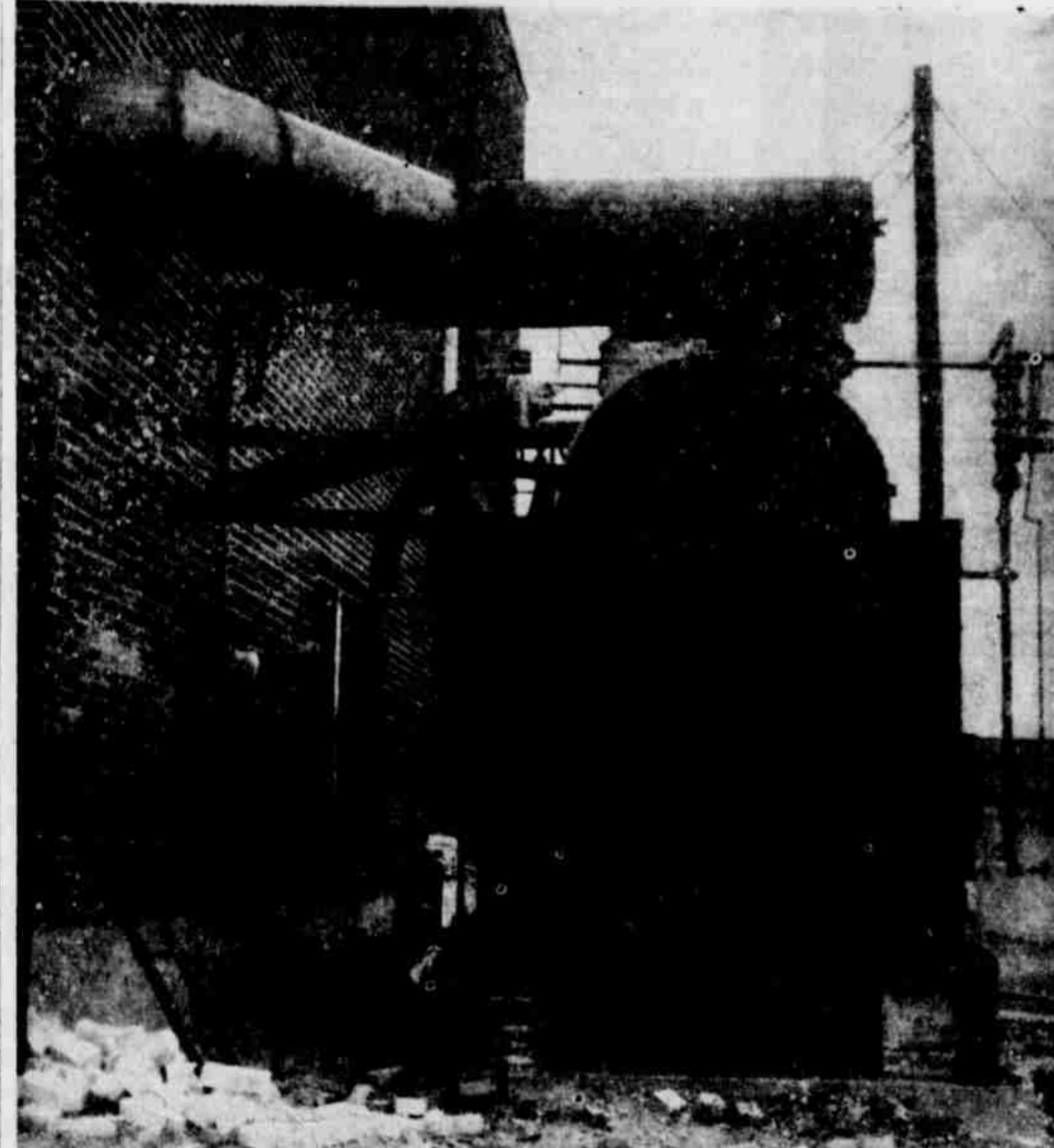

Special Class Plans, Coach Changes OK'd

Littlefield school board members Monday night endorsed a special class for educable mentally retarded children between the ages of 6 and 13, instructing Dr. Ralph Schilling, to make application for the class.

