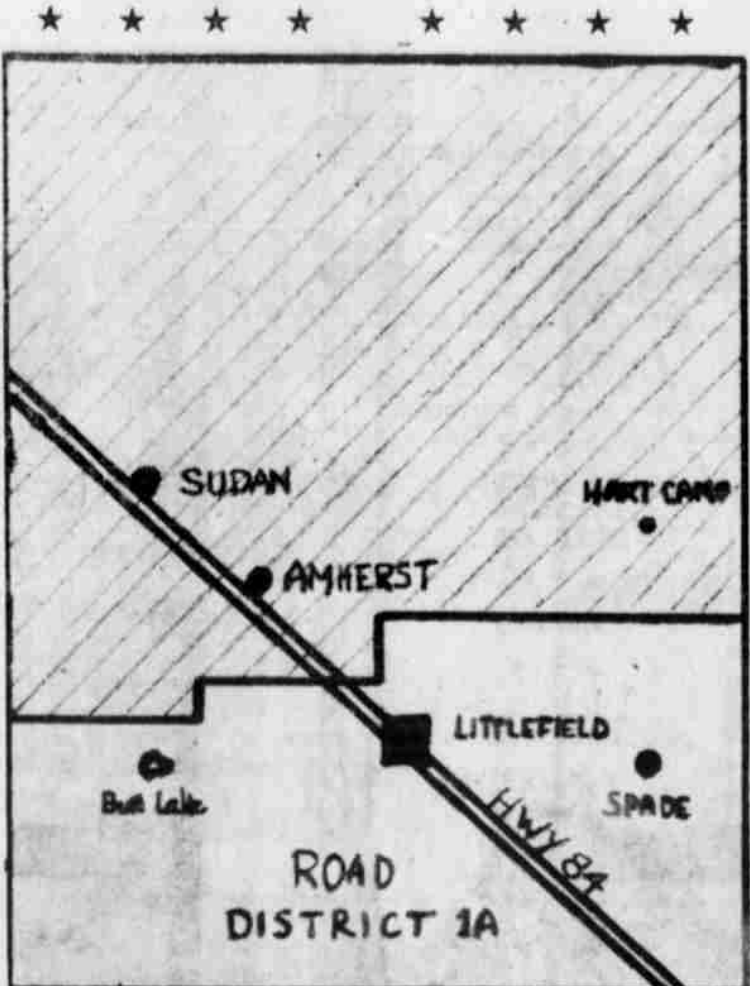

### BULLETIN Clement To Talk In Sudan

SUDAN (294) — Governor Frank Clement of Tennessee, dynamic keynote speaker at the Democratic National Convention, has accepted an invitation to speak at Sudan's annual Fall Festival Friday Sept. 28.  
F. O. Masten, prominent Sudan area farmer and rancher, made the announcement Wednesday afternoon that Clement will make his appearance and address at 7:30 p.m. that day.  
Masten said the appearance is part of the state's drive for contributions for the national democratic party campaign fund. He is asking farmers to bring 100-lb sacks of grain as contributions to the fund.  
Hundreds of sacks of grain, beef steers and bales of cotton have already been donated, according to Masten.  
Clement's talk will be the feature of the Fall Festival (Continued on Page 2)



ROAD DISTRICT 1-A voters will decide Saturday whether their district should authorize bonds to purchase right-of-way for widening Highway 84 to four lanes within the district. If you live within the district, if you are a property owner and if you have paid your poll tax, you are a qualified voter. Starting at the west county line on the map, the district is bounded by a line going east from the north side of league 212. The boundary jogs at leagues four and five then continues east, cutting through leagues 661 and 660. It jumps to the north again in league 659 and then continues directly east from the north side of league 659 until it reaches the east county line.

### WHERE, WHEN TO VOTE

Polls for the \$275,000 Highway 84 bond election open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Saturday.  
Ballot boxes will be located in these five precincts:  
1. Pep box — C. H. Clevinger residence, Vic Diersing, presiding judge.  
2. West Littlefield box — Lumsden-Perkins gin, W. O. Hampton, presiding judge.  
3. South Littlefield — Lamb County Courthouse, Arthur Jones, presiding judge.  
4. Spade box — Spade School House, Albert Lockwood presiding judge.  
5. North Littlefield box — Library of High School Building, Bruce Porcher, presiding judge.  
Qualified voters are those property-tax and poll-tax paying voters residing within Road District 1-A.

