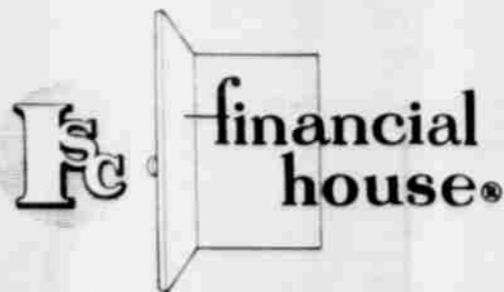

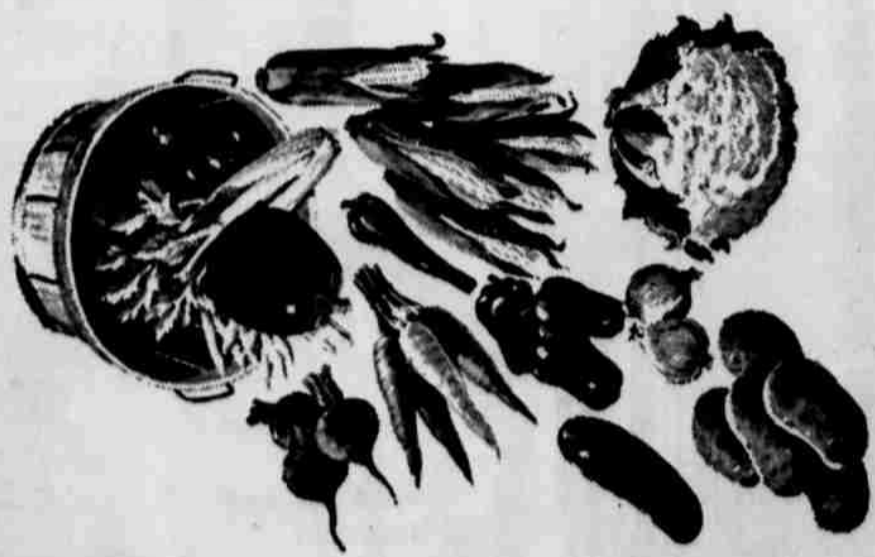

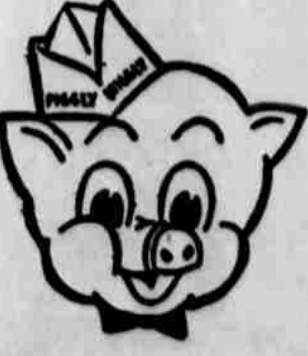

The campaign is now getting underway in Littlefield. Every person interested not only in Scouting but community growth at its most important level - our young people - is urged to participate in this program.

"The load is lighter when everyone lifts" is the philosophy of the endeavor. Girl Scouts in the 18 counties are looking to their communities for this help.

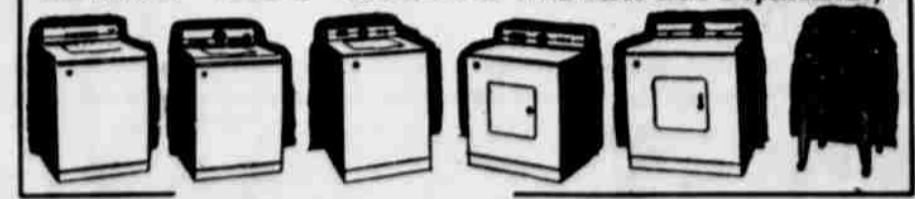
