# Crash Kills Muleshoe Man

A young Muleshoe business-man, Willard F. Heathington, was killed in a freak accident near Amherst Monday morning when a tractor-trailer rig skidded out of control on US-84 and crashed head-on into the vic-

Heathington, 33, was pronounced dead at the scene by J.N. Bowen, justice of peace from Littlefield. Madison A. Winn, 47, Fort Sumner, N.M., truck driver, was hospitalized

Another truck was involved in the collision but the driver, William D. Scott, 29, of Fort Worth was not injured. An identified car, which stopped on the highway to make a left turn toward Amherst, apparently touched off the tragic chain of

Investigating Texas Highway Patrolmen Bill Angel and Wel-don Parson said witnesses reported a car stooped on the highway to make a left turn when Winn, who was headed

to slow down.
Winn's rig went into a broadside skid and his truck sideswiped the other truck which headed northwest, patrolmen indicated. Then the truck veered across the center stipe and hit almost head-on with Heathington's 1964 Pontiac which was headed northwest.

The new car was a total loss and the tractor part of the trucktrailer was also demolished.

Heathington, born June 18, 1933 in Plainview, has been a resident of Muleshoe since 1946, when he moved there from O' Donnell. The manager of Heathington Lumber Co., he was a

### On New Water **Tower In City**

Despite a condemnation suit low-down on right-of-way for pipeline, the city is moving ahead with construction work in a \$988,000 water improvements program.

Work on a 500,000 gallon ele-vated storage tank has been launched off Sunset Ave. in southwest Littlefield. The tank will be 120 feet high and will be painted in school colors--maroon and white. The tank will be white with maroon lettering Since the tank will not be far

from the new high school, city officials thought it appropriate to use school colors. The Pittsburg-Des Moines Tank Co. is erecting the water tower. Another storage tank will be located on the Davis farm north of town. The site is the high point between town and the sandhills water tract.

Work is scheduled to begin Monday on distribution lines in the city. Major portion of this construction is the installation of a 14-inch main from the city pump station to the new over-head storage tank. Panhandle Construction Co. of Lubbock is contractor for this job.

City crews will also start replacing some 2-inch lines with 4 and 6-inch laterals, Much of this work is to be in the Dug-

a land owner north of town this week appeared almost cer-tainly headed for an appeal in county court.

Basis of the appeal will be that an award made to Dwain Phillips, the land owner, for passing a pipeline along the roadway before his house must be made in money, not in a lowered rate for water used by him from the city's pipeline, as the 3-man board decided Saturday.

The board ruled that Phillips was entitled to receive water from the city's water line at the same price paid by residents of the city, instead of the rate regularly charged to water users living outside the city limits, 50 percent above

the in-city price.
City Attorney Bill Street protested that the award to Phillips "or any other land owner for right of way" has to be in money, not services, in asking the board to award the land owner a cash settlement. Phillips, on the other hand, sought of money.

The condemnation board, in effect, set a water rate for the City of Littlefield, city officials say. It is contrary to existing water rates to which the city is committed for \$988,000 in water

action on the decision by Wednesday, however Mayor B.W. Armistead indicated that an extensive study of the legal aspects of the case was being made.

Besides the appeal route, the city is also studying the possi-bility of having the decision set aside on the basis that an award of the type made was not legal. If this action could be taken, the arbitration board would be asked for another decision.

The pipeline work has been proceeding at a rapid pace and the day of decision could arrive about Friday. The pipeline crew was crossing FM-2197 Wednesday after already installing the 24-inch line across four farms near town and starting down the county road.

Unless a decision comes soon on what the city can post in lieu of a cash award, workmen may have to skip the Phillips property and lay the line on down the road. Pipe has already been strung out by the contractor for several miles along the dirt road.

The board's decision put a couple of kinks in the city's schedule to have water flowing in abundance from its sand hills water field by mid-sum-







# LITTLEFIELD MERCHANTS WILL ENFORCE THE LAW ON BAD CHECK PASSERS

The passing of bad checks has become a problem in Littlefield, one serious enough to require certain procedures in accepting checks. In this procedure, we sincerely request the co-operation and understanding of all persons.