### State To Begin At Once If Right-Of-Way Okayed

Lamb County voters in Road District 1-A make another familiar trip to the polls Saturday, this time to decide whether the southern part of the county will pave the way for a finer, more modern Highway 84.  
By now veterans in voting procedure due to a rush of recent elections, southern Lamb County citizens take a second look at whether bonds should be voted for right-of-way to widen Highway 84 to four lanes.

It was just 90 days ago that voters all over the county balloted on a similar proposal. In that election, road district 1-A residents went for the issue by almost 4-1.  
But heavy voting in Olton, Earth and Springlake against the bond election sent the ill-fated project down to defeat.  
Assuming this district's voters feel the same way they did just three months ago about progress, safety and four-lane roads, the outlook for Saturday is optimistic ... especially since 1-A's voters can do the job for one-half the tax money it would have cost them in the first election.  
Chamber of commerce highway committee members have placed the program before local civic clubs this week in a combined effort to inform the citizen of what is at stake and to get out the vote.  
They have been optimistic over the \$275,000 proposal to buy right-of-way, but have warned against complacency.  
Saturday's ballot will read, in effect, "FOR" or "AGAINST" the issuance of bonds and the levying of the tax for their payment. The bonds total \$275,000 — and the money would go for buying right-of-way only for widening Highway 84 within Road District 1-A.

Road district 1-A covers almost a third of Lamb County, as pictured in the map on this page. The district's tax rate, now 80c per \$100 assessed valuation, would be raised 12 1/2% if the bond issue passes. That would raise the property owner's taxes to 92 1/2c for the next five years, but county commissioners have said that the rate can be dropped to 50c after the first five years, because part of the district's now outstanding bonds will be paid by that time.  
In terms of dollars and cents, the property owners now paying \$10 a year in taxes to the road district would pay \$11.56 annually or if he is now paying \$50 a year, his new rate would be \$57.80 a year, if the bonds are voted.  
If the \$275,000 in right-of-way bonds are voted, the state highway department has said that widening work will begin immediately on a strip east of Littlefield. State funds totaling about \$750,000 are ready and waiting for the district to buy right-of-way to widen 84 from a point two miles east of Littlefield to the Hockley County line.

If right-of-way isn't okayed in this election, officials believe the state's money will be allocated elsewhere, thus putting Lamb County "years behind" in an effort to obtain modern, four-lane roads.  
State funds still are not available for the highway through the rest of the road district, which extends northward to a point four miles northwest of Littlefield. The bond money, however, includes right-of-way for the complete length of Highway 84 through the road district, and it is believed that state funds for widening the rest of 84 in the district would be forthcoming soon after the first part of the road work is completed.  
When 84 is widened through the rest of the district, it will go around Littlefield to the south through present airport land and join the road's present route northwest of Littlefield.  
If the bond issue passes, the present route of 84 through Littlefield's business district also will be widened to four lanes, but without a center divider.  
All of the rest of the highway's route would be a divided four-lane set-up, however.  
That, plus improved Highway 51, would give this road district more than 25 miles of four-lane super highways.

### Violators Pay Heavy Fines In County Court

About \$3800 was paid in fines and court costs early this week as the fall term of County Court got underway.  
The court, with County Judge Robert Kirk presiding, handled 20 cases, but only one of them went before a jury.  
Pleas of guilty were entered in 18 liquor law violation cases and fines ranged from \$100 to \$500 for each case plus court costs amounting to \$32.75.  
A plea of guilty was entered also on a lone aggravated assault charge.  
The only jury trial came when a plea of not guilty was filed on a liquor law violation. The jury found the accused not guilty.  
Composing the jury for the trial were Elton Hauk of Littlefield, T. W. Hackler of R. 1 Hart, Glenn Batson of Amherst, Wayne Brown of Sudan, J. W. Gosdin of Sudan and Mrs. George Harmon of Amherst.  
Two civil cases are set for the court today, and Judge Kirk said the cases will close out the present term of the court.

