



### Many From Littlefield Attend Baptist Women's State Meet

A number of members of the Women's Missionary Union of the First Baptist Church were in attendance at the 18th annual meeting of the Woman's Missionary Union Auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention of Texas, held in the Municipal Auditorium at Lubbock Thursday and Friday, November 3 and 4.

An impressive center of interest used throughout the sessions was a revolving globe with white continents set against a background of midnight blue oceans. Set above a mass of frothy white clouds, it looked as though it were hanging in space. In the blue atmosphere above the world, glittering gold letters hung suspended, spelling out the words of the theme, "The Greatness of God."

Thursday afternoon the program personalities included the International choir of Wayland Baptist College, Plainview, under the direction of James Cram, dean of music; Dr. Edward Doshier, medical evangelist to Nigeria; and eight new appointees to the foreign mission field, who will be sailing to their respective stations in June, 1961. ### Baptist YWA Observe Late Program, 'Midnight Methods'

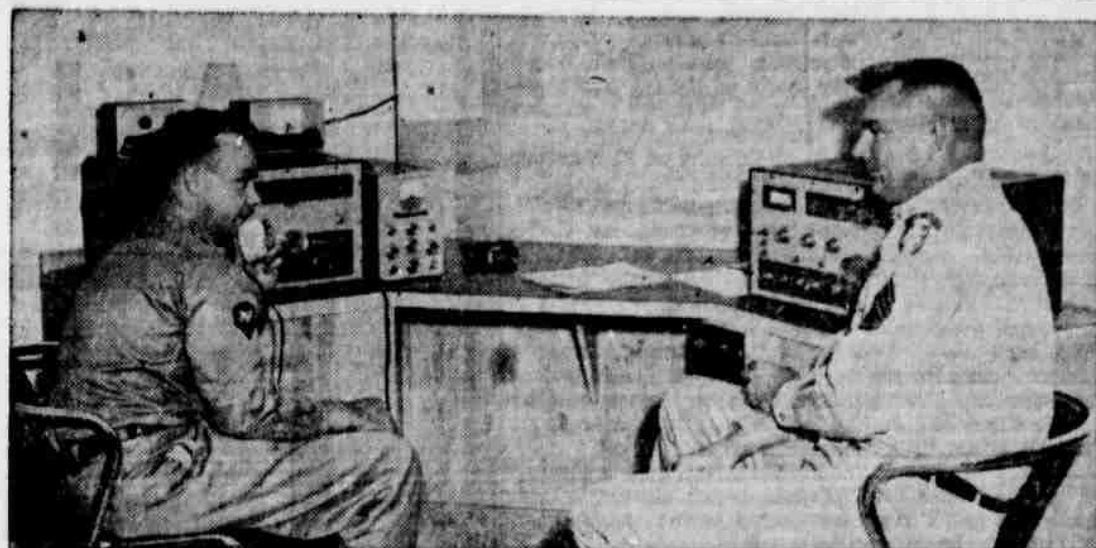

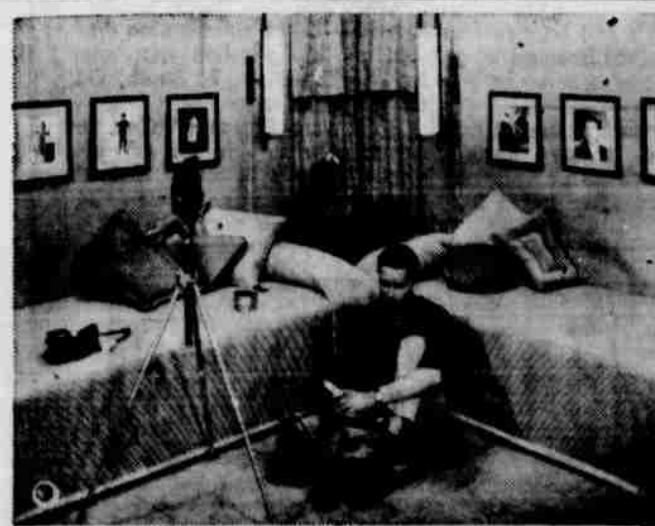

**Bus Route Due Service Here**

City bus service for school students will begin in Littlefield Monday, November 14, according to Skipper Smith, bus operator.

