USE HOME PRODUCTS

Lessons of the war have taught us that the more nearly self-sustaining a nation becomes the more advant ageously it will be situated should war unhappily come again.

The same principle applies in peace times as well, and the more we are able to substitute home products for those usually imported the better off we shall be from an economic stand-

With this principle in mind, the Southwide Cotton Council is urging new and wider uses of cotton, as well as better methods of marketing that staple. It is estimated that the use of cotton bagging alone, instead of imported jute, might ensity absorb from one-half million to a million bales of cotton annually.

The idea of giving preference to home products is applicable to states and local communities as well as to nations. Home producers of both raw and manufactured products should be given every possible encouragement and patronage. Aside from keeping money at home, such a policy would often make possible large savings in transportation charges, give more employment to local labor and enhance local prosperity generally.

FEEDING METHODS REDUCE FLAVORS

Offensive Taste Due to One of Four Causes.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

While milk producers are giving considerable attention to preventing losses due to sour milk, they too carely recognize that other flavors and odors also cause an annual loss probably as great as that from soor milk Milk containing abnormal flavors and odors is rejected by dealers and con-

Abnormal flavors result mainly from four causes, according to C. J. Babsock, of the bureau of dairy industry. United States Department of Agriculture. They may be due to the physical condition of the cow, to highly flavored feeds and weeds, to the absorption of odors by the milk after it is drawn, or to biological changes in

If due to the condition of the cow or to feeds the objectionable flavors and odors will be noticeable just after milking and usually will not increase with time. Those caused by absorption develop only when the atmosphere is permeated with pronounced odors. whereas those due to biologica! changes become more apparent after some time has clapsed.

Feeds and weeds impart flavors and odors to milk mainly through the body of the cow, although feed-tainted barn air may have some effect. The time of feeding, therefore, is an important factor to consider in preventing undesirable flavors in the milk, according to Babcock. In most cases feeds do not flavor the milk except for a few hours, although some feeds, such as cabbage, when consumed in large quantities may still be noticeable in milk drawn 12 hours after feeding. For this reason, he says, highly flavored feeds should be fed immediately after milking-never just before. When fed as short a time as one hour before milking, such feeds as silage made from corn, alfalfa, sweet clover, or soy beans; and such feeds as green alfalfa, cabbage. turnips, rape and kale seriously affect the flavor and odor of milk. Green rye, green cowpeas, potatoes, driedbeet pulp, and carrots affect the milk only to a slight degree, whereas green corn, green oats and peas, green soy beans, pumpkins and sugar beets have practically no effect on the flavor and odor of milk.

Grain Should Be Given

Before Roughage Is Fed Most farmers who feed grain and good silage or alfalfa hay to their milk cows in the winter time have learned that it pays to feed the grain before the cows are given their roughage. Some cows relish sliage so much that they will actually leave some of their grain in their troughs and clean up the silage. Four reasons are cited by practical dairymen why grain should be fed before the roughage is fed. The first reason is that heavy producing cows will get the concentrated grain feed that they need to maintain their production and their body, the second that the cows will relish the grain more when fed alone, the third that they will produce more milk and butterfat from a certain quantity of feed. and the fourth one is that they will produce more during their entire lactation period.

One pound of grain for each three pounds of milk produced per day is the usual amount fed. Four to six pounds is generally enough for helfers and eight to twelve pounds enough for mature cows. With the grain the cow should be enting about one pound of hay and three pounds of silage for each one bundred pounds she weighs. that is, a thousand pound cow would eat ten pounds of hay and thirty pounds of silage per day.

Improved Feed Methods Always Most Profitable

The selection of economical feeds, the intelligent compounding of rations and the feeding of each cow in proportion to her production, constitute the principal factors in economical feeding. Prices of feeds vary greatly from time to time, so that in choosing those most economical the cost per pound of digestible nutrients in various feeds should be considered. Under normal price conditions, roughage usually furnishes digestible nutrients more cheaply than concentrates; and feeds high in protein, such as cottonseed meal and oll meal, furnish digestible protein much more cheaply than low protein feeds, such as corn and oats.

FEED FOR WINTER EGG PRODUCTION

Maturity and Health Make for Strong Bodied Fowls.

One of the paramount problems a this time is the matter of feeding for maximum egg production through the winter, when egg prices are highest, Some mighty good hints on this question are supplied by R. L. Watkins. extension poultry specialist, Ames, in bis bulletin for record flock keepers, His suggestions follow:

"Winter eggs are laid by well-matured pullets and healthy old hens which are confortably housed and properly fed. Maturity and bealth make for a strong-boiled egg machine. Pullets, to lay large eggs steadily throughout the winter, must have proper body size and weight. Leghorns or other light breeds may be considered ready for a regular laying ration when three to three and one fourth pounds in weight. Heavier breeds, such as Reds, Rocks and Wyandottes should weigh four and one half to five pounds. Immature pullets must not be forced into egg production by feeding them on a regular lay-

ing ration. "Comfort enables the bird to utilize feed in manufacturing eggs instead of using the energy thereby obtained to maintain body warmth. Feeds are the raw materials out of which hensbuild eggs.

"A well-balanced egg mash containing ground grains or grain by-producls, protein concentrates in the form of meat and milk products; minerals in the form of bonement, salt and some grit; and often green food in the form of ground affalfa must be kept available to hens and pullets it they are to lay any number of eggs during the winter months.

"Whole or cracked grains such as corn, outs, wheat and burley should be used in combination with a must to maintain body weight and comfort. Redy weight cannot be maintained during heavy egg production unless sufficient grain feeds are included in the ration. In a ration made up of mash and grain the mash feed contains most of the egg building material while the scratch grain contains most of the fat and heat-building, material. Good poultry management requires that the birds consume sufficient mash to maintain their egg production, also that they cat sufficient grains to maintain body weight. Hens

try is summed up by one hen professor as follows: Stronger and healthter birds, prevention of leg weakness from heavy laying in late winter and spring, better looking egg shells, more and stronger chicks from the eggs hatched, and fewer blood spots in

Cod liver off is most easily fed. this professor writes, in semi-solid butternilla or cottage cheese. Or,"he says, you can feed in with the scratch grain-a quart to 100 hens every

For a flock that size, his method is to mix about a teacupful of the oil with the scratch grain every other day. Keep this up until spring takes the floor outdoors again,

Guard Against Disease

in Feeding Green Bone Some butcher shops have installed bone grinders and sell ground green bone. This is an excellent feed when fed fresh, but poultry offal must not be ground in because of the danger of transmitting disease to the flock. This is especially true of tuberculosis. Whenever a supply of green bone is purchased it should be spread out thin in a cold room. If left in a paper sack even in a room below freezing the center of the mass will heat and spoil. Green bone cannot be successfully kept in large quantities unless thinly spread.


