**PECAN KISSES**  
2 egg whites  
1/8 t. salt  
2 C. powdered sugar  
1 t. vinegar  
1 t. vanilla  
1-1 1/2 C. pecans

Beat egg whites and salt until it forms soft peaks. Gradually beat in sugar, vinegar, and vanilla. Continue beating until stiff. Fold in pecans. Drop by teaspoon on greased baking sheet. Bake at 300 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes or until firm. (Cookies should remain light colored) Cool on rack. Makes 3 1/2 dozen small cookies.

## Bible School Conducted At Templo Bautista

Mrs. Ralph Nelson, Cheryl Reast, and Glenda and Brenda Cunningham, Bill and Cathy Nelson returned on Saturday from Espanola, New Mexico where they had been conducting a two week Bible School at Templo Bautista, a Spanish Baptist Church where missionary John H. Abbott is pastor.

Sessions were held for Beginners through Juniors from 8:00 until 11:00 each morning, and for Intermediates through Adults from 6:30 until 8:30 each evening. Enrollment was 123 and the average attendance was 87.

Morning sessions included singing, recreation, handwork, sword drills, memory work, Bible teaching, and counseling in daily living. Mrs. Nelson wrote all the material used. The stories were presented with the aid of flannelgraph pictures. The Bible study presented the life of Christ, with follow-up stories applying the teaching of the day in the life of the child. Also there were "Decision" stories in which some Bible character who had a great decision to make was presented. A follow-up story, called Living Lessons, presented a live situation in which the child was required to make a decision.

Evening sessions included singing, handwork, and Bible teaching. Mrs. Nelson taught Bible to the intermediates and adults, and the Rev. Abbott taught the adult class. Films were used to accompany the Bible teaching.

The First Baptist Church of Littlefield has sponsored Bible Schools for Templo Bautista for the past five years. Heretofore, however, all schools have been held in missions of the church. This is the first time the local group have conducted a school for the

church proper. Rev. Abbott reports that this is the largest and most effective school ever held there.

Mrs. Nelson served as Principal; Miss Reast as Junior II Superintendent and Pianist; Miss Brenda Cunningham as Junior I Superintendent; Miss Glenda Cunningham as Bible story-teller for the morning session; Bill Nelson as chorister; Junior II Worker, "Decision" story-teller, and he was in charge of boys' handwork. Cathy Nelson was in charge of the flannelgraph stories and girl's handwork. Assisting the local group were four young ladies and one boy who are members of Templo Bautista. Miss Precilla Herrera, Wayland student who is sponsored by the Littlefield First Baptist Church, was Superintendent of the Beginner and Intermediate Departments. She was assisted by her sister, Ruby Herrera. Another sister, Miss Mary Lou Herrera, who is a student at Texakana Baptist College, was superintendent of the Primary and Young People's Departments. She was assisted by Miss Rosinia Martinez, John Abbott, son of the pastor, was a Junior I Worker and in charge of all films.

On July 2, Mrs. Nelson, Bill, and Cathy will return to Espanola and conduct a two week school at one of the missions of Templo Bautista in the little village of Cordova. They will be accompanied by Misses Martha Naylor, Carol Tubbs, Stella Bussey, Janis Wilson, Mike Stafford and Dale Thompson.

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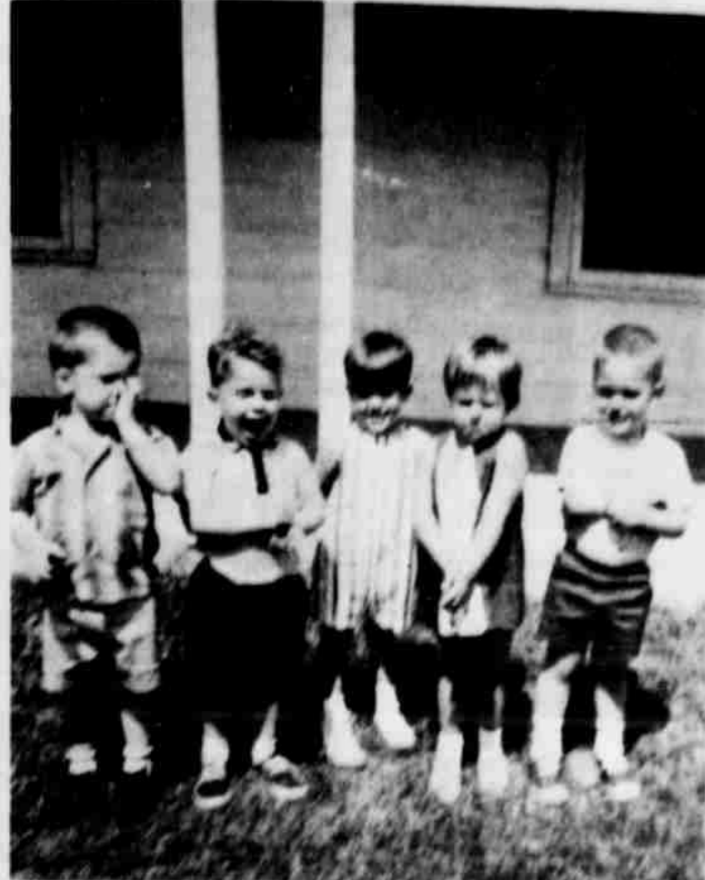