The grid pitch is high and tickets are going fast, according to School Secretary Sid Hopping. Hopping said Wednesday that only a few reserve seat tickets are left on the Littlefield side and that Olton has asked for more tickets on its side of the stadium. School officials say the game will be a complete sellout.  
The pep rally is scheduled to take place in front of the First National Bank building under the sponsorship of the local Quarterback Club.  
Mackey Greer, president of the club, said Wednesday that the entire high school student body and band will be on hand for the rally.  
Greer also said the club is starting a membership drive and that dues have been reduced from \$5.00 a year to \$1.00. About 35 attended a Tuesday meeting of the club, in which members voted to pay for members' travel to pay for towels for the Junior High team. Wildcat cridders also saw the club's film of the Plainview game this week, he announced.

## Spend-Save

Medical men say you could sell the human body for its chemicals for about \$1.65.  
Most of us wouldn't sell our lives for a million dollars. And we wouldn't have anyone sell it for us, either.  
Road District 1-A voters will be asked for a few dollars Saturday — a few dollars that could mean the difference between life and death.  
Four-lane roads will save you time and money — and in the final analysis, they may save your life. They eliminate the killer-accident that few survive — the head-on collision. Four-lane roads will let your family travel safely and quickly.  
They will bring the customer to your store and send him home safely so that he can come back for more.  
You and your neighbor have a stake in Saturday's election. If you believe your dollar is worth something more than 100 pennies, that it is worth buying a life — you are obligated to vote in Saturday's election. Your neighbor's vote is important too — remind him.  
You can bet that those who oppose four-lane highways will turn out Saturday. It always is easier to oppose — nothing is perfect and faults are not hard to find.  
But if we are to progress, if we are to provide the safety that EVERY Lamb County citizen wants when he climbs behind the steering wheel, it's time for us to forget the dollar and do something for our own good and the good of everyone else in the district, the county and the state.  
One man said this week that he will pay only \$1.50 more a year in taxes if the election passes. He quickly added that he would be glad to spend it on a four-lane road, even if it did no more than make his driving convenient.  
We think a lot of Road District 1-A's citizens will feel that way Saturday and that they will spend money to save lives.

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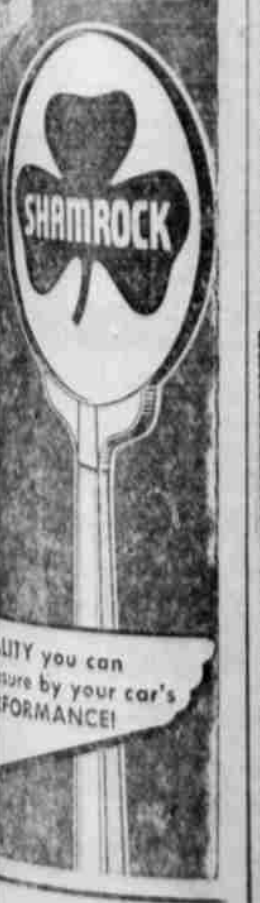

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### No Injuries Sustained In Smash-up

No injuries resulted from the two-car crash occurring Sunday evening about 7:15 p.m. at the intersection of a farm road and Highway 84 near Bainer Switch. Frank Butler, a Negro, was driving a 1948 sedan toward Little-

field. Tranquillo Estrado, driving a 1952 automobile, headed north, attempted a left turn onto Highway 84, striking the Butler car. A Texas Highway Patrol unit investigating the accident was informed by witnesses that the car driven by Estrado left the scene of the accident without stopping. Estrado was apprehended in less than an hour. Charges of failure to grant right-of-way, driving while intoxicated, and hit-and-run were filed against Estrado. He

entered a plea of not guilty to all charges with the exception of DWI. Trial was held Tuesday morning in County Court and Estrado was fined \$150 plus costs, totaling \$182.75, for DWI. The same day, Estrado was tried in Justice Court on two counts, hit-and-run and failure to yield right of way. A fine of \$100 and costs of \$15.50 was assessed on the former charge and \$50.00 plus \$15.50 costs on the latter.

