SGT. CHARLIE PRYOR ARRIVES HOME

Sgt. Charlie Pryor, 25, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Pryor Sr., of Whitehall, Texas, who was taken prisoner by the Japs when the Houston went down on February 28, 1942, and liberated from Nike Thailand Jap camp on August 30, and a patient in a hospital in India a short time, arrived home two weeks ago. He is on a 90-day furlough and reports to Corpus Christi January 1, 1946, when he expects a discharge.

Sgt. Pryor will be in the service as a Marine seven years on January 11 next.

Following the sinking of the Houston, Sgt. Pryor and Pvt. Thomas McFarland were in the same prison camp, but McFarland was moved.

Sgt. Pryor had never heard from his parents or anyone else from the time he was taken prisoner until he was liberated and received the message sent him, although his relatives had sent him at least 200 cards. Mr. and Mrs. Pryor received two cards from their son during his prison life.

Speaking of Japanese camps, Sgt. Pryor stated he had been in Jap camps all the way from Thanbuzant to the Thailand border, and was working on the Thai-Burma railway. He said that since he worked he fared better than he would have otherwise; that he received seven ounces of rice a day divided into three meals, and a spoonful of fish. He said the sick men got only one-half as much as he did. He said that in that part of the country it rained nearly all the time from May 15 to October 15; that in the month of July, 1943, it rained 90 inches, and that they worked all through the rain. He put in 20 hours working out of 24 at times, and many days worked 18 hours. Sgt. Pryor reports that due to conditions such as these, combined with dysentery, tropical ulcers, malnutrition and fever, they lost 25 percent of their men. At one time he reports he was ill with fever and ran a temperature of 107; that they had no medical

supplies at all, and just toughed it out. One of his buddies had a temperature of 108½, he said, and lived. Reporting mistreatment by the Japs, he said that for the least fraction of a Jap rule, the Japs would hit the prisoners with a bamboo stick, kick them, or hit them with a rifle, adding that he had seen the Japs pick out a few prisoners and give them a real session of beating and slapping.

He said they had no medical supplies at all, that they only received one American Red Cross package all the time he was in camps, but that he had seen Japanese troops with American Red Cross supplies, usually medical supplies.

Project Will Cost About \$100,000; Bonds Will Be Voted

A post-war water and sewer improvement program to cost in the neighborhood of \$100,000 is underway by the City of Littlefield.

Work is now underway in the surveying of the City, which is in charge of H. N. Roberts, engineer, following which he will make his report to the City and make certain recommendations. A thorough check is being made of the water and sewer system so that the City may provide for the extensive growth expected here when materials for building are available.

Included in the proposed improvements and extensions of the sewer and water system, it is planned to install larger water lines, some new sewer lines, and either a new sewer disposal plant or some additions to the present one.

Following the receipt of the Engineer's report, setting out improvements needed, bonds will be voted on to carry out extensive improvements needed in the growth of the City.

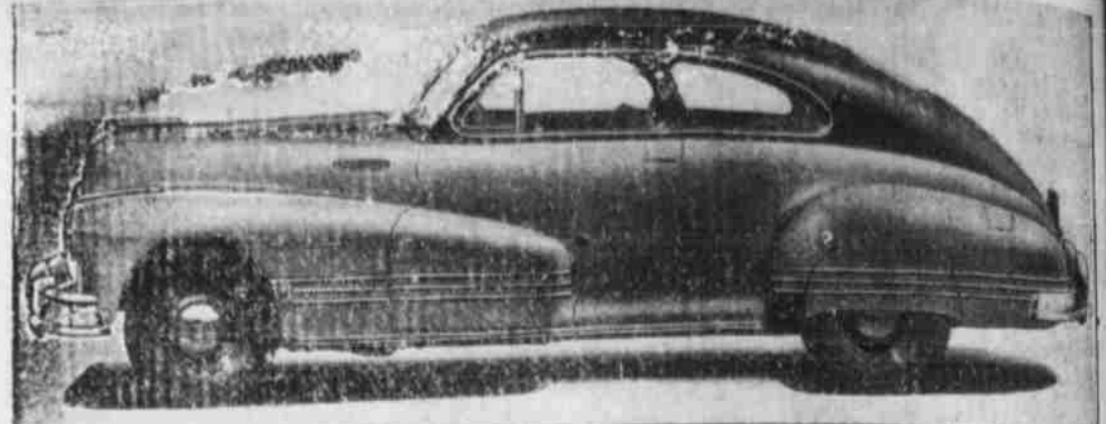

SIDELIGHTS FROM WASHINGTON

By George Mahon
WHITE CROSSES

In military cemeteries here and there around the world, little white crosses mark the graves of our men who made the supreme sacrifice in the war. The names are stencilled in black on the crosses of white.

Some time ago when I was on Tarawa in the Pacific, I heard the Commanding Officer say as he pointed first to the beaches and then to the cemetery: "This is where our boys stormed the beaches and that is what it cost us."

