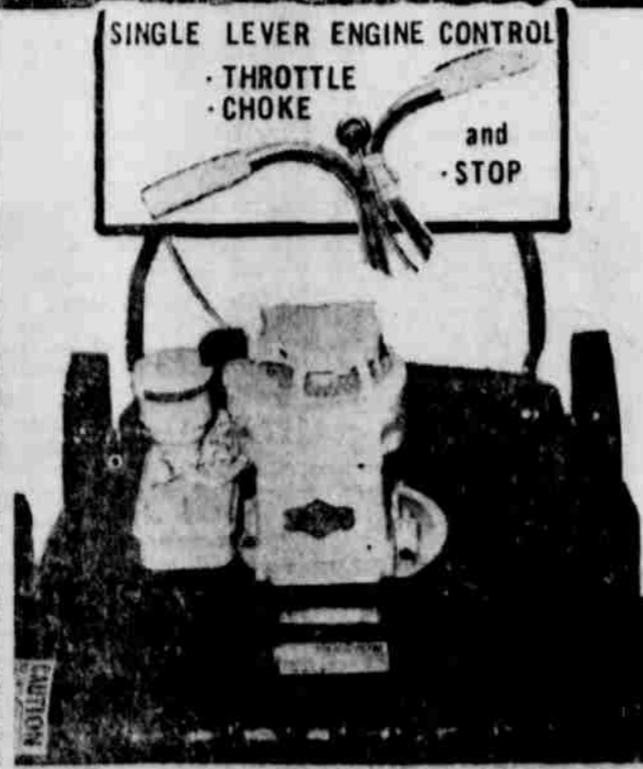

Tax Clinic Set By TEC

Many Littlefield employers are not taking advantage of the one tax they can control directly. R. Jewell, Jr., office manager of the Texas Employment Commission said today.

"This is the tax they pay to help finance unemployment compensation," Jewell explained. And to help businessmen better understand the tax and how it works, a tax clinic will be held Friday at 2:30 p.m. in the county court room. Additional sessions will be held on a demand basis.

Some 50 or more local employers are expected to attend this first session, which will last about an hour. Any employer may attend by simply calling the TEC office and making a reservation.

What they will be told is simply this: A worker is entitled to unemployment compensation only if he is unemployed through no fault of his own, and each case must be judged on his own merits. When a former employer files for compensation, the former employer is entitled to proper payment if he wishes. An employee discharged for misconduct or who has quit a job without due justification is not entitled to compensation.

How does this affect the tax? Employers pay a "sliding tax" which ranges from .01 per cent to as much as 2.7 per cent of each employee's wages up to \$3,000. The number of valid claims filed against him by former employees affect the rate of tax he pays.

Car Inspection Reminder Issued

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said this week that more than two million motor vehicles remain to be inspected before the April 15 deadline. He urged all Texas motorists to obtain their new inspection stickers at an early date.

Garrison reported that more than 4,300,000 will be inspected in Texas this year. To date only half that number have gone through inspection lines at some 4,400 inspection stations located throughout the state.

The DPS director pointed out that inspection stations cannot inspect vehicles during wet, rainy weather, a condition normally prevailing during late winter and early spring. To make sure every vehicle owner is able to obtain his 1960 inspection sticker in time, Garrison suggested that inspections be made now to visit an inspection station, before inspection lines grow long.
