John W. Porcher III Missing In Action

Sgt. John W. Porcher III, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Porcher of Littlefield, is reported missing in action in Germany since January 14, according to a telegram from the War Department received by his parents Tuesday morning.

Sgt. Porcher was an aerial gunner on a B-17 Flying Fortress, with the Eighth Air Force, stationed in England.

He was serving with the veteran and colorful 390th Bomb. Group, and has seen action with the Eighth Air Force in bombing attacks against vital Nazi targets in support of growing Allied ground operations. A release from the Eighth Air Force base recently also reported his taking part in bombing underground fuel reservoirs near Bingen, also over Frankfurt, and road and rail junctions near Marshal Karl von Rundstedt's breakthrough.

He is a graduate of Littlefield High school, and was a student at Tech college, Lubbock.

He had been in the service a year and a half; and overseas since September.

Sgt. Porcher's group holds a Presidential Citation for its highly successful attack on ball-bearing factories at Schweinfurt, Germany, last year, and is a unit of the Third Bombardment Division, cited by the President for its historic England-to-Africa shuttle bombing of Messerschmitt plants at Regensburg, Germany, in August, 1943.

Pryor said he was in good health and working. He sent his regards to his immediate family and friends.

Pryor was taken prisoner February 28, 1942, when the Houston was lost. His family received notification in March, 1942, from the War Department that he was missing. Later they were notified that his status would remain the same until his whereabouts was officially established.

Mrs. Hankel was much enthused over the splendid response shown in Lamb county over the home nursing classes. She stated that this was the best organized Home Nursing program in her area, which covers the southern part of Texas and the State of New Mexico.

The time for classes in Littlefield has been changed. Mrs. Johnson will teach classes Monday and Thursday nights from 7:30 to 9:30, and Mrs. E. S. Rowe, Jr., will conduct her classes Wednesday and Friday afternoons from 3 to 5 o'clock.

A total of 119 are announced enrolled in the nursing classes as follows: Spade 42 with accommodation for three more; Sudan, enrollment 10, can accommodate more; Littlefield, 45 members, with enrollment open at regular course Monday and Thursdays, 7:30 to 9:30 p. m.; Earth, 22 members enrolled, with enrollment still open. No figures were available on Olton classes.

He is survived by his wife and eight children: three sons and five daughters. Home After Two And A Half Years In Jap Prison Camp

Sgt. Lawrence P. Ingley, son of Mrs. Mary Ingley of near Lubbock, and brother of Mrs. E. H. Spears of Bula, at home after two and a half years in a Jap prison camp, recently received the Purple Heart in a quiet ceremony in the office of Col. Howell M. Estes, Jr., at Lubbock Army Airfield.

Sgt. Ingley arrived home November 14, but it is a very modest young man who had expressed the wish for quiet, and to be permitted to forget about those years in the Philippines, hence it was not until he was awarded the Purple Heart that his experiences in the Philippines came to light.

Sgt. Ingley has been in the service since August, 1941; and went to the Philippines in October, 1941. He was taken a prisoner when the Japs overran Mindanao and on May 10, 1942, following which his mother was notified that he was missing. However, it was not until about Christmas, 1942, that she received the first card from him from the prison camp on Mindanao.

When American forces began returning towards the Philippines the Japanese started a program about Sept. 7, 1944, of moving the prisoners from that area to Japan. Sgt. Ingley was on a ship loaded with prisoners, which was sunk by an American submarine 19 days later while en route from Mindanao to some northern Jap base. With 83 other survivors he managed to swim to shore where he lived with Philippine Guerrillas until the U. S. Navy sent in a rescue boat. About 750 prisoners were loaded in the bottom of this boat, which was an old freighter, with no ventilation, and conditions are reported to have been very bad.

Of the 750 loaded on the boat, about 250 prisoners had died when the boat was torpedoed.

As the prisoners fell into the water from the torpedoed ship and tried to swim away to liberty, they were shot by the Japs; and it was only because night came on and the darkness, which enabled the 83 men to get away to safety.

Sgt. Ingley picked up a Jap life saver in the water, which helped him swim ashore. He lived with Philippine Guerrillas three weeks,

Two Local Paratroopers Wounded In Action

Pfc. Frederick Mitchell, paratrooper of Littlefield, is reported wounded in action January 3 over Belgium.

R. E. Mitchell, of Frederick, Oklahoma, father of the Serviceman, was so notified by the War Department, and he notified Mrs. Allan Rhodes, sister of Pfc. Mitchell, last week.

The telegram from the War Department also stated that a letter would follow.

Pfc. Mitchell was in the same paratroop division as M. B. Edwards and Darrell O'Dell. He attended Littlefield schools, and at the time of induction was employed by the City Laundry, then owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. John Cary with whom he made his home.

He has been in the service about two years and overseas a year and a half.

and states they are the finest people in the world.

Sgt. Ingley was sent to a hospital in Australia, where he spent a month, arriving in the States November 6, and in Lubbock November 14.

