



BIGGER TEAMS TO INCREASE POWER

In general, the more power a min uses or directs at a profit, the greater will be his income, A. L. Young of the farm sectionics department, col, lege of an iculture University of this nois, points out in snowing the value of large texas in farm work

"There are, of coarse, practical lim its to the amount of power that can be used profitably, and this amoun will vary a great deal with the kind of work as well as with the man.

"If a farmer uses horses as his source of power when doing field work, he must, if he wants to make his own time or that of his helpers count for as untel, as possible, use reasonably large teams and implements. Certainly the man who uses six horses and plows between five and of his time than another man who uses two horses and plays two acres

"On some implements, and particularly on plows, it becomes necessary when using the larger sizes of teams. to hitch the horses in tandem. This must be done to avoid the side draft that exists when the horses are hitched abrensi. With four horses abreast on a plow with two 14-inch bottoms there is usually from 18 to 22 Inches of side draft, which is enough to cause both plow and horses to work at a great disadvantage.

"As a rule one will not want to use less than four horses in tandem. If these are used, two in front and two behind, on a two-bottom plow, they will probably have to be kept pretty well separated (from 44 to 52 Inches, center to center of horse) to keep thes line of pull on or near the line of draft. Five horses, two in front and three behind, with a distance of about 32 inches from center to center of horse, will pull two 14-inch bottoms with practically no side draft. Where the ground is especially hard to plow, or under other adverse conditions, six horses (preferably bitched three and three rather than two and four) can be used on a two-bottom plow without excessive side draft. As many as seven horses (hitched three and four) have been used on a two-bottom plow. but this necessitates having considerable side draft.

"In a few cases Illinois farmers are using eight horses on three-bottom plows. This seems to be about as large a team as is practicable unless the team is strung out until there are three or possibly four or five horses in tandem. These very large teams, of from 12 to 20 horses, are being used to considerable extent in sections of the country where farms and fields are large. In the corn belt section it is the use of more five to eight-horse teams that should be emphasized."

Better Sheep as Result

of New Grading Process Grading and seiling co-operatively has helped materially to improve the live stock of Allegheny county, Virginia, according to information re ceived by the United States Department of Agriculture from County Agent S. B. Surber. Referring to the manufacture of grading and sale of sheep. Mr. Surber contrasts the old method with the new. "In the old way." he suys, "it was the same price to everybody, but under the grading plan the best lambs bring the most money. Our farmers soon learned that if a neighbor had better lambs he received a higher check. This induced them to take notice of what neighbors were doing. It was not long before those with inferior breeding stock obtained better bucks and also gave their sheep the stomach-worm treatment. Briefly. grading has done a great deal toward increasing the use of better bucks and toward the better care of lambs."

The local association has been shipping about 4,000 lambs each year with satisfactory returns to owners.




