HARD TRAINING CATS SET FOR TOUGH SEASON

Lighter and somewhat less experienced than the state winners last year, the Wildcats are bowing their necks and working harder than ever, whipping into shape for the relatively tough seas ahead.

After 16 of last year's 21 'A' team men graduated, Coach Jay Fikes began molding the 1950 squad from the five remaining players and a number of boys who were either reserves or played in the 'B' team last year.

The first skirmish of the season will be played with Crosbyton Friday, September 1, on the Wildcat home ground.

Broken Collar Bone
Billy Cowen, one of the five Wildcats who played first string ball last year, broke his collar bone in practice Wednesday night and probably will not play this season, Fikes said. Cowen, who has sustained broken bones in past games, was advised by doctors not to play football because of the brittle condition of his bones.

The four first stringers remaining from last year are Bobby Cox, Arlen Wesley, Gene Renfro and Dickie Hopping.

Camp Included
The grid training camp, which began Monday, August 21, at 8:15 a. m., ended Friday afternoon. The boys underwent rigid training, observing a schedule which began with breakfast at 9:30 in the morning and continued throughout the day with cleanup until 1 p. m., skull practice from 4:00 to 5:00, supper at 5:00 and scrimmage practice from 7 to 9:30 p. m.

Weak in Reserves
An unusually small number of reserves were on hand at the beginning of practice last week. Only three boys from the junior class turned out for the grid season. Fikes said the junior class was smaller than other years because the class began in school when the extra 12th grade was added in Texas schools, and most of them in Texas schools, and most of them ahead or the grade behind.

The jump from sophomores to seniors creates a large gap in the prospective football squad, Fikes said.

The majority of the squad this year will be boys who played on last year's 'B' team. The four first stringers, 15 from the 'B' team and several sophomores will compose the 'A' material during the approaching season, Fikes said.

Renfro, a 190-pound defensive line-backer last year, has been placed in the fullback position as the Wildcats launch their 1950 season. Cox will play left end. In 1949 he was used on the defensive. Wesley, a 180 pound reserve last year, will hold down left tackle. Dickie Hopping, the heaviest man on the team, a 202-pounder who played center on the offensive last year, is slated for right tackle spot this season.

Vie For Three Spots
One of two or more contenders for each of three positions — right end, right tackle and center — will be selected when the grid season gets underway.

Bobby Edwards and Freddy Howard, both 'B' Teamers last year, are vying for center. Two more from the B team, Joe Paul Owens and Bob Burnett, will try for right end. In line for right halfback are Billy Gray, Walter Brantley and Don Wilson. Gray and Brantley are products of the B team last year, and Wilson stepped up from junior high.

Bobby Barker will hold down the left guard spot. He weighs 168 pounds and climber up from the B team last year. George Heard, 150 pounds, also a B team grad, was selected for right guard.

Jackie McCannies will be quarterback. A product of the B team last year. He weighs in at about 150 pounds.

M. C. Northam, who weighs 160 pounds, will fill the slot for left halfback.

SECOND WILDCAT STAKES NEAR EARTH

National Associated Petroleum Company has staked another wildcat location in North-Central Lamb County, approximately five miles northwest of its recently proposed site.

The new project will be the No. 1 Ewing Haisell, located 4,166 feet from north and 2,777 feet from west lines of league 237, Dallam County School Land survey. Drill-site is two and one-half miles southwest of Earth.

Stated depth, to test through the Pennsylvanian, is 8,500 feet. Operations are to begin immediately.

National Associated previously was reported to be planning its on 2 Haisell, located 1,300 feet from north and 755 feet from east lines of labor 2 league 239, Cottle County School land survey, and three miles southeast of Earth.

Both locations have been filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas office in Midland.

National Associated has a block of 8,023 acres surrounding the two drillsites.

State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox describes the fluoridation process as a "tremendous step forward in the fight against dental diseases. It's simple and in expensive, as well as effective."

"It won't be a cure-all," cautions Dr. Edward Taylor, director of dental health at the State Health Department. "It won't give children complete protection against tooth decay, but it will reduce decay from 23 to 47 percent."

He said that range of reduction percentage had been established in departmental experiments with artificial fluoridation in Marshall.

The addition of the chemical to drinking water in the ratio of 1 to 1.5 parts per million parts of water now has been recommended as a decay control measure by the United States Public Health Service, the American Water Works Association, and the Association of State and Territorial Dental Health Directors.

