Range For Growing Pullets

Good range for growing pullets help reduce their feed bill and at the same time permit the poult to take a replacement flock of healthy birds. Pullets on range, says W. J. Moore, poultry specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, can be separated from the older birds on the farm and this is very important from the standpoint of disease control.

When carriers of diseases and parasites are kept segregated from the main flock, they may be affected. The range is one that provides plenty of good green grass and shade for the birds. Chickens don't like to be out in the hot sun any more than necessary. If shade is not available, other types of shelter should be provided. The shelter, says Moore, is the most important to build in addition to the range. They provide safe housing for the developing pullets on the range. They should receive a good growth of water, oyster shell and plenty of good water. The care given the pullets on the range may determine whether or not they develop into profitable layers. To show the importance of water, Moore points out

IT'S THE LAW in Texas
A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas

There are only two ways to get a thing done. You do it yourself or get someone to do it for you. When you get someone to act for you he is your agent. This right to represent you may be given orally or in writing.

It is best to have the agency relationship carefully defined and written down. When written, the document often takes the form of a "Power of Attorney."

Any person legally competent to act for himself may give to another power of attorney to act in his place. With the growth and expansion of business it is difficult for one man to handle the variety of complex tasks that come his way. It is more expedient to delegate power and responsibility to others, thus giving such persons authority to make binding contracts in his name.

The person who delegates the power is called the principal, and the person to whom the authority is given is the agent. Third persons can deal with a properly authorized agent with the knowledge that the law will enforce the obligation against the principal.

The law sets up two broad classes of agents—special and general. Most agents are special agents—

that is, they have specific authority to do only certain things. When a person is named in a power of attorney as a general agent, he is authorized to act in all proper cases as if the principal were acting in person.

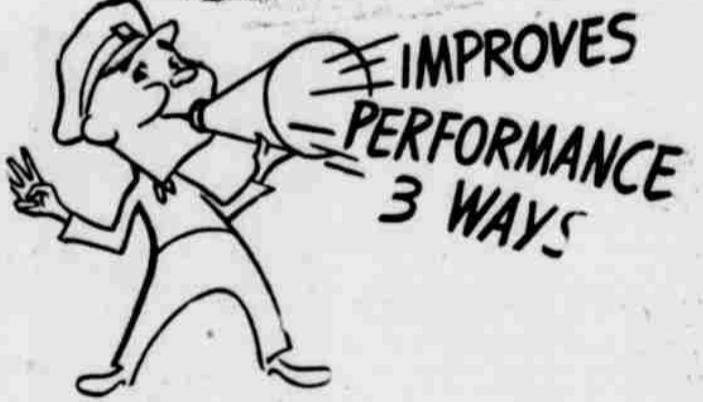
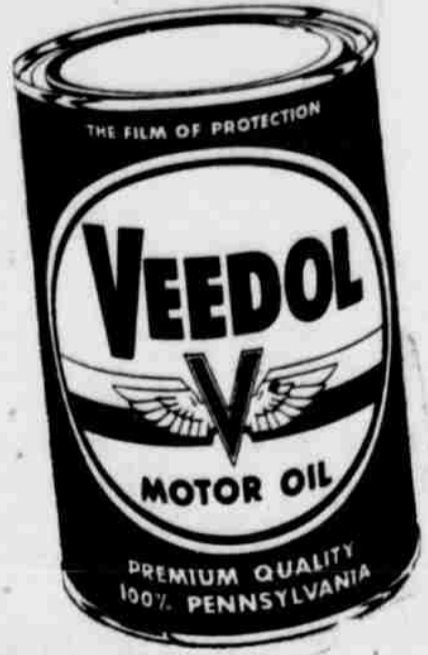
For example: A citizen-soldier leaves home to go to war. He needs someone to represent him while he is away. He names such a person—usually a parent, wife, or trusted friend—in a power of attorney, giving this person specific powers or a general power to act in his behalf. If the soldier wants to sell his home while overseas, he can give such agent the power to sell the home, and may limit the agent's authority to this one matter. When this agent begins negotiations for the sale, the prospective buyer can, by an examination of the power of attorney, know exactly what authority the agent has.

If the person is given a general power of attorney, he can transact all of the serviceman's business as though the soldier were home to act for himself. Suppose the soldier owns a store and want someone to run it while he is away. He may authorize this person through a power of attorney to buy, sell, extend credit, collect bills, deposit and withdraw money from the bank, and, in short, do business on the same basis as the serviceman could if he were present to run the store himself.

YOUR GARDEN: Fussy Biennial Care Pays Off In Beauty

By CYNTHIA LOWRY AP Newsfeatures Writer

There's a third division of the plant family too often neglected by the home gardener who is aware of the advantages and uses of both perennials and annuals.



PANSIES are a beautiful member of biennial family.

