of brown and tan, dark green and cream, maple and bone, in mottled effect, with which the furniture and equipment in the various rooms blend perfectly.

### Building Air Conditioned

Another special feature of the new building is the air conditioned system installed, which includes two large Delco-Frigidaire heating and cooling units, using double filtered hot air for heating in winter and cool circulating air in summer.

The building was constructed with four large exits leading from the hospital, making the intaking and outgoing of patients easy.

### Parking Space On 3 Sides

Due to the large property on which the building was erected, parking space is available on three sides of the hospital.

Every patient room is on the ground floor and all are outside rooms.

Commodious living quarters for nurses are maintained in the large semi-basement, as well as diet kitchen, dining room and living room.

The operating room and nursery are dust-proofed with glass brick openings.

### Special Lighting System

The operating room, located in the west wing of the building, is equipped with special lighting system, including large operating spot light, which can be adjusted and focused to any field of operation. This room is snow white throughout, with the exception of the blue and light gray tile floor. Adjoining the operating room are the sterilizing room, doctor's scrub room, and delivery room, and across the hall conveniently located is the nursery.

### Install Electric Food Elevator

An electric food elevator is used to elevate the patients' trays from the diet kitchen to the main floor to be easily dispensed by the nurses.

### Family Room Is Convenience

A family room is equipped with spacious divans for the convenience and rest of friends and relatives of the sick. Numerous rest rooms are also available throughout the building.

The common lobby and reception room is located at the south end of the east wing, and it is here that clinical patients register for the doctor of their choice. Around this spacious lobby, connected by halls, are the offices and treatment rooms of the staff doctors.

### Pastel Shades Throughout

Pastel shades of cream and white are carried out throughout the building. All lights are of the indirect type, with silent switches in each patient's room.

The patient's rooms have all built-in wardrobes, and the all steel furniture includes dresser, two chairs and service table, the

color scheme of which corresponds with the tile floor. Three sets of color schemes are featured in the patients' rooms; in some of the rooms maple and bone are featured both in the furniture and tile floor; in others, cannon brown and bone white, while some rooms are equipped with walnut furniture, with corresponding tile floor.

### In Natural Birchwood

Rezo type doors were hung throughout the building which were made in Oregon.

The hospital has been furnished with Simmons all-steel beds equipped with the latest style inner spring mattress.

Individual radio provided for each room when wanted by patient.

### New X-Ray Equipment

New equipment purchased include a new X-ray machine of the very latest type and design. It is shockproof in every respect and any part of the body can be X-rayed or fluoroscoped in any position either standing or reclining. Superficial X-ray treatments can be done as well as radiography.

### Physiotherapy Purchased

New physiotherapy equipment

has also been purchased. This includes an infra red and violet light and diathermy machine, as well as a new machine used in thyroid disease.

