Minimum Charge Slashed To \$1.35 With Further Reductions

The railroad commission Tuesday ordered reductions in rates charged the West Texas Gas company by domestic and commercial gas sold in all towns in this area.

The commissioner ordered a reduction of 15 cents for the first 2,000 cubic feet; 12 1/2 cents each for the next 2,000 feet and 171/2 cents per 1,000 for the next 46,000 feet.

With the reductions, Olin Culber son, director of the gas utilities division, said the minimum rate would be cut from \$1.50 to \$1.35,


