The public hearing on the 1965-66 City of Littlefield Budget for 1966 will be held tonight at 7:30 p.m. in the council room of City Hall. The new budget will go into effect start-

ing October 1 of this year. The budget is available for inspection and all persons that want to discuss any item on the budget are free to do so at the public hearing tonight by appearing before the council.

Another important item on the agenda for tonight's city council meeting will be the setting of the tax rate for the coming fiscal year. Littlefield Mayor J.E. Chisholm stated that he anticipates there will be no increase in the tax rate for the coming year, but it will remain at the present \$1.09 per hundred. The council will also discuss

the issuing of warrants in connection with the downtown pro-

The first to be considered will be to consider a resolution to allow Mayor Chisholm to sign a warrant for \$800 for the downtown music. Under the plan the city has agreed to pay the initial cost of \$800 for the installation and the money is then to be collected from the merchants participating. They are charged on a monthly basis and the cost is included on the water bills.

The other warrants to be considered at tonight's meeting are for the city's portion of the downtown project.

City Manager Richard Bean stated that there will probably be several additional items added to the agenda by the time of the meeting tonight.
