobs, and more jobs for all Texans." Senator Smith continues to stress in the runoff, as in the First Primary, his pledge to work for the following things: To simplify the general sales tax. To correct the auto insurance merit plan. To assure economical government without waste. To correct inequities in Texas women's rights. For better schools. To provide safe, efficient highways and farm-to-market roads. For vigorous water and soil conservation programs. To provide hunters and fishermen with an improved game and fish program, and better recreational facilities for our parks and lakes. For small loan regulations. For adequate care of the aged, the needy, and the blind. To maintain and strengthen the Democratic Party leadership in Texas.

Farm Facts

Back in 1947, food sales represented 88% of total grocery sales. They represented only 80% in 1959. At the same time, beer, wine and liquor sales jumped from 2% of the total to 5%. Other non-foods were only 10% of the total in 1947 but had reached 15% by 1959. This is reported by Cleo Fitzsimmons and Sarah L. Manning of Purdue University's Experiment Station in a study made by them in the Indianapolis area in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service. About 18% of the total spent by customers in the stores studied went for non-food items - beverages and gum in addition to tobacco and other inedibles. Of the average of 12 items per shopping basket, 2 were non-food. Soaps, detergents, paper goods, household care items, tobacco products, and health and beauty aids were noted most frequently and in that order in the non-food items purchased. In dollar value tobacco led the list. Non-food buying tended to be higher in suburban stores than in grocery stores in city centers, residential areas, and small towns.

be construed to mean any change from residential to commercial or industrial." In other words, when a change is made from residential to commercial or industrial, a certificate of occupancy is required.

Section 8.2 was changed to read, "Certificates of occupancy, to determine residential, commercial or industrial, shall be applied for coincident with the application for a building permit..." This is no extreme change in the present laws since the purpose of a building is required on the building permits currently being issued.

Section 8.3 was clarified and reads, "No permit for excavation for any building shall be issued before application has been made for a certificate of occupancy state whether the structure is residential, commercial or industrial.

Copies of the ordinance as revised will be available in the City Manager's office early next week and also at the public hearing.

cause the plant is just getting started and any adverse effects by insects will hurt in the long run."

There are approximately 60 days from the date the squares form and 45 days from the blooms until a mature openboll appears.

"The bottom bolls are the most important because they are the hardest to put on and keep," King explained. "They are all mature and open by frost time and if you hand pick they will be the ones you take to the gin. The top crop isn't of much concern because it will not mature due to a lack of time."

He told of several new poisons in the proving stages at present that will be a boon to cotton farming because of constant protection through the first six weeks of growth.

Twenty one members were present at the meeting. The next meeting has been set for June 18 when irrigation practices throughout the year will be discussed.

Medicare Bill Hit By Chamber Group

Over 35 local businessmen attended the chamber's governmental affairs committee breakfast in downtown Littlefield Wednesday morning.

Chairman Byron Douglas officiated at the beginning of the meeting, and then asked chamber manager Gene Garrison to read a group of resolutions to be submitted to the board at its next meeting. Garrison reported in the absence of Houston Hoover.

Garrison explained that although the governmental affairs committee does not take candidates or political stands, they must have the authority to voice their opinions of various legislative actions, and the group approved the list of resolutions.

Basically the resolutions outlined the need of the local businessman receiving a voice in national and state government. Garrison also brought up discussion of the Kennedy administration's forthcoming King - Anderson Medicare bill which would require an increase in social security taxes and would furnish hospital benefits for persons over 65.