The seed-bed should consist of screened earth rather on the lean side. Growing conditions vary so much that the best starting date can be reached only after a little experimentation.

Forethought Needed The trouble with biennials, if trouble it be, is that seed for next year's crop must be sown during the summer months of this year and most of the young plants require considerable attention if the best flowers are to be achieved.

Soil and Sun Requirements Until the young plants are comfortably settled down to their first-season growth, the soil and conditions must be watched carefully. Soil should be moist at all times, but never consistently saturated.

And when fall comes, the plants may be set out in the locations where they are to bloom the next year. Once established, most of these plants require no such elaborate precautions if the gardener isn't fussy about color and quality of bloom.

When freezing weather comes, most of the biennials, require some winter protection—just the kind required by the perennials—leaf or evergreen-branch mulches.

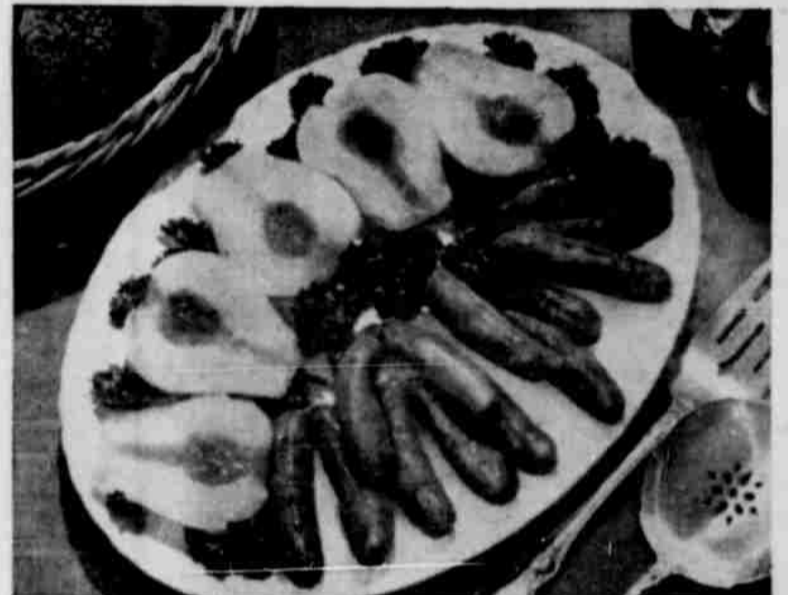

PEAR MERINGUES—With Pear-Orange Sauce

Canned Bartlett pears, now plentiful on market shelves, can pep up meals because they are so versatile. For breakfast, for instance, team them with golden-brown pork sausage. Serve the pears straight from the can or sprinkle them with brown sugar and broil just enough to heat through; put a spoonful of currant jelly in each core cavity for color. Along with hot rolls and coffee, this is a fine main dish to serve to Sunday brunch guests. Start the menu with chilled orange juice and cereal.

Canned pears make a delicious luncheon salad that's no trouble to prepare. Arrange the pear halves on a bed of torn mixed greens. Fill the core cavities of the pears with creamed cottage cheese studded with nuggets of crumbled Roque-

fort; garnish with strips of pimiento. Serve with a creamy French dressing that has enough paprika in it to make it a pretty pink.

For a festive dessert fill individual meringue shells with vanilla, chocolate, or orange ice cream; top with a canned pear half and accompany with the following sauce:

PEAR-ORANGE SAUCE Ingredients: 2 tablespoons cornstarch, 1 No. 2 1/2 can pears, 1 tablespoon grated orange rind, 1/2 cup orange juice. Method: Put cornstarch in a saucepan; drain a little of the syrup from the pears and mix with cornstarch until smooth; stir in remaining pear syrup, orange rind, and orange juice. Cook and stir over moderately low heat until thickened. Chill; serve over meringue shells filled with ice cream and topped with pear halves.

Choosing the Right Toy

Buying toys for children is an all-year-round job. It requires thought as well as money. It means selecting the right toy at the right time to suit the growing needs of children throughout the year.

Fun Giving Value: (1) Must afford amusement either through action, humor, fascination, imitative play or competition. (2) Must be safe for play for pre-school age children by having smooth edges, harmless finishes, appropriate weights; for intermediate ages and above, all toys must be electrically harmless and chemically harmless.

Grasshopper Infestation To Be Light

Forecasts based on surveys and actual egg bed counts indicate that grasshoppers will not be a threat to crops and pastures in Texas this year. In only a few spots were enough eggs found to rate the areas as threatening, says Allen E. Gutter, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The areas are small and are found in the upper northwest Panhandle, in the Trinity bottoms of Ellis and Kaufman counties; in Hill, Falls, Milam, Robertson and Washington counties along the Brazos River. In these areas farmers should watch for the early hatches and if the young hoppers show up in large numbers, they should be controlled before they leave the egg bed areas, says Gutter.