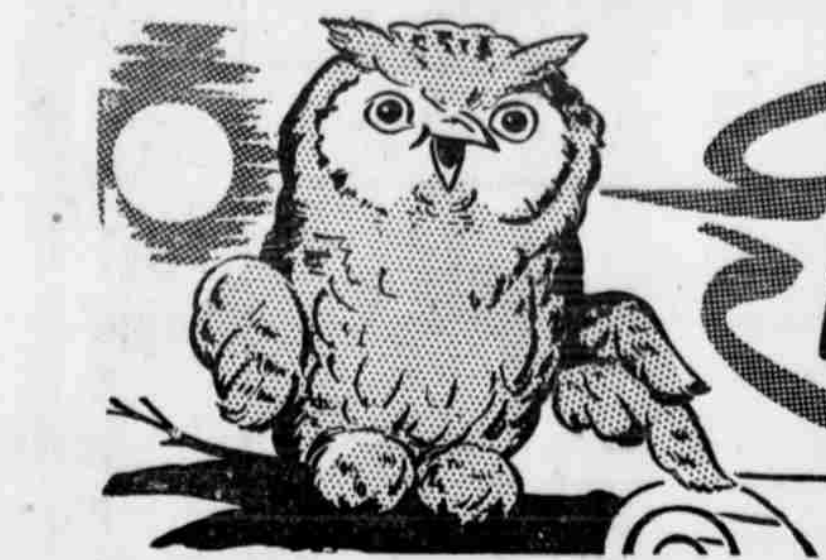

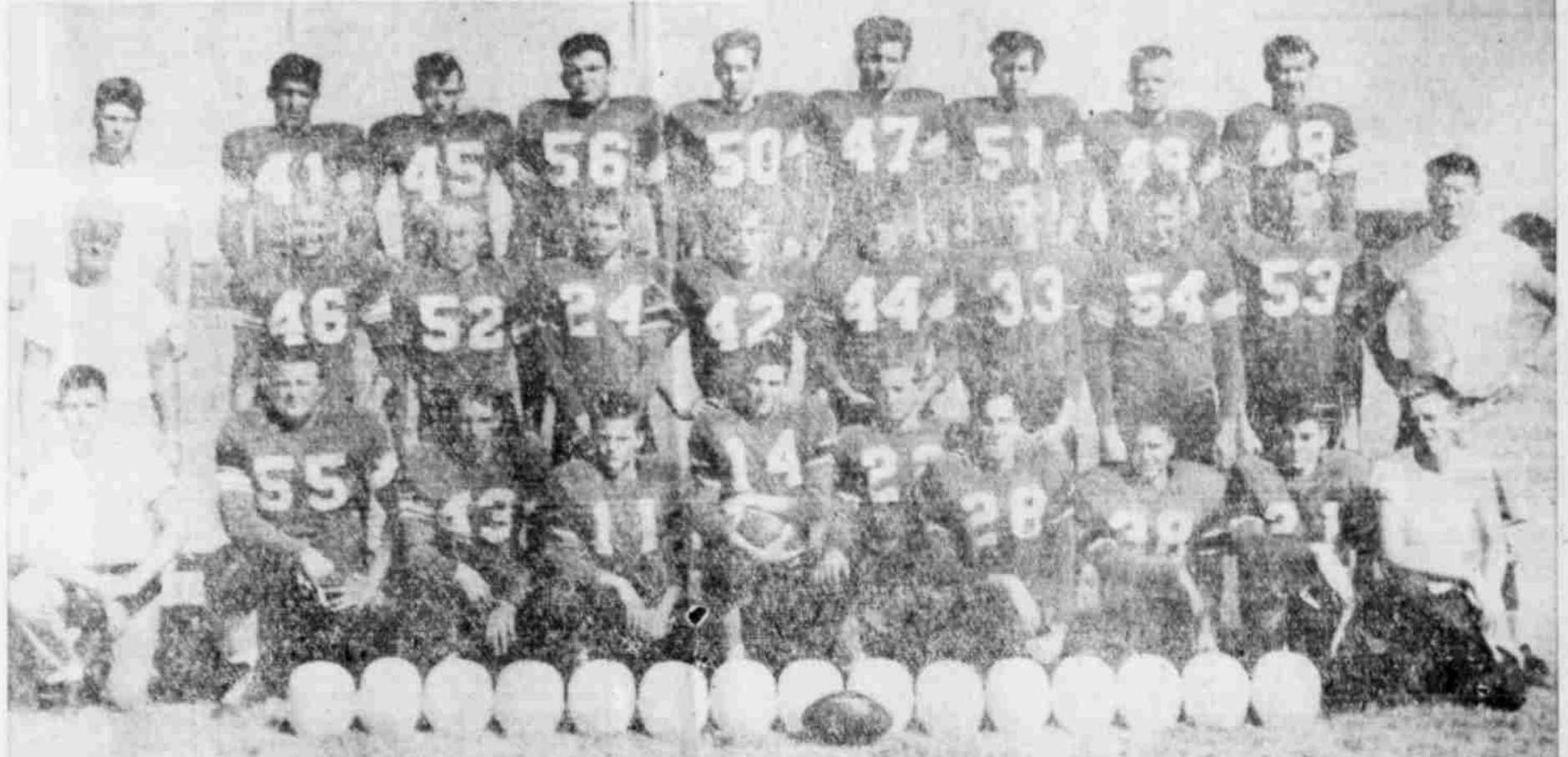

## Wildcat-Olton Grid Rivalry Has Been Long And Fierce

BY JIMMIE W. CHAPMAN

When Olton tangles with the Littlefield Wildcats Friday night at Seely Stadium, one of the oldest and fiercest rivalries in football on the South Plains will be fought before what should be the largest crowd ever to witness the game.

Looking back over the games played in the past fifteen years, there have been close ones, big scores and individual stars that have made themselves part of football history for the two schools.

### 1941 WAS BEST VICTORY

In 1941 in a game played at Littlefield, the Mustangs were heavily favored to win the contest and with it the North Half of District 4-A. The Mustangs had beaten the Cats two years previously and had in their backfield, two of the best scoring punches on the South Plains, the Hedco twins, William and Willis and the game was played before a packed house.

Littlefield took over from the beginning and with backs Gene Clark, Jimmy Vadenburgh, Roy Allen, Henson, Babe Hammons, Floyd Hoberg and a host of others, the Wildcats quickly jumped into a lead and beat the Mustangs 34-0 in one of the biggest upset victories of the series.

To top this off, Gene Clark ran one yard back through the center line to score but that was called back and an offside penalty was given to the Wildcats.

Littlefield won the North Half of the District that year and Coach Abe Martin and W. T. Sawyer lost to a powerful Howard's team in the District game.

