



A broad statement, but this is about the red tags that are being eliminated from sacks of state certified and registered seed.

W. H. Cunningham, state certified seed grower in Lamb county, received samples of the tags that are to be used by dealers in all of the states. The light blue tags will mean certified seed, and the purple tags will be registered seed.

Many states in the union will use red tags for semi-certified seed, Mr. Cunningham said, but not Texas . "We're coming completely out of



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

Committee Elected

Wheat growers must watch the varieties they plant or they may be penalized for growing a poor baking quality of wheat. The Texas Wheat Improvement Association cooperating with the Extension Service is trying to prevent growers from losing the wheat market, which has happened in other states. Flour mills refuse to buy wheat from sections where wheat of poor baking quality is grown even if grown by just a few producers. The wheat is mixed at the elevator thus making all wheat grown in that locality low in baking quality.

The varieties that are not high in baking quality are Chiefkan, and Early Blackhull. In all test run on baking quality, Chiefkan is at the bottom of the list. Blackhull state service office, was adopted the bottom wheat rates only fair in these tests and is penalized more if grown under irrigation. Turkey and Temmarq varieties rank high in all the tests. Turkey and Temmarq, also, according to experiment stations, over a period of years will have as high a yield as Chiefkan and Blackhull varieties.

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

The Liberties We Must Defend

When a man will spend \$10,000 to tell the world the principles he stands for and why, that is pretty good evidence hat he really believes in what he says. A New York business man, Sidney Hollaender, has done just that. He has bought the advertising space on the back cover of the New York Classified Telephone Directory to outline his idea of the American Way.

What he has printed is worth every American's serious attention.

"I like the American Way. Why? "Because I can go to any church I please.

"I can read, see and hear what I choose.

"I can express opinions openly. "My mail reaches me just as it was sent—uncensored.

"My telephone is untapped. "I can join any political party I wish.

"I can vote for what and whom I please.

"I have a constitutional right to trial by jury. "I am protected against unconstitu-

tional search and seizure. "Neither my life nor my property

can be forfeited without due process We do not know Mr. Hollaender

nor anything about him except that he is the head of a company which manufactures labels. His name suggests a foreign origin, but his words are those of a real American. Mr. Hollaender has put our Bill of Rights into simple, compact form. Those are the liberties which we must be prepared to defend.

An Old American Custom

There are great numbers of people who do not like the principle or the purpose of the new laws which Congress is considering for drafting young men for military training in time of

peace. But it cannot be truthfully contended that compulsory military service, in peace-time as well as in war, is something new and not in accord with the traditions established by the Founding Fathers.

The Constitution gives authority to Congress "to provide for organizing arming and disciplining the militia and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United States." Under this provi-sion President George Washington recommended to Congress that it be made "an indispensable qualification for exercising any of the rights of a free citizen that he shall have undergone prescribed military training in preparation for his citizenship."

The first law comparable to the present proposal was enacted in 1792 by the Federal Congress. It provided for the enrollment and annual muster of all able-bodied male white citizens of the respective states between the ages of 18 and 45. It authorized the state legislatures to enact such exemptions as they saw fit. So while the law remained on the statute books for more than a hundred years, states successively exempted certain classes of citizens and finally most of them permitted any man to buy exemption for a fixed fee.

That was a long departure from the principles of the original colonists. Every one of the thirteen colonies had laws requiring compulsory military training and service when needed. Washington declared this obligation of personal service to be "the main pillar of a free state." He said that "Every man of proper age and ability of body is firmly bound by the social compact to perform personally his proportion of military duty for the defense of the state.'

Whether one approves or disapproves of the present movement for conscription for military training it cannot be called un-American.



Canada Allowed

New regulations have been established under which tourist may bring their firearms to Canada for family, and Mrs. Phillip Brugger- Martha and Johnnie left for Wash- hunting, gun club or trap shooting. on By Order-in-Council, passed under the authority of the Defense of Canada Regulations sometime ago, aliens were not permitted to carry firearms in Canada or have them in their possession. As all tourists visiting Canada fall within this category, the hardship imposed on many welcome visitors whose half: it has been for years to shoot in Canada's hunting grounds annualy, has been removed by an amenda. Order-in-Council which grant thority to the Commissioner of Poyal Canadian Mounted Police grant individual permits.

The new regulations provide that intending hunters or others who wish to bring their firearms to Canada (and a reasonable supply of ammunition therefor) are quired to sapply in advance by letter or wire to the Commissioner of Commissioner, Customs or the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Ottawa, giving name, address, occupation, purpose and duration of visit, destination in Canada, description, make and serial number frontier port of arrival. This application should be supported suitable references. The bona fides of the applicant having been satisfactorily established, a permit will be forwarded to the Collector of Customs at the Canadian frontier port designated in the tourist's application, by whom it will be delivered to the tourist on his arrival.


