Area Gets First Snow Of Season; Moisture Of About Inch Falls

It finally rained. It also snowed. The moisture is welcomed and was welcomed. But more—much more is badly needed, to even dent the long-protracted dry spell that has prevailed here for months on the South Plains, and throughout practically all of Texas.

Moisture received here from several onsets, including the light snow which fell early Tuesday morning, was officially gauged at a .70 inch total for both Sunday and Monday. This added to light moisture which was received here earlier in the month, brought total November moisture, measured at the official station at the Cotton- oil mill to exactly one inch.

The heaviest rain started falling here last Monday evening and continued for several hours. A high, cold wind blew in during the night, dropping temperatures to a low of 30 degrees, and bringing light snow with it.

Littlefield streets, and county highways were covered with ice Tuesday morning, but Littlefield school buses operated as usual.

Springlake school officials closed their schools Tuesday, after decid- ing not to send buses out.

It was reported here Tuesday that 15 inches of snow fell in Amarillo Monday night and Tuesday morning, which will be very beneficial to the wheat crop. It was also reported that roads leading out of Amarillo were closed Tuesday morning.

EXCAVATING AND FOUNDATION WORK GETS UNDERWAY

New Bids On Project Will Be Opened Feb. 15

All bids were rejected by the Building committee of First Baptist church at a meeting last Friday afternoon, when they were found to be considerably higher than had been hoped for, and anticipated on the basis of architect's preliminary figures.

Plans are being revised, and new bids being called for on all phases of construction of the projected church auditorium, which it is hoped will bring the big figures in line with what had been planned and hoped for.

The church has already voted to go ahead with the building program, and the work on excavation and foundation will go steadily forward, as a contract for this portion of the construction has already been let to E. W. Holder, excavation contractor, of Lubbock. This work has been started, and is under the supervision of the architect, Herbert Brasher, Lubbock.

The plan of procedure on bidding under the revised plans, which are being worked out, call for opening of the new bids on or about Feb. 15.

Total Cotton Production Is Estimated At 162,000 Bales For 1952 Season

A sharply upped estimate of total 1952 Lamb cotton production was issued by W. C. Cannon, local manager for Western Texas Cotton company last week-end, after completion of a county-wide ginner survey, which contacted, and ginned figures from each of the 34 gins. The Cannon report, dated last Friday morning, listed total ginnings to that date as 147,412 bales ginned.

Estimated the crop as 90 per cent harvested and ginned, leaving 10 per cent still to be processed.

If that percentage figure is correct, it precludes a total county cotton production of approximately 162,000 bales. This figure is about 10,000 bales more than estimates made by other sources last week.

Ginning came to a temporary, but almost complete halt Tuesday following the advent of rain, snow, and much colder weather Monday night.

TURKEY AND FIXIN'S—All-American favorite.

Lower the cost and up the nutrition of your holiday meal by using nonfat dry milk powder in some of your Thanksgiving dishes. Here are three recipes showing how to do it.

Sausage Stuffing

Ingredients: 4 cups soft fluffy bread crumbs, 1/2 cup nonfat dry milk powder, 2 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1-4 teaspoon pepper, 1-2 teaspoon sage, 1-2 teaspoon thyme, 1-3 pound sausage meat, 1-2 cup chopped onions, 1-2 cup hot water.

Method: Mix bread crumbs well with nonfat dry milk powder, salt, pepper, sage and thyme. Crumble and brown sausage in skillet. Remove sausage; brown onions in sausage drippings. Add sausage meat and onions to bread mixture. Stir in hot water and mix well. Stuff body cavity of bird. This will make enough stuffing for a 4-pound chicken; for a 12 pound turkey triple recipe.

Roast Turkey Gravy

Ingredients: 3-4 cup drippings, 1-2 cup flour, 3-4 cup nonfat dry milk powder, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1

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Method: Pour drippings from roasting pan into a bowl. Measure 3-4 cup drippings and pour back into roasting pan. Mix flour, nonfat dry milk powder, salt, paprika and pepper. Stir into drippings until smooth and well blended. Gradually stir in water. Place over low heat; cook, stirring constantly, until thickened and smooth. Serve hot with roast turkey or use with leftover turkey dishes. Makes about 4 cups.

Creamed Onions

Ingredients: 2 pounds raw onions (sliced) (or about 3 1-2 cups cooked), 1-2 cup nonfat dry milk powder, 4 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon pepper, 1-4 teaspoon paprika, 1 1-2 cups water, 2 tablespoons butter or margarine.