Other counties in these same general areas may expect light infestations and some damage is possible. Serious damage may develop in the fall if the weather is hot and dry.

Gutter advises farmers and ranchmen that control measures, if needed, should be used before the grasshoppers leave the egg beds and scatter. Wiping out this year's hatches will reduce the chances for major outbreaks next year, points out the specialist, and from this standpoint, the use of control measures is justified.

For information on the best insecticides to use, Gutter suggests that farmers contact their local county agents. They can also advise on whether control measures should be used.

Veterans With GI Loans Are Warned

Veterans who are delinquent in payments on their GI home loans are warned to check carefully any offers by strangers to pay delinquent payments if they, the veterans, will "sign on the dotted line."

This warning was sounded today by the Veterans Administration, which has guaranteed home loans for nearly 3,000,000 World War II veterans.

VA said such veterans should check with the holder of the mortgage or with the loan guaranty division of the nearest VA regional office to determine whether or not the offer is legitimate and sound.

In some parts of the country, a revival of the practice sometimes called "milking" or "equity skinning," has occurred, VA reported.

In one form of this racket, the veteran, who is behind in his GI loan payments, is approached by individuals offering to pay the delinquent installments if the veteran will "sign on the dotted line."

The veteran subsequently learns that he has signed a deed and can get his property back only by signing a land sales contract at a much higher price.

When the veteran finds he is unable to meet the frequently excessive terms of the land sales contract, legal action is taken to obtain possession of the veteran's home.

In other instances, a low cost subdivision will be canvassed to learn whether veterans are having trouble meeting their GI loan payments.

If the veterans are having trouble, these individuals offer each veteran a nominal amount for his equity, plus the privilege of purchasing another home in a lower cost area on a land sales contract.

The veteran agrees to give possession in 60 days and "signs on the dotted line," unaware that he is signing a deed. When the 60 days are up, the veteran is advised that no listings are available in the lower cost development. The veteran then is evicted from his home.

A third variation of these practices, is used in states where there is a long mortgage redemption period. A veteran, falling behind in home loan payments, is offered a nominal sum for a quit claim deed to the property with a verbal promise that all back payments will be made up.

The veteran moves out believing that his loan will be brought up to date. Instead, the individual hold-

ing the quit claim deed rents the house without making any attempt to make up back payments.

Most of the money received as rent is profit until foreclosure is final and the veteran, unaware of what has happened, still owes the lender and quite possibly the U.S. Government if VA pays a claim on the loan.

Many variations of these practices are used in different parts of the country, depending on state and local laws. Although these practices may be legal, they are considered unethical by the vast majority of mortgage lenders and real estate brokers.

VA advises veterans they will be protecting their own interests and doing other veterans a service if they report any such propositions to the holder of the mortgage and to the nearest VA regional office.

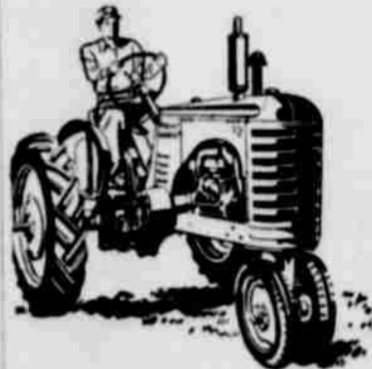

Spade School Bond Election Carries Three To One

Spade's \$32,000 school bond election Saturday, May 10, passed by an overwhelming majority of almost three to one. In favor were 153 voters, while 45 said no. This is one of the heaviest recorded turnouts in the Spade area, and nearly 100 percent, of the voters registering votes, C. O. Head, school superintendent said.

Residents had watched the election with interest, for it was stated that the vote on the school bond would indicate whether or not Spade residents wished to consolidate with the Littlefield schools. They will vote on this issue in both Spade and Littlefield on Saturday, May 24. The bond election was called last week, and the consolidation election had been announced prior to that by Judge Orin Dent, following receipt of petitions from both Spade and Littlefield residents.

There will be a waiting period of 30 days before the issuance of the new school bonds, Head said. If the consolidation is passed, they will not be issued. However, from the great majority given to the bond acceptance, residents in Spade are predicting a turnaround on the consolidation question.

The bonds will be used for general repair of the school, and a vocational agriculture shop building will be constructed before the next school year. This will increase the ag. course from three years to four, Head said.

Preston Lyda, manager of the Anton Producers Co-op Gins has announced they will soon pay to their stock holders cash dividends totaling \$50,000.

The normal summer vacation period doesn't count as a period of interruption for veteran students in colleges and other schools organized on a term, quarter or semester basis. A veteran, for graduate training in time, need not start his ad-
