

# COLLEGE PROPERTY TO BE IMPROVED; USED FOR PERMANENT FAIR GROUNDS

## Contract Let For Water And Sewer Improvements

**Bell and Messer  
Engineers In  
Charge Of Work**

**Extensive Water and  
Sewer Lines Over  
City To Be Laid**

A contract for the water and sewer improvements and extensions was let last Friday to Bell and Messer, contractors and road, bridge and water system engineers, in the amount of \$116,244.43.

These improvements will include water tower, water lines over a considerable part of the city, and sewer lines.

C. H. Messer of Littlefield and Dean Bell of Abilene formed a partnership for the purpose of carrying out the above contract.

The City voted on the bond issue in connection with the water and sewer improvements March 29th.

Bonds in the value of \$190,000 authorized and sold to Crummer and Company of Dallas on April 8 last to be paid annually over a period of 25 years and drawing 3 per cent interest.

## School Election Saturday, June 15

Upon presentation of a petition signed by the required numbers of property owning voters, the school board ordered an election to be held Saturday, June 15, to raise the school tax from \$1.00 per \$100 valuation to \$1.50 on \$100 valuation. The election will be held in the Methodist Church with Jess Elms as election judge.

The boost in taxes was made necessary by the loss of Teacher salary aid from the state. Littlefield is no longer eligible to receive this aid because the city population has pushed above the 3,600 mark.

The Littlefield schools must have this revenue to maintain even its present standard of work. Without it, the teacher's salaries would have to be reduced and some depts. and services would have to be discontinued.

The School officials ask the cooperation of the voters in its efforts to maintain an efficient system for our children.

The board requests that the voters go to the polls and vote on this vital issue.

## Boy Scouts Are Reorganized Here

A meeting was held at the Scout Hut Tuesday evening, when a Boy Scout reorganization took place, and Durwood Howell was elected local Chairman.

The Rotary Club, Lions Club, and American Legion are planning on sponsoring boy scout troops. The Oddfellows and Junior Chamber of Commerce are also to be contacted and expected to sponsor troops.

The National Boy Scout Executive will spend all next week in Littlefield and assist in the organization.

C.A.R.E. is a non-profit, government-sponsored organization (formed by 24 religious, relief and labor groups) which is sending food free of customs duties and ration regulations to Czechoslovakia, Finland, France, The Netherlands, Norway, Italy and Poland.

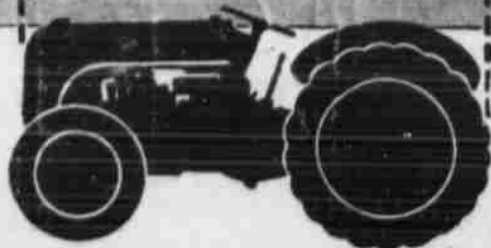

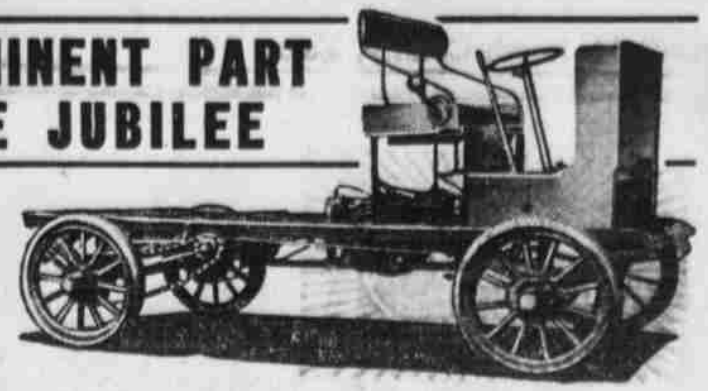

Right: The automotive industry's Golden Jubilee celebration recalls an early pioneer of motor transport progress. One of Detroit's first motor trucks, this one-cylinder, chain-driven 1902 model is the "Grandfather" of today's powerful GMCs.

Austin, Texas, June 5. — Jerry Sadler, candidate for governor, has announced that his cousin Harley Sadler, of Sweetwater, has accepted appointment as his campaign chairman for West Texas.

