Amendment Gets Smashing Defeat

In spite of bitter opposition, especially on the South Plains, the amendment to the state constitution appeared to have every chance of passing.

In Lamb county the amendment received a smashing defeat. Final tabulation showed: 565 against; 24 for the amendment.

As the Texas Election Bureau prepared to wind up final tabulation of Saturday's election, the latest figures included returns from 229 of 254 counties, and favored the amendment 95,248 to 82,742 with 81 counties complete.

He is also survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Wood, and six brothers, Jim, Tom, and Woody of Wellington; Jack of Lubbock; Ray of Sudan, and Odie of Earth; and also a grandmother, 92 years of age, and two grand children, Elmer Earl and Deanna Wood.

He was converted and joined the Methodist Church in 1922, and was a member of the local church at the time of his death.

Homer Snowden, one of the largest producers in the oil world, announced in an interview with a Leader reporter that if present plans are realized his company would start drilling shortly in Lamb and Hockley counties. The company plans to drill wells north of Littlefield and near Levelland.

Main purpose of Mr. Snowden's visit here was to see the opening performance of Harley Sadler's show which is on the road again after an absence of several years. Snowden is an old friend of Harley and Billie Sadler.

The guests arrived Monday afternoon at the local airport in 15 airplanes. They were greeted by Mayor Art Chesher, Harley and Mrs. Sadler, and a large group of Littlefieldans.

Before landing, Snowden's pilots put on an exhibition of stunt flying for the spectators.

In the party were Mrs. Snowden, the former Maxine Courtney of Littlefield, children, Jackie and Charles, and Snowden Oil Company officials.

FOUR ACRES OF PLANES

Mr. Snowden owns 1,543 army surplus airplanes purchased from the War Assets Commission. Plans are to sell them to a foreign government after they are repaired. The planes are trainers, both single and twin-engine types, which were used by the U. S. Army Air Forces in training student pilots.

I read in a copy of the Clovis Journal, which my neighbor had been using on his tractor seat to keep the sun from gettin' it too hot while he went to the house to get a drink of water Monday afternoon where the Attorney General of the United States has heard prices is too high and has set out to investigate the matter.



Now I don't want to horn in on somebody else's job, and I don't suppose no investigation I made would be scientific, but if the Attorney General wants to save time and I believe I can help him out, at reasonable price.

I don't know what method he will use, but it probably will involve a lot of travelin' around and checkin' up and require a lot of help and cost the government a lot of money, which I am in favor of if it will reduce prices, whereas my method will get the same results and won't cost the government much more's one Senator's stamp bill for two or three months during an election year.

some of my grocery and drygoods and hardware and miscellaneous bills, in fact, I really don't need to save em as I get new ones every month coveri' the same old ones, some business men bein' more optimistic than others when it comes to the delicate matter of my credit standin', and if Attorney General Clark really wants to find out right away whether prices is too high or not, I will send him my batch of bills if he will agree to settle for em.

New Vocational Program Announced For Local Schools

Supt. Joe C. Hutchinson announced that a new vocational program, Distributive Education, will be installed in Littlefield High School for the first time this year.

Distributive Education is a vocational program of interest to all students who will make their careers in retail, wholesale, or service selling businesses. In addition to classroom

training which the students will receive during the morning and in addition to other school courses, training will be offered in downtown business houses for students who enroll.

One objective of the Distributive Education program is to bridge the gap between school and employment for high school graduates. Trainees who enroll in this program receive laboratory credit, as well as a training wage, for the work which they do in downtown stores, and this work is supervised by the coordinator employed by the High School.

This new program has been close-

ly tied in with the business education classes already offered in the High School supplementing the school offerings in a valuable way. Students who enroll may receive training in stock control, buying, merchandising, selling, advertising, display, personnel work, credit office work, interior decoration, in any of the numerous fields associated with retail, wholesale or service selling.

Mr. E. F. Bingham of San Angelo, who has been elected to be the local coordinator of the program, is contacting interested students and businessmen who wish to cooperate in the program.

Students in the Junior and Senior Classes are eligible to participate in this training, provided they are 14 years old or older. Students will receive full credit for this work in Distributive Education, so that they will graduate with their class.

WASHINGTON—The War Department said Friday probably only two ships bringing home American War dead will reach the United States this year.
The first, with about 3,500 bodies, is due at San Francisco about Oct. 10. A second, bringing some 6,300, mainly from the Henri Chapelle Cemetery in Belgium, is scheduled to reach New York Oct. 25.
When the caskets arrive in this country relatives will be notified. It is expected to take about thirty days from the time the caskets are landed before they reach their destinations.
Further shipments are not expected until spring.

Housewife Discovers Stain-Proof Process

Stepping where scientists were balked, a California housewife undertook an experiment in her own wash tub that resulted in a boon to her sisters.

The discovery that was made by Mrs. Henry O. Dorman of 1121 Stearns Drive, Los Angeles, was that an unsuccessful formula for rendering paper water-repellent was actually a highly successful formula for stain-proofing fabrics.

The formula, now known as "Stainproof", has just been made available to home users after having, according to Lt. Gen. E. B. Gregory, U. S. A., Q. M. C. (Ret.), filled an important war role in protecting the clothing and hospital supplies of our G. I.'s.

Carrying on what Mr. Dorman began, the Stainproof Co. of Los Angeles has also just succeeded in compounding the formula with starch making it possible to starch fabrics and at the same time render them water-repellent and proof against such horrors as tomato catsup, meat gravy and the like.

The magic of Stainproof discovered by Mrs. Dorman also protects curtains from an incidious action known to scientists as "sun rot". This occurs through a constant cycle of hydration and dehydration each 24 hours, the curtains soaking up moisture from the air during the hours of darkness and then being dried to tinder degree by the sun during the

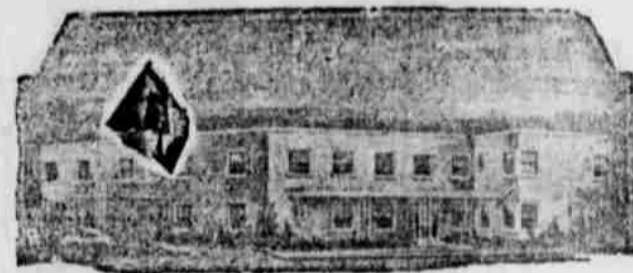
day. Mrs. Dorman's discovery prevents sun rot by keeping the curtains constantly dry.

The formula had a long record of failure, beginning in Europe, before Mrs. Dorman took it firmly in hand. In Europe scientists tried fruitlessly to use it to make bricks and mortar water-repellent. In this country an attempt as made to use it to render cardboard boxes water-repellent for use in shipping agricultural products. Mrs. Dorman's husband was interested in that phase and brought a bottle of the formula home one night.

After he had gone next morning, Mrs. D., being a bit of a home scientist herself, washed out a tablecloth and used a little of the formula in the rinse water. Then she dried and ironed the cloth. It was not a good tablecloth, but nonetheless it made her shudder when she deliberately spilled meat gravy, Worcestershire sauce, cherry juice, ink and other vicious staining agents over it. Stainproof was born the minute that she found the stains washed right out.

The secret of Stainproof is simple. Minute particles of wax, conveyed by aluminum salts, are so thickly deposited around the fibers of a material that they coat them.

As a result, no stain can "soak" into the fibers and thus it is simply "flushed" from the fabric by the application of soap and water.
