

IN CAR-TRUCK WRECK NEAR AMHERST

Crash Kills Muleshoe Man

A young Muleshoe businessman, Willard F. Heathington, was killed in a freak accident near Amherst Monday morning when a tractor-trailer rig skidded out of control on US-84 and crashed head-on into the victim's car.

Heathington, 33, was pronounced dead at the scene by J.N. Bowen, justice of peace from Littlefield. Madison A. Winn, 47, Fort Sumner, N.M., truck driver, was hospitalized in fair condition with head and

facial injuries. Another truck was involved in the collision but the driver, William D. Scott, 29, of Fort Worth was not injured. An unidentified car, which stopped on the highway to make a left turn toward Amherst, apparently touched off the tragic chain of events.

Investigating Texas Highway Patrolmen Bill Angel and Wellington Parson said witnesses reported a car stooped on the highway to make a left turn when Winn, who was headed

southeast, applied his brakes to slow down.

Winn's rig went into a broadside skid and his truck sideswiped the other truck which headed northwest, patrolmen indicated. Then the truck veered across the center stripe and hit almost head-on with Heathington's 1964 Pontiac which was headed northwest.

The new car was a total loss and the tractor part of the truck-trailer was also demolished. The other truck, which came to a safe stop, was not badly dam-

aged. The accident occurred about 11:10 Monday morning 7 miles northwest of Littlefield.

Heathington, born June 18, 1933 in Plainview, has been a resident of Muleshoe since 1946, when he moved there from O'Donnell. The manager of Heathington Lumber Co., he was a veteran of the Korean War. Survivors include his wife, Glens of Muleshoe; two sons, Hal and Ronnie; a daughter, Gayla; two brothers, Aubrey and Kenny; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harris Heathington,

all of Muleshoe; his grandparents, Mrs. Kate Gardenhire of O'Donnell and Mrs. Myrtle Heathington of Lubbock.

Funeral services for Heathington were held Wednesday at 3 p.m. in the Church of Christ at Muleshoe. LeRoy Thompson, minister, officiated and was assisted by the Rev. Don Murray, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Burial was in Muleshoe Cemetery under direction of Singleton Funeral Home.

Mrs. Hammond was a passenger in the car driven by her husband.

Work Starts On New Water Tower In City

Despite a condemnation suit slow-down on right-of-way for pipeline, the city is moving ahead with construction work in a \$988,000 water improvements program.

Work on a 500,000 gallon elevated storage tank has been launched off Sunset Ave. in southwest Littlefield. The tank will be 120 feet high and will be painted in school colors--maroon and white. The tank will be white with maroon lettering. Since the tank will not be far from the new high school, city officials thought it appropriate to use school colors. The Pittsburgh-Des Moines Tank Co. is erecting the water tower. Another storage tank will be located on the Davis farm north of town. The site is the high point between town and the sandhills water tract.

Work is scheduled to begin Monday on distribution lines in the city. Major portion of this construction is the installation of a 14-inch main from the city pump station to the new overhead storage tank. Panhandle Construction Co. of Lubbock is contractor for this job. City crews will also start replacing some 2-inch lines with 4 and 6-inch laterals. Much of this work is to be in the Duggan addition.

Troy Armes was elected president of the Littlefield Industrial Corporation during the first annual stockholders' meeting Tuesday, and members approved the continuation of the corporation as a means of encouraging new industries to locate here. Armes replaces J. C. Hilburn as president. Amherst Girl Top Speller

Debbie Landers of Amherst, second-place winner last year, returned to capture the Lamb County Spelling Bee title Saturday afternoon in the district courtroom, spelling down 11 other winners from six county schools. The vivacious 13-year-old correctly spelled "beauteous" and "bedaub" to put an abrupt end to the 2 1/2-hour long bee. Sheron Wilson of Sudan, 12, slipped up on "beauteous" and wound up in second place. The bee started out with 13 champs--the first and second-place winners from six county schools. A total of 1,210 words were called out by Judge Pat Boone Jr., pronouncer, before the climax came.

Debbie, a 7th grader at Amherst, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L.E. Landers. He is the Santa Fe Railway agent there. Debbie has two sisters, ages 9 and 2. Sheron, the alternate, is a 6th grader at Sudan and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Wilson. Her father is grade school principal. As county champion, Debbie wins a trip to the regional bee in Lubbock April 11. It is sponsored by the Lubbock Avalanche Journal. The regional winner earns a trip to Washington, D.C. for the national contest.