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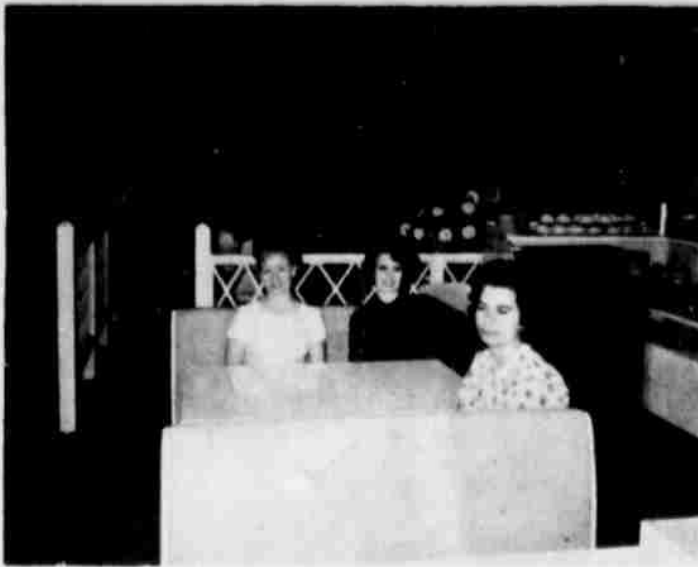

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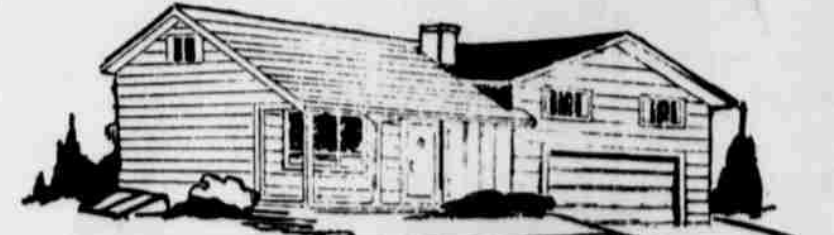
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**Williams Ends

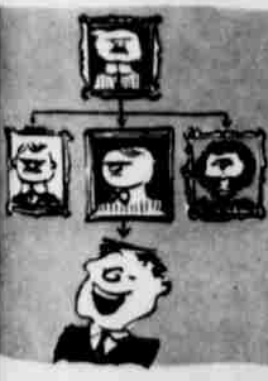

**"Laughing Heirs"**  
The letter bore grim tidings: old George had passed away. But George read it, not a flicker of the crossed his countenance. On the contrary, his only reaction was a deep sigh of relief. It was the sole heir to \$20,000. George was not heartless. But the matter was that he and his relative—actually, just a distant relative—had always disliked each other intensely. They had not been on speaking terms for years. The only reason the \$20,000 was being left to George was that he was, technically, the next of kin. Since George had never bothered to make a will, the law automatically



pass his money to the next of kin. Are such ironies common? So common, alas, that lawyers have a special phrase to describe people who do this: "laughing heirs." Each year, property worth billions of dollars must necessarily change hands because of death. When there is no will, this wealth is transferred according to the rigid formulas of inheritance. Although these formulas do try to be fair, all they can do as a practical matter is to follow the lines of kinship. What may have mattered most to the deceased—the ties of friendship, a sense of gratitude, the promptings of charity—cannot be weighed by a court after he is gone. An added mockery is that the more remote the kinship, the more costly it may be to track down the heir and settle his rights.

Some states have tried to foil the laughing heir by cutting off all claims beyond a certain degree of kinship. That may help in a particular case, but then again it may not. For even a relative who is close in terms of kinship may be under-serving in every other way. The real answer is for the individual to express his wishes and his wisdom before he dies. If you don't like the thought of some ungrateful heir chuckling over your demise, you can prevent it simply by exercising your will power—your power to make a will.