Recommendations are subject to approval of state and local health departments, which has been granted in the case of the three Texas cities.

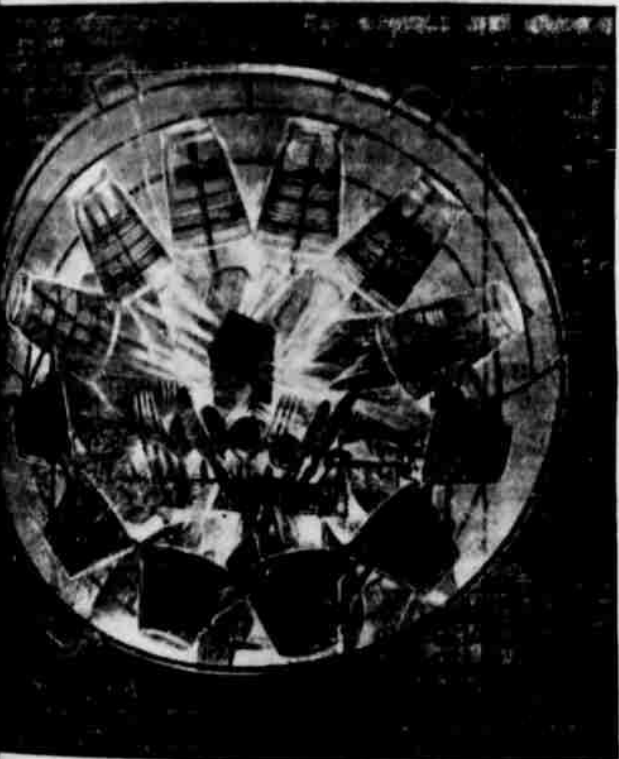

Cool Wave Hits Area

A wave of cool air, which moved down over most of western Kansas and Oklahoma, swept into Littlefield during the weekend. Sunday the temperature remained below 85 degrees and reached a low Monday of 62 degrees.

More than a half inch of rain fell Saturday. With the exception of a very light sprinkle Sunday night, Saturday's rain was the only one for the week. Temperatures and rainfall for the week of August 29, 1950. Monday, high, 91; low, 62; rain, fall, 0; Tuesday, 95; 66; 0; Wednesday, 98; 66; 0; Thursday, 104; 66; 0; Friday, 98; 69; 0; Saturday, 96; 69; 56; Sunday, 84; 66; 0. Monday morning low temperature was 64 at 4:30 a. m.

Despite Infestation Prospects Good For Big Cotton Crop, Says Agent

"Leaf worm is really on the increase, and has reached damaging infestation in nearly all parts of the county," stated David Eaton, county agent, Tuesday. Mr. Eaton added: "The farmers are doing a tremendous amount of dusting and spraying. There is a scarcity of cotton insecticides, and farmers are driving all over

to get it. If we can control the insects, we have a pretty good chance for a bumper crop. We have an awful lot of cotton that will go a bale and a half to the acre, especially the early irrigated cotton."

Dusting Being Carried Out On Large Scale

Considerable leaf worm infestation in the cotton is reported in the Oklahoma Flats area, where farmers are dusting with calcium arsenate. Ray Denny, who has 125 acres in cotton in that area stated there were quite a number of leaf worms in his cotton, but that his 45 acres of cotton two miles west was almost free of insects. Reports indicate that in some sections the insects are doing considerable damage to the cotton, and dusting is being carried on a large scale in parts of the county. Insect infestation is reported to be very bad in the Vernon area, and a man from Mississippi, who was visiting here, stated he had dusted his cotton crop back in Mississippi 13 times.