All of the school champs won blue ribbons and Paper-Mate pens, and the county champ will be presented a plaque at Lubbock. The county bees here moved along at a fast elimination pace until half of the contestants had been spelled down. An arbitration board's decision last Saturday on pipeline right-of-way payments to a land owner north of town this week appeared almost certainly headed for an appeal in county court.

Basis of the appeal will be that an award made to Dwain Phillips, the land owner, for passing a pipeline along the roadway before his house must be made in money, not in a lowered rate for water used by him from the city's pipeline, as the 3-man board decided Saturday.

The board ruled that Phillips was entitled to receive water from the city's water line at the same price paid by residents of the city, instead of the rate regularly charged to water users living outside the city limits, 50 percent above the in-city price.

City Attorney Bill Street protested that the award to Phillips "or any other land owner for right of way" has to be in money, not services, in asking the board to award the land owner a cash settlement. Phillips, on the other hand, sought the reduced water rate instead of money.

The condemnation board, in effect, set a water rate for the City of Littlefield, city officials say. It is contrary to existing water rates to which the city is committed for \$988,000 in water system bonds voted several months ago, they add.

The city had taken no definite action on the decision by Wednesday, however Mayor E.W. Armistead indicated that an extensive study of the legal aspects of the case was being made.

Besides the appeal route, the city is also studying the possibility of having the decision set aside on the basis that an award of the type made was not legal. If this action could be taken, the arbitration board would be asked for another decision.

The pipeline work has been proceeding at a rapid pace and the day of decision could arrive about Friday. The pipeline crew was crossing FM-2197 Wednesday after already installing the 24-inch line across four farms near town and starting down the county road.

Unless a decision comes soon on what the city can post in lieu of a cash award, workmen may have to skip the Phillips property and lay the line on down the road. Pipe has already been strung out by the contractor for several miles along the dirt road.

The board's decision put a couple of kinks in the city's schedule to have water flowing in abundance from its sand hills water field by mid-summer. (See APPEAL Page 7)

