Good progress is being made in the construction of the rodeo equipment on the fair grounds and the arena is nearing completion, with H. P. Cook as foreman. It is expected that it will be completed next week, following which work will start on the grandstand.

The lights for the rodeo field have been purchased from the softball club, and will be installed some time after August 15, when the softball season closes.

The body also made a lease to James Miller and Jim McGuire on the airport for one year.

On returning home they reported a splendid meeting. Several important officials took part on the program, including Claude R. Wickard, administrator of rural administration, Washington; Congressman W. R. Poage of Temple; Congressman Lyndon B. Johnson of Johnson City.

Mr. Carl reported that they had a very successful conference with Kenneth B. Hardy of the applications and loans, in connection with locating K Section lines, on which the Lamb County Electric received \$100,000 allotment sometime ago.

Mr. Carl reports that it is impossible to secure materials; that the situation in this regard is worse than it ever has been, but that as soon as materials are released they will be able to go ahead with this allotment program.

Mr. Carl also reported that beginning Monday J. D. Beunethy of Sudan had been employed to take over and work up new lines and secure right-of-way preparatory to extending lines on allotment.

The Lamb County Electric Cooperative have at this time approximately 500 applications on file signed up at \$2.45 per mile most of which, according to Mr. Carl, will have to be reworked due to the fact that the requirements at the guaranteed revenue are \$7.00 per mile, under the REA government rules. The farmers who have signed up at \$2.45 will be contacted personally and given the opportunity of raising the guarantee revenue, in order that these lines may be presented for construction as soon as materials are available.

Mr. Carl stated that they hoped to have electricity available to all farmers who can meet the REA required revenue within the next three years.

Pool To Be 40 By 80 Ft.; Hope to Have Completed In 45 Days

Work got underway Wednesday morning on the excavation for the new swimming pool to be constructed in the City Park.

The project is being sponsored by the civic clubs and organizations of Littlefield, with the city cooperating.

The committee in charge is composed of Mayor A. C. Chesher, Durwood Howell, Charlie Signor and Fred Miller. Included in the civic organizations subscribing money towards the project are the Rotary Club, Lions Club, Junior and Senior Chambers of Commerce.

The pool will be constructed of cement and 40 ft. by 80 ft. in size, and it is hoped to have it completed in about 45 days, according to Mayor Chesher, who added that it depends, of course, on how soon the necessary materials would be delivered.

Mr. Chesher added that all the needed materials, including cement, sand, etc., had been ordered.

Joe Wells will supervise the job, and the water pipes will be laid by Messer & Bell, city engineers in the present sewer and water improvement program.

This pool will provide deep water for swimming and a wading pool for the children.

The Lamb County Frozen Food Locker Plant, of which James Garrett and Virrel E. Roberts are owners, will stage its formal opening Saturday in its new building, recently completed, on Highway 54, just east of Highway 51, and the Highway Department's buildings.

The building is 40 by 80 feet, of stucco construction, with capacity of 600 locker boxes. The property on which the building is constructed is 150x120 feet.

The structure includes: processing room, where the meat will be checked in and out to assure complete records; a 12x20 ft. chill room, equipped with Yanol Profyer lights to retain the meat at high standards and eliminate all odors from the meat room; curing room 12x20; two cold storage rooms; and slaughter rooms and pens at rear.

The work room is equipped with large maple block, big Biro saws, sanitary grinder and National slicer. Harry L. Hussman, Jr., of El Paso furnished the major portion of equipment for the processing room.

Armstrong Supply Company, Lubbock, furnished and installed the refrigeration.

The James Insulating Company, Lubbock, carried out the insulation contract on the structure.

Lloyd Elms was the electrical contractor, and the G. A. Plumbing Company had the plumbing contract.

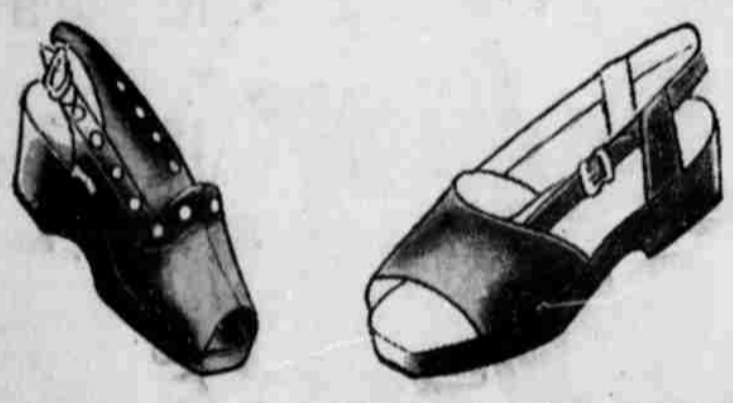

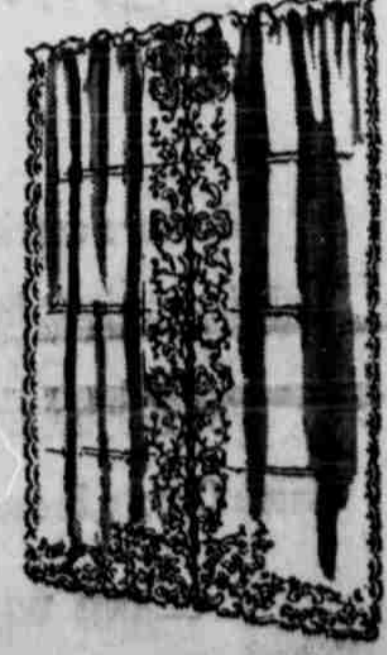

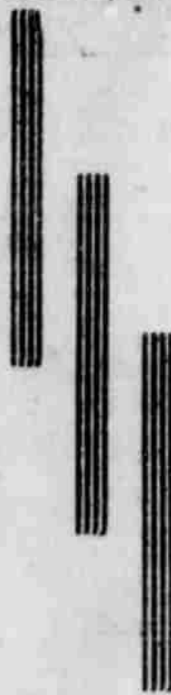

Our plant is now operating, canning peas from South and Central Texas. West Texas blackeyed pea harvest will begin after the harvest season in East Texas is over. We will start buying here when peas are first available, and we will continue to buy until the first killing frost.

BADGER, Box 1146, Phone 78, Littlefield, Texas, will handle buying for us in the Levelland and Littlefield territories, setting up receiving points at convenient loading places throughout the territory, to be designated later. He will take care of receiving and will pay for the peas at the time they are received.

We will pay market price for the peas, which should be in the vicinity of \$65.00 per ton. The demand for canned blackeyes appears to be far in excess of what canners can supply this year.

According to the experienced blackeyed pea growers in West Texas, less moisture is required for producing a good yield of blackeyed peas than cotton, and they can be planted 20 to 30 days later than cotton yet still in time for maximum yield.

Blackeyed peas, being a legume, will serve to build up the soil, and will also serve somewhat as a cover for the soil to keep down erosion during the winter months.

We will also buy dried blackeyed peas this year.
