

NEWS FROM OFFICE OF COUNTY **AGENT**

Some farmers will plant corn crops this year on a small scale. If the field of corn is to be used for both stock feed and human consumption, Texas Hybrid corn No. 8 has proven the best adapted. Texas Hybrid has a shuck that fits very tightly around the ear, which prevents worm dam-

Hybrid corn No. 12 will produce slightly more than Texas No. 8 under irrigation, ,but this is not so under dryland conditions. Mr. E. J. Bussanmas of Rockyford community planted 12 acres of Hybrid No. 8 in 1946, and was well pleased with the results.

In tests, made at 17 locations, including nearly all section of Texas, corn hybrids show an average yield increase of 33 per cent over the over-pollinated varieties.

Hybrid corn seed that gave extra yields can be be had by the farmer at an extra cost of only 75 cents to \$1 an acre.

As to the type of hybrid, tests have shown that the Texas yellow hybrid No. 12 does the best in most humid bottoms. Hybrids No. 8 and 18 have made good records in the central and western corn-growing sec-Opening night for "The Eighteen-drought-resistant of all hybrids.





Spot cotton advanced about \$2.25 Meters Being Built per bale. Activity increased in the central exchanges but slackened in farmers' markets. Demand weakened, as offerings increased.

Tone of the wool market improved despite higher Commodity Credit Corporation prices. Texas fall mohair got started about a week ago.

Grains made even more spectacular advances last week than the week before. Wheat led the swing upward, eld fairly firm, and demand dozen at San Antonio, Fort Worth, as white corn climbed 15 cents; yel-rus fruits improved. Denver's Dallas and Oklahoma City; 35 cents low corn 121/2; barley 12; and oats 10 to 11. Sorghums jumped 16 to 19 cents per hundred pounds.

Feed prices moved up to sharply higher levels, reflecting the upward surge of grains. Good quality alfalfa hay showed strength, but inferior grades slowed. tarded rice planting, but Louisiana farmers are ready to begin. Scarce holdings of peanuts sold higher. Sales of shelled No. 1 Spanish were made in the southwest at 161/2 cents per pound; and farmers' stocks in the Virginia-Carolina area went up at 10 to 1112.

Bulk of hog sales at the close of the week went at \$26.50 for medium weight good and choice grades at Fort Worth, and \$28 to \$28.25 at Wichita. The late-week top was \$26 at San Antonio; \$28 at Oklahoma City; and \$28.40 at Denver.

Sheep ruled steady to around 50 cents per hundred higher at most Southwest markets. Good and choice slaughter lambs brought \$19.50 to \$21.50 at San Antonio; \$22 to \$23 at Fort Worth; \$23 at Oklahoma City; and \$23.50 at Denver. Cattle advanced to new all-time high levels in practically all classes at Fort Worth, and sold at steady t ostrong prices at most other terminals. Cows gained at Oklahoma City, but other classes netted losses for the week at that market. Common and medium cows moved at \$10.50 to \$13.50 at Houston; and \$12 to \$14.50 at Wichita. Medium and good kinds turned at \$13 to \$15 at San Antonio; and \$12.50 to \$15 at Fort Worth. Common to good beef cows cashed upward to \$17 at Oklahoma City; and \$12.50 to \$16.50 at Denver.

Production Credit to Finish Paying Out By End of 1947

Eleven of the 36 production credit associations in Te xas have practically completed the job of returning their government capital to the U. S. Treasury, according to President Virgil P. Lee of the Production Credit Corporation of Houston. The Government now has only a \$5,000 investment in these associations, which formerly had from \$200,000 to \$600,-600 of Government capital. Over a period of 13 years these Government funds have been replaced by capital and surplus owned by farmers and ranchmen who are members of the association, he said.

Definite plans have been made by the remainder of the production credit associations in Texas to finish paying out by the end of 1947. Nearly 30,000 Texas farmers and ranchmen now own \$9,245,105 of Capital and surplus in the 36 associations, which made loans for more than \$85, 000,000 during 1946.





Mr. Caldwell pointed out that a blanket increase on all claims will etor and tank, or in other words not be made but that the standard food chart figures have been revised upward in accordance with the percentage of advance in food prices since the time of the last cost survey some two years ago. The number of persons in a family depending on the aid benefits will also be taken into consideration, Mr. Caldwell said.

The aditional appropriation will allow money for payment of full claims in the Aid to Dependent Children program. Heretofore, due to limited funds, allocations were made to allow as much as per case as possible but rarely was there enough funds to pay the full amount authorized, Mr. Cadwell said.

Approximately 190.000 aged and 5,100 needy blind will get increases amounting to \$500,000 or \$600,000 over the State as a result of elimination of the ceiling. The 30,000 dependent children will receive around \$200.000 per month.

There is an average grant for Old Age Assistance in Lamb County of about \$32, or an increase of \$760. a month. At present 380 persons on Old Age Assistance in this county are receiving about \$12,160 per month. The State has given a great deal more money to operate our program for Aid to Dependent Children. This has greatly increased their grants for assistance. This county has 39 persons on Aid to Dependent Children who are receiving \$1704.00 with an average grant of \$43.70. Lamb County is receiving \$67 a month for the needy blind; however, we have only two cases receiving Aid to the Needy Blind. Lamb County is receiving \$13,-931.00 for all assistance.