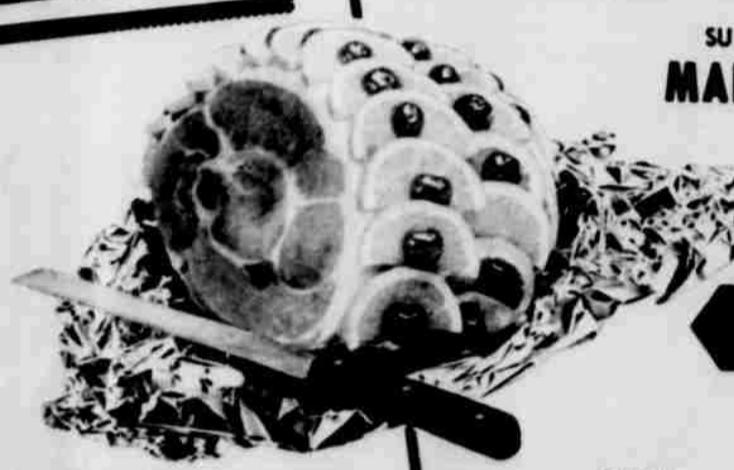

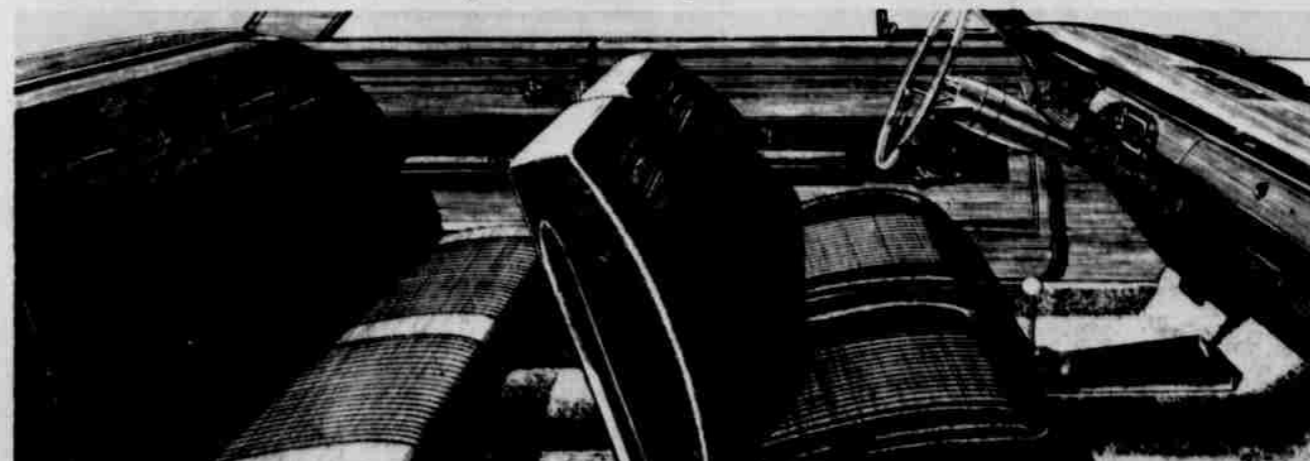

The board's decision, the city attorney declares, was contrary to Texas laws.

An appeal by the city would call for a formal hearing in county court before Judge Davis.

Settling the county road right of way has turned into a larger problem for the city than that of crossing several farms with the pipeline. On one of them a suit was in prospect, but was settled by negotiation.

The roadway easement sought is an agreement with land owners along it to allow the city's pipeline to be laid on a 16 1/2-foot strip that the owners provided for the roadway on either side. The line is coming down the west side of the road, but the city has made its offer to owners on both sides of the 33-foot unpaved roadway.

The first could be over whether they can go ahead and lay a 24-inch pipeline from the city to town along the country way on which Phillips lives.

Ordinarily, when a condemnation award is made and sealed, the agency seeking condemnation can post the amount of the award and go ahead with work through or by the city.

In Phillip's case, there is no set award to be posted, since the city will be the plaintiff, agreement on an amount to be posted may not be established.

An agreement on the lower rate for Phillips, should the city elect not to appeal, might bring some repercussions on 18 other land owners along road route who have agreed to the city's offer.

The city offered, actually, to install a 24-inch water meter tap for land owners along county road at no cost to owner, and to deliver them from the big pipeline at usual out-of-city rate.

In lieu of the meter, tap and pipe, the city would pay \$160 money. The 18 agreements were made on this basis.

On other right-of-way cases suits to be settled, besides Phillips, Ice Cummings, another landowner, protested with Phillips but did not come into Saturday's hearing because parties concerned with his suit could not be served. No suit has been set Wednesday for case.

It is scheduled, however, to be heard by the same board who made the Saturday decision. Members are E.L. Black, D. Feagley and Willie Steffen. The board was appointed County Judge J.B. Davis in agreement with both sides in hearing.

Phillips argued his own case about legal counsel in the Saturday hearing. This put Street

