The 1945 annual meeting of the Lamb County Red Cross Chapter will take place Thursday night, January 18, to review the greatest series of accomplishments in the history of the local Red Cross, G. M. Shaw, chairman of the Lamb County Red Cross Chapter, has announced. The local Red Cross Chapter has expanded its activities at least 50 per cent, possibly more during the past year, to fill the needs created by the war emergency, according to Mr. Shaw. More than 10,000 volunteers have participated in the chapter's activities.

The expanded Red Cross program included production of surgical dressings and knitted garments for members of the Armed Forces, Home service and assistance for servicemen and their families, Junior Red Cross, Camp and Hospital Council, and collection of the largest War Fund quota in the Chapter's history. The annual meeting program will open at 8 o'clock at the Presbyterian church, Littlefield, and will feature reports on various Red Cross services, election of new Chapter officials, plans for future activities, and a general explanation of the American Red Cross objectives. The program will include a band concert of 30 minutes, followed by the singing of "America"; Welcome—Chapter Chairman, Mr. Shaw;

## Red Cross To Sponsor Series Of Home Nursing Classes In County

Lynn B. Willis  
Promoted To  
Staff Sergeant

With an Air Service Squadron of the Fifteenth Air Force Service Command in Italy; According to a recent announcement by his commanding officer, Lynn B. Willis, Littlefield, Texas, has been promoted to the grade of staff sergeant.

Sergeant Willis entered the Army in March of 1942, and came overseas seven months later, serving first in North Africa, and later in Italy. Sergeant Willis is authorized to wear the Good Conduct ribbon, and the European, African, Middle-East ribbon.

A construction worker in civilian life, Sergeant Willis is an expert parachute rigger in Brigadier General Mollison's Fifteenth Air Force Service Command. He is the son of Mrs. Sophie E. Willis, also of Littlefield.

## Decision Expected In Thomas Case Today

Selection of a jury to try Jim Thomas, 50, ex-convict, a second time for the alleged slaying of Dr. Roy E. Hunt of Littlefield, Oct. 23, 1943, got underway Monday morning at Lamesa, before Special Judge J. E. Garland in 106th District Court. By midnight the jury of 12 men were picked from the 59 veniremen examined.

The case was proceeding rapidly late Wednesday, and State testimony was expected to be concluded in the afternoon, and that the argument stage would be reached today (Thursday) and the case go to the jury this afternoon.

Ten attorneys participated in the trial, five to the side. The State were represented by District Attorney Harold M. LaFont of Plainview, 106th District Attorney W. C. Huffaker, Jr., of Tahoka; Carl Rountree of Lamesa, George W. Dupree of Lubbock and County Attorney Bob Huff of Lamesa. Defense counsel included Curtis Douglas of Pampa, Geo. McCarthy of Amarillo, John B. McNamara and Schufert Farmer of Waco and Judge Kilmer B. Corbin of Lamesa.

Sixty witnesses were subpoenaed, and testimony started Tuesday morning.

Tuesday's court opening attracted a large audience. It was estimated about 500 people were in the courtroom during the day session Tuesday. The night session opened about 7:30 o'clock.

Thomas was assessed a death penalty in a former trial conducted last August at Plainview but 64th District Judge C. D. Russell, at a subsequent hearing, found there had been irregularity in the jury room, contrary to his instructions, in dis-

Prior to entering the service in 1942, Lieut. DeLoach was employed by the Texas Printing Company, Lubbock.

Army General Hospitals in this country have fewer nurses per bed than most civilian hospitals.

The minimum for the adequate care is one to every 15 patients while the Army today has an average of one for every 22 with some staffs as low as one to every 60.

Every hour's delay on the part of a civilian nurse in enlisting for service with the armed forces means unnecessary suffering and perhaps death to some American fighting man. We cannot let our men die for want of nursing care as long as there is an available nurse for the armed forces. If you are a trained nurse and can enlist with the Armed forces contact your nearest Red Cross immediately and offer your services for the need is urgent.

The third letter dated August 27, 1944, was received Sunday, December 24, and is as follows:

"Had cake for birthday. Has only five ingredients and doesn't rise. Also weighs a lot but the two a week are looked forward to. Camp is seeing three pictures in shifts. They are Black Swan, Holliday Inn, and a Mickey Rooney picture. We have also seen two stage shows by British and Americans. Classical orchestra started concerts last night. Another tonight and tomorrow. Same program. Still playing clarinet. Some of the players are professionals. Have attended insurance classes for a month. Will draw full pay, including flight pay when I return, which will amount to quite a bit. Have two hour recording concert at least 4 times a week with best records. New books arriving regularly. Wanted to learn German, but other classes interfere."

At the time he was taken prisoner Lieut. Winston suffered burns, and was a patient in a German prison camp hospital 10 days.