Sgt. Ingley, in the regular Army before the war began, was sent to the Philippines in October, 1941, with an aviation ordnance outfit. They were taken prisoners when the Japs overran Mindanao on May 10, 1942. The prisoners were kept on Mindanao until September 7, 1944, when they were loaded in an old Jap freighter and started for an unknown destination farther within Japanese held territory. The boat was promptly sunk, and most of the American prisoners and most of their captors were lost.

In addition to the Purple Heart, Sergeant Ingley wears the Distinguished Unit badge with two Oak Leaf Clusters, the good conduct ribbon, the American Defense ribbon with a bronze star for service prior to Pearl Harbor and the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with two stars.

Since arriving home Sgt. Ingley has been visiting relatives and friends in Lamb, Lubbock and Dallas counties. After spending some time with his sister and brother-in-

law, Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Spears of Bula community, he returned to Lubbock last week, and left again Saturday for Modesto, Calif., where he will meet his brother, Lieut. Harold J. Ingley, who is due to arrive from overseas service. He will visit his brother and friends until February 26, when he will go to a hospital for medical treatment.

Lieut. Ingley went to England as mechanic in the Air Corps in 1942, and after nine months service, returned to the States in 1943, and took cadet training, receiving the commission of Lieutenant and his wings in June, 1944. He went to Italy as a pilot on a fast fighter plane, and had been flying a month, when returning from a mission over Southern France, he became suddenly ill in the plane, and the plane fell. He baled out, but his chute didn't open, and he fell into a swamp, which saved his life. He was confined in a hospital in Italy some time, and was due to arrive in the States the first of this week. His wife lives at Modesto, Calif.

There were five Ingley brothers in the service at the same time, and until Pvt. H. M. Ingley, 38, after taking training three months was discharged, and returned to his farming operations.

Louis Ingley, 2 1/C, has been in service a year, and overseas 10 months. He was in New Guinea when he took ill with ear trouble, losing the hearing of one ear, and was sent to a Navy hospital in Australia. While there he heard that some American Jap prisoners had been brought to an Army hospital only 4 1/2 miles away, and he went there and located his brother, Sgt. Lawrence Ingley. As Sgt. Lawrence Ingley had only heard from home once since being taken prisoner he did not know that his brother, Louis, was in the service. The brothers came home on the same boat, and were assigned to the same deck on the ship. Seaman Louis Ingley is now in New Orleans, and hasn't gotten a furlough home as yet.

James B. Ingley, 43, who had enlisted in the Navy at the age of 18, serving four years, returned to the seas when war broke out, and he is somewhere in the Atlantic zone. His work is guarding the convoys across to foreign lands.

Penrod Drilling Co. Have Contract To Drill 6 Wells Here

Test On Homer Sewell Tract Making Good Showing Of Oil

The derrick is up and all the machinery on the ground, and it is expected drilling will start tomorrow (Friday) on the Hunt No. 1 E. J. Foust wildcat on section 43, block R. M. Thompson Survey, which is 12 miles east of Littlefield. This is located on the east one-quarter of the property purchased by E. J. Foust from E. C. Hardeman, and is being drilled for the Hunt Oil Company of Dallas by the Penrod Drilling Company of the same city. The Drilling company's crew arrived here Saturday, and have been busy since getting started. It is scheduled to be drilled to a depth of 8500 feet.

It was reported to the Leader that the Penrod Drilling Company have a contract to drill six wells for the Hunt Oil Company in this area, and that the crew would remain here about a year and a half, which should be strong indication that oil operators believe in production for this area. R. E. Moore is the driller in charge.

The Hunt No. 1 E. J. Foust location is four miles due north of the Humble Discovery, Lamb county's first producer. This well has been completed, and is reported to be making 300 barrels daily.

Ellis Foust stated Tuesday that he had six labors of land in the vicinity of this city which he leased recently to oil companies for \$10.00 per acre.

A good showing of oil is reported at the wildcat being drilled by the Stanolind Oil & Gas Company on the Homer Sewell tract in the Yellowhouse pool, approximately 15 miles south and west of Littlefield, just over the line in Hockley county. This well is down 4609 feet. Reports indicated Tuesday that it had been shut down, and preparations were being made to start pumping.

The derrick has been up some time on the Humble Oil location on the Alvin Bagwell property 3 1/2 miles southwest of town; and reports are prevalent this week to the effect that a drilling crew is expected to arrive next Monday, and that drilling will get underway at once on this test.

March 15 Deadline For Filing Final Income Tax Returns

In spite of all changes in the income tax laws, March 15 is still the deadline for filing final income tax returns.

March 15 is just about five weeks off, and before that date many thousands of people must file their 1944 income tax returns. While the forms for filing returns this year are much simpler than in prior years, many people will still probably want help in preparing them.

Everyone who had a gross income of \$500 or more in 1944 must file a return. This even includes minor children with \$500 or more gross income. In addition, many wage earners whose salaries were subject to withholding will not owe a tax for the year, but must, nevertheless, file a return in order to obtain a refund of amounts withheld by their employers from their salaries or wages.

In the face of these requirements hardly anyone can afford to overlook the importance of March 15. One of the greatest steps in simplification is the new provision permitting most wage earners to file an income tax return merely by filling out a few spaces on the back of their withholding receipts, Form W-2 Revised, furnished them by their employers.