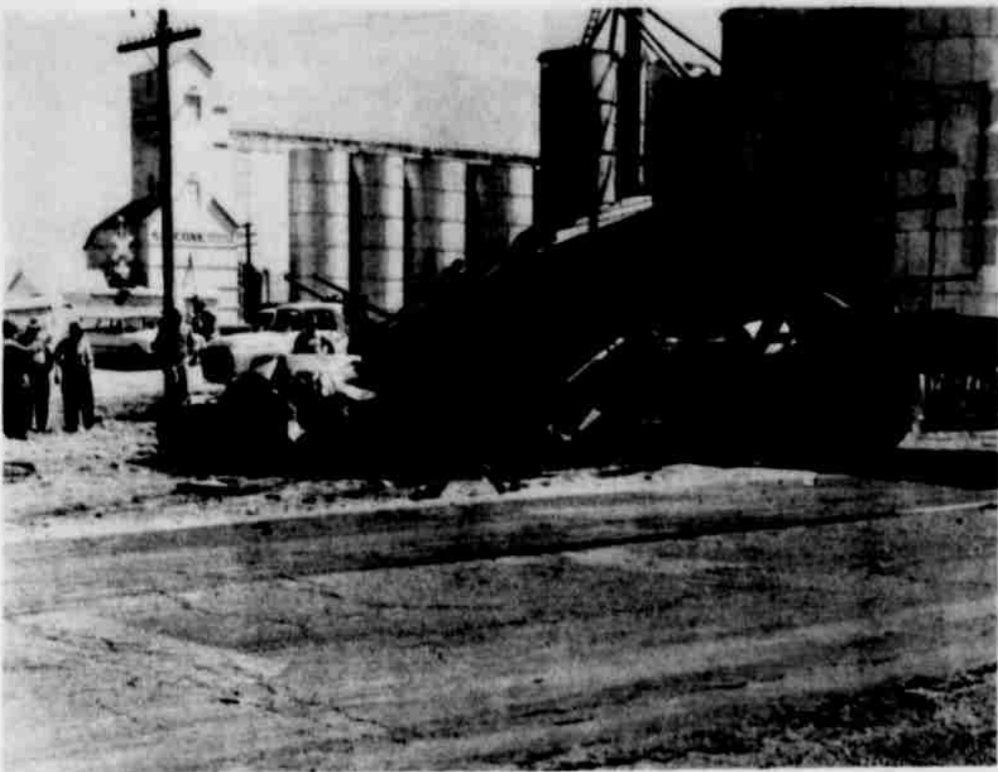

In experiments with two varieties, corms stored at 80 degrees for 15 days bloomed 10 days earlier than untreated corms. Flower yields also were higher.

Weed Control Meeting Set At Levelland

THE latest in weed control will be the agenda for a Hockley County meeting to be held Tuesday. County Agent Bill Taylor says the meeting will start at 8 p.m. in the Women's Building at the Fairgrounds in Levelland.

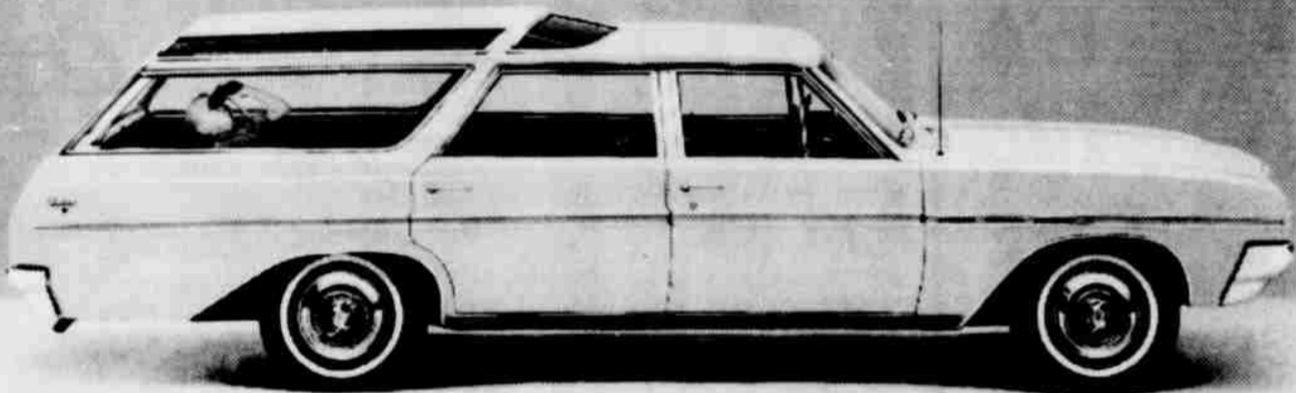

A COURTEOUS NOTICE AND WARNING:

LITTLEFIELD MERCHANTS WILL ENFORCE THE LAW ON BAD CHECK PASSERS

The passing of bad checks has become a problem in Littlefield, one serious enough to require certain procedures in accepting checks. In this procedure, we sincerely request the cooperation and understanding of all persons.

First, we are asking that an address be given on all checks written in the stores listed below. This will be a tremendous help to your merchants, and will be appreciated.

Second, if a check is returned, a notice will be sent to the giver giving the reason. It will ask that he make any corrections necessary to clearing the check.

Third, IF THE CHECK IS NOT CLEARED WITHIN A SHORT PERIOD OF TIME, IT WILL BE REFERRED TO THE COUNTY ATTORNEY FOR FULL ACTION UNDER THE TEXAS HOT CHECK LAW.

The County Attorney has assured full cooperation in prosecuting on bad checks. He will not negotiate once a check is referred, but will go ahead with enforcement with the full support of the merchant who holds the check.

THE PURPOSE WILL BE TO CONVICT ANY OFFENDER WHO KNOWINGLY DEFRAUDS WITH A BAD CHECK.

Only by doing this can the important practice of doing business by check be kept simple and easy for everyone.

A listing of bad checks will be kept by merchants and will be available to business firms. Anyone with a check on this list will not have his check accepted by any of these business firms, until all checks are cleared in all businesses.