None of the winners from either Olton or Littlefield got a chance to further their football career in college off of that team because the war hit in December and Olton and Littlefield lost some great men to the war. Four members of the 1941 Littlefield Wildcats were killed, all those being John Dunbar, Babe Hammons, John Henry Chapman and Gene Clark and others were wounded and returned for life.

In 1942, Littlefield Schools voted not to field a team and the lights and other facilities.

at Seely Stadium were stripped.

### OLTON BEATS CATS IN 1943

In 1943 Littlefield decided that football should be picked back up and calls went out for boys to return for practice. No transportation could be furnished by the school, due to the gasoline and tire shortage. The townspeople got together to furnish the transportation to and from the games. Littlefield's coach resigned and most of the time, the team coached themselves with the help of Supt. Williams and some of the men.

The game with the Mustangs was played in Olton that year and the Mustangs had a hard fought 25-0 victory over the Cats. Arthur Hedco, young member of the Mustangs, twice was the one that led to the Olton win. In fact, years truly was a guard on that team and Arthur and I took point the Mustangs on the cross try in January of the following year.

### FINES ARRIVES IN 1944

In 1944, the Wildcats began their rise to power with the arrival of their new Coach J. S. Fines and the winged-T offense. The game was played in Seely Stadium that year and with a backfield consisting of Bobby Lyman, Walter Swain, Junior Graham and Gene Arnold, the Cats won the conference game 14-0 in the first game played at night in Littlefield since 1941.

### CATS VICTORIOUS IN 1945

And it was virtually the same story as the year before as practically the same lineup for the Cats pushed out a 45-4 victory at Olton.