Board members were told of several recent resignations of teachers, including those of Mrs. Ray Keeling, high school home economics; John Crosby, high school English; Kenneth Clapp, coach; Mrs. Mary Wilson, fourth grade; and Mrs. Linda Stephenson, first grade.

Complete official election results by precincts, as canvassed by the executive committee, are carried on page one, section 2 of today's Leader.

The returns show Muleshoe attorney Jack Young the winner of his race against District Attorney Bill Sheehan of Frona and Sheriff Dick Dyer the winner over Loy Dalton.

The district attorney contest, covering Lamb, Bailey and Parmer counties, shows 4,478 votes for Young and 4,046 for Sheehan, Young led in Lamb County, 2,962 to 1,896.

The turnout at the June 4 election may have a big bearing on the run-off contests. Some 5,000 voters — a record — went to the polls in Lamb County May 7, but the turnout is not expected to be that large next month.

Littlefield will have two new tennis courts in Crescent Park instead of one. That announcement was made Tuesday night by Mayor E. J. Foust at a special city council meeting.

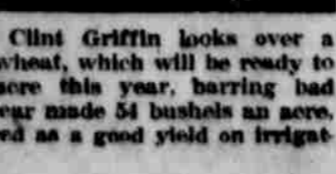
Crescent Range To Open Friday

the school year. Two of them -- Craby and Clapp -- will take new jobs. Craby will teach in the Lubbock system and Clapp will be a junior high coach in the Amarillo system.

The board employed one teacher at Monday night's meeting and authorized Coach Don Williams to employ a coach to replace Clapp. Williams reported Tuesday that Bill Waters, Dalhart assistant the last three years, had accepted the post.

The teacher employed Monday night was Mrs. Iona Donnelly. She will teach fourth grade in 1960-61.

In other action, the board approved plans for a boiler house at the junior high. The board will open bids on the boiler house at 5 p.m. May 23.

The house is part of a \$15,000 program to improve heating systems at the junior high and primary schools. However, the board noted that costs on the overall project are being cut through careful management and that more than a third of the \$15,000 may be saved.

With the employment of the new coach, several changes were announced on the coaching staff.

Coach Williams said Tuesday that Devetille Lewis will move up to the first, assistant spot, replacing Clapp. Coach Harold Gouge, b-team coach last year, will join the varsity staff. Lewis will continue to work with the 7th and 8th grade teams.

The new coach, Waters, will coach the b-team along with Bill Harmon, Waters, about 27, is a Texas Tech graduate, Harmon will be head basketball coach.

Coach Gerald Richey will continue as coach of 9th grade football, basketball and track.

Most of the coaches will go to school or work in other towns this summer, but at least one Harmon, will remain here and work at the football field, taking care of the field and field house.

Taking up discussion of the athletic fund, the board found the fund had less than \$20 in it, with debts totaling \$9,579.80.

The board authorized payment of \$299.05 in bills, leaving two bills totaling \$9,320.80 to be paid later.

The bills are from two sporting goods firms for equipment, towels, jackets, etc. Most of the equipment was purchased after the 1959 football season for use next season.

In the past the board has supplemented the athletic fund with \$2,000 in tax money each year. Part of the recent tax increase levied by the board was for an additional \$3,000 to subsidize the athletic fund. This will be added next year. Advance sale of football tickets also will build up

Building Goes Over Half-Million

Somebody's been overheard." But Mrs. Gladys Joplin of Littlefield, county census supervisor, said she believes the figure is substantially correct.

"It's humanly impossible for the figure to be perfect," said Mrs. Joplin, "but I don't think it is very far off."

Mrs. Joplin joined Chamber of Commerce and city officials in asking people to mail the C.C. office (177), the city hall, 626 or the Joplin house (275) if they were not counted in the census.

"If we have missed anyone, it is still possible to get them counted if they will contact us before Saturday night," said Mrs. Joplin.

Mrs. Joplin told a reporter that the 1950 census of West Texas towns are going to be disappoing by census results.

The new census figures point out a trend showing up all over West Texas. Brownfield, which expected a figure of 13,000, received a preliminary report of 10,700. Colorado City, which thought its population was more than 8,500 received an estimate of 6,416.

