The ultimate solution of the farmers' problem, we have been told for years, is the development of new usesfor the products of the soil. The Farm Chemurgic Council has spent much money and time in laboratory research to discover industrial uses for farm crops, and with encourag-

Now the United States Department of Agriculture is starting out on the same line. Four regional laboratories are to be established under a new Bureau of Agricutural Technology and Engineering, headed by Dr. Henry G. Knight, chief of the Bureau of Chemistry.

The purpose is to find new ways of tying agriculture to industry by developing industrial uses for such items as corn, wheat, fruits, vegetables, potatoes, cotton, sweet potatoes, peanuts, tobacco, apples, and
