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



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

Why are so many communities concerned about obtaining new industry?

Primarily, because when a new industrial plant goes up, there is a new addition to the income flow in the local community. The new payroll dollars roll into the cash registers of the local merchants. into the coffers of the local banks and the local economy experiences expansion. Furthermore this economic expansion if reflectd in gneral community growth with increases in population school enrolmeint and all the rest.

The Chamber of Commerce of the United States has made a statistical attempt to measure the influence of new industrial payrolls to a community.

The study was exclusive of what was determined as large Metropolitan areas. Neither were they adjacent to a Metropolitan area. As a matter of fact the total population of the 9 counties studled had a populaion of 266,877 in 1940 and 322,581 in 1950. Lamb County could well fit into this cat-

The study revealed that an increase of 100 industrial employees with an average annual income of \$59.00 per week is associated with a \$360,000.00 in annual retail sales. A breakdown of this information into catagories reveals the following sales increases per annum:

Grocery stores Eating and drinking places

30,000 Department, dry goods and va riety stores 45.000 Clothing and shoe stores 25,000 Automobile dealers Gasoline service stations 20,000

Lumber yards and building ma terials dealers 15,000 105.000 Other stores \$360,000

Total Doubtless, this information is worthy consideration by any community. Also, it leads to some searching questions: (1) Is it possible for us to acquire indus-try? (2) If so, what kind? (3) What would we have to do to get ready for it? (4) Who would have to work on the project? (5) What changes would have to be made? (6) Would it be worgh it? etc.,

These are questions the Chamber of Commerce, the Board of City Development and the Master Planning Commission and the City Council are attempting to answer. It might be wise to follow their activities: Such a program requires the efforts of many different people from many walks of life to be successful.

The factors that determine what is essential for industrial development will be reported from time to time. We may want to go out for industry or we may not. Your people may or may not want to spend the time, money and en ergy to get ready. Such a tremendous effort depends on far mor than th efforts of the committee members: it takes the work of the people of the town as a whole. You don't get industrial development by writing a letter or making a phone call. It is simply a matter of making up our minds and then either going after it or forgetting it.
