Highway Construction To Start

At a meeting held Wednesday morning at the Littlefield office of the State Highway Department final plans were discussed for the start of construction on Highway 84 from 2.9 miles northwest of Littlefield to 1.88 miles southeast of the Bailey County Line where it will connect with the four lane highway.

Attended by Henry L. Stafford, prime contractor for the project, Oscar L. Grain, Highway Department District Engineer, J.O. Boswell of Boswell and Crafton who will be sub-contractors on the project, Rhea Bradley, resident engineer and members of his staff and officers of the Department of Public Safety, the representatives discussed the cooperation of the contractor, law enforcement agencies and Highway Department engineering personnel in promoting traffic safety on the project. Also present were other sub-contractors including E.M. Bailey.

Stafford who was awarded the contract with a bid of \$1,371,000 announced that work on the project would start the first of next week. His firm will start near the Amherst area and work toward Littlefield with the Boswell and Crafton firm starting from the northwest end of the project.

Under the contract the highway will be four lane divided highway with the south lane to be completely finished before work will be started on resurfacing the present road which will be the north lane when the project is completed.

The project is to be completed within a maximum of 19 months from the starting date.

The only portion of the highway, not included in the 16.8 mile project which will connect with the northwest end of Marshall Howard Blvd. here is through the city limits of Sudan. The present highway through Sudan will be connected with the highway.

The contractors outlined the safety procedures which will be in effect during the construction and will include barricades at each end of the project; at each intersection through the length of the project and at Sudan, with construction signs and lights also to be erected along the length of the project, and flagging procedures.

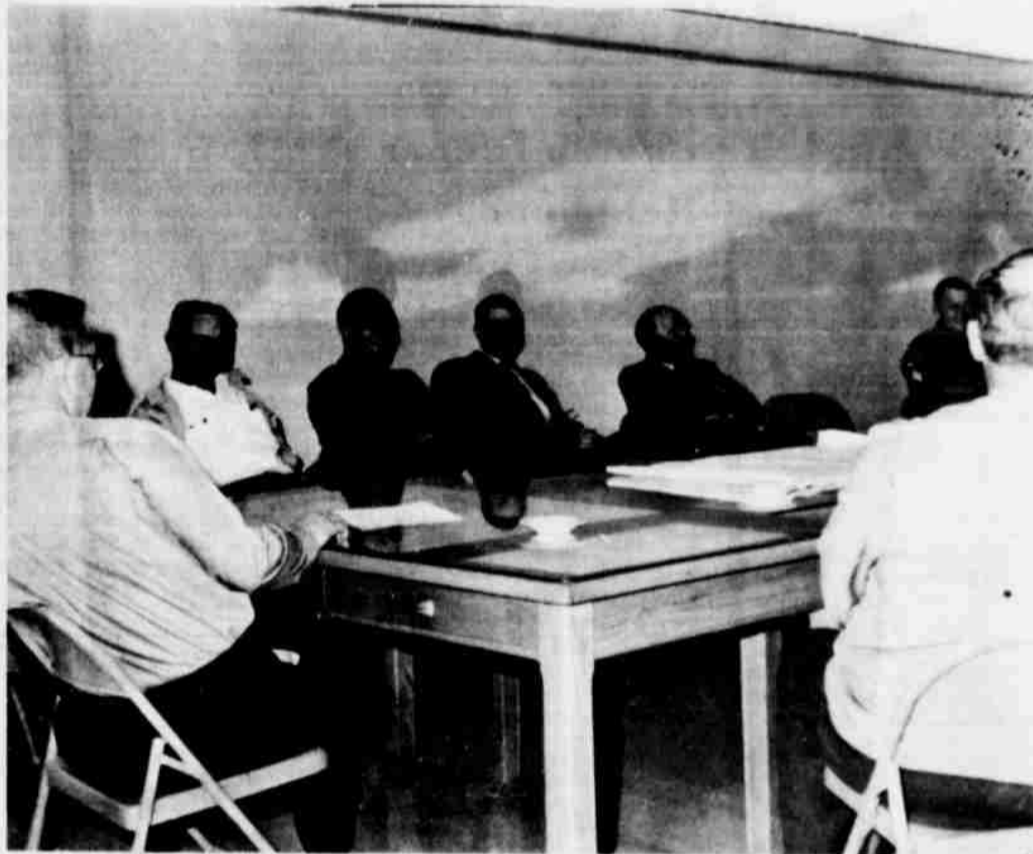
It was announced that at the present time there will be no reduction in the speed limit on the present highway because the first scheduled work on the new south lane of the highway and therefore will cause very little interference with the present traffic conditions on the highway.

Salvation Army Drive Underway

Lt. H.F. Harwell of the Salvation Army post here stated that the first returns from their drive to raise a minimum of \$2,500 during a week-long drive, were encouraging.

The drive is being conducted to raise funds to enable the post to remain in Littlefield and Lt. Harwell stated that the results of the drive will be a large factor in the determining of whether the Dallas office will elect to retain a post in Littlefield.

James Lee, a member of the board of directors stated that if the post is removed from Littlefield in the future the money that is donated in the present drive will be turned over to an agency which will use the money in a similar work to that now being carried on by the Salvation Army.

Building Permits Total \$57,000

The Littlefield Tax Assessor-Collectors office issued eleven building permits during February with the permits totaling \$57,447.

Four family residences with one for \$18,000, one permit for \$13,000, the third permit for \$12,000 and the fourth for \$4,500 accounted for the vast majority of the month's total.