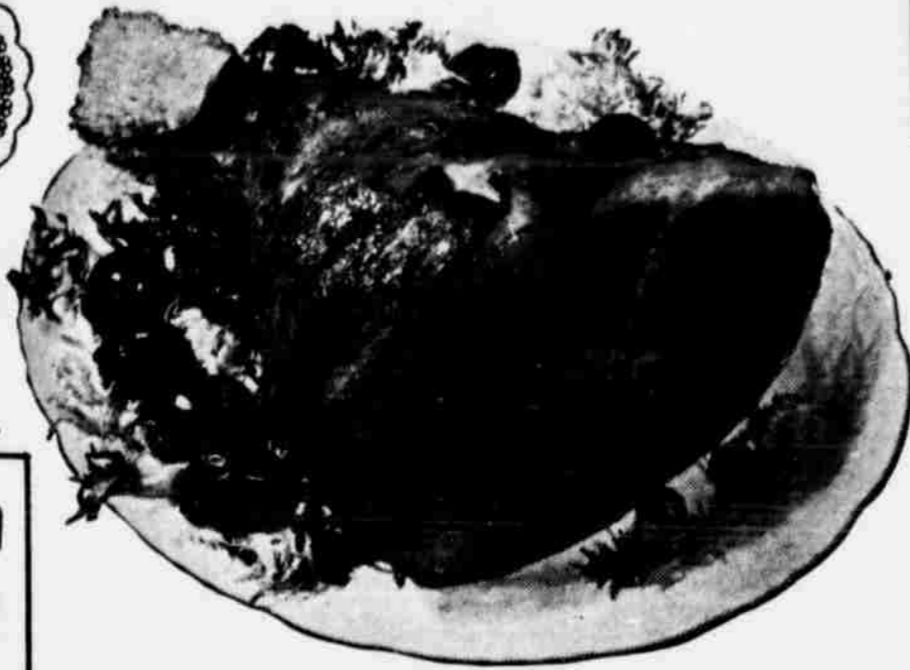

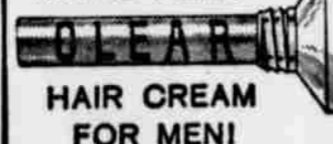

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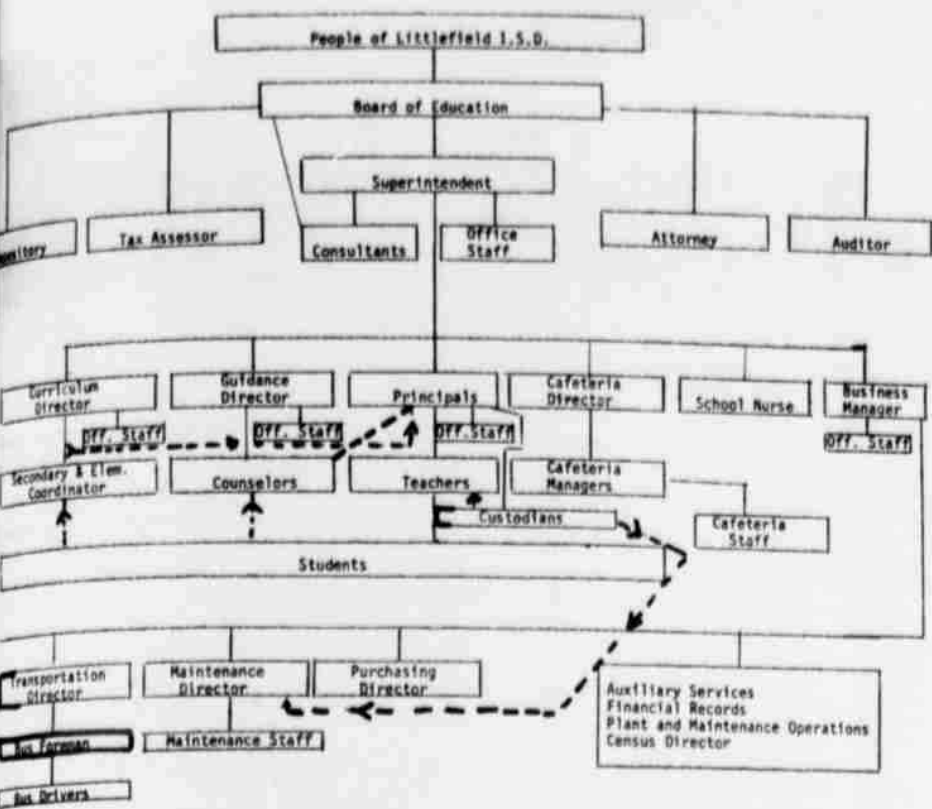