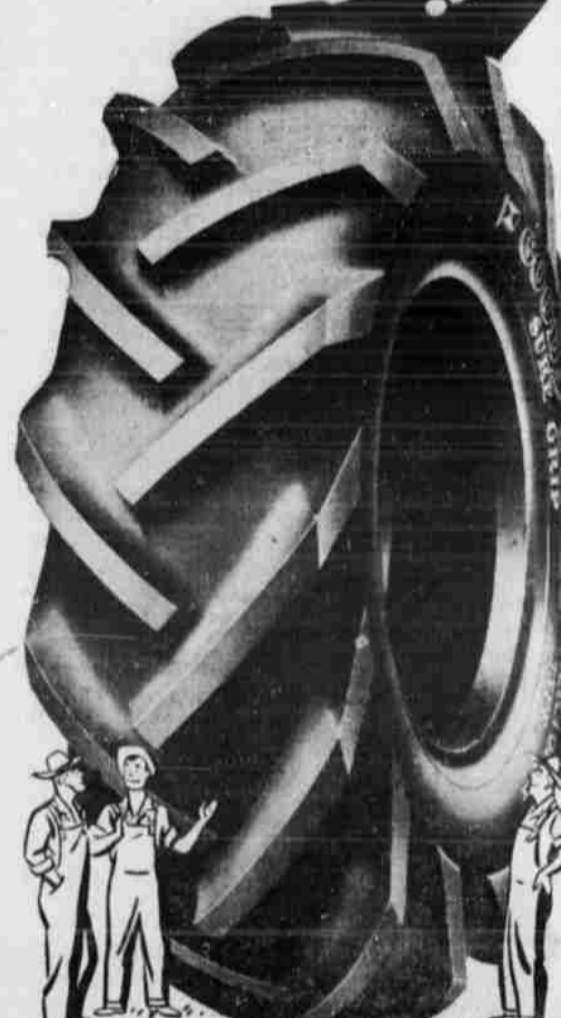

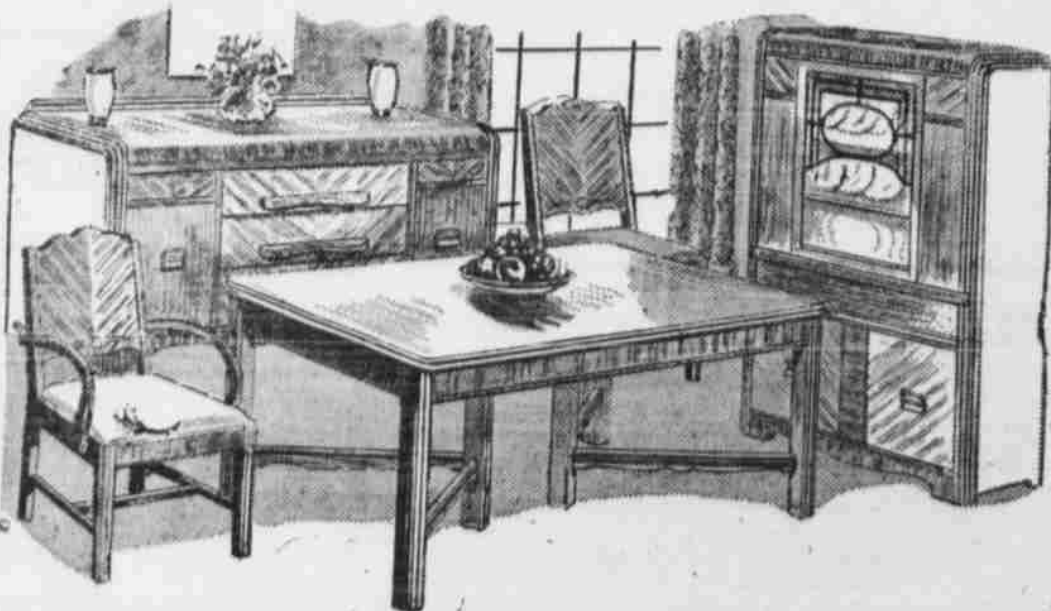

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT

THEREOF." "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF THE BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

Each voter shall mark the ballot with black ink or black pencil on the above expressions, thus leaving no other as indicating his vote. The manner of holding the election shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas relating to general elections.

A copy of this resolution duly signed by the Mayor of the City of Sudan, Texas, and attested by the City Secretary of said City, shall be filed in the City Secretary's office as proper notice of the election.

