



Good Foods Help Build Sound Health

A bright eyed eager child is usually a healthy child. And so that more little Americans may have a healthy happy childhood, a day each year is set apart by our government for calling atten-tion to the well being of children. It is National Child Health Day, observed on May 1.

Puddings like this banana tapioca are favorites with children and like other good foods they and like other good foods they help build sound health. Most youngsters like creamy tapioca pudding, a nutritious, milk-rich dessert, easily prepared with quick-cooking tapioca as in the following recipe:

Tapioca Banana Pudding

1 egg white 2 tablespoons sugar

1 egg yolk

2 or 3 tablespoons sugar 's teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons quickcooking tapioca

2 cups milk 1/2 teaspoon vanilla Beat egg white until foamy throughout; add 2 tablespoons sugar Reat egg white until loamy throughout, add 2 tablespoons sugar I tablespoon at a time, and continue beating with rotary egg beater until mixture will stand in very soft peaks. Set aside.

Mix egg yolk with small amount of the nulk in saucepan. Add 2 or 3 tablespoons some salt, quick-cooking tapicea, and remaining milk Place over medium heat. Cook until mixture comes to a boil, stirring constants.

Help Garden Seedlings to Break Through the Soil



It's a Big Job For a Young Sprout to Force Its Way Up Through the Soil, as These Bean Seedlings Prove.

Seeds sown in the open garden encounter many dangers. They or their seedling plants may be at-tacked by insects and diseases, drowned by floods, eaten by birds, injured by animals, or buried alive by a crust which forms on the soil through which they cannot pene-

By dusting the seed with a disinfectant, the moulds and fungi which cause disease may be prevented; and this is especially advisable in sowing early when the ground is cold. If there is any suspicion that the soil may crust above the seeds, it will be wise to use a special soil to cover them.

your garden contains clay, hard rain may compact it sufficiently to imprison the seed. The tiny sprout often faces an impossible task in attempting to break its way to the sunshine. The illustration shows two bean seedlings, one of the varieties most likely to suffer from crusty soil. The bean seed swells with moisture, and a sprout emerges which pushes the seed itself-twice as large as when plantwonder that a compacted or crusty soil may prevent it.

ONE of the finest collections of totem poles in North America, all of which may be seen in their natural state, line the streets of the picturesque Indian village of Kitwanga, on the banks of the Skeena River, 150 miles east of Prince Rupert, on the Canadian National Railways in British Columbia.

The Kitawanga Indians in com-mon with their North Pacific Coast forebears, believe the proper place for a totem place is right in the vicinity of their houses. These

photogenic poles of Kitawanga, the trains pause there long enough on the run between Jasper and Prince Rupert to allow passengers to walk through the tiny village to inspect poles, covered with carving often and photograph the Indians' trib-are brightly painted. They repredute to tribal and family pride.


