According to W. G. Street, Sec. retary, the City was notified Saturday that a water works WPA project, calling for additional water mains and other improvements had been approved, and were scheduled to start next Monday.

Under this project 400 fect of water mains will be laid, the City park will be beautified, bridges and culverts will be repaired, and other minor improvements in the city will be carried out.

"This work will furnish labor for forty men for about a month, and is scheduled to start next Monday, if the money is available," said Mr. Street.



The WPA project for the improvement of the highway through Fieldton to Hart Camp has also been approved,


Duanne Orr, who will be engineer NUMBER 36 in charge of these projects, was notified of this at the WPA Lubbock office Tuesday.

In mailing Christmas packages patrons of the office should do their mailing early. Packages should be wrapped securely, the return address placed upon them and when items of value are sent through the mails it is well to insure them. Parcels may be marked "do not open until Christmas." Only Special Delivery packages will be delivered on Christmas day.

A competent temporary clerk will be hired for several days preceding Christmas day. The Littlefield Postoffice force is expecting a heavy mail in and near Christmas and will be fitted to take care of its business in the way it should be handled.