Where Littlefield's population was 32.2 per cent of the county population in 1950, it presently is 32.3 per cent of the county population. That comparison does not match the trend reported in most other

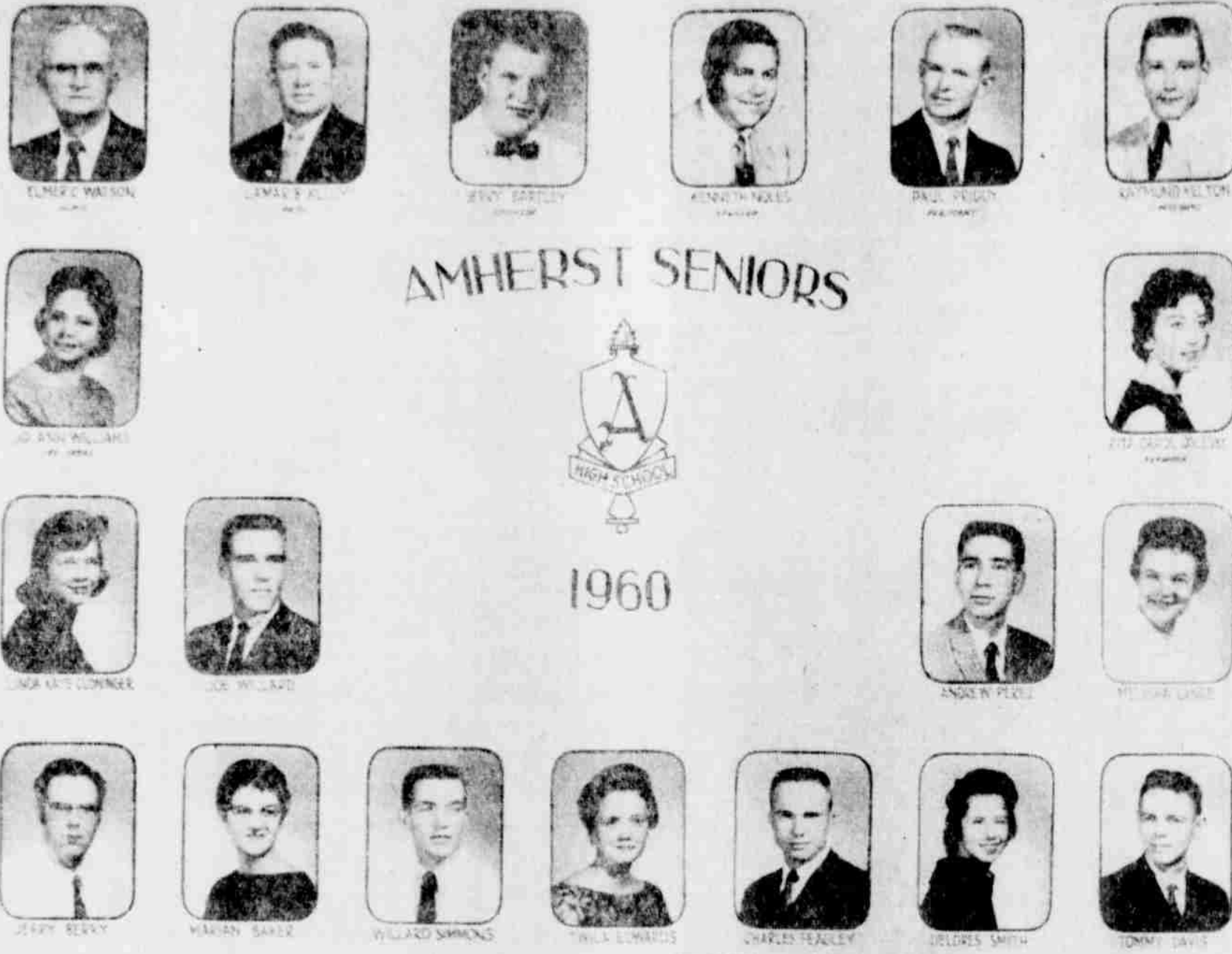
