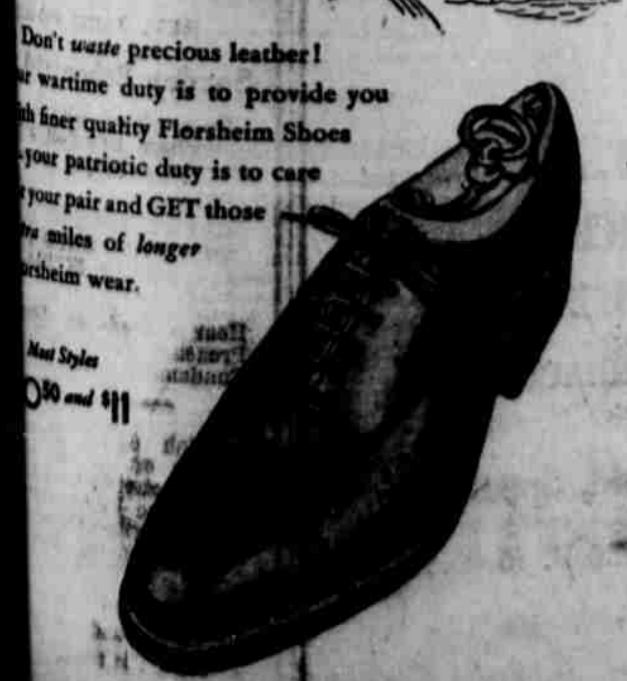

Lacking only a few ties being through, he is said to have been loading them in a car by lantern light when the chain broke causing the block to fall and strike him on the head, breaking his neck.

"B. B." as he was known here, came to Littlefield in 1924 and bought a farm south of town where he lived until about eight years ago, when he sold his farm and moved to Center.

Funeral services were conducted at Center, Saturday afternoon, and burial took place in the Pleasant Grove Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife and four children. The children are: Doreline, Bonnie Ruth and Mrs. Zelene Armstrong. Also surviving are three grandchildren, his mother and step-father, Mr. and Mrs. Stanley; one brother, Noble Halliburton of Levelland; two sisters, Mrs. Floyd Patterson of Center, and Mrs. Eugene Latimer of Littlefield; three half-brothers, one half-sister, and a number of uncles and aunts, all of Center.

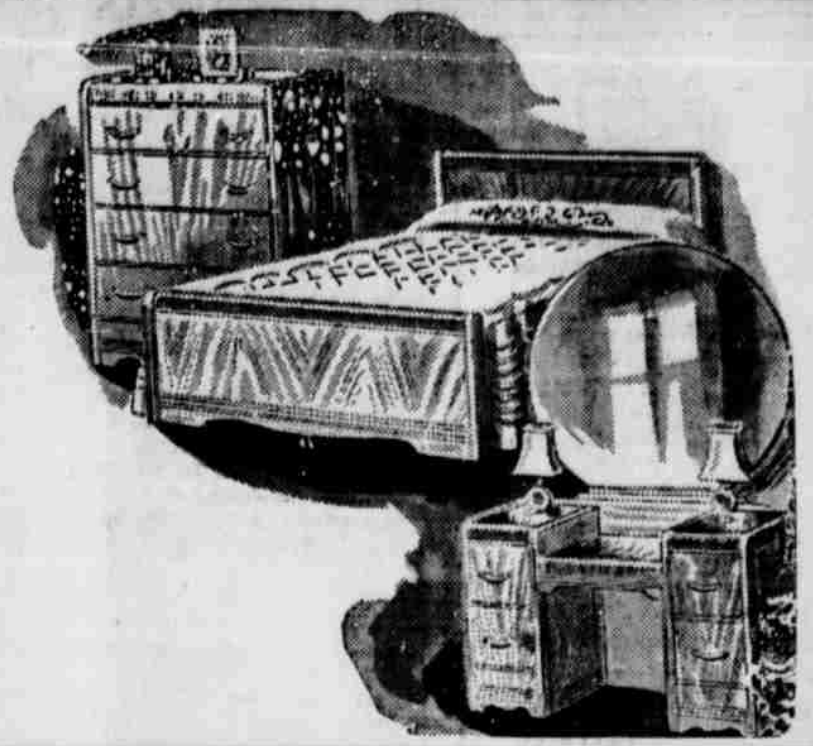

**SUGAR**—Stamps No. 30 and 31, Book IV, good for 5 lbs. indefinitely. Stamp No. 40, Book IV, good for 5 lbs. sugar for 1944 home canning.

**MEATS AND FATS**—Book IV, red stamps A8, B8, and C8 good for 10 points each—valid February 27 through May 20. D8, E8, and F8 valid March 12 through May 20. G8, H8, and J8, valid March 26 through June 18.

**PROCESSED FOODS**—Book IV, blue stamps A8, B8, C8, D8, and E8 are good for 10 points each, valid through May 20. F8, G8, H8, J8, and K8 good for 10 points each, valid April 1 through May 20.

**SHOES**—Book 1, stamp No. 18 expires April 30. Book III, stamp

**GASOLINE**—(Coupons must be endorsed on front.) "A" coupons, 3 gals. each, with No. 11 and succeeding stamps in "A" book lasting three months instead of two of previously. No. 11 stamp became valid March 22 with the expiration of No. 10 Stamp March 21. In B-2, B-3, C-2, and C-3 books, the coupons na-

tionally have a value of 5 gals. each. Other "B" and "C" coupons, including B-1 and C-1, still outstanding, will retain their two-gal. value. "R" and "T", 5 gal. each, and "D" one and one-half gal.; "E" one gal. each.

**TIRE INSPECTION**—"A" book holders before March 31, 1944; "B" before June 30; "C" before May 31; and "T" every six months of every 5000 miles, whichever comes first.