The game was much closer than the final score indicates as the Cats led only 12-6 at the end of the first half.

The Wildcats of that year won their first regional championship under Coach Jay Fines, beating out Mendenham.

### GAME IN RAIN IN 1946

In 1946 in a game played before

a small crowd at Seely stadium, the Wildcats edged out a 13-6 victory over the stubborn Mustangs in a game that was played in a heavy down pour.

Jackie Shelby scored in the first quarter for Littlefield with a 44 yard run in the first quarter and Sabin Hendrickson, one of the best fullbacks ever to tug the pigskin for the Wildcats rammed over two touchdowns, one a 5 yard smash and the other a 30 yard run after Gene Carter had received off 50 yards to put the ball on the Mustang 20.

Doyle Kenyon pushed the lone touchdown for the Mustangs over in the third quarter, from 5 yards out.

### 1947 WAS RUNAWAY FOR CATS

In 1947 at Olton, the game wasn't much of a contest for Littlefield. Littlefield's prize quarterback, Tracy's Price was out of action for the Wildcats but little Johnny Srygley, a substitute almost single handed beat the Mustangs with his passes. Jackie Shelby, James Lee, Tommy Bales, Joe Fiel, Gene McCannies and Jack Davis were the Wildcats making touchdowns but most of

them was on the receiving end of Srygley's passes. And a Hodge boy was the one that scored for Olton, the last to play for Olton out of a football family that had kept Olton supplied with football talent for 70 years.

### NO GAME FOR FIVE YEARS

Then there came the drought years for the rivalry. No games were played between the two school for five years and in those five years, Littlefield was enjoying its best seasons, one of these was 1949 when the Cats won their State

### 1953 WAS YEAR FOR OLTON

In 1953 Olton got back on the winning side of the series when they handed the Wildcats one of their worst defeats in ten years a 48-14 shellacking.

Bobby Straw, Archie Souter and R. V. Alleorn was the trio of backs that spelled doom for the Wildcats. Alleorn was practically the whole show as he blasted for long runs, while Milton Vaughn did most of Littlefield's ground gaining. Dan Howard and Dwan Hoover scored

### the two lone touchdowns for the Cats.

### OLTON EDGES OUT IN 1955

There was no game in 1954 between the two schools but in 1955 the game was again played in Olton.

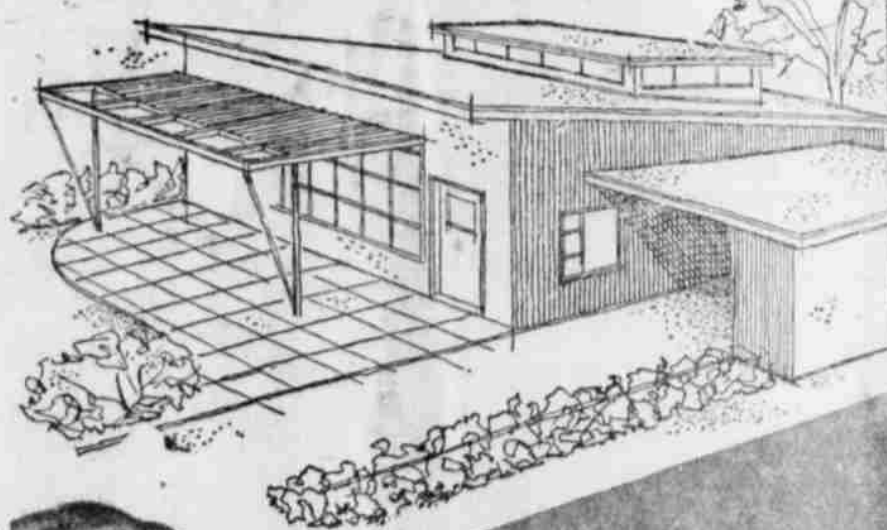
It was an Armistice day game that saw the Mustangs take a 13-0 District 2-AA contest from Littlefield and with it went the right to represent the district in the Playoffs.

Wally Stewart scored one of Olton's touchdowns, a 32 yard dash

around left end and Jackie Gray got the other on a four yard plunge in the second period. Jack Roy Straw scored the extra point by a boot through the uprights.