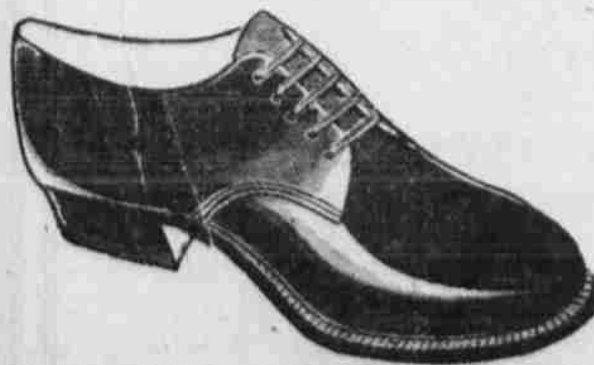

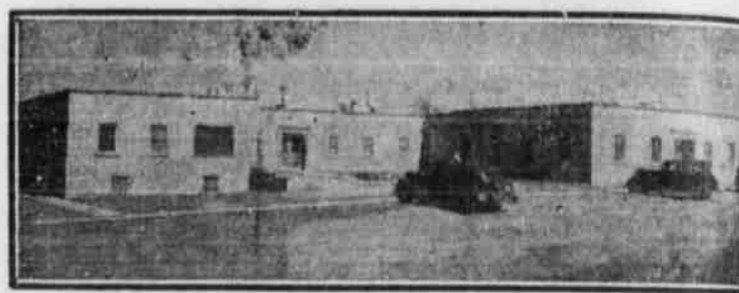

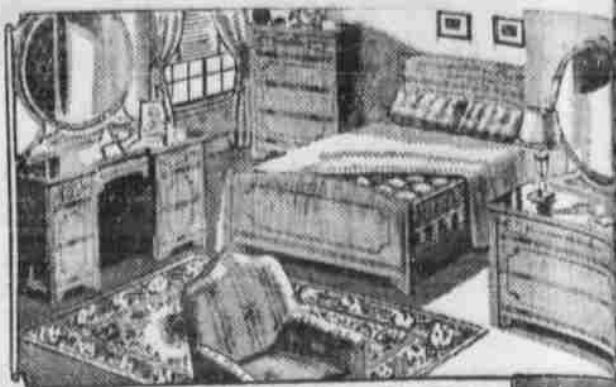

the same, pieces of cord, string, wire and electric light cord cut from the bodies; pictures of the bodies and an open window; and plaster of paris casts of footprints were entered as State exhibits.

Mr. and Mrs. Grissom testified how the Hunt children, Jo Ann, 6, and Jane, her little three-year-old sister, came screaming and crying to the Grissom residence after discovering their parents' bodies about 8 o'clock.

Dr. Ewell Hunt described the wounds on the bodies and said a swelling over Mrs. Hunt's eye indicated she did not die immediately. She had suffered a severe blow over the right eye.

Defense objection to parts of the testimony of Mrs. Hall in the Plainview trial regarding Thomas' statement to her that he "had been called" in a hotel at Galveston a few days before the slaying was sustained by Judge Garland but he allowed that phase of her statement regarding telephone conversations to be included in the record.

Mrs. Hall, operator of a travel business, testified that she had talked with Thomas by telephone in Galveston Saturday before the slaying. The slaying was on Tuesday. Mrs. Hall said Thomas told her he was going fishing.

Later, she said, he called her by long distance from Vernon and said he was through fishing.

She testified she told him "you'd better fish on down this way. The sheriff is looking for you."

Mrs. Veazey testified Thomas came to their home in Amarillo late Saturday night before the slaying, remained there Sunday and left around 4 p. m. Monday. She said he did not come back until "around 8 o'clock Tuesday morning," the day of the slaying. She identified a pair of trousers and a shirt which the State is seeking to prove Thomas wore when the crime was committed.

Her husband also identified a pair of rubber-soled shoes, which the state claims were also worn by the slayer. Fawver, the Lubbock police officer, previously had told of taking plaster of paris casts of footprints near the Hunt residence.

Thomas, as usual, was immaculately dressed and groomed.

Efforts to get into the record the words of the children were unavailing. Special Judge J. E. Garland sustained a defense objection from Curtis Douglass.

"To investigators, Jo Ann had related immediately upon their arrival at the Hunt premises the morning of the slaying: "Daddy and Mama are killed—had man did it." She minute-

ly described a man, whom she said she had encountered in a hallway next the bedroom where her parents lay—)

In the courtroom were observed Mr. and Mrs. Allie Hunt, Homer Hunt, Mrs. I. L. Hunt, Mrs. Warren Bason and Mrs. Harvey Hays, all kinsmen of the late Dr. Roy Hunt, and C. N. Franks of Houston, father of Mrs. Roy Hunt.

A transfer of trial records from the 64th district was approved. The indictment, charging only the murder of Dr. Hunt, was read, and Thomas firmly pleaded innocent.

**INFANT SON OF MR. AND MRS. V. MOKRY PASSES AWAY**

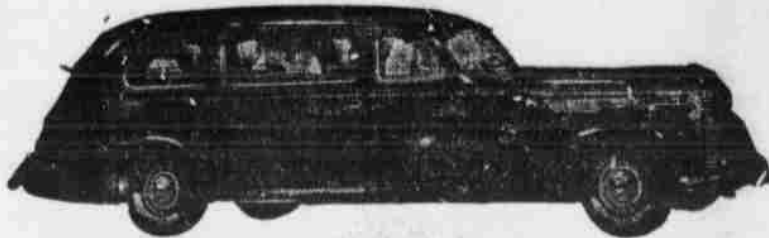
Raymond Mokry, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Vaclav Mokry, of near Pop, passed away soon after birth at a local hospital Sunday.
