Prices Remain Strong In Local Livestock Market

Sheep offerings fell off sharply Thursday at the West Texas livestock sale, but the volume held steady and prices showed strength at the Tuesday cattle market.

Tuesday 700 head of cattle went through the ring on brisk bidding. Norman Reed furnished a highlight with a truckload of fat cows, sold individually. One went at 14.00, another at 14.50 and the balance higher up to 17.60. Butchers classes were much in demand with fat stuff gaining over the previous week.

Hereford cows and calves ranged from \$120-\$150; mixed cows and calves from \$85-\$145; fat cows from 12.00-17.60; fat yearlings 17.00-21.00; fat calves 22.00-22.60; stocker calves 11.00-14.10; canners and cutters 8.00-11.50; bulls (medium grade) 13.00-14.00.

Forty head of hogs hit 24.40, the top being 40 cents above the Fort Worth market for the same day. Thursday a few head of hogs hit 24.00.

Sheep offerings Thursday held to 400, a fourth of the previous week. Aged ewes with small lambs brought 10.00-12.50; medium milk lambs 18.00-19.60; feeder shorn lambs 13.00-15.60; fat bucks 5.50; ewes (run-off-mill) 3.00-8.00. Several head of horses also sold with classes varying from rendering plant specials to saddle mounts.

Irrigation In West Texas

Martin, Glasscock Counties Lead In Water Development

(This is the second in a series of three articles devoted to prospects and problems in the development of irrigation in the West Texas area. —Ed Note).

Martin county is establishing the pace in irrigation development in this area, but Glasscock county also is loomed as a "hot spot." Prospects for Howard county are less rosy.

Localizing of the development is understandable in light of studies

by the US Geological Survey and the state board of water engineers. These indicate clearly that the great sheet water belt does not get far below Plainview and certainly not too far south of Lubbock, although there are some strong wells even as far down as Lamesa. Thus large volumes of water in this area come from narrow strata or sinclines. Board sections with little or no water are not uncommon.

Glasscock county is still in the

experimental stage, even more so than the entire irrigation belts of this area. Only one place, the Dr. G. T. Hall farm just over the Howard county line in northern Glasscock, has a long record of irrigation. Here the program has been carried on experimentally with emphasis on alfalfa production, although in recent years irrigation has been applied to other standard row crops with reasonable success.

Elsewhere, emphasis seems to be turning to irrigated pastures. J. B. Calverley has drilled a well for the purpose of watering 80 acres. Marshall Cook has a well for serving 80 acres subject to irrigation. Cecil Wikerson and J. W. Cox are planning wells for sizeable plots, all pasture irrigation. These wells are in the area north and west of Garden City and range from 135 to 200 feet, yielding an estimated 650 gallons per minute.

Some 10 miles southeast of Garden City in the Lacy draw, Steve Currie has heavy producing wells in conjunction with a dam to capture surface water. One well is above and one below the dam, which apparently overlies some sub-soil gravel. He has 40 acres for varied irrigation, largely crops.

In south central Glasscock county one large well has been developed in an old lake area and in the vicinity of a ranch recently subdivided for farming purposes. This project still is more or less in the speculative stage. Glasscock county, with several sweeping draws, has other sections which may yield strong wells. To the south in the north end of Sterling county, Foster Price has developed a good well on his Bob's Creek ranch and Nick Reed is set up for a 58-acre irrigation program from a low-water dam.

Howard county is without any projects of comparable scope, and this, as mentioned before, results from the peculiar geological structures of this immediate vicinity. Few wells, even those developed by the City of Big Spring in its continuing search for water reserves, have records of sustained production sufficient to warrant economical irrigation. This does not mean that there are not many small patches devoted to truck crops.

Several isolated sections, however, are adaptable to sub-soil irrigation and some encouraging success stories are coming out of these sections, peculiarly provided for by nature. One of these is in the western part of the county on Sulphur Draw, others immediately northwest and northeast of Big Spring, one near Sand Springs, and others north and south of Coahoma.

Special Grasshopper Poison To Be Made Available Here

The Howard county chapter of the Farm Bureau has made arrangements to secure special grasshopper poison prepared by the government.

Thad Hale, president of the local chapter, indicated that the poison would arrive here the latter part

of this week or the first part of next week.

It will be furnished to farmers without charge. However, farmers will furnish their own filler and there will be a small mixing charge assessed by the bureau. Because of the lethal nature of the poison — which is far more potent than the long-used arsenic compounds, it must be mixed at a central point.

Efforts are being made to locate and secure ample supplies of filler material since the stocks of bran and sawdust are limited in Big Spring. Hulls are more plentiful but price is a deterrent. Addition of molasses is indicated for effectiveness and there is ample supply of the material in Big Spring.

All persons faced with prospect of grasshopper infestation are urged to report it to the county agent's office and to apply for poison. Some areas of the county report grasshopper evidences but in most instances the advance has not been far beyond the fence rows and can yet be controlled effectively.

Under the CWA plan, said Berry, the series of independent regional unions would be merged into the one large unit, but that likely there would be territorial divisions. Phone Workers Into New Union

Thirty-seven of 41 unions affiliated with the Federation of Telephone Workers will become part of a new national union — the Communication Workers of America — on June 9, W. D. Berry, district president for the Southwestern Telephone Workers union has announced.