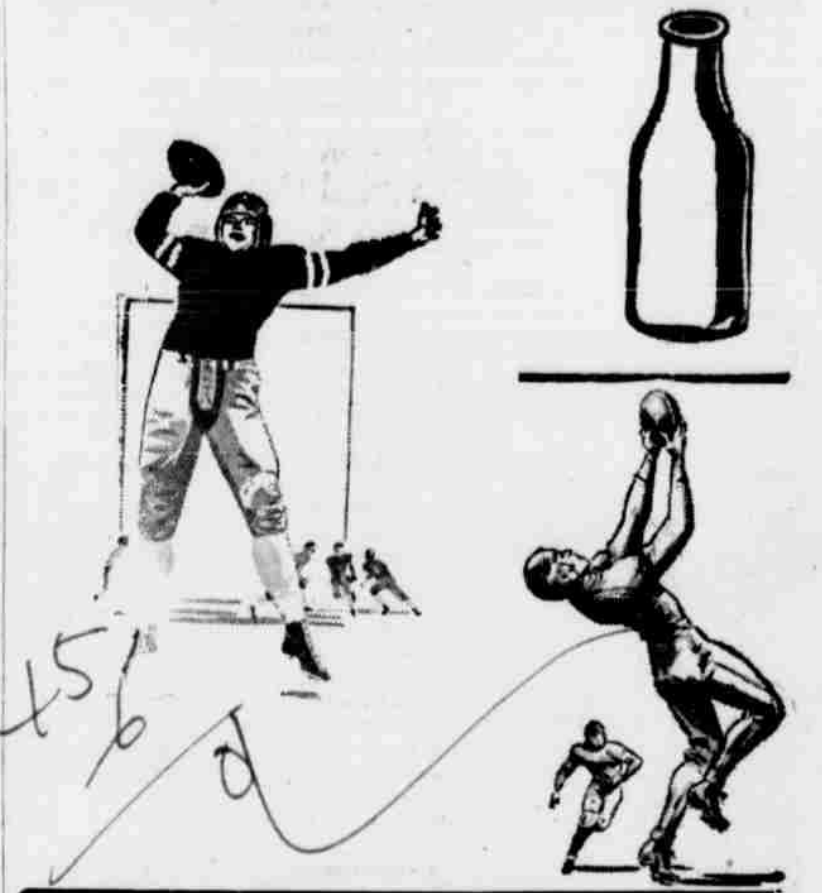
It was stated that the basis for markup will be on a definite percentage rather than on increased demand. Hard to get items will not be sold at a higher price because of scarcity, it was reported.

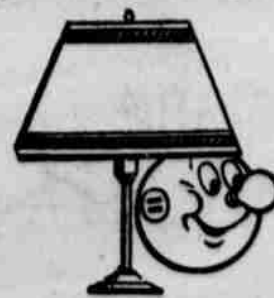

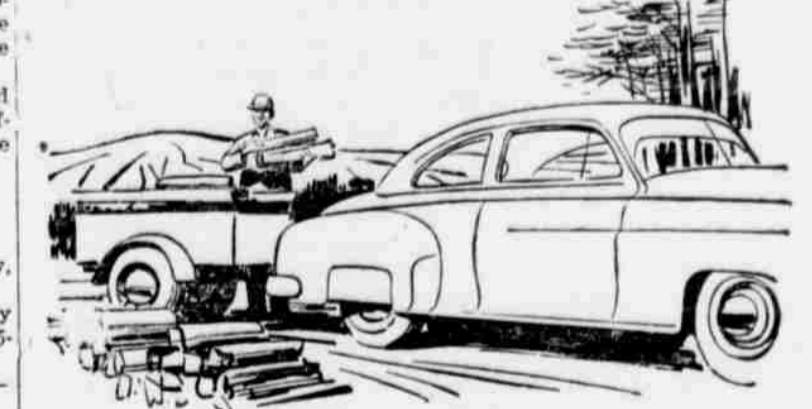

Four Persons Injured In Two-Car Collision Near Anton Saturday

Four persons were injured, three of them seriously, in a two car collision three miles northwest of Anton on the Littlefield-Lubbock highway about 8:30 p. m. Saturday.

One car caught fire and was destroyed. Taken to Lubbock Memorial hospital were Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Moss, 56 and 47, respectively, of 1725 Twenty-third street and two Lubbock negroes, Charles Robert Rutherford, 46, and Ida Sedberry, 78, both of Lubbock. Moss is a contractor for the BMF&P construction company of Lubbock.

Mrs. Moss' condition was described as "fairly good" by attendants late Saturday night, while Moss was treated for bruises and lacerations of the leg and head above the right eyebrow. The negroes were being X-rayed for possible rib injuries.

Conflicting reports were given investigating officers, but it appeared that Moss was driving a 1950 Mercury towards Lubbock and Rutherford also driving a 1950 Mercury was going in the opposite direction. Earlier reports indicated the possibility, however, that both vehicles were traveling in the same direction and one pulled in too soon while attempting to pass the other.