### **OLD AGE PENSION RECIPIENTS TO RECEIVE LESS**

Each old age pension recipient in Texas will get \$1.50 less than his authorized grant in June because of increasing rolls and the ceiling on available funds.

The Department of Public Welfare announced Thursday an additional 50 cent cut in each payment, on top of similar deductions in April and May. The prospect was the reductions would continue.

There was a net increase of 1,354 in the pension rolls during May, bringing to 183,389 the number of aged persons eligible for the June payments. This was the largest number in history, welfare department officials said.

Discontinuance of service allowances continued to be the chief reason for the increase in the rolls. Stoppage of payments from the government to families of men released from the armed services accounted for 35 per cent of the increase. Loss of employment or decreased earnings accounted for 20 per cent.

Although there was an increase of 47 during May for those eligible to receive aid for the needy blind, no prorated cut was in sight. The average payment for June will be \$26.70.

Because of insufficient funds, each payment on behalf of dependent children in June will be for 26 per cent less than the authorized grant. These payments will be made in behalf of 23,314 children in June, with the average payment \$25.31.

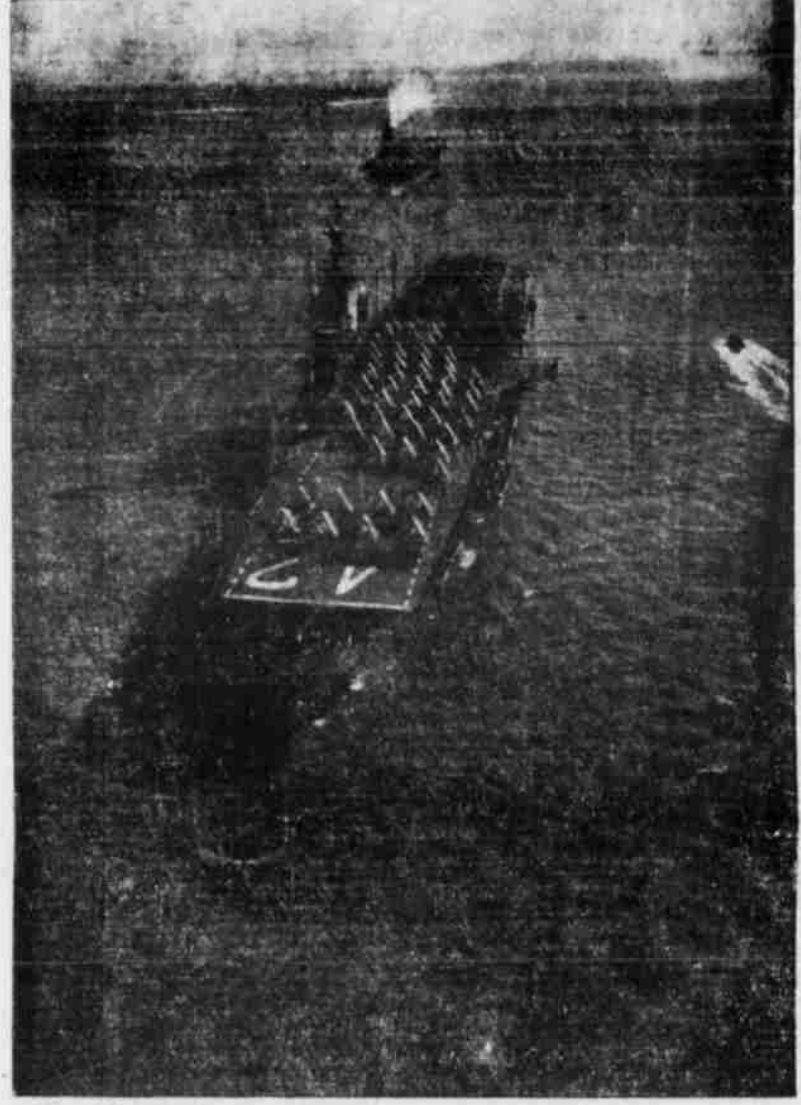

**Information For Veterans**

Q. May a veteran pay off a guaranteed loan before it becomes due?

A. Yes, the regulations give the veterans the right.

Q. Can a guaranty of a loan be obtained if the proceeds are to be used by a minor or a person under legal disability?

A. This can be done only if the loan and liens are valid under the state law governing the transaction. Many states have enacted statutes removing disability of veterans, and for the wives of veterans who are minors, to enable them to make such loans.