Berry was informed by the board of directors now in session in St. Louis that 37 unions had declared a desire for CWA affiliation in a recent referendum. The Chicago commercial and the AT&T long lines workers had indicated they would leave the FTW for a CIO affiliation. Two other unions were not accepted by the new CWA.

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Auto Mishap Fatal To Insurance Man

WACO, June 6. (AP)—The number of dead as the result of an automobile collision near Mart Saturday had risen to four today following the death last night of Mrs. Arthur Bennett of Mart.

Mrs. Bennett's three-year-old daughter, Jennifer, and Leslie Wisniewski, 16, of Mart, were killed in the collision. Tuesday night the third victim, Mrs. Emma Wisniewski, mother of Leslie Wisniewski, 16, of Mart, was killed in Mrs. Bennett, who died in a hospital here, was the 15th traffic fatality in McClennan county since Jan. 1. The Wisniewski car collided with one driven by Joe V. Boleman of Waco.

WAA Personnel To Be Reduced

DALLAS, June 6. (AP)—About 200 employees will be cut off the North Texas region staff of the War Assets Administration by June 27, according to WAA regional personnel Director Bennett Boggs.

He said El Paso center will be reduced about 20 per cent and the WAA customers' service center at Pantex Ordnance plant in Amarillo, with 15 employees, will discontinue operations altogether at the end of the month.

He said this would mean a total of 900 government employees in six major agencies of the Dallas region who will be out of jobs as a result of the federal economy move. The cutback, Boggs said, will affect commodity specialists who have directed disposal of various items as much as it will affect clerical and accounting help.

New Manager Here For Margo's Store

'MURDER BY MAIL'

More Letter Bombs Mailed To British Political Chiefs

LONDON, June 6. (AP)—Scotland Yard reported today that nine new letter bombs for Britons had been found in the mails, making a total of 20 discovered since early this week.

Reliable sources said that all 20 of the "Murder by Mail" letters had been posted in Turin, Italy. Dispatches from Jerusalem, meanwhile, said the so-called Stern gang, Palestine Jewish underground group, had announced that its European branch has been sending the bombs.

Scotland Yard said some of the new bombs were addressed to former cabinet members, but refused to name any of them or to say whether Churchill was among them. A Churchill spokesman said the ex-prime minister had no knowledge of any bombs having

been sent him. Foreign Secretary Ernest Beven and his predecessor, Anthony Eden, were among those to whom the earlier dynamite-laden envelopes were mailed. None of the bombs has exploded, except in police tests which have shown them powerful enough to maim or kill a man.

Officials said the latest letters were brought across the English Channel by steamer late last night. Post Office employes, scrutinizing mail from the Continent, found them in a single mail bag. Home office explosive experts and Scotland Yard criminal investigation agents removed them and examined them for further clues to the senders.

West Texas' Crude Reserves Cited By Murray At Midland

MIDLAND, June 6. (AP)—The attention of the nation's oil industry is "centered on West Texas, the only area of the nation which effectively can produce more oil than it now is producing," according to William J. Murray, Jr., Texas Railroad Commissioner.

Here to attend the opening of the 12th annual Midland Rodeo, Murray said, "the Permian Basin area of West Texas with its huge reserves and with its many new discoveries assumed national significance in meeting the increased oil demands of the nation."

The railroad commissioner rode in the horsemen's parade launching the rodeo yesterday afternoon and last night witnessed the initial rodeo performance. He was accompanied here by his wife and two small daughters. His father, W. J. Murray Sr., of Abilene, also was present.

Does Singer Deserve A Copyright? Congress Delves Into The Question

By ARTHUR EDSON WASHINGTON, June 5 (AP)—Congress is all tangled up in this perplexing question: Should people like Bing Crosby and Frank Sinatra be allowed to copyright their phonograph records?

Before a House judiciary subcommittee decided not to decide right off, it considered such interesting items as: The first person to sing "The Star Spangled Banner," Al Jolson's knee.

This whole thing came up a week ago when hand leader Fred Waring, who heads the National Association of Performing Artists, declared the law should be changed so that records could be copyrighted.

"Bing Crosby and Frank Sinatra have a distinctive style," Waring said. Everybody in his associati—, "from Benny Goodman to Toscanini," thinks this style should be protected by a copyright.

Yesterday's witnesses, representing songwriters and publishers, didn't agree. Composer Deems Taylor said the work itself, not the way it's played, is the important thing.

Rep. Chadwick (R-Pa) said he was searching for a quotation. "It goes something like this," he said, "a song without the singer is dead."

"Yes," agreed Taylor, "but without a song, the singer is buried."

John Schulman, attorney for the Songwriters' Protective Association, agreed with Taylor that the song's the thing.

"If the performer is so important, who first sang 'The Star Spangled Banner'?" he asked.

Nobody knew. Which brings us to Jolson's knee. Sidney Wattenberg, of the Music Publishers' Protective Association, asked how far the performing artist would be protected.

"Take the song 'Mammy,'" he said. "In the third chorus, as that great performer Al Jolson does it, he gets down on one knee."

"Can the knee be copyrighted?" Nobody knew the answer to that one, either.
