Consideration is being given at this time to a proposal that \$500,000 be spent in the erection of a new high school building in Littlefield.

Voters will have the opportunity to pass on this proposition at a bond election, which will be called for sometime

To Include 1000-Seat Auditorium Preliminary plans by the school board call for a high school building of brick and tile construction, containing approximately 19 class rooms; a 1000-seat auditorium; gymnasium seating ap-proximately 900 persons; vocational agriculture department with classroom, shop, and proper storage for equipment; well equipped library to care for 90 students; band hall complete with rehearsal room, storage rooms for instruments and uniforms, a home making department with complete equipment for instruction in sewing and cooking, etc., a science department with complete equipment laboratories. a commercial section where bookkeeping, accounting, typing and shorthand would be taught, a commercial woodwork and mechanical drawing department and a laboratory with all the required facilities as well as offices for school administrators and necessary storage and rest rooms

The Veterans Land Bill

By Mrs. L. M. Brandon **Executive Secretary**

We received an interpretation this week of the Veterans Land Bill passed recently in Austin and for the benefit

According to the Veterans Affairs Commission, a veteran to be eligible under this act must be honorably discharged and residing in the State of Texas at the time of enlistment or induction and who at present is a legal resident of the state. Also, he must have served between September 16, 1940 and Dec. 31, 1946.

A veteran with a service-connected injury will be given a 90-day priority in purchase of this land.

The maximum is \$7500 with 5% down and the remainder at 3% interest over a period of 40 years. The veteran can pay the balance off, however, at any time within the 40 years at no penalty. The exception to the \$7500 maximum is provided in an amendment to this bill which states that a veteran may purchase land to a total of \$10,-000; however he would have to provide the \$2500 or difference between \$7500 and \$10,000 in cash, plus 5% of the \$7500, or a total of \$2875 in cash. This was done to enable veterans who have some cash to purchase land in excess of \$7500.

So far as we know no land has been set aside at this time for purchase by

.'In support of your Recommendation No. 1 on priority of use of multi purpose reservoirs-as contained in your Commission's report to the Congress on Federal Business Enterprises the enclosed analysis and report n 'West Tepas Water Shortage Damages and Application of the Hoover Commission's Domestic Water Recommendations' has been made' Bandeen wrote to Mr. Hoover, "The report is an effort to show that lack of domestic water is truly a menace to public welfare equivalent to flood damages and that the adoption of your recommendation would certainly contribute greatly to the welfare of our people everywhere, including municipal corporations.

"There is widespread and militant support in this West Texas territory and all of Texas of your municipal water priority formula and our purpose is to campaign in Washington for the adoption of your commission's majority recommendation."

To other officials Bandeen pointed out that although the WTCC report xpresses the organized thinking for use within 120 work days.



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

The new Straw-Burrow plant will gin some six bales per hour on the new left at 4 p. m. of the same day, and element and about seven bales per hour in the first battery. Operating on a 24-hour basis at the height of the season they will turn out some 312 bales per day.

The Straw-Burrow gin will have a double overhead burr extractor, a new- fering \$1227.95. ly developed cleaner and a drier. This equipment helps to upgrade cotton picked by mechanical means.

Down the road toward Plainview. Bob Caudle is erecting two batteries of four stands each. The machinery is of Mitchell manufacture and each stand has the 80 saws typical of most gins. The project is one of the most extensive in the area and also one of the most unusual.

Caudle placed his order for the machinery and the building at the same time. The machinery began to arrive from Dallas but because of some fabricating and material difficulties the steel building was delayed.

Caudle went ahead with his plans and poured the concrete foundation and floor. Still the building material did not arrive. To save time Caudle and his right hand man, Robert Bynum, started to mount the machines on their foundations and this week the gin is rapidly nearing completion in the open

"We expect our building to arrive next week," Caudle said. "In the meantime we do all we can in the daylight hours and cover the machines at night with tarps. We have plenty of light to work by this way but sometimes it does get a little hot." Caudle's new gin is also an addition

to an existing four stand gin and burr burner. The Caudle family has been in the ginning business for many years, and they see a continued expansion in cotton production in West Texas despite threats of restrictions. At Roundup, the Roundup Co-Op

gin, owned and operated by "Sleepy" Bailey, is constructing a modern concrete block, fire-proof burr burner. "A fire last year taught me that it pays to be careful and a few dollars