First, we are asking that an address be givan on all checks written in the stores listed below. This will be a tremendous help to your merchants, and will be appreciated.

Second, if a check is returned, a notice will be sent to the giver giving the reason. It will ask that he make any corrections necessary to clearing the check.

Third, IF THE CHECK IS NOT CLEARED WITHIN A SHORT PERIOD OF TIME, IT WILL BE REFERRED TO THE COUNTY ATTORNEY FOR FULL ACTION UNDER THE TEXAS HOT CHECK LAW.

The County Attorney has assured full cooperation in prosecuting on bad checks. He will not negotiate once a check is referred, but will go ahead with enforcement with the full support of the merchant who holds the check.

THE PURPOSE WILL BE TO CONVICT ANY OFFENDER WHO KNOWINGLY DE-FRAUDS WITH A BAD CHECK.

Only by doing this can the important practice of doing business by check be kept simple and easy for everyone.

A listing of bad checks will be kept by merchants and will be available to business firms. Anyone with a check on this list will not have his check accepted by any of these business firms, until all checks are cleared in all busines. ses.



## **Lamb County Republicans** Plan Large Scale Primary

have their first large-scale party primary in county his-tory on May 2, a vote that may have some effect over in the primary of the opposition Dem-

ocratic party.

The party primary in Texas long has been an exclusive Democratic party show that, until a few years back, in effect elected Texas office holders. Republicans have shown up in some strength at general elections, but usually not until RECOGNIZED-Larry Wood, Littlefield High School senior and all-around athlete, was no-

then. This year they will have two races of high party interest to bring them to their own party primary polls, one for U.S. Senate and a preferential choice by the Sunrise Optimist Club of Lubbock. Larry was recipient of a merit certificate this week for President.

There are four candidates for the Republican nomination for U.S. Senator, a record field. They are Davis, Jack Cox--party standard bearer for gov-Texas nominate young men for ernor two years ago -- George Bush and Robert Morris.

While this race promises ac-tion for GOP's, their big primary interest probably will tocus on the presidential preference vote, one that will guide Texas delegates to the national convention in August where the nominee will be named. "awry." Danny Glasscock of Springlake has previously mis-spelled "accommodation" to

In Texas, the choice will be limited to U.S. Senator Barry Goldwater of Arizona and Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York.

This is a smaller field than the state Republican executive committee planned two weeks back when they put the preferential primary on the ballot. Eight GOP hopefuls were listed initially, including former vice president Richard Nixon and Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, who won the recent New

Hampshire primary, Since however, all but Gold-water and Rockefeller have asked to be left off the Texas ballot, a choice they can make. Goldwater has notable strength among Texas GOP's,

a fact that may have limited the presidential field in the state's first preferential vote. Rockefeller, however, has indicated that he may make a firm campaign in the state. If he does, the Goldwater faithful are expected to be at their primary polls on May 2 to be counted for their candidate.

tic voting on that day. Traditionally, many Texans who could be expected to vote Republican in general elections in November have shown up to vote in the Democratic primaries where practically all local officials--sheriff, county judge, etc.--are elected. Below the office of Congressman, the Democratic nomination in Texas has always been tantamount to election.

This year, however, the interest on their own ballot may keep the Republicans at their own polling place on May 2. This year, also, primary election officials will stamp poll tax receipts with a "Demo-crat" or "Republican" identification, an action that would prevent crossing over in the second primary election, which one or both parties will have in most counties.

A full-fledged GOP primary will put new demands on the growing Texas Republican numbers. Expenses of primaries are borne largely by county candidates--who pay up to \$600 each on the Lamb county Demo ticket--and there are no GOP local candidates.

This may mean that unpaid volunteer party members will

up the election. Republicans welcome their own party primary as an important step towards developing a balanced two-party system in Texas, long exclusive territory for the Democrats.

Early plans were for a Re-publican slate in the county for local offices, a plan that seemed harder to implement after the assassination of President Kennedy.

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
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