The bus service will run to and from school every school day with students being picked up anywhere enroute. The service will cost the students 10 cents per ride or 20 cents to and from school.

Smith said that the town was divided into three routes with two busses doing the routes. Both busses will leave their starting points at 8 a. m. each day. Route 1 will take about 40 minutes to run while route 2 and 3 will take about 20 minutes each.

The bus service comes as the result of many requests by parents who live far from the school but within the 2 mile limit set up for school bus service.

Smith said as the routes are set up now route 1 is as follows: south on the Lubbock highway, west on Meacham avenue, north on Atchison street, west on Freeman avenue, north on Hall avenue, west on 6th street, south on

Twitchell avenue, east on 17th street, south on Harrall avenue, west on 15th street to Crescent Drive, around Crescent Drive, north on Merse avenue, west on Bula highway, south on Westside, west on 13th street, north on Monticello, west on Bula highway, north on Sunset, east on 6th street, north on Ripley avenue and on into school.

Route 2: start on Elm avenue, east on Griffin, north on Dallas west on Irvin, north on Spring lake highway, west on Cole, north by compass, east on Green field to the Springlake highway and on into school.

Route 3: north on Clovis highway, south on Sunset, west on Burleson, south on Beech, east on Dillon, south on Sunset, east on 3rd, north on Wicker, east on Reed and on into school.

There will be a map in Sunday's Littlefield paper showing the exact route with approximate time schedule.

Smith said that if at a later date there is a need to change the route to better suit the students it will be done.

Four years ago when the county also went Democratic while the nation as a whole was going Republican, 5,177 persons voted. Thus Tuesday's turnout was more than 1,000 greater than in 1956.

Six boxes went for Nixon-Lodge, Olton, which polled more than 1,000 votes, favored the Republican candidates 509 to 455. West Littlefield also went Republican by two votes — 45 to 47. Pleasant Valley voters cast 54 for Nixon and 32 for Kennedy and Hart Camp also favored the Republican standard-bearer 37 to 3. Springlake gave Nixon three more votes in a 100-100 dead heat. Absentee also showed a majority for Nixon, 130 to 113.

In the U. S. Senator's race, however, it was Johnson all the way, only one box in this county favoring Tower. He carried Pleasant Valley 46 to 38.

Mahon, the incumbent, carried every box in the county, but at Spade the Constitutional candidate, John R. "Rich" Anderson received a surprisingly large total — 215 to Mahon's 257. Anderson made his best showing in that box.

One of the unusual situations which developed was in North Littlefield when each of the presidential candidates received 187 votes. Sullivan got 17 in that box. County races were determined in the Democratic primaries this past summer. However, several write-in votes were noted; Billy Hall, a Littlefield attorney, received one write-in vote for county attorney and Loy Dalton received a write-in for sheriff. Don Watson, got two penciled-in votes for sheriff and V. L. Smith, Olton, had one write-in.

John West, Pleasant Valley, received a write-in for commissioner, District 2, and Kenneth Watson wound up with two write-ins for commissioner, District 1.

## Safety Association Lists Bad Weather Driving Rules

Seven rules were outlined today for avoiding "slip-ups" on slippery roads of early winter by J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association.

1. Learn to adjust your speed to varying road, weather and traffic conditions.
2. Get the "feel" of the road by trying your brakes or gently pressing your accelerator while driving slowly and away from traffic on snowy or icy days, and rainy days.
3. Follow other vehicles at a safe distance. You may find it hard to explain why you could not stop when the driver ahead did.
4. Pump your brakes rapidly to maintain best steering control when braking on ice or slippery snow. This gives short intervals of maximum braking separated by short intervals or effective steering while front wheels are rolling.
5. Signal your intention to turn or to stop well in advance, as a means of alerting the driver behind regarding your plans to turn or come to a halt.
6. Keep your windshield and windows clear. You must see danger in time to avoid it. Be sure your windshield wiper arms and blades are in good condition and have recommended arm pressure to sweep rain, snow and sleet off instead of sliding over it.
7. Have good tires and always carry a pair of reinforced tire chains for severe conditions. Tests show that chains cut stopping distances in half and give four to seven times more "go" traction often needed on snow or ice.

"Driving is a convenience that helps us conduct our business and enjoy life more completely," Musick declared. "Between now and March some severe weather conditions will cover our streets and highways. By following these fundamental rules we can overcome these hazards that face us each winter."