Building permits were issued for two buildings to be used in business, one for a green house for \$3,500 to Walter Choate who will grow tomatoes and other vegetables in the green house located just South of the Highway 84 by-pass.

The other permit for a building to be used for a business was to Roy Pugh for the construction of a welding shop. The permit was for \$3,984.

The other permits issued during February were two for a move in house one for \$750 and the other for \$100, an addition of a bedroom to a residence for \$350 and a permit for \$400 for a set down residence.

Peace Corp Tests Saturday

Lamb County area residents interested in putting their skills to use developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps placement test at 9 a.m. on Saturday, March 12 at the Littlefield Post Office.

The Peace Corps uses the placement test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. (If test scores indicated a limited language-learning ability, for example, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English-speaking country.) The placement test requires no preparation and is non-competitive--an applicant can neither pass nor fail.

The application form, not the placement test, is the most important factor in the selection of Volunteers. Persons interested in serving in the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before taking the test. Applications may be obtained from local post offices or from the Peace Corps, Washington, D.C. 20525.

The placement test takes about an hour and a half. An optional achievement test for applicants who have studied French or Spanish requires another hour.

Computer Service Meeting For Farms Set March 14

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has initiated a new electronic computer service which tells the land-use combinations and row-patterns likely to produce the highest net return under the current cotton program, reports Buddy C. Logsdon, County Agent.

The decision making tool will be explained in an educational meeting to be held March 14, in the Security State Bank meeting room at 9:30 a.m.

At the session, which is open to all interested people, an Extension farm management specialist will be on hand to discuss the new system.

Logsdon said farmers using the service fill out forms to submit information on such things as land, cotton allotment, other allotments, yields and production costs.

A set of forms, available at the county agents office, is prepared for each plot of land designated as an "ASCS farm."

The computer service costs \$30 for each ASCS farm. Logsdon said, but trial runs made at Texas A&M's Date Processing Center indicate the fee can be gotten back many times in better returns.

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Paintings By Young Artists On Display

An exhibition of 75 paintings, representing the most promising young artists honored in the last five years of the Scholastic Art Awards will go on exhibition Sunday (March 6) at the Museum on the Texas Tech campus.

Each of the artists has been awarded a \$100 purchase prize. The Scholastic Art Awards are the annual Scholastic competition. The works include watercolors, oils, drawings, and mixed-media, and were chosen from more than 200 Hallmark prize winners in the scholastic Art Awards competitions. The exhibition will be open to the public in the Museum auditorium through March 24.

The Scholastic Art Awards are now in the 39th year and competition that racks up impressive statistics as it helps artists discover their abilities and interests. An estimated 1,000,000 junior and senior high school artists participate each year, with about 170,000 pieces of work submitted to regional judges and about 35,000 reaching the national jury.

Museum spokesman said, "These youngsters are painters of promise, perhaps the masters of tomorrow." Young artists are urged to view the paintings.

The idea behind the Scholastic Art Awards was born in the 20's when Maurice R. Robinson, president and publisher of Scholastic Magazines, Inc., was visiting high school assemblies and noticed that all of the end-of-the-year awards were going to athletes. "Why not equal honors for achievements in non-athletic skills?" he asked himself.

This year, more than \$18,000 and approximately 6,000 gold achievement keys will be awarded to talented students. The keys and certificates of merit are usually the first honor a budding artist receives. From the key-winning pieces, the judges select "blue ribbon" finalists which are forwarded to national judges.

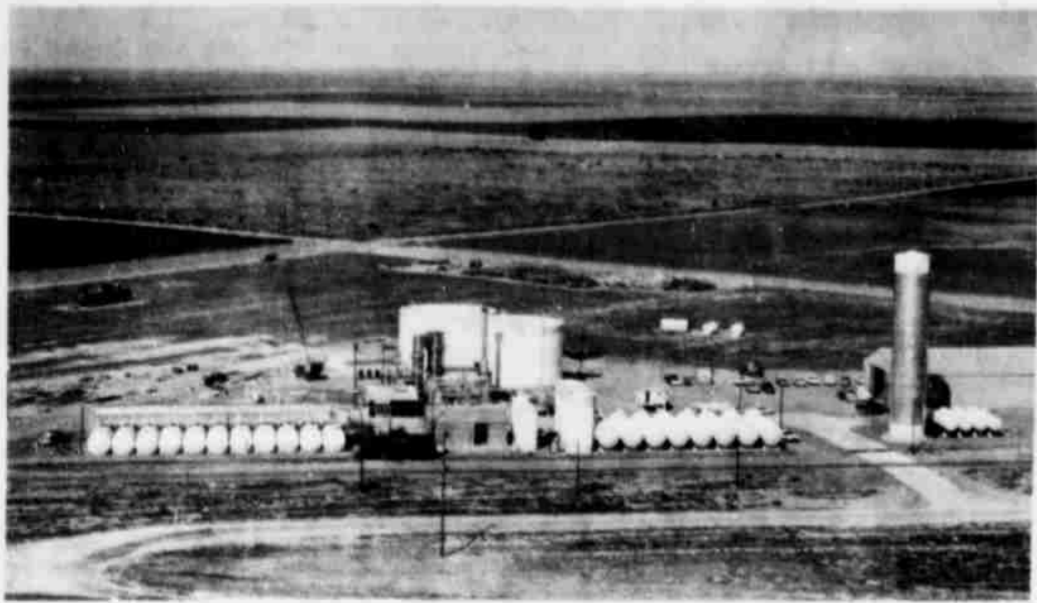
