### Commissioners Discuss Formation Of CD Unit

in their first meeting for June, Monday discussed the formation of a county Civil Defense organization, but delayed further action until assistance in organizing such a group can be received from the State Civil Defense headquarters in Austin.

County Judge J.B. Davis told the Lamb County Leader he, because of the many duties of the county judgeship, did not have adequate time to devote to the formation of aCivil Defense unit, but recognized the need and has written to state headquarters to request aid in establishing a good civil defense program for Lamb County,

The commissioners court created a CD unit for the county in January but had not taken any action prior to Monday's meet-

Judge Davis saidhe has asked the commissioners in the various precincts to submit names from their area, of people they think would work on the program, and from these he make the appoint-necessary to fill the posts. "One reason for the delay," the Judge said, "Was I didn't want to appoint someone who wouldn't work, because of my other duties it might be necessary to hire a full time civil defense director in order to get the job done." "In this the commissioners do not agree with me, but I feel if we are to have the right type of organization, it would take a full time man," Judge Davis added,

In discussing the formation of Civil Defense organization the Judge said, according to the Olton Enterprise, the City Olton is considering forming their own unit, "Which," said the Judge, "I think is a fine idea, Littlefield has been asked to join with the county in forming a unit but for some reason have refused, indicating they might form a separate pted by anger at ourself, ager that has developed lack of interest and lack

# Reeves Resigns From School Post

### Littlefield Teachers Receive \$88,000 In Salary Boost

in the Littlefield school system the entire pay raise as granted

by the recently passed bill. The raise which is based on sperience and educational experience background will mean a \$88,503 pay increase to the 113 certified personnel in the Littlefield School System.

The raise can be passed onto the teachers without a raise in school tax rate through the Minimum Foundation Program, The program is one based on the economy of the school district and Littlefield falls into a category that qualifies the district for an amount nearly equal to the amount of salary increase,

Other items on the agenda included the accepting of resignations by six teachers in addition to School Superintendent Glenn Reeves'. (See Reeves, story page 1). The teachers' resignations accepted included those of john and Mary Hughes; Don Thorp, Mary Davis second grade teacher, who is retiring and 1st grade teachers Pat Lang and Lavenia Dollins.

The board also approved the hiring of three new teachers for 1965-66. Mary Cox will be a fifth grade teacher; Lehman Jones will teach sixth grade and Charlene Reast will be a science teacher in the his school.

Recommendations were made for instructors for the Manpower Training School. The approva I has not vet been received for the actual starting of the school but a tentative date of either July 5 or July 12 is planned. The Texas Employment Commission is presently interviewing applicants for the school.

The Board approved the sending of the high school band to the Music Educators conference next February if the band is invited. The band has won the Region 1 Honor Band and taped selections of the band have been forwarded for final judg-

Superintendent Reeves then presented to the board a tentabudget for the 1965-66 school year. The final budget will be presented at either the July or August meeting of the

### Spraying To Start In Near Future

The Littlefield street department will start spraying operations for mosquito and fly control in the very near future as the alleys sufficiently dry out so the city truck can be used.

The city will use a new insecticide this year called Baytex, manufactured by the Chemagro Co. It is a low toxic pro-duct and has been approved by the U.S.D.A. and Public Health

The insecticide, which is used in Lubbock will be in a spray form and it is hoped that the interval between sprayings needed will be greatly lengthened with better results than have been achieved in the past with the previous insecticide.

The city will also spray low lying areas where water is standing as the insecticide has also proved advantageous when used on mosquito larva.

### Texas Cotton Crop Shows Big Loss

Value of the 1964-65 Texas cotton crop was about \$650 million, representing a \$150 million drop from the preceding year, University of Texas Economic Research reports.

Texas ginned 4,053,030 bales for the 1964-65 season by Jan, 16, 1965. The total was about 323,000 bales below the figure at the same date in the 1963-64 season. The decrease was attributed to three factors; a smaller crop, a price decrease for lint and cottonseed, and a lower state average for grade and staple lengths

Beat egg whites and salt until it forms soft peaks. Gradually beat in sugar, vinegar, and vanilla. Continue beating until stiff. Fold in pecans. Drop by teaspoon on greased baking sheet. Bake at 300 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes or until firm. (Cookies should remain light colored) Cool on rack, Makes 3 1/2 dozen small cookies.



Today people are taking to the water like ducks, but unfor-tunately, they don't swim any-

where near as well. A generation or two ago water sports consisted chiefly of leaping into the old swimming' hole

or rowing around the lake. But today, more people than ever before are seeking their summer pastimes in an aquatic setting-and literally dying from

Several hundred will drown this year in Texas, according to a projection of previous records. On a nation-wide scale, 6,000 persons are predicted to drown from a variety of aquatic sports and activities.

Scuba and skin diving, surfboarding, water skiing and highpowered boating have added to the hazards of conventional swimming, diving and boating, And the proliferation of municipal and private pools and public beaches have further compounded the opportunities for injury, infection and death.

Let's take a look at the type injuries that accompany the average sports, and from this investigation we can gain clues to prevention.

Sailing accidents often are head injuries from a swinging boom. Power-boating accidents are frequently lacerations and amputations from motor boat propellers and collisions.

Common injuries among water skiers are finger, wrist, nose and face abrasions or fractures, mostly occurring from a fall onto the skies while in motion.

Some of the dangers of skin diving and underwater swimming include hyperventilation, malfunctioning scuba apparatus, face mask squeeze, middle ear squeeze, water pressure, and the threat of underwater life such as sea urchins, coral, the Portugese man of war and

The dangers from these aquatic sports depend, of course. on your proximity to water-

If you live close to the water. or plan to vacation by the water-front this summer, follow this

Make sure you and your family are trained in survival treatment. Check with your local health department or civil defense director about the medical-self help courses.