Q. Are veterans of World War I eligible for benefits under the GI Bill?

A. No. Its benefits are for World War II veterans only.

Q. May funds from a loan guaranteed by the Veterans Administration be used to pay operating expenses on a farm?

A. Yes, but the veteran must actually operate the farm.

Q. Must a veteran put any of his own money into a business, a home, or a farm in order to get a guaranty of loan?

A. No, this is not a requirement for guaranty or insurance. It is a question which is settled with the lender. The only bearing it has on the guaranty of a loan is that in the case of a farm or a business it may affect the likelihood of the veteran's success in the venture.

Q. May a loan to buy an automobile or a truck be guaranteed or insured?

A. Yes, but only if the automobile or truck is necessary to the conduct of the veteran's own business or farming operations, or the conditions of his employment require that he have such a vehicle for use in carrying on his work but not merely for transportation.

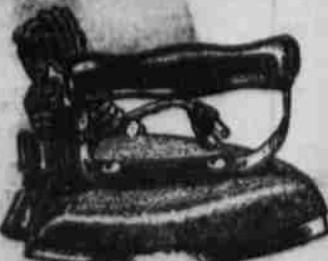

To Launch Educational Program

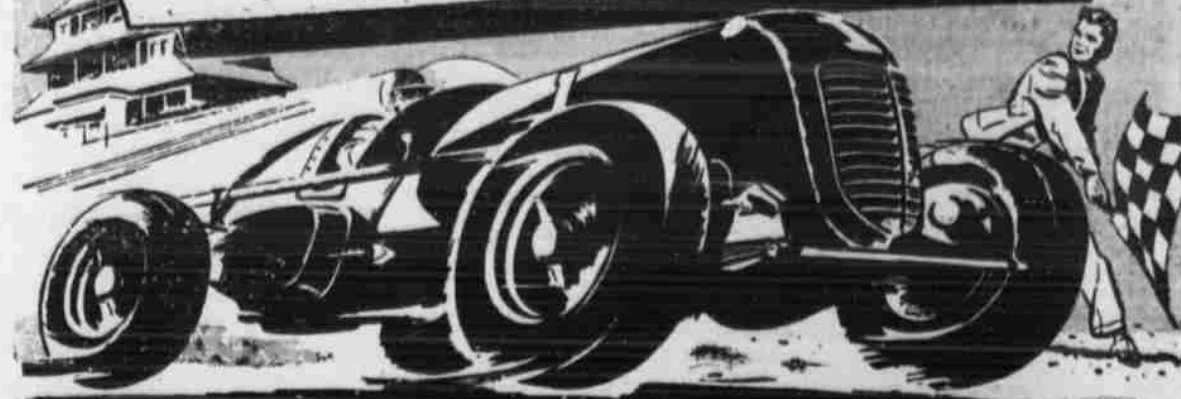

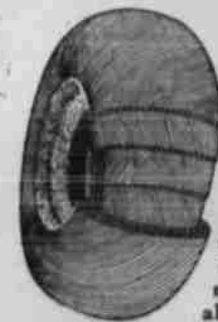

GENERAL MAC ARTHUR MEDAL SPURS YOUTHFUL GARDENERS

