# **Public Hearing Set** On U.S. 84 Bypass

# **1st Phase** Appraisal **Report Due**

The general design of the Littlefield bypass in the U.S. Highway 84 four - laning program in Lamb County will be discussed at a public hearing here June 10, Rhea Bradley, Texas Highway Department resident engineer, announced this week.

The hearing is scheduled for 10 a. m. June 10 at the county courtroom at the Lamb County Courthouse.

Bradley will be on hand at the hearing to show preliminary sketches on the bypass project.

Meanwhile, it was announced by County Judge Pat Boone. Jr, that appraisal work on the first phase of the 84 widening program - from the Hockley County line tothree miles southeast of Littlefield - is near completion.

The county judge said a ppraiser Homer Robbins has indicated he will turn over his report to the county by the end of May. Judge Boone said he hopes to have the report by May 31, when a regular meeting of the commissioners' court is set