I think the loved ones of these men who sleep beneath the white crosses would like to know that the graves are being well kept. I saw many of these cemeteries and all I saw are well kept and attractively laid out. The one on Tarawa was especially well kept and the chapel of native construction was very beautiful. The principal cemetery on Guadalcanal was similar in appearance and had an equally beautiful chapel. There is a little office adjacent to the cemetery where a soldier keeps the register of the men buried there. Some fresh graves were being dug in the Guadalcanal cemetery. It was explained that during the thick of the fighting a few of our men were buried at isolated places on the island and that their remains were being brought to the main cemetery. It was also explained that the remains of a number of the men who had been buried in the New Hebrides Islands were being brought to Guadalcanal for re-interment.

Our plane did not stop at Iwo Jima but circled the tiny island at low altitude a couple of times. The island was rimmed with war installations, but the cemetery with its many white crosses was about as obvious from the air as Mount Suribachi, where the flag was raised and the memorable photograph taken.

I saw three of the seven cemeteries on Okinawa. In the center of one of them was the grave of Lt. General Simon Bolivar Buckner, who led our forces there, and all about him were the graves of heroes of the Okinawa campaign. There were no chapels at Okinawa cemeteries, but they were well kept. At one of them I observed a little shelter which protected a register of the names of those buried there.

The largest cemetery in the Pacific area is at Finschhafen, New Guinea, where about 7000 of our men are interred. The remains of our men in many of the smaller cemeteries throughout the Pacific are being removed to the larger cemeteries where they can be better cared for, about 50 cemeteries thereby being abandoned.

In the European theatre, the remains of our men who lost their lives on German soil are now being removed to semi-permanent cemeteries in France, Belgium and Holland.

and. Our cemetery at Henri-Chappelle, Belgium, not far from Aachen and Liege, is the resting place of 17,323 American dead. This is our largest cemetery in Europe.

About 200,000 of our brave fighting men of World War II, who gave their lives for this country, rest beneath white crosses overseas. One-fourth of them are in the Pacific area and most of the others are in Europe. Congress plans to provide at a later date for the return to the United States of the remains of these men for re-interment in national or local cemeteries, in accordance with the wishes of the next of kin.

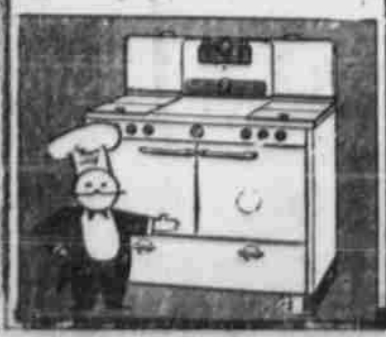

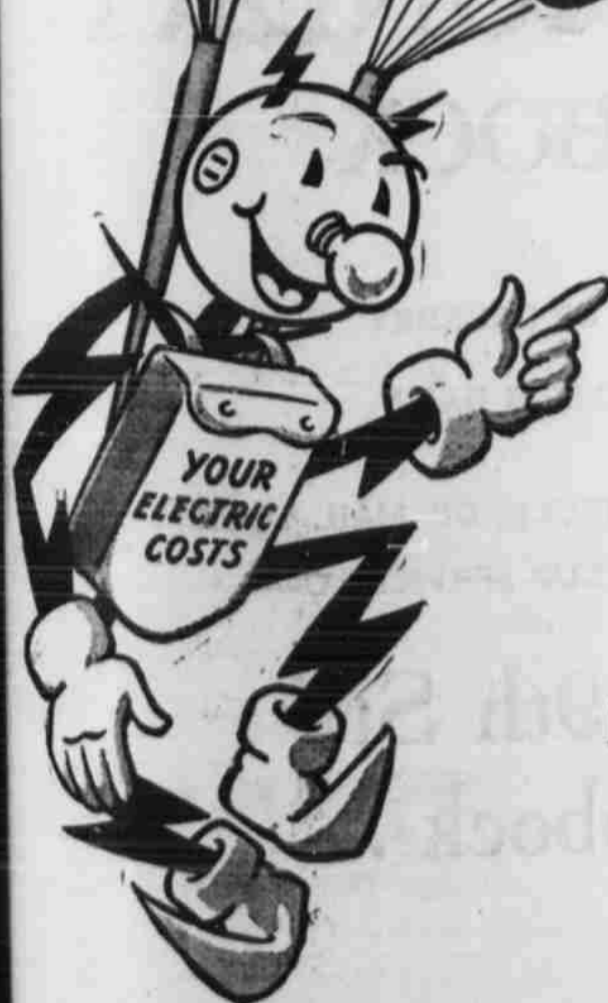

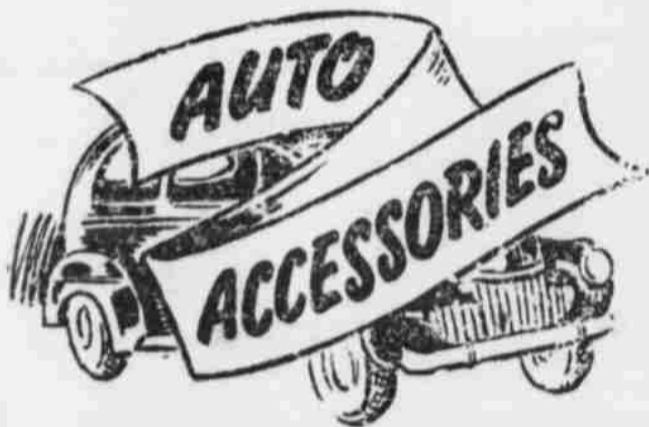
