

> The Congressman said he had consulted with officials of the Internal Revenue Service because many Panhandle-South Plains farmers had indicated they would not be able to obtain the information to support their claims by April 15.

"Taxpayers who believe they are entitled to depletion on water for 1962 should file protective claims for refund with the District Director of the Internal Revenue Service before April 15, 1966, estimating the amounts of depletion and tax refunds to which they are entitled." Congressman Rogers said.

The average price for the lambs was well over the \$26.10 of-fered by commercial buyers. Steers entered in the show brought an average of 46 cents per pound an increase of 14 cents per pound over the average last year with the Grand Champion Angus shown by Bruce Nicholson, Amherst

School Board elections are set throughout the Lamb County area Saturday with hotly con-tested races expected in all school districts except at Pep and Whitharral where the two incumbents are running for reelection without opposition and at Spade where two are running

for the two positions. Between 1,800 and 2,000 persons are eligible to vote in the Littlefield School Board race where Incumbent Dr, William C. Nowlin, Jerome Kirby, Werner Birkelbach, R.M. Nicholas, Calvin Price and Dick Hopping are running for the three positions open on the Board.

A total of 1,793 residents within the Littlefield School District which includes Precinct 12, most of Precinct 16 and portions of Precincts 4 and 9 had paid their poll tax and it is estimated that between an addi-itonal 150 and 200 voters are eligible to vote either through registering during the free voter registration period or persons who are over 65 and eligible vote without having to register.

Sid Hopping, School Tax Assessor/Collector said that seven persons had voted by absentee ballot as of Wednesday morning with the deadline for the absentee voting being midnight last night.

The three receiving the highest number of votes in Saturday's election will serve three year terms and will join Board President Buster Owens, John D, Smith, Jack Barton and Pat Downs on the seven man Littlefield School Board.

They will become members with the April meeting replacing C.A. Duval and Dr. Albert Perkins who did not run for reelection to the Board.



## **Precision Cotton Planting Boosts Yields 13 Percent**

Cotton yields in Texas A&M University tests are being upped a sizeable 13 percent by using preshaped beds and a new-fangled precision-depth cotton the other. planter

And A&M Extension specialists and researchers say most any cotton farmer can do the same.

Lamber Wilkes, agricultural engineer at A&M, designed both a bed shaper and the planter to pave the way to the higher cotton yields.

Wilkes uses the bed shaper about a month or more before planting. It smooth and leaves the beds table-top flat for faster, more accurate seed placement.

Then, he uses his new precision planter on the flat beds, Since the shpaed beds are level on top, the usual sweep which runs in front of the furrow opener on a conventional planter, is eliminated on Wilkes' model.

His precision planter has a curved, runner-type furrow opener that forms a narrow "V" shaped furrow. It slices cleanly into the soil, leaving a neat seed trench about an inch and a half wide for the seeds to drop into.

sweep and chisel furrow opener

usually leaves a ragged, wide, uncertain furrow, where some seed will be deeper than others. Also, seed is usually scattered from one side fo the furrow to

But not so with the precision planting. Each seed is dropp-ed neatly into the seed trench at a uniform depth, in a straight line.

The shaped beds are from 1 to 3 degrees warmer at planting time because the flat top absorbs more direct sun, he

This combined with precision lacing of the seed, promotes faster germination and emergence. In A&M tests, a 70 percent stand was up on shaped beds in 6 days, while it was on conventional beds.