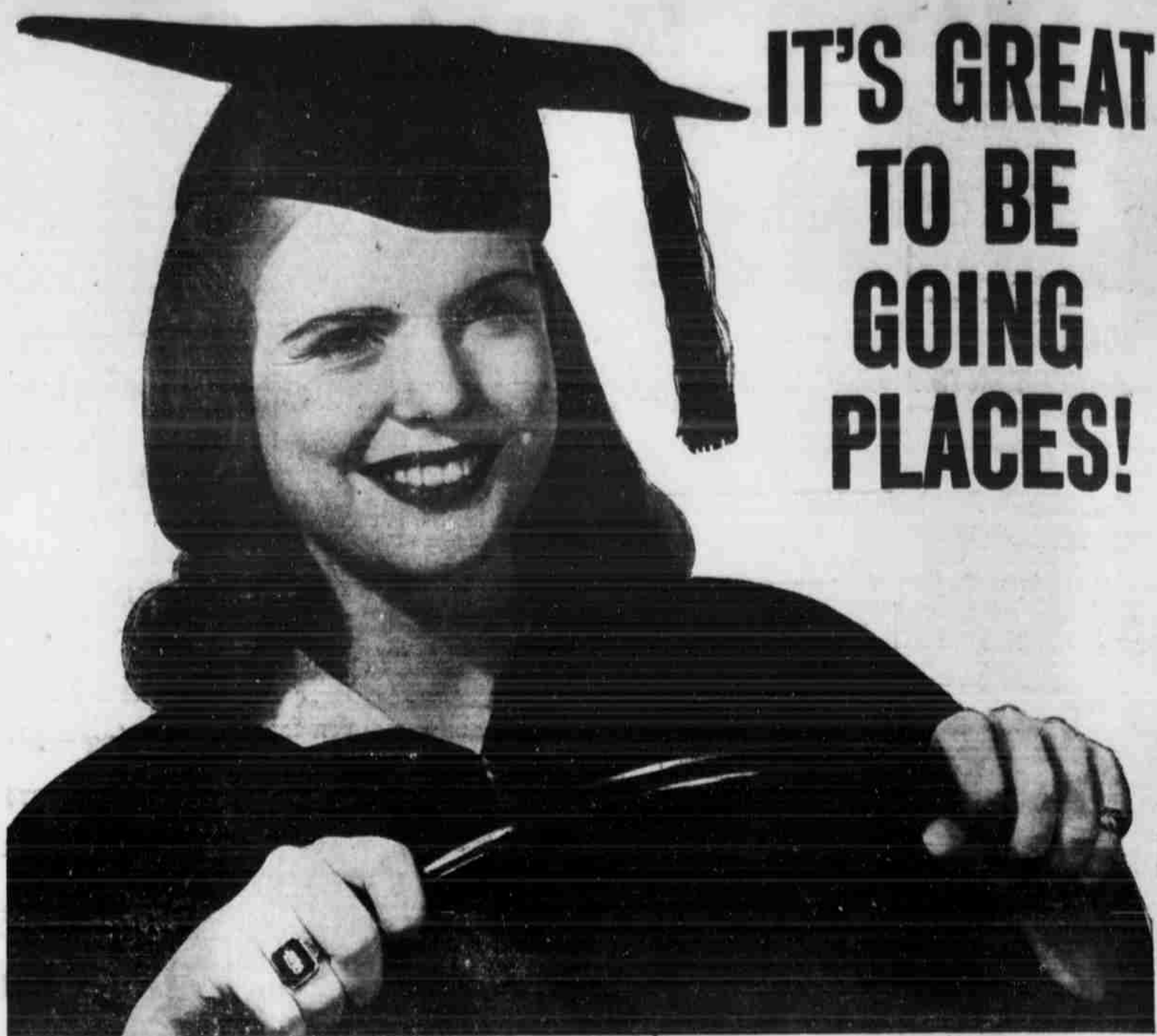

Rallying to the urgent appeal of President Truman for more Victory Gardens, because, as the President says: "Food is today the most sought after commodity in the world," the National Garden Institute is sponsoring the National Green Thumb Contest—a project which during the war years helped greatly to stimulate home food production. Also, the Institute will award General Douglas MacArthur medals to boys and girls who qualify as good gardeners in supervised groups, as for example the Boy Scouts, 4-H Clubs, Girl Scouts, Camp Fire Girls and others who did outstanding work during the war years and are continuing to do so.

The Green Thumb contest is divided into two divisions, Adult and Youth, with awards totalling \$1550.00 in Victory Bonds. The adult division is for home gardeners and for company gardeners with awards for both groups. The youth division includes elementary and high school gardeners with prizes for both groups. Winners of these groups are eligible to compete for the grand national awards which total \$850.00 in Victory Bonds for the adult division, and \$400.00 in bonds for the youth division. In addition, there are silver medals for state champions and gold medals to grand national winners.