Most of the sentiment was in favor of disfavoring such a bill, until local telephone manager Bob Saunders blasted the group

Cortez With 49th On Exercise

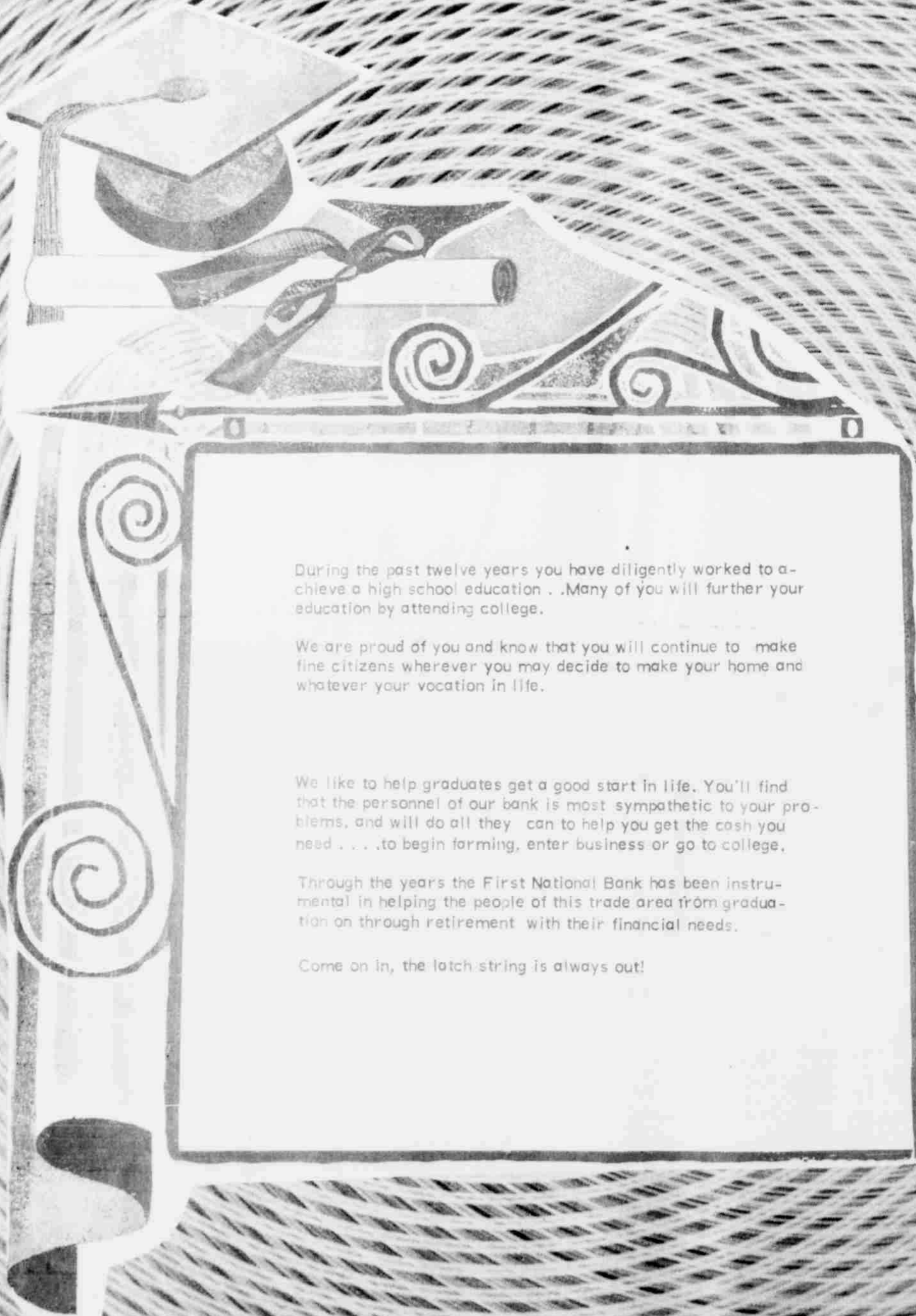
FORT POLK, LA. (AHTNC) -- Army Reserve PFC Pablo F. Cortez, 27, son of Julio L. Cortez, Earth, Tex., is participating with other personnel from the 49th Armored Division in Exercise Iron Dragon in Louisiana. The exercise is scheduled to end May 14.

During Exercise Iron Dragon, the largest field maneuver to be held in the U. S. this year, nearly 20,000 troops will move across 1,300 square miles of Southwestern Louisiana maneuver ground. With blank ammunition for rifles and tanks, artillery simulators and gas grenades, friendly forces will be engaged in battle against an "Aggressor" force under simulated combat conditions.
