

Total votes cast was 6,280. It was George Mahon, Lubbock, who was seeking re-election as the 19th district congressman who led the ticket. He piled up 4,714 votes to only 588 for Anderson, the Constitution party's candidate. Mahon was unopposed by the Republicans.

the High Plains Research Foundation in September and October. The objective was to reduce the moisture content to the 13 percent acceptable for safe storage or government loan, without dockage.