TEXAS "HOT CHECK" LAW

THE LAW

It is unlawful for any person to give a check, draft or order for any purpose with intent to defraud and knowing at the time that he or she has not sufficient funds in the bank to pay such check, draft or order, in full and all other checks upon such funds then outstanding.

It is unlawful for any employer to give a check, draft or order for salary or wages, knowing at the time that he or she has not sufficient funds in the bank to pay such check, draft or order in full and all other checks upon such funds then outstanding.

Failure of the maker to pay the holder of a check, draft or order within ten days after he has been given notice by the holder that the check was refused by the drawee (Bank), shall be evidence of intent to defraud. This notice may be given by the holder in person or by registered mail.

THE PENALTIES

For the first conviction of a violation of this law:

- On checks, drafts or orders of \$5.00 or less, the punishment shall be, A fine not exceeding \$200.00.
- On checks, drafts or orders over \$5.00, but less than \$50.00, the punishment shall be, By imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding two years, or by a fine not exceeding \$1,000.00, or by both such fine and imprisonment.
- On checks, drafts or orders of \$50.00 or more, the punishment shall be, By confinement in the penitentiary for not less than two nor more than ten years, and by a fine not exceeding \$10,000.00.

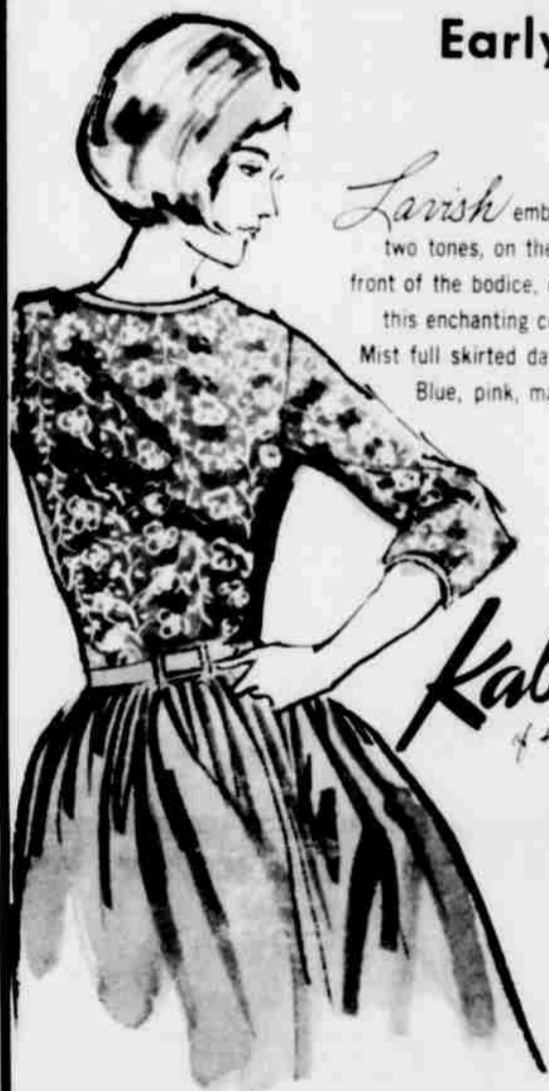

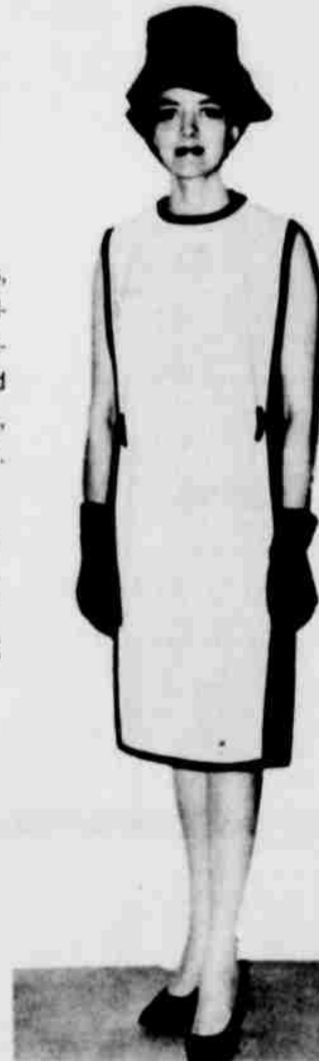