Method: Cook onions in boiling water until just tender; drain. (There will be about 3 1-2 cups drained cooked onion.) Sprinkle nonfat dry milk powder, flour, salt, pepper and paprika over water in top of double boiler. Beat with a rotary beater until well blended.

lay design could be achieved by making an easy-to-use stencil by gluing your cut-outs and letters onto a piece of transparent cellulose sheeting the same size as your card. This way you won't need to arrange the design over again for each photograph. After the design or stencil is set on the paper, you are ready to turn on strong light to expose the paper and transfer the design. This light should be held about 16 inches directly above the center of your card. Turn on the light and count out a ten-second exposure — "one chimpanzee, two chimpanzees, three chimpanzees . . ." and so on up to ten chimpanzees. This is just about the right timing. Snap off the light and the sheet of paper is ready for a di in developer to bring out the exposed photograph in black and white. (If you use a No. 1 photo flood lamp as your strong light exposure time may be reduced to four seconds.) The materials needed for developer are available in a tiny tri-chem pack. Small pans for the solution and newspapers to place under them as protection for floor or table are needed. Bath tub or sink will serve for final washing of each newly-developed photograph. Expose another sheet of paper with the developed photograph while you are washing sign overlay to make the next photograph while you are washing one. It's a good idea to let the photographs dry overnight before mounting them with rubber cement to the card folders or backing-with-border you cut from Yule-tide-colored drawing paper. Tuck the finished cards inside a heavy book to make the mounting secure and eliminate any curling or wrinkling. Dress up your photograph with decorative cord or ribbon, if you like. A bright-colored sticker star, for example, can be a nice addition to the black and white motif. Fluffy cotton or a blanket of soap powder can be pasted to the outline of a snowman or a winter landscape, or used to give Santa Claus some real whiskers. You can achieve interesting effects, also, by pasting bits of fabric to your photograph if it suits your design.

Kirsten Flagstad tells, in "The Flagstad Manuscript" the exciting story of the woman called the greatest Wagnerian soprano of our time. Born in Norway in 1895, Mme. Flagstad began life in a musical family, her father a violinist, her mother a pianist, one brother a pianist and one a cellist. She planned to be a doctor, but with music all around, began to play the piano at an early age, did some singing, made her vocal debut in 1913. She was married in 1919 to Sigurd Hall, had a daughter Else, was divorced and, about 10 years later, became the wife of Henry Johansen. Mme. Flagstad made her American debut in 1935, returned to her native country in 1941 to be with her husband who was later to be charged with pro-Nazi business relations... he died in 1946 before there was any trial. Accusations of Nazi sympathies carried over to the singer herself.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Turkey Patties

Breaded: November 22, 1952

- 1 Tablespoon fat
- 2 Tablespoons flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup fat milk
- 1 cup finely cut turkey or chicken, cooked or canned
- 1 teaspoon ground onion
- 1/2 cup soft bread crumbs, 2 days old
- 1/2 cup corn flake crumbs
- 1/4 cup evaporated cream of chicken soup

Melt fat in saucepan. Blend in flour, salt and pepper. Stir in gradually 1/2 cup milk. Cook until very thick, stirring all the time. Stir in turkey, onion and bread crumbs. Chill. Shape into 8 small patties. Roll patties in corn flake crumbs. Dip into 1/2 cup milk. Save any milk that is left. Roll patties again in crumbs. Brown on both sides in 1/4 inch hot fat. Mix soup and milk left from dipping patties. Heat until steaming hot, but do not boil. Serve over patties. Makes 4 servings.

Earl Bovine, manager of Bill's cafe, who was already under bond after entering a not guilty plea to a liquor charge about two weeks ago, was again arrested and charged with a fresh violation. He again entered plea of not guilty, and posted bond in the sum of \$750.

The out-of-town man charged in court here Monday was Shirley Chaney, farmer of near Earth, charged with sale of liquor from his home, entered a plea of not guilty, and was placed under \$500 bond by Judge Dent.

The colored driver of a gin-owned truck was arrested Saturday night and charged with driving while intoxicated, west of Littlefield. He paid a fine of \$100 and costs in County Court Monday afternoon, after entering a plea of guilty.

will be forwarded to the Seattle meeting.

The Texas Farm Bureau will recommend that acreage controls be imposed to keep production in line with demand. The resolution on the controls reads: "We feel a more workable control program can be set up on the basis of farm acreage control, percent of the retired acres to be determined by the overall over-production of all farm commodities." C. H. DeVaney, vice-president of the Texas Farm Bureau said.

According to the Texas plan, unique among long-range farm program proposals, the support prices would have to be flexible to control plantings of the various crops. The support would be 100 per cent of parity when supplies of a given commodity were normal, increasing when the crop is short, and decreasing when supply is in excess of demand.