**Tech President Sights Shortage Of Allocations**

LUBBOCK — If Texas Tech had received even average State-college appropriations in the past three academic years, more than \$1 million would have been added to its support, Tech President R. C. Goodwin declared Saturday (Nov. 5).

If Tech had received the same 1959-60 appropriations (per full time equivalent student) as Texas' smallest State College, Tech's income would have been increased \$566,000. Dr. Goodwin told the annual Tech Dads Assn. meeting here.

Likewise, if Tech's average appropriation had been the same as that provided for the largest institution in the State higher education system, during 1959-60, Tech's funds would have been increased by \$1,866,000 he explained.

He described a "full time equivalent" student as one taking 15 semester hours of academic courses per semester.

"What is true for 1959 is true to a greater or lesser extent for many previous years," Goodwin continued. "As a result, this College has dropped behind in its departmental equipment and in several areas of service to the students."

"Hence, we need appropriations not only to keep us going, but to help us make up for the deficient appropriations of past years."

Goodwin emphasized that adequate financing of Texas' Tech and other 17 State Colleges and universities will require new taxes.

However, if the public decides it wants quality education and the resulting benefits, a way will be found to finance the effort, he predicted.

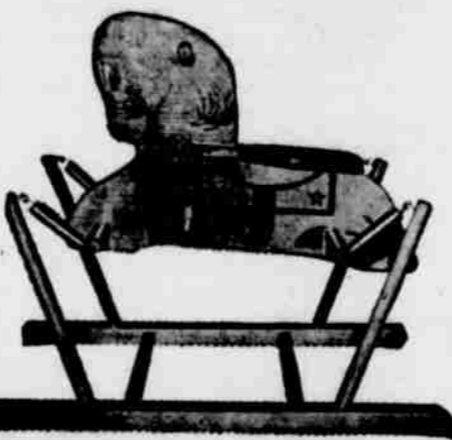

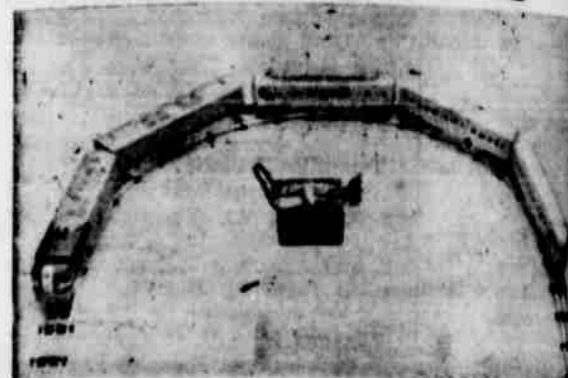

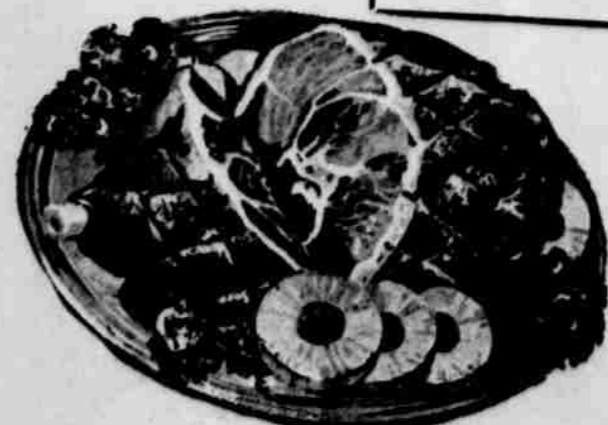

**Flame Cultivation Seen As Aid To Grain Sorghums**

Field drying grain sorghum by the use of flame cultivation was a new experiment conducted at the High Plains Research Foundation in September and October. The objective was to reduce the moisture content to the 13 percent acceptable for safe storage or government loan, without damage.

The results secured were encouraging enough to justify continuation of the experiment. During the winter months the grain sorghum in the Rio Grande Valley and at the Foundation at Halfway in 1961 will be dried.

A high clearance tractor equipped with a flame cultivator was used in the tests. Two additional burners were added per row and the burners placed opposite each other. The flame was directed at the base of the plants in the row. Where the flame from the burners collided, the flame