The rules for the Green Thumb Contest are simple: Every man, woman and child in the United States who fills out and returns a Green Thumb Record Book showing that he or she has grown a garden which measures up to the high standards of this award is eligible. Contestants must submit Record Books that have been signed by a local official or an accredited leader. Green Thumb Record books can be obtained in many localities from local garden chairmen, 4H club leaders, Scout masters and school garden supervisors or from the National Garden Institute, 598 Madison Avenue, New York 22, N. Y. The books, which cost two cents per copy, may be obtained also from the Institute's offices in Detroit, Chicago and San Francisco. Andrew S. Wing, manager of the National Garden Institute, announced yesterday that the closing date for the state, community and company Green Thumb contests will be October 1. The National contests close November 1.

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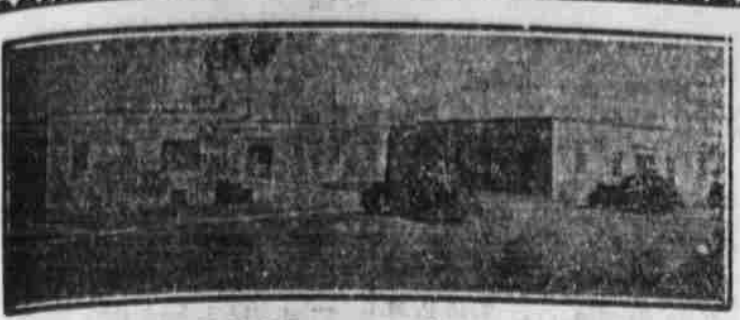

### Cotton Prices Go Higher

Prices were higher for cotton, steady for grain and hogs, but easy on vegetables, poultry and eggs, cattle and sheep last week, USDA's Production and Marketing Administration said today.

Unfavorable weather for the 1946 cotton crop and action on the price control bill by the Senate Banking Committee tended to strengthen cotton prices. Reported sales in 10 markets totaled 82,600 bales this past week against 93,100 bales the previous week and 67,600 last year. Spot market activity decreased as strikes clouded the outlook for cotton consumption.

Continued urgent demand for tight supplies of grain and feed kept prices at new ceilings.

Eggs declined about a cent at most southwestern markets early last week. Cold storage space became tighter and hatcheries reduced operations, throwing more eggs on the market. Demand held up very well and prices were almost steady by Friday. For current receipts, dealers paid 30 to 31 cents a dozen, Dallas; 30-1/2 to 31 cents, Fort Worth and Denver; 30 to 33 cents, New Orleans.

Poultry prices sagged early last week but later leveled off about steady. Heavy hens brought 23 cents 5 pound, Dallas, 23 to 24 cents, Fort Worth; 25 to 26 cents, Denver; and 27-1/2 to 30 cents, New Orleans. Fryers remained at ceiling, but movements were near standstill.

Until Friday, most southwest vegetables found fair demand at steady prices last week. The railroad strike stopped most shipments except by truck. As a result, supplies were slightly lower.

Cattle prices were steady to weak at Houston, San Antonio and Fort Worth but stronger to 25 cents higher at Oklahoma City, Wichita and Denver last week compared to Friday's prices of the previous week. Houston sold medium steers and yearlings at \$13 to \$14.50 per hundred pounds and canner and cutter cows at \$6 to \$8.25. San Antonio cleared top medium and good steers at \$14.50 and canner and cutter cows at \$6.50 to \$8.75. At Fort Worth medium steers and yearlings realized \$15.50 to \$16.50 and canner and cutter cows at \$6.50 to \$8.50. At Wichita medium and good slaughter steers and yearlings brought \$14.50 to \$16 and canner and cutter cows, \$7 to \$8.50. Denver sold medium to choice

### Give Up Hope of Finding 12,000 Men Missing In War II

The Army and Navy have abandoned virtually all hope of finding more than 12,000 missing men for whom extensive search has been made in many parts of the world, particularly since the war's end.

The search will continue but the War and Navy departments said in a joint statement that reports from overseas commanders indicated that "there remains little or no possibility of finding any except a few who have been missing less than 60 days or were deliberately absent without authority."

The Army in its most recent reports listed 7,814 as missing along with 3,083 "unrecovered from captivity."

The Navy carries 1,103 missing, the Marines 86, and the Coast Guard 97.