This all points to a good contest Friday night when the Mustangs come to Littlefield for the first time in ten years. This time, Littlefield has the home field, this time Littlefield will be favored and we hope, this time Littlefield will win. Coach Joe Turner has beaten the Wildcats twice and he has never lost a game to Littlefield.

# Water Conservation Widely Studied

## FARMERS ARE COOPERATING

**By MORLEY B. DRAKE**

There's an old axiom which goes something like this: "We never miss the water till the well goes dry."

The well has gone dry in some parts of our nation because there is no underground water supply, and rain, if any, in such small proportions as to not even dampen the top of the soil. Rivers having their source in regions that ordinarily have a lot of snow and an abundance of rainfall have become trickling streams, or have virtually dried up, often times removing a former valuable supply of water for irrigation.

**Plains Is Bright Spot**

With the Plains the bright spot of Texas, increasing attention is being given to conserving all available water, underground or rainfall, to the end that we will not be in the unpleasant position of awakening to the "well goes dry."

Looking at the Texas and national picture we find conferences being held and new steps being taken, to the end that all water will be made to go as far as possible with the objective that our local, state and national

economy will be maintained at a high level.

**Texas Meeting Held**

How to preserve Texas' water supply and how to use it best was the theme of most talks at a Water for Texas Conference at College Station Monday through Wednesday. Topics included demineralization of water for farm and industrial use, proposed water laws, artificial rainmaking, requirements for forests and forest industries, pollution problems, transpiration, evaporation and exploration and calculation relating to underground water reservoirs.

Few people are aware of the fact . . . at last few folks have given it much thought . . . that so vital is the water problem of the nation it is being studied by such outstanding organizations as National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws and the American Bar association.

**Studying Water Laws**

Arthur P. Dugan, Jr., Littlefield attorney who has rendered conspicuous service to the Plains in matters concerning the use and conservation of underground water, recently was appointed to the Water Rights committee of the American Bar association.

The Water Rights group of the Bar association is collaborating with the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws, to the end that a model water rights act may be prepared.

The National Conference goes further afield than the study of water laws; it has written a number of model codes, which are being used by various states as guides in bringing their laws up to date. The organization is taking up new studies from time to time. The general aim of the National Conference is the creating of more uniform, more workable, and fairer laws in all the states of the Union to the end that much of the confusion now existing will be eliminated. At the present time many of the states have different laws covering the same general subject . . . and some of these laws are declared to be poorly worded.

The Littlefield attorney assisted extensively in drafting the existing underground water laws of Texas, which provide for area control as represented in such organizations as the High Plains Underground Water Conserva-

tion District No. 1 with headquarters in Lubbock.

**Texas Law Valuable**

The Texas underground water law is purely a conservation statute and provides for recharging, spacing of wells, obtaining logs of new wells being drilled, and general provision to prevent waste.

The High Plains Water District has taken many steps leading to the conservation of water. These activities include the following:

Recommended a practice by farmers of so arranging the use of irrigation water that when this water runs off one crop it will be directed in watering other portions of a farm.

Recommended that farmers run excess irrigation water, for example, in watering potatoes, into a low spot previously prepared, so that the water will go back down to the underground water reservoir, where it cannot evaporate and will become available for future use.

**Rainfall Preservation**

The High Plains Water District is carrying on experiments to the end that rainfall can be poured into the underground water reservoir as economically and efficiently as possible.

Several farmers over the High Plains are using their own programs for directing rainfall into the underground reservoir.

The ultimate goal of the High Plains Water District is orderly conservation of rainfall which, at the present time, stands in barrow ditches and wet weather lakes and evaporates.

Many technical problems are involved in water conservation, both underground and rainfall, and they will receive increased attention by the High Plains Water District. Bill Broadhurst, hydrologist for the district, recently returned from a Guatemala assignment to which he was loaned.

- 1 cup fine graham cracker crumbs
- 1/4 cup melted butter
- 1 pkg. lemon gelatin
- 1 cup boiling water
- 9-oz. can crushed pineapple, not drained
- 1/2 cup Pet Evaporated Milk