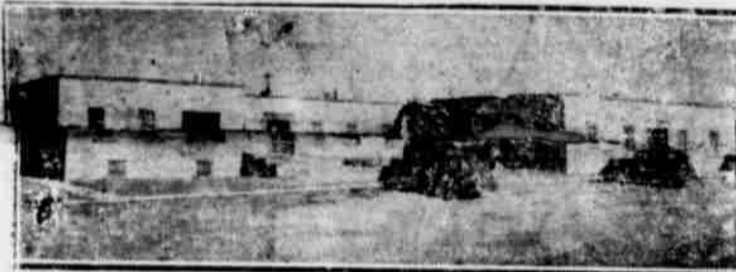

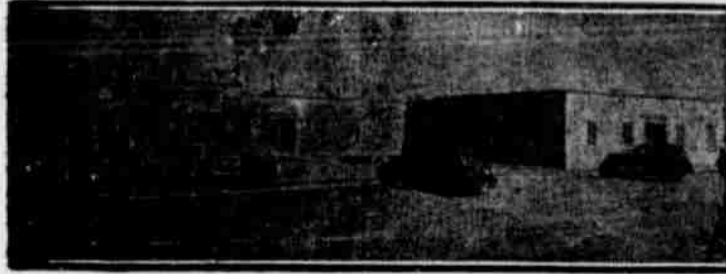

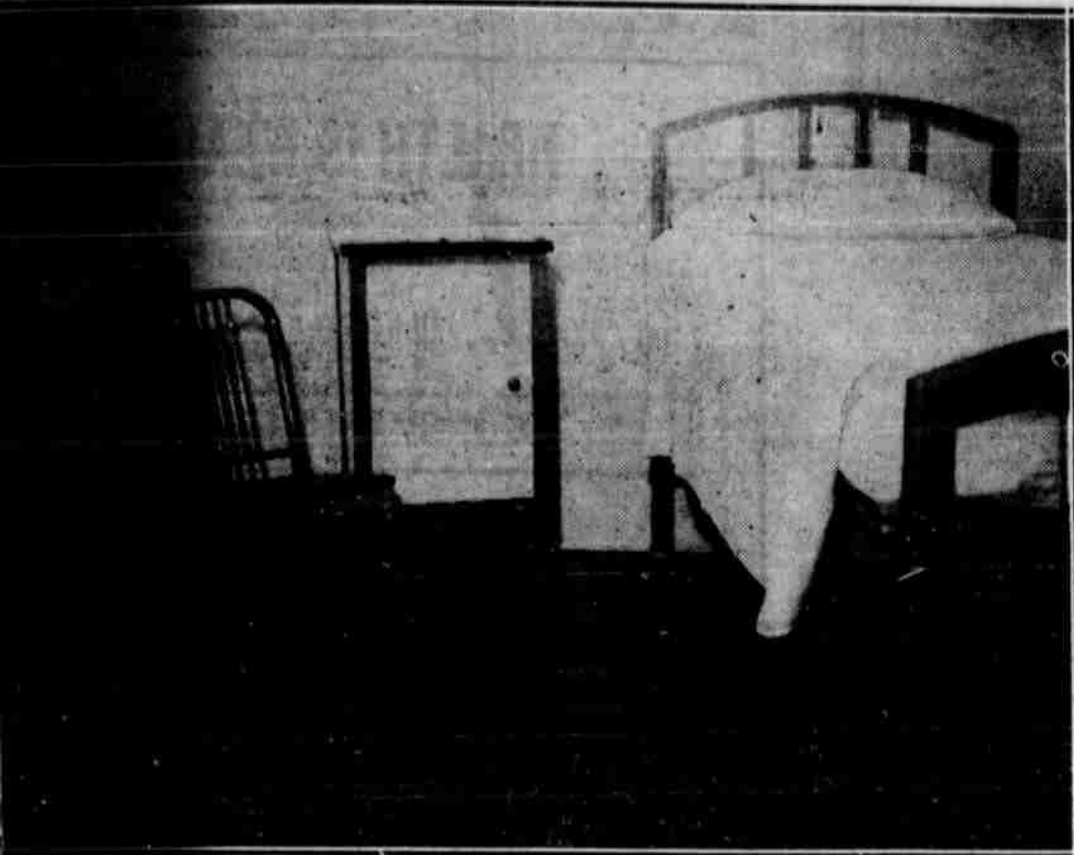

One of the latest systems in the telephone service has been installed at the Littlefield Hospital and Clinic. A two trunk system with 10 lines is now serving the new institution, designated to the public as numbers 301 and 302. The system is a simplified common talking, selective ringing system with 10 lines and 2 trunks providing local intercommunication and central office service from the same telephone without the services of an attendant operator.

The equipment is designed to operate from Central office battery of 22 volts or local dry batteries consisting of 18 1-2 volts. The telephones are standard type with 12 non-locking type push buttons conveniently mounted in a sub-base of the telephone. The telephone has dial opening which is blanked when used with a manual operated Central office. The above system offers convenient, quick service to all doctors' offices, as well as the general office, chart desk, etc.

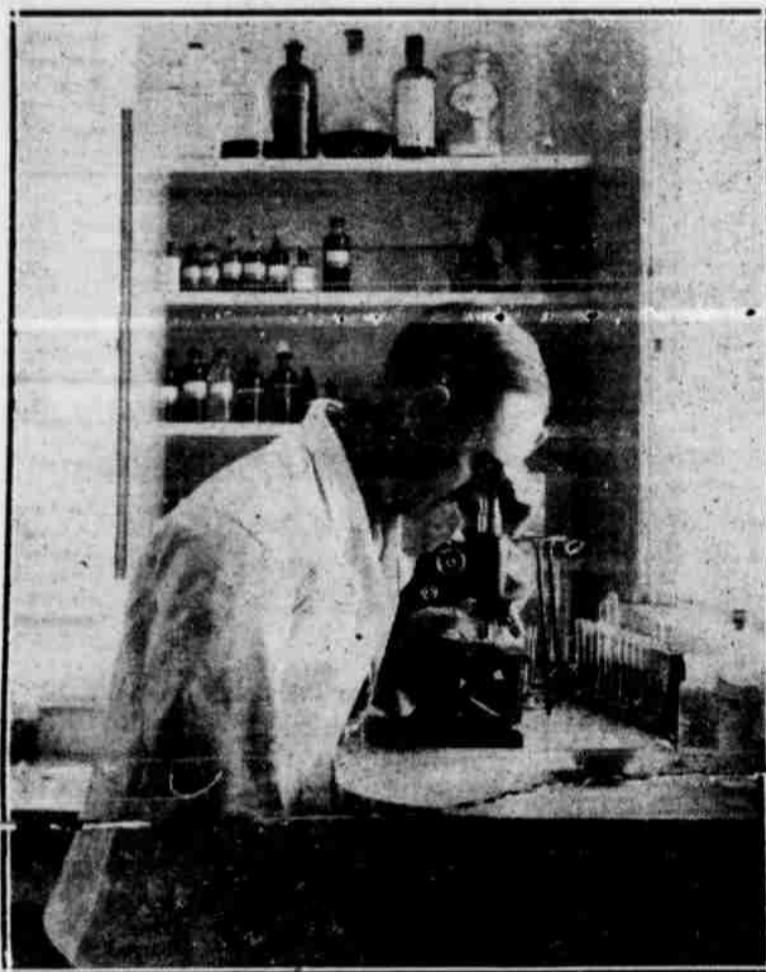
